# Locker Plant Organization Ready Sheep-Goat Men Big Bond Rallies For The Enrollment Of Members

Due to the many requests for information regarding the recently organization of The Callahan Refrigeration Cooperative, Inc. the Star has received from people who live in the Baird trade territory, we are publishing the following. Those whe wish to obtain locker space in the proposed plant should contact one of the men on the directorate without delays to be directorate. on the directorate without delay to be sure of accommodation.

### QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

1. Why a \$10 deposit? ANS: It is the part you own in the Cooperative and gives you a vote in the operation.

2. Why are lockerts \$12 and \$15 per year? building and machinery areadvanced over two or three years ago. Labor to operate is up as much as 50% and locker rental must

3. Will yearly locker rental always be \$12 and \$15? ANS: A Co-operative locker plant must pay for the plant and operation expen-ses—rates might come down when prices and labor are cheaper.

4. How long can food be kept in a locker? ANS: "Frozen food" has been kept in lockers for many years, but it is recommended for best food value it be used within 12 months. Can I transfer or sell my membership to someone else? ANS:

NO! You can withdraw and receive a refund based on the value of your membership as determined by the Board of Directors.

After Sign-up work is completed, can I still rent a locker? ANS: If lockers are still available that have not previously been rented, however, permission to build is granted only on 80% being sold in advance.

7. Will membership fee still be demanded if I wait until the locker plant is built? ANS: Yes. The \$10 membership will have to be charged one time to each person who rents a locker.

8. Am I liable for the debts of the Cooperative? ANS: Only to the extent of the \$10 membership fee.

9. Where will the plant be built? ANS: Near the City Limits of

10. Can more than one family use and sign up for one locker? ANS: Yes. But both families should sign the application for the locker. In most cases it will be found too small for two families.

11. What size are the lockers? ANS: The shelf locker is approximately 17x20x30 inches and has a capacity of approximately six cubic feet. The drawer locker is approximately 20x20x30 inches and has a slightly greater capacity.

12. What is the attitude of Federal Government to building this locker plant in wartime?
