Cross Plains school enrollment up seven students

Clyde CISD reported the largest student enrollment drop of the four Callahan County school districts, according to school officials totals released following the first day of school on Monday, August 22nd. Baird ISD and Eula ISD reported students declines, while Cross Plains ISD was the only school district to report more students for the start of the school year this year compared to last year.

Clyde CISD reported 1,412 students enrolled in the first day of school Monday, August 22nd. That number is down 50 students compared to 2010 when 1,462 students reported for the first day of school.

Eula ISD reported 367 students at the first day of school Monday, down seven students compared to 2010 when 374 students enrolled for the first day.

Baird ISD reported 283 students for the first day of school on Monday, a drop of 16 students compared to 2010 when 299 students reported for the first day of school.

Cross Plains ISD had 385 students enrolled for the first day of school Monday, a jump of seven students compared to 2010 when 378 students reported for the first day of school.

By campus, Clyde High School, with grades nine through twelve, had 410 students report on Monday. CHS reported enrollment for 2010 of 418 students.

Clyde Junior High School had 332 students on Monday, according to Clyde CISD officials. Clyde Junior High School, with grades sixth, seventh and eighth had 338 students report for the first day of school in 2010.

Clyde Intermediate School, with grades third, fourth and fifth, had 314 students enrolled on Monday. That compared to 2010 when Clyde Intermediate School had 325 students.

Clyde Elementary School, with grades Pre-Kindergarten, kindergarten, first grade and second grade, had 338 students

report for the first day of school on Monday. Clyde Elementary School also had 18 students enrolled in the Head Start program. Clyde Elementary School had enrollment of 381 students in 2010.

Eula ISD reported 89 students at Eula High School on Monday, which includes grades nine through twelfth. EHS had 109 students enrolled for the first day of school in 2010.

Eula Junior High School, with grades seventh and eighth, had 52 students enrolled for the first day of school in 2011. Eula Junior High School had 60 students report for the first day of school in 2010.

Eula Elementary School, with grades Pre-Kindergarten through sixth grade, had 226 students enrolled on Monday. Eula Elementary School reported 205 students for the first day of school in 2010.

Baird ISD officials said Baird High School, with grade ninth through twelfth, had 92 students enrolled for the first day of school in 2011. BHS had 97 students

enrolled for the first day of school in 2010.

Baird Junior High School, with grades sixth, seventh and eighth, had 54 students enrolled for the first day of school this year. In 2010, Baird Junior High School had 61 students enrolled.

Baird Elementary School reported 132 students enrolled in grades Pre-Kindergarten through fifth grade in 2011. Baird Elementary School had 141 students enrolled for the first day of school last year.

Cross Plains High School had enrollment of 100 students for the first day of school this year.

Cross Plains Junior High School, with grades seventh and eighth grade, had enrollment of 61 students for the first day of school this year.

Cross Plains Elementary School, with grades Pre-Kindergarten through sixth grade, had 224 students enrolled for the first day of school in 2011. Cross Plains Elementary School reported 206 students enrolled for the first day of school in 2010.

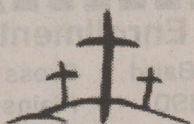

"Footsteps of Approaching Thousands"

In Second Printing

The first printing of Ann Beeler's book, *Footsteps of Approaching Thousands*, a history of the early days of Cross Plains, has sold out. A second printing is now available at the library. Beeler has gathered together items and photos collected for years into an extensive coverage of the founding of the town, the names of people who formed many of the first organizations here and mention of a great many of the businesses through the years, just in time for our Centennial celebration.

The book begins with the early days of Cross Plains in the 1877, before the incorporation of the town, through to the sale of the lots and the creation of the first city government and utilities. Beeler devotes chapters to the schools and churches, the cemetery and early transportation. Then she travels through World Wars I and II. Beeler also devotes a chapter on events and landmarks, including myths and legends surrounding the town, plus the wildfire of 2005.

Both Higginbotham's and the S&H Department Store ran special ads in the *Cross Plains Review*, offering boys bib overalls from 79 cents to \$1.25 while fabric for the girl's dresses was only 10-19 cents per yard. Shoes for both boys and girls had a wider price range—\$1.19 through \$2.98. Girls were definitely cheaper to outfit for school.

Interestingly enough, it was horribly hot in August of 1936, with the 110 degree recorded on August 14 being the hottest day on record since June of 1907. The *Review* reported that your Joe Kendrick and LeDoyle Lancaster found the ears of their treasured popcorn crop turning white. Sorely disappointed, they sought adult advice, only to find that the kernels were popping on the stalk. Yep, that's what it said!

Mahalia

Mahalia, Thomas "Tom" Flippin's mother was married to a man by the name of Watkins around 1880. Mahalia and Watkins had a son who they named Willie.

Watkins went to work for the Southern Pacific Railroad laying track from Dallas to California. When Willie was about 6 months old Mahalia got word that her husband was bad sick at Big Springs, about 125 miles northwest of Cross Plains.

She saddled up two horses and one pack horse and took the baby plus his brother, a 10 to 12 year old, and rode to Big Springs. Mahalia stayed with the husband until he died then rode back home. She was a pretty tough old girl since it was still wild country with some Comanche wondering about.

Tom was not sure how long before she met and married John Stacy. Stacy and her had 16 or 18 babies, but only raised seven. Stacy's kids plus Willie made eight. Tom stated that they lived with them a few months in Oklahoma. "Willie could sure tell some pretty tall tales. I suppose that they were true," Tom noted.

Willie left home young and began punching cattle and breaking horses. Tom remembered Willie telling about being on a cattle drive. Willie stated, "The man cooking was a sorry cook, but no one complained." One day Willie complained about the food and

got elected cook. (It seemed the first one to complain got the job.)

There was a big bag of rice in the chuck wagon and Willie was by himself and never cooked anything, let alone any rice. Willie filled a boiling pot full of rice and water and started dipping rice out and pouring it down prairie dog holes.

It wasn't long before he had every hole he could find full of rice. If the boss caught them wasting food, they had to pay for it.

After a couple of weeks he got an idea on how to get rid of the cooking job. He started pouring the salt to everything he cooked. Someone stated, "Boy this stuff sure is salty! There was a short pause, then noted, "but that is the way I like it." By the time the cattle drive ended Willie was a pretty good cook.

One of the boys had a rattle snake crawl in his bed roll with him and when he got up the next morning the snake bit him on the leg. One of the older cowhands grabbed a burning log, had the other hands hold down the man while he stuck the burning log to the bite. They loaded him in a wagon and hauled him 40 miles to a town to see a doctor. The old doc looked him over, gave the some salve for the burn and sent them on their way. I guess the unusual treatment did the trick.

Willie died in 1936 or 1937 and was buried in Wewoka, Oklahoma.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Governor Perry and Other Politicians:

Where do you, Texas' Governor, National and State Senators, and Congressmen stand on the subsidization and support of the ineffective, expensive and wasteful windmills and solar panels?

That \$25 billion could have been used to build about 5,000 megawatts of highly reliable

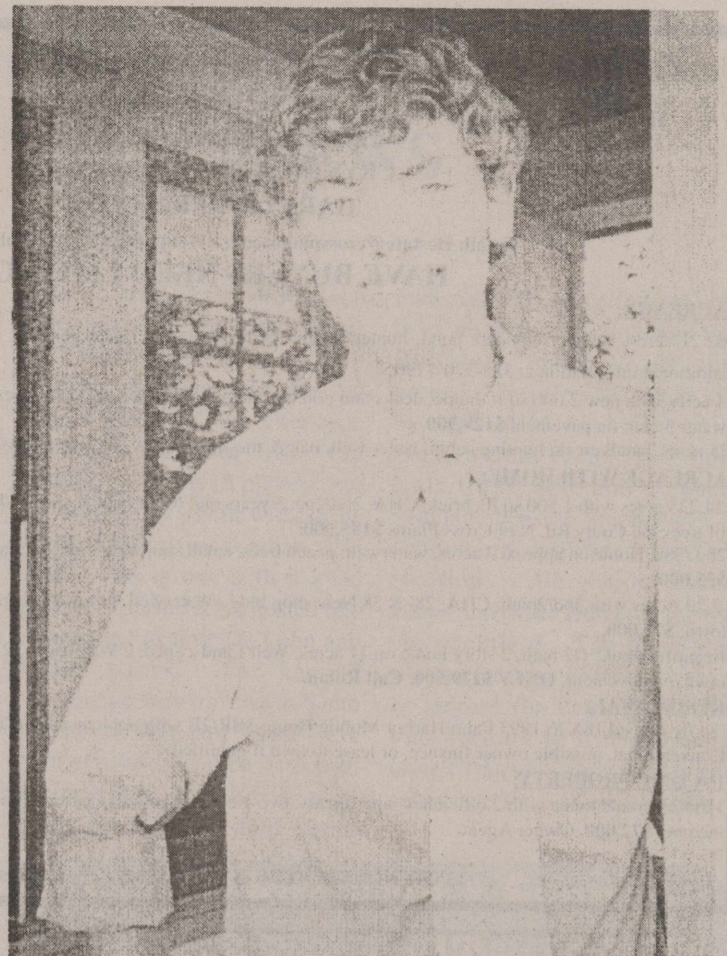
nuclear generation capacity or as much as 25,000 megawatts of natural-gas-fired capacity, all of which could have been reliably put to work during the hottest days of summer.

The wind-energy lobby has been masterly at garnering huge subsidies and mandates by claiming that its product is a "green" alternative to conventional electricity. But hype has obscured a dirty little secret: When power demand is highest, wind energy's output is generally low. The reverse is also true: Wind-energy production is usually highest during the middle of the night, when electricity use is lowest."

The questions for you, my elected politician, are:

1. Did you support this dysfunctional waste of taxpayers' money?
2. How much money did you accept from the wind-power lobbyists?
3. What are you, my elected politician, doing to stop such new expenditures and minimize the ongoing financial damage and shortage of electricity for Texas and America?
4. What are you doing to encourage and expand known cost effective energy production in Texas?

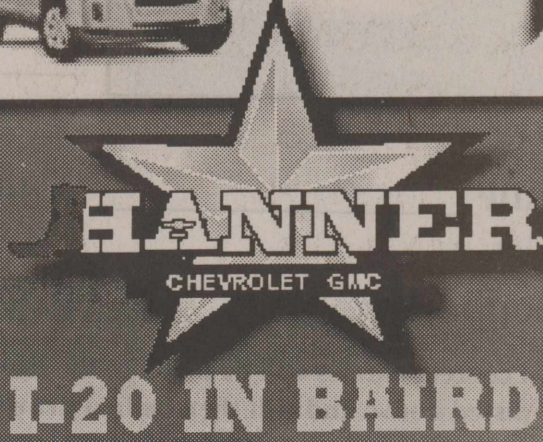

Mystery Picture #2 Identified

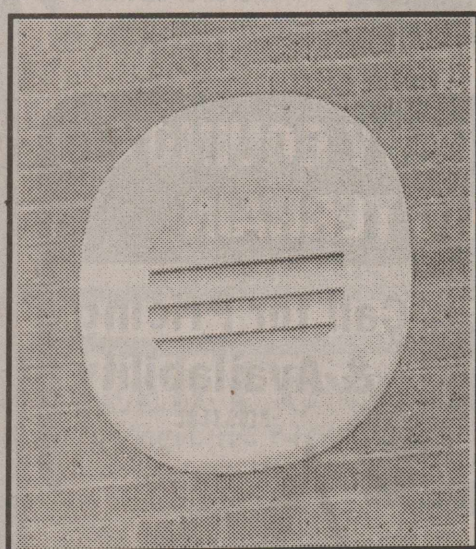
Project Pride's mystery picture #2 was definitely more difficult to identify, but several folks did submit correct answers. Number 2 was the north side of Williams Planing Mill, located one block west of the bank. Picture was taken just a few steps off of Ave. E.

The sign on the front (east) side of the building is still faintly

visible, reading W.B. Williams' Planing Mill. Several pictures are currently available, showing both the front and the inside of the mill in the 1920's. Local resident and son of the original owner, Roger Williams continues to keep the building in good repair.
