Urgent, Prison Site Public Hearing Set

Men, Women, Children Urged To Attend April 1

"As you all know we have made the short list for a prison facility to be located in this community," Jay Messenger said, when speaking to the Rotary Club meeting at noon Tuesday.

"A public hearing has been scheduled for Wednesday, April 1 at 7 p.m. in the high school auditorium. You are urgently needed to give positive support. A representative of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice will be present to take a head count. Those attending will sign in and have an opportunity to speak for or against the prison site.

"A 1,000 bed prison facility would create 300 new jobs and an annual payroll of \$6 million.

"The community's continued support is mandatory. When we first started to work on this project they were to build six, 1,000 bed and three 2250 bed facilities. That has changed today they are talking about 18,--500 bed, six, 1000 bed and three 2250 bed facilities. And the 2250 bed facilities may be become 12 facilities.

"I feel better about this project now than I did when we went into it. Everyone told us it was unlikely we would get a prison site the first time we tried. We went into it thinking we would learn and get the community involved. I now think we have a good chance of getting the prison site.

"If we don't get a prison site this time I think we can hold our heads high. We have had a number of

complements from the Texas Department of Criminal Justice. We have made a good impression.

"If we don't get the prison site, we haven't lost much but labor. What we are doing is selling our resources, soil, weather, growing season and our vegetables. What we throw away, the prison system wants to get their hands on.

"We are going to have a prison site located within 60 miles of Muleshoe.

"We're down to the last little thing, the public hearing and we Cont. Page 6, Col. 4

urgently need all of the community's support. We need to fill the auditorium. Everyone is asked to bring their spouse, children, parents, living in this community. Some of you are business men, you are encouraged to talk to your employees. Employees, bring your friends. Now is the time to show your support. The prison official will literally count heads, and tape the meeting. The head count and tape will then be taken to Huntsville.

"The building will hold about 800 people and we want some standing outside. At the first meeting we had about 300.

I have contacted Farwell and Sudan and plan to contact Friona seeking their support.

When asked if he had had any negative words about the site Messenger replied "I have not been contacted about anyone being against the site, I have had 100 percent support."

"We should know the final decision in two and half or three weeks," Messenger concluded.

Businesses Must File Rendition Forms

State Comptroller John Sharp has reminded Texas businesses that they must file property rendition forms with county appraisal districts by March 31, listing the taxable property which they owned or managed as of January 1, 1992.

State law requires that anyone who owns or manages income-producing personal property on January 1 must file a rendition statement with the local appraisal district.

"For example, businesses must report their inventories, furniture

and fixtures, machinery and equipment and other tangible business property on a rendition. Filing this annual report is actually to their benefit because chief appraisers use the renditions to establish a property's value," Sharp said. "When a business' personal property is not rendered, the chief appraiser can only estimate the value."

Sharp also announced that businesses whose property was damaged by a storm, flood or fire last year may file a special decreased value report which could lower their final tax bills.

"Businesses which suffered damage during Christmas-New Year flooding across Texas may be able to receive a tax break to help them through the tough times ahead, but they must still file the paperwork by the March 31 deadline," Sharp said.

While business owners and operators are required by law to file renditions, any property owner--including homeowners, farmers and ranchers--may voluntarily file one, or the report of decreased value. Cont. Page 6, Col. 1

MISD Students Easter Vacation Dates Changed

At Monday night's meeting, the Trustees of the Muleshoe Independent School District voted to amend this year's calendar so that students and faculties would have the Monday after Easter as a holiday. Superintendent Bill Moore recommended the change saying, "This will give families the day after Easter as travel time to return home." The Good Friday holiday remained unchanged.

Two "bad weather" days were built into the calendar, as required by law, and were scheduled originally for Thursday, April 16 and Monday, April 20. "Since we had to use one day for snow in January, we lost one of those holidays. Feedback we have received indicated that it would be better to have Friday and Monday as holidays at Easter rather than Thursday and Friday," Moore added.



Dietitian Advises Caution On Rapid Weight Loss

If your clothes are feeling a little snug these days, attending a quick weight-loss program to drop those extra pounds may sound appealing. But a Texas Christian University dietitian suggested that problems may lurk in promises to rapidly melt away excess body fat.

"You should be leery of any weight-loss weight at a rate greater than a pound and a half to two pounds a week," explained Registered Dietitian Dr. Mary Ann Gorman, chairman of TCU's nutrition and dietetics department.

Most dietitians will classify plans offering quicker weight loss as dangerous, Gorman said. "It's usually weight that'll come right back."

Those with few pounds to lose can modify food consumption and increase exercise to lower weight. "There's a balance between intake and expenditure, and a healthy way to lose weight is a combination of moderate exercise and just lowering the calories slightly every day," she said.

Gorman recommended eating 100 to 200 fewer calories daily. Depending on body size, as many as 500 calories may need to be cut from the daily diet, she said.

"A pound of fat is 3,500 calories, so if you want to lose a pound of weight in seven days, that's going to be 500 calories a day for the average person, she noted.

Gorman recommended consuming a balanced diet while emphasizing fatty foods and increasing the amount of complex carbohydrates, like rice, pasta and potatoes. She also suggested eating more fruits and vegetables.

Substitute some plant proteins such as beans or rice for meat, Gorman added. "You'll still be getting all of the benefits of protein in the diet, but you're not adding a lot of fat," she said.

While cutting calories is a part of weight reduction, Gorman said a

moderate intensity, long-duration exercise program of 20 to 30 minutes of walking or low-impact aerobics also can be beneficial. "This type of exercise will raise your basal metabolic rate," she added.

This measure addresses the calories expended in performing minimal functions to stay alive such as breathing and production of enzymes and hormones. With an elevated basal metabolic rate, which is present for up to 15 hours after a workout, the body effortlessly expends a few additional calories. "You don't have to sweat to lose those calories," she said.

Each person's metabolic rate varies, and that affects the rate of weight loss, according to Gorman. She said people who become too number-oriented may risk developing eating disorders.

A person who has more than a few pounds to lose should have his or health condition evaluated by a physician before beginning a weight-reduction regimen, Gorman said.

The services of a registered dietitian may be part of a doctor-directed weight-loss plan. Such a person has at least four years of college-level nutrition education plus a year of practical experience under the supervision of a registered dietitian, Gorman explained. A successful score on a nationally administered examination is also required.

Gorman cautioned those seeking

weight reduction services from special clinics to ask if registered dietitians staff the programs. She said also to ask if dietitians were consulted regarding foods that clinics may offer as part of a weight-loss plan.

Although a variety of methods are available for weight reduction, Gorman said long-term success depends on learning healthy eating habits.

shall also post, at the polling place used in the preceding general election, notice of the precinct's consolidation and the location of the polling place in the consolidated precinct. A notice posted under this subsection must remain posted continuously through election day.

(c) In addition to any other notice given, notice of an election ordered by a commissioners court or by an authority of a city or school district must be given by the method prescribed by Subsection (a)(1).

(d) If other law prescribes the method of giving notice of an election, that law supersedes this section, except that Subsection (c) applies regardless of the notice requirements prescribed by other law with respect to an election covered by that subsection.

(e) The authority responsible for giving notice of the election shall deliver to the secretary of state a copy of the notice of a consolidated precinct required by Subsection (b) not later than the date of the election.

*** Newspaper eligible for publication of notice.** Art. 28a, Revised Statutes, prescribes the criteria that a newspaper must satisfy in order to be eligible for publication of official notices, as follows:

The term "newspaper" shall mean any newspaper devoting not less than twenty-five (25) per cent of its total column lineage to the carrying of items of general interest, published not less frequently than once each week, entered as second-class postal matter in the county where published, and having been published regularly and continuously for not less than twelve (12) months prior to the making of any publication mentioned in this Act.

Location of bulletin board for posting notice. Sec. 3a, Art. 6252-17, Revised Statutes (the Open Meetings Law), provides for the posting of notice of meetings of governmental bodies as follows:

(b) A State governmental body shall furnish notice to the Secretary of State, who shall then post the notice on a bulletin board to be located in the main office of the Secretary of State at a place convenient to the public.

(c) A city governmental body shall have a notice posted on a bulletin board to be located at a place convenient to the public in the city hall.

(d) A county governmental body shall have a notice posted on a bulletin board located at a place convenient to the public in the county courthouse.

(e) A school district shall have a notice posted on a bulletin board located at a place convenient to the public in its central administrative office . . .

(f) A governmental body of a water district or other district or political subdivision covering all or part of four or more counties shall have a notice posted at a place convenient to the public in its administrative office, and shall also furnish the notice to the Secretary of State, who shall then post the notice on a bulletin board located in the main office of the Secretary of State at a place convenient to the public; and it shall also furnish the notice to the county clerk of the county in which the administrative office of the district or political subdivision is located, who shall then post the notice on a bulletin board located at a place convenient to the public in the county courthouse.

Larry Logan Performs In Hereford

A concert was held in Hereford Monday, March 23 at 8 p.m. in the Hereford High School Auditorium. This was the third of the 1991-92 season for Hereford concert subscribers.

The harmonica, usually a rural down-home kind of instrument, appeared in its earliest form around 1100 B.C. From that beginning the harmonica with its compact size and unique musical qualities became a very personal kind of instrument. It was lightweight and traveled with its owner into the uncharted wilderness, into the lonely tenements of the city.

It was also a means of instant expression ranging from happy toe-tapping renditions to mournful wails of loneliness.

In this century the harmonica has found its way out of the backwoods and the grey ghettos of the city to the very pinnacle of musical expression--the concert stage. Its unique sound was preserved and enriched by the full orchestration of a philharmonic symphony. This rise in stature is due primarily to three American harmonica virtuosos--Larry Adler, John Sebastian and now Larry Logan.

Logan fits comfortably into the category reserved for high-ranking artists who have developed their technical skill to the point where virtuosity is limited only by human imagination. He is, at the same time, a musician of great sensitivity and courage because there was, and still is, general public misunderstanding and resistance to the harmonica as an instrument for serious musical express.

His has been a varied and exciting career that has meant world travel, performances with the show business greats of our time and symphony orchestras here and abroad. It has been on the concert stage that Larry Logan has made the most dramatic contributions to his art. Logan has been converting disbelieving concert-goers for over 30 years. Audiences and critics alike have expressed awe of this unusual talent who so skillfully interprets the master composers from Bach to Gershwin. He has performed thousands of concerts in his career and chronologically is the third person in the world to perform as soloist on the harmonica with major symphony orchestras. They include the orchestras of St. Louis, Washington, D.C., Birmingham,

Nashville, Shreveport, Manila, Singapore, San Juan and New Orleans.

Another notable credit to this career was his selection by the U.S. State Department as a member of the President's International Cultural Exchange Program. This service as American's "Musical Envoy" carried him throughout the Far East where he was heard by a greater audience than had ever before attended recitals and concerts of one playing the harmonica.

Relaxed the moment he walks on the stage he greets his audiences with an Irish wit, then transforms the mood into a truly virtuoso performance.

Larry Logan, is properly listed among the elite few who have elevated the harmonica to the concert stage. From a hobby which began during his childhood, Logan developed his talent to the point that his performances on the little known instrument (at least in serious music) led to a career of recitals and as soloist with major symphony orchestras throughout the world. He has also worked with a stunning array of legendary names in show business. They include Bob Hope, Rudy Vallee, Eddie Cantor, Jimmy Durante, Gizele MacKenzie, Lisa Kirk, Cab Calloway, Mickey Rooney and a host of others.

His greatest accomplishment, however, has been in overcoming the doubts about the harmonica as a solo instrument in classical concerts. To that end, he has appeared in thousands of concerts performing to millions worldwide.

Recently added to the many achievements of his distinguished career, Logan has been included in the 1989 edition of Who's Who in Music by the International Biographical Institute of Cambridge, England.

Protect your rights! "Render" your property by March 31st.

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on January 1st of this year. The rendition form is available at your local appraisal district office... or you may draft a similar form.

Who must file a rendition?

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income--such as the inventory and equipment used by a business.

Are there any advantages to you?

The advantages of filing a rendition are:

- ☑ You give your opinion of your property's value. If the appraisal district believes the value is higher. It must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.
- ☑ You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.
- ☑ You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 1991. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 1992.

What's the deadline?

The last day for filing or postmarking 1992 renditions is Tuesday, March 31. You can get an extra 30 days if you ask for it in writing by the March 31 deadline.

Where do you file?

File renditions with your local appraisal district at:



All property owners may also receive a 30-day extension for either form but still file a written request with the appraisal district by the March 31 deadline.

Sharp noted that homeowners who voluntarily file a rendition are in a better position to exercise their rights as taxpayers. First, they are ensuring that the appraisal district has their correct address so that they are notified of any schedule hearings or actions that may affect their property or tax bills.

"If the tax collector cannot deliver a tax bill because of an incorrect address, a property owner is still responsible for paying the taxes plus the penalties that may result from late payment," Sharp said.

Also, a rendition offers an opportunity for property owners to record their opinions of their property's value.

Finally, by recording an opinion, property owners have made sure that the chief appraiser must send them a notice before placing a higher value on their property. This notice allows property owners the time to gather information to protest the appraisal if they believe the proposed value is too high.

If a property is appraised by more than one appraisal district, the

property owner should file a rendition in each appraisal district office.

Rendition forms are available at local district offices. For more information, contact local appraisal district offices or the Comptroller's Property Tax Division at 1-800-252-9121.

FLBA Represented At Stockholders Meeting

Representatives of the Federal Land Bank Association (FLBA) of Muleshoe were among more than 500 attendees at the Farm Credit Bank of Texas 1992 Annual Meeting for FLBAs, according to Association President William C. Liles.

The annual stockholders event, held in Austin, commemorated FLBAs' 75th anniversary of making long-term agricultural land and rural housing loans.

Local FLBA directors and staff who attended were James Glaze, Jimmie Pitcock and Don McDonald, all of Muleshoe; Billy D. Baxter of Friona; and Donald Christian of Oklahoma Lane.

Highlights of the year included interest rate reductions to variable rate stockholders, bringing the rate from 9.75 percent at the beginning of the year to 8.95 percent currently; development of a lending division geared specifically to the needs of agribusiness; and introduction of an adjustable rate loan program, with rates tied to a Treasury index.

In addition, the district bank returned \$14 million in patronage refunds to district FLBAs last year to help them build financial strength.

The FLBA of Muleshoe has

\$25 million in long-term agricultural loans to farmers in two counties," said William C. Liles, president. The office is located in Muleshoe.

"The Tenth Farm Credit District has approximately \$3.6 billion in loans outstanding to nearly 60,000 borrowers."

Former Muleshoe Resident Featured In Colorado River

This article recently appeared in the Fort Collins Coloradoan. Johnson, who was raised in Muleshoe is the son of Evelyn Johnson and brother of Roald (Buck) Johnson, both of Muleshoe.

The people who live and work in a community define it. People like Jim Johnson are Fort Collins.

His deep roots, his long public service record, his involvement in local causes and his longevity here give him a rare perspective on the community. From the vantage point of his law office on West Magnolia Street, Johnson can sit back and reflect on 33 years of

change in Fort Collins.

Johnson came here in 1959. He was a young lawyer, a University of Colorado graduate and Korean War veteran who had flown F-9F Panther jets for the Marines. Johnson came here with his wife, Nancy, at a time when Fort Collins was a little town with a homey feel, a downtown business district three blocks long and not much industry.

"We thought it was the most wonderful place we'd ever been," Johnson said. "It was great place to raise kids, and it had a really fine amalgamation between the university and the town. It traditionally has had an openness and friendliness and a tolerance within the community that makes it very appealing."

Now, at the age of 61, he still thinks so. The city is almost four times bigger, the university has expanded three times. There are 10 times as many lawyers now and a number of major industries now reside here. But from what he can judge, the people who live here feel the same way about Fort Collins as they did back in the '50s.

"I don't know why I'd leave. I feel sorry for people who have to move away."

Johnson's life and career have been busy in the intervening years. The clip file on him in the Coloradoan library is a fat one.

In the early years, he was appointed a deputy district attorney, one of two in Fort Collins, which was his start in politics. In 1966, he ran for a seat in congress as a moderate Republican with an anti-Vietnam War platform. At the time, he was described by a colleague as "a dove in a congressional district that had as many doves as it had lobster pots."

He lost, but when he ran again in 1972 for the same job, the anti-war movement had gained some respectability. The first Republican congressman from this area in 24 years, he claimed the seat in Colorado's 4th District for eight years, or four terms, before he gave it up to Hank Brown and came home to Fort Collins.

In 1980, he was being talked about as a candidate for secretary of the interior under President Reagan. He was also on the short list for the presidency of Colorado State University, to succeed A.R. Chamberlain. He didn't get either of those jobs, but he was close.

Most recently, he was appointed in 1991 by the state Supreme Court to serve on the

reapportionment committee. He has worked with a group called Americans to Limit Congressional Terms, and was outspoken in his views about deadwood collecting in the U.S. Congress. He was appointed by Gov. Roy Romer in 1989 to serve on the Colorado Commission on Higher Education. In 1985 he served on the Colorado Water Conservation Board.


Locally, he has long been a supporter of the Children's Clinic. He was actively involved in getting it started, he handles its legal work and is now waiting on final funding from the state to close on its new building. "That's really been one of the nicest things that's happened in this community, one of the most worthwhile," he said.

He has served on church boards, including the board of a seminary in San Francisco for many years.

"I've worked on so many fundraising boards over the years. I think people cross the street to avoid me, because they think I'm going to ask them for money," he said with a laugh.

Johnson now practices law with his son, Drake Johnson. "He says he does all the work and I drive the company car," the senior Johnson said.





Exercise Helps Self-Image

Research reveals that one of the best ways to raise self-image and increase creativity is through exercise. Self-image studies have found that people who are stronger and more muscularly fit have a significantly better self-image than their peers. In addition, psychological tests have discovered that those who exercise are more confident, emotionally stable and outgoing than those who are sedentary.

Joan C. Gondola, associate professor of physical education at Baruch College in New York, found the same positive results of exercise on creativity levels when she administered a test on female college students. One group had exercised 20 minutes before Ms. Gondola gave the tests and the other group had not; the exercise group had more imaginative responses than those that had not.

Gondola attributes this boost in creativity to the release of adrenaline and endorphins during exercise. The right side of the brain is stimulated by these chemicals which control the creative and intuitive processes. "This puts us in a more meditative state," said Gondola. "We become clearer, more spatially aware, more open to stimuli and to the creative process in general."
