Spring Forward, but Fall Back on **Sun Protection**

spring is coming, Daylight Saving Time began this year on Sunday, March 13th at 2 AM. An extra hour of daylight each day means not just longer days, but additional exposure to solar ultraviolet (UV) radiation. About 90 percent of all nonmelanoma skin cancers and about 65 percent of melanoma cases are associated with exposure to UV radiation from the sun. With this in mind, The Skin Cancer Foundation reminds everyone to take precautions before spending time outdoors.

"After a particularly long and arduous winter, I'm sure everyone is looking forward to Daylight Saving Time," said Perry Robins, MD, President of The Skin Cancer Foundation.

"The sun may not feel that strong this time of year, but its UV rays still penetrate and damage the skin, so it's important to keep the skin protected. Even on cloudy days, about 80 percent of UV rays can still reach us."

In addition to being linked with skin cancer, the sun can also age the skin prematurely. Up to 90 percent of visible skin changes commonly attributed to aging (such as wrinkling and brown spots) are caused by the sun. By making sun protection a part of your lifestyle, you can spend time outdoors without jeopardizing the health of your skin. Be sure to follow The Skin Cancer Foundation's ·Seek the shade, especially

between 10 AM and 4 PM. not Avoid tanning booths and/

or UV tanning booths. · Cover up with clothing, including a broad-brimmed hat and UV-blocking sunglasses.

· Use a broad spectrum (UVA/UVB) sunscreen with an SPF of 15 or higher every day. For extended outdoor activity, use a water-resistant, broad (UVA/UVB) spectrum sunscreen with an SPF of 30 or

Apply 1 ounce (2 tablespoons) of sunscreen to your entire body 30 minutes before going outside. Reapply every two hours or immediately after swimming or excessive

· Keep newborns out of the sun. Sunscreens should be used on babies over the age of six months.

• Examine your skin from head-to-toe every month. See your physician every

Vets have new snakebite vaccine for your pets

hundreds of dogs and cats in the Big Country.

Animals are naturally curious and get bitten while investigating the rattling or slithering snake. The venom injected by the snake causes immediate pain, swelling and tissue damage. The severity of bites varies greatly.

The damage done to the animal can range from mild swelling, to large areas of skin and muscle dying, to even the death of the animal.

Avoiding snakes is best. Keep dogs away from areas where snakes are likely to be: tall grass and weeds, brush and junk piles, old houses and barns. Avoidance training is also valuable to teach dogs to stay away from snakes. If your dog encounters a snake, try to call your dog away and leave the area. Never approach the snake and risk being bitten!

Every year, rattlesnakes bite give your dog some measure of protection against rattlesnake bites. It causes the production of antibodies that act as a natural anti-venom. Animals that are properly vaccinated tend to have less swelling and tissue damage when bitten by a rattlesnake. They also recover more quickly. However, it is not absolute protection. Dogs that receive severe bites can still die even if properly vaccinated.

Any pet that is bitten by a rattlesnake needs veterinary care as quickly as possible, whether vaccinated or not.

Your veterinarian is the besttrained individual to determine what and how much treatment your pet requires following being bitten.

First aid for snakebites has proven to be of very little value. Getting prompt medical attention is best.

Call your veterinarian for information regarding the proper care and treatment of your pets.

Sun Safety Tips For Kids And Teens

There's no such thing as a healthy tan, say experts, especially among kids and teens.

"Children need to be protected from the sun's harmful ultraviolet rays, even on cloudy days," says Dr. O. Marion Burton, president of American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP). "Parents should make sure kids and teens are using a waterproof sunscreen with an SPF of 15 or higher when outdoors."

The AAP also strongly cautions teenagers against using tanning salons. While it may be a growing fad among teens today, artificial tanning is not risk-free and can cause skin cancer and eye damage just like sun tanning.

Revamped a few years ago, the new food pyramid from the U.S. Department of Agriculture treats each food group as equally important and has new measurement recommendations. But the most interesting aspect of the new food pyramid is the new interactive features that have just been unveiled.

You now can create personalized food and exercise online www.mypyramid.gov, to plan meals and track dietary goals. The site also boasts a new resource called MyFoodapedia, a database providing the calorie count of almost any natural food. You can search for any food, specify how you will prepare it and then get a calorie count.

Free Xeriscape Gardening workshop

Create a beautiful garden with a minimum of watering right here in West Texas! With the help of the Abilene Public Library and the Big Country Master Gardeners, you'll be able to do more with less after the free workshop on Tuesday, March 22nd at 6:30 p.m. at the Main Library downtown. "Xeriscape Gardening" will be presented by Kathy Feagan and Audrey Gillespie, both Master Gardeners.

The term "xeriscaping" was coined in Colorado in the 1970s to mean "water wise landscaping" derived from the Greek word "xeros" which means dry. Some have the misconception, according to the presenters, that xeriscaping means that other than cactus, there is very little to choose from.

"There are many wonderful perennials, shrubs, trees, grasses, vines and shade plants to make your xeriscape

according to Master Gardener Feagan, who will talk about what plant materials to use and where best to place them to thrive with little supplemental watering. Master Gardener Gillespie will discuss composting techniques, "a must for successful xeriscape gardening.'

The Texas Master Gardener program is an educational volunteer program conducted by the Texas AgriLife Extension Service of the Texas A&M system. Applicants must complete 50 hours of specialized training for an internship and 50 additional hours of volunteer work before earning the Master Gardener certification. 

Callahan County's jobless rate rises to 6.9% in January 2011

The unemployment rate in Callahan County jumped over one percent to 6.9% in January 2011, according to jobless figures released Friday, March 11, 2011 by the Texas Workforce Commission. The unemployment rate in Callahan County one year ago in January 2010 was 6.4 percent.

Of the 7,129 civilian labor force in Callahan County, 6,637 were employed during January 2011, and 492 were unemployed, giving the county an unemployment rate of 6.9%.

Callahan County's unemployment rate was 5.8% in December, 2010. Of the 7,319 civilian labor force in the county during December, 6,897 had jobs while 422 or 5.8% were unemployed.

Previous monthly jobless rates in Callahan County included: 6.1% in November 2010, 5.5% in October, 5.6% in September, 5.8% in August, 6.3% in July, 6.5% in June, 5.9% in May, 6.0% in April, 6.0% in March, and 6.1% in February 2010, according to the unemployment figures.

Big Country area counties, bordering Callahan County, and the counties' unemployment rates for January 2011 include: Brown, 7.9%; Coleman, 7.1%; Eastland, 7.9%; Jones, 7.8%; Runnels, 8.3%; Shackelford, 4.8%; Stephens, 8.7%; and Taylor County, 6.6%.

New Medical Center Breaks Ground

FRISCO, TX (Frisco Enterprise)—The face of the Frisco Square will change in the next year-and-a-half as a medical center will be constructed northwest of city hall. Forest Park Medical Center-Frisco has broken ground with construction now underway. The full service acute care hospital will focus on surgery and will have 50 patient beds, 12 operating rooms, and two procedure rooms.

In addition to the main facility, the site will include a 55,000square-foot medical office building and parking garage. The hospital's managing partner, Alan Beauchamp, said the facility will be an economic benefit to the city. "The construction of the facility will bring several hundred new jobs, and once it is open for business, several hundred more jobs will be created," Beauchamp said. "Since we are a for-profit facility, we will bring in tax dollars to the city," he added. Vibrant Healthcare, who will operate the facility, opened a similar hospital on Central

Beauchamp said the facility has been a success and is already being expanded.

West Hiring 300 Workers

SAN ANTONIO, TX (San Antonio Express-News)-West Corporation plans to hire more than 300 people at its Universal City call center after landing a new client. West's work force will increase to about 2,700 people in the San Antonio area, spokesman David Pleiss said. The Omaha, Nebraska-based call center and telemarketing company said the new full-time positions will be filled through April. Customer service and tech positions will pay \$10 an hour, while bilingual tech positions will pay \$11.50 an hour, Pleiss said.

Spring Branch Center to Re-

HOUSTON, TX (Houston Chronicle)—Spring Branch Medical Center has been sold to a private equity firm that plans to reopen it as an acute-care hospital. McVey & Co. Investments LLC announced that it closed the purchase from HCA Gulf Coast Division and currently has commitments from 100 physicians who previously practiced at the hospital to come back. Houston Mayor Annise Parker said it "will mean jobs and accessible health care for

the Spring Branch area." "I just fell in love with the hospital's story," said Marty McVey, president of the Houston firm which invests in medical technologies. McVey said he anticipates Spring Branch running at full capacity and employing 650 staff within a year. He said the hospital plans a grand opening in late spring. Outpatient services will continue to operate and the 57 staffers currently there have all agreed to stay on according to McVey.

Pipeline Company Bringing Jobs to Robstown

ROBSTOWN. TX (Nueces County Record Star)—The Robstown City Council has approved a six-month lease with a pipeline company that could provide the area with an economic boost from 200 jobs it will be bringing for a construction project. In a letter presented to the council, Marc Tausend, agent and attorney-in-fact representing Enterprise Texas Pipeline LLC, expressed the company's desire to set up shop within the city limits of Robstown for a few months. The reason for the request is the company's construction of an 18.6-mile natural gas pipeline that will be running from Agua Dulce all the way to the outskirts of Robstown.






