

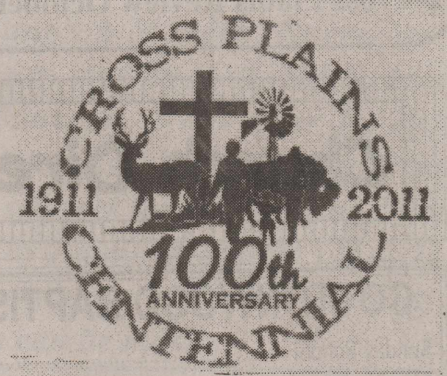

Dairy Foods National Champions

Last week on Tuesday, October 18th, the Cross Plains FFA flew out of Abilene and headed for the National FFA CDE (judging contest) in Indianapolis, Indiana. After arriving in Indianapolis, they attended a photo session and team orientation on Wednesday.

Thursday morning they participated in the Dairy Foods CDE held at the Indiana State Fair Grounds. On Saturday morning the winners of the National FFA Dairy Foods CDE were announced at the awards banquet held in the downtown Marriott

Hotel. Dr. Freddie Scott of the University of Arkansas who served as the superintendent of the event announced the results. The top ten individuals were announced first, Katharine Goode was the 1st high individual, Zoie Walker was the 3rd high individual, Joe Holland was the 6th high individual, and Payton Porter was the 12th high individual.

According to their placings this classified all of the students as Gold Emblem Individuals. Next the team awards were announced.

Cross Plains FFA was the 1st place team followed by Missouri and California. This also made the Cross Plains team a Gold Emblem team.

Each of the students received a plaque, a medal, and a \$1000 scholarship for their accomplishment. These students were dedicated and worked extremely hard. All of their hard work paid off by winning the National Championship.

We are very proud of them for the way they represented the Cross Plains FFA and the state of Texas.

Cross Plains Buffaloes Stampede the Baird Bears in District Play Friday Evening at their Home Field

After Cross Plains' 39-21 win over Baird in a District 9-1A

Division II game Friday at Cross Plains, both the Buffaloes and Bears are looking ahead in hopes of qualifying for the playoffs.

The loss dropped Baird to 1-7 overall and 1-2 in district play, while Cross Plains improved to 2-6 and 1-1. Meridian and Gorman lead the district with 2-0 records, while Ranger is 0-3.

"That was our first district win in two years," Cross Plains coach Daniel Purvis said. "We are excited. We have overcome a lot, including a difficult pre-district schedule of Winters, Bronte and Valley Mills. We thought if we could get to the end of the year healthy, we could do something."

Purvis said Cross Plains, which plays Friday at Meridian before closing out the season against Ranger, needs to win one of those two remaining games to earn one of the district's three playoff berths. "Win both and we can get a share of the district title," Purvis pointed out. Baird, meanwhile, has just one game left, Friday at home

against Gorman. Baird coach Quinn Conley said the Bears need to win that game and hope to get into a possible three-way tie for second place in the district, forcing a tie-breaker to determine which team advances to the postseason.

"We will play as hard as we can and then see how it falls," he said.

The difference in Friday night's game was Cross Plains' running game, led by Blake Hutchins, who rushed 25 times for 248 yards and four touchdowns. The Buffaloes had 383 yards rushing as a team.

"We couldn't stop them," lamented Conley. "We are just too young. Offensively, we didn't play as well as we have been. Cross Plains had been turning it over, but they didn't turn it over once against us. That was the difference. The kids played hard, but we just couldn't stop their rushing attack."

Purvis said he thought his Buffaloes could run the ball

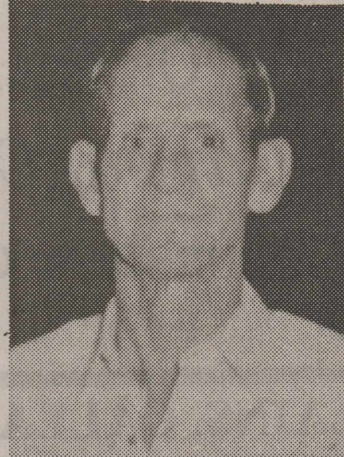
James Wesley (Wes) Richards

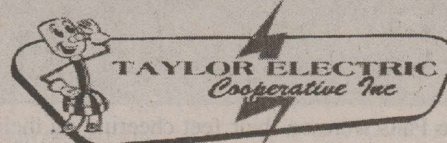
this week trying to fit in everything into one week. I was on vacation last week, so I am still trying to get back into working and finding out what went on while I was gone.

Constitutional Amendment Election early voting underway

Callahan County voters will go to the polls on Tuesday, November 8th to adopt or reject 10 constitutional amendments to the Texas Constitution.

Early voting for the Constitutional Amendment Election began on Monday, October 24th at three voting locations in Baird, Clyde and Cross Plains. Early voting will conclude on Saturday, November 5th.

Early voting will take place at the Callahan County Courthouse located at 100 W. 4th Street in Baird, the Clyde Justice of the Peace Office located at 208 Oak Street in Clyde and the Cross Plains Justice of the Peace Office at 424 South Main in Cross Plains.

Early voting hours are from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m.

This year's Constitutional Amendment Election will take place at five voting precincts in Callahan County on Tuesday, November 8th. Election officials reported voting Precinct #5 at Putnam will consolidate with

Historical Lord's Acre Revisited

What started about 16,000 turkeys and three generations ago continues to be an annual tradition of the First United Methodist Church—the Lord's Acre.

Although the preparation of the turkeys and the tubs of dressing and gravy haven't changed much over the years, the sweet potatoes and cranberries have transitioned from natural to convenient. Fortunately we no longer peel all those gallons of sweet potatoes and cook them from scratch; those little frozen patties swimming in Jean's special sauce of brown sugar, butter and cinnamon are so much easier and just as tasty.

Instead of grinding bag after bag of fresh cranberries and making into bowls and bowls of relish, we just open the cans of jelly, slice and serve. And for the most part, the hot rolls come from a commercial supply rather than local kitchens.

The financial report from that

first festival on November 21, 1964 is quite interesting in itself. With expenses of only \$100, the income of \$1,800.17 came from 337 meals at \$1.00 each, \$460 from the live auction, \$74.55 from handwork items, \$45 from the bake sale and \$372 in donations. The goal of the event was to install central heat and air conditioning in the old church by the Post Office where J's Art & Soul is now located.

We can thank the local Genealogy Society for obtaining the microfilm of the *Cross Plains Review*; thus enabling folks to research local and area happenings back through the years to the beginning of our town. And thus, we have information on the early Lord's Acre Festivals that was otherwise lost in the fires of 2005.

On to the 2011 version of the long-running festival; the church will be alive with activities all day Saturday, November 12; starting

with the Little Store and the Silent Auction at 9:00 and ending with the Live Auction starting at 6:30 p.m. Carry-out turkey dinners will be available at the north doors from 4:30 until 6:30 p.m., while dine-in dinners will be ready at 5:00 until the auction starts at 6:30.

The cost of the dinner is \$8.00 and will consist of generous servings of turkey, dressing, gravy, green beans, cranberries, rolls and homemade cake. Coffee and tea will be available with the dinners served in the Fellowship Hall. Meals can be delivered to shut-ins simply by calling the church 254-725-7377 throughout the day.

Even if you have plans to attend the Gary Morris concert, we warmly invite you to join us for a home-cooked meal before going to the school for the concert. And be sure to invite your out-of-town friends who are coming for the evening.

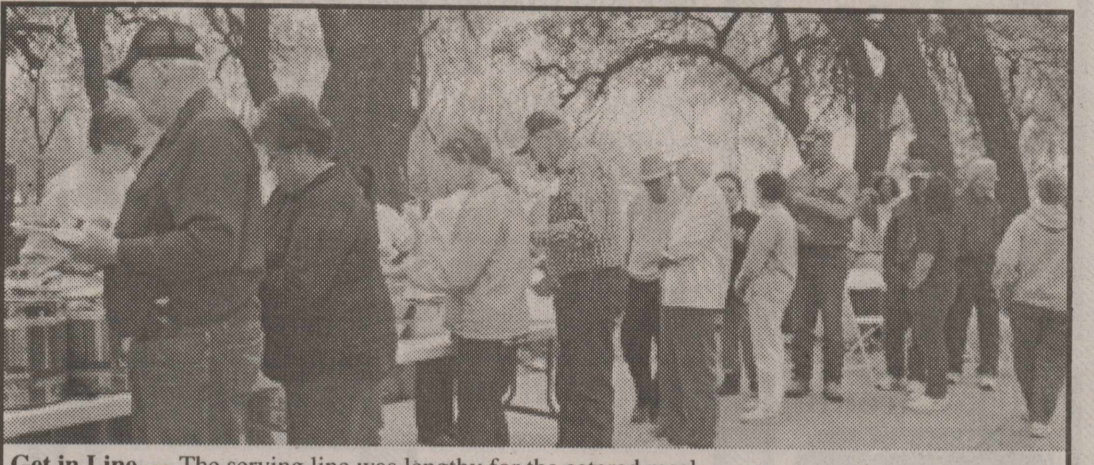

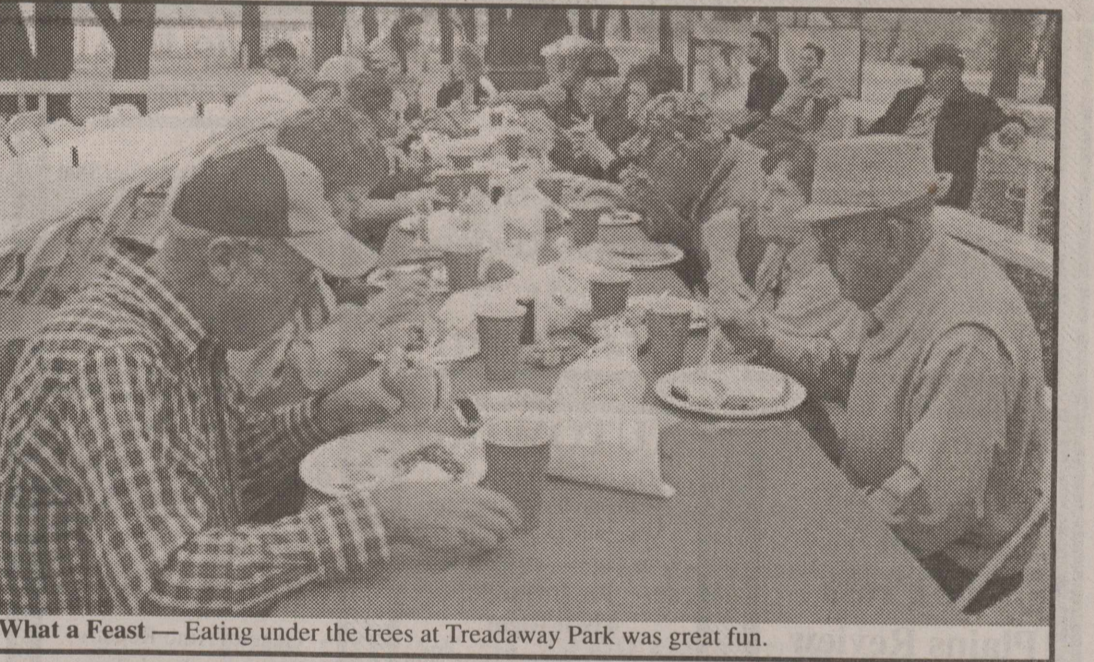

Emergency grazing for FY 2011 ends on October 31, 2011.

"The 2012 CRP emergency grazing period begins on November 1, 2011, and ends on January 29, 2012," said Frost. "CRP land previously hayed or grazed, either managed or emergency use, during the previous 12 months is excluded from the FY 2012 grazing authorization," he said.

The following Texas counties are approved for CRP emergency grazing approval for FY 2012: Armstrong, Bailey, Baylor, Borden, Bosque, Briscoe, Brown, Burnet, Callahan, Carson,

Castro, Childress, Cochran, Coke, Coleman, Collingsworth, Concho, Cottle, Crosby, Dallam, Dawson, Deaf Smith, Delta, Dickens, Donley, Duval, Fannin, Fisher, Floyd, Foard, Frio, Gaines, Garza, Gray, Hale, Hall, Hansford, Hardeman, Hartley, Haskell, Hemphill, Hidalgo, Hill, Hockley, Howard, Hutchinson, Jones, Kenedy, Kent, King, Kinney, Kleberg, Knox, Lamar, Lamb, LaSalle, Lipscomb, Live Oak, Lubbock, Lynn, Martin, Maverick, Medina, Mitchell, Montague, Moore, Motley, Nolan, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Pecos, Potter, Randall, Red River, Roberts, Runnels, Scurry, Shackelford, Sherman, Starr, Stonewall, Swisher, Taylor, Terrell, Terry, Throckmorton, Tom Green, Uvalde, Wheeler, Wilbarger and Yoakum.

The FY 2012 CRP emergency authorization permits grazing only. No haying of CRP acres is allowed at this time. Additionally, there will be a 25 percent CRP payment reduction on the 2012 annual payment for CRP acres used for grazing under these

emergency provisions.

To take advantage of the emergency grazing provisions, authorized producers can use the CRP acreage for their own livestock or may grant another livestock producer use of the CRP acreage. The eligible CRP acreage is limited to the acreage located within the approved counties.

Eligible producers who are interested in grazing CRP under the emergency authorization and current CRP participants who choose to provide land for grazing to an eligible livestock producer, must first request approval to graze eligible acreage; obtain a modified conservation plan from the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) to include grazing requirements, leave at least 25 percent of each field or contiguous CRP field ungrazed for wildlife, or graze not more than 75 percent of the stocking rate as determined by NRCS.

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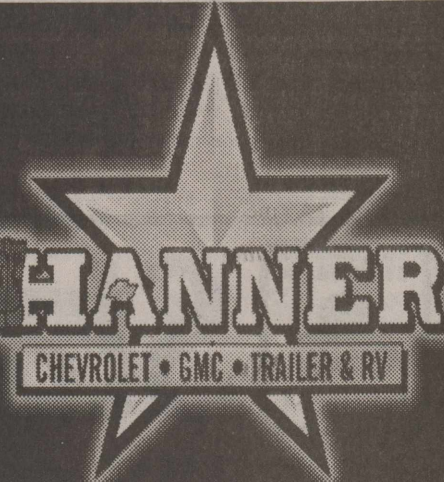

Paula Deen's White Chocolate Cherry Chunkies

Ingredients
1 stick butter, softened
1 cup packed brown sugar
1 cup granulated sugar
2 large eggs
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
3 cups all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons milk
1 cup chopped macadamia nuts
1/2 cup candied cherries
1-1/2 cups white chocolate chunks

Directions
Preheat oven to 375 degrees F.
In a medium bowl, with electric mixer, cream butter and sugars together until light and fluffy. Add eggs and vanilla and beat until just combined. Set aside.
Sift together flour, soda, and salt. Add milk to the butter mixture and then add the flour mixture. Mix until just combined. Batter should be stiff.
In another bowl, combine nuts, cherries, and white chocolate. Then add to batter, stirring only to blend.
Drop by heaping tablespoons onto a greased cookie sheet, 2 inches apart. Bake for approximately 11 to 13 minutes. Cool on wire rack. Yield: 4 dozen

Don't pass a stopped school bus: it's dangerous

Texas law prohibits vehicles from passing any school bus that is stopped and has its flashing red lights activated to protect children getting onto and off of a school bus. However, some motorists still break the law and place schoolchildren at risk of injury or death.

During National School Bus Safety Week (Oct. 17-21), Texas Highway Patrol Troopers in many rural areas of the state may be riding on or following school buses to catch motorists who break the law.

When a vehicle illegally

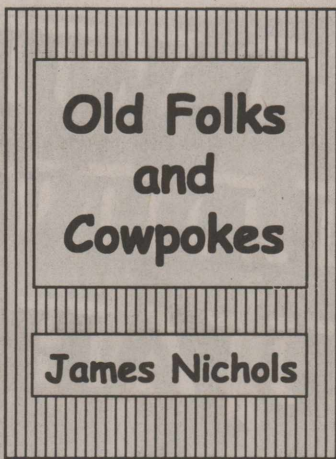
passes a stopped school bus with the red lights activated, Troopers riding on the bus will radio ahead to other Troopers who will then pull over the offending motorist and issue a ticket that could cost up to \$1,000. Troopers will also be patrolling areas where school buses pick up and drop off children, looking for motorists violating the school bus law.

"The safety of children riding on school buses is important, and we will do everything we can to ensure that Texas drivers obey the law," said Steven C. McCraw, Director of the Texas Department of

Public Safety. "Drivers will receive tickets if they do not stop for school buses as required."

In 2010, Texas Highway Patrol troopers wrote 414 tickets for passing a stopped school bus. There were 762 crashes in Texas involving school buses last year. In those crashes, one person died and 89 people had serious injuries, according to the Texas Department of Transportation, which tracks traffic crashes.

"Laus Deo" Chupacabra Fact or Fiction?

Chupacabra (Spanish) from Chupra "to suck" and Cabra "goat" literally "Goat Sucker" is a legendary animal rumored to inhabit parts of America. It is associated more recently with a sighting of an allegedly unknown animal in Puerto Rico (where sightings were first reported), Mexico and the United States, especially in Latin American communities.

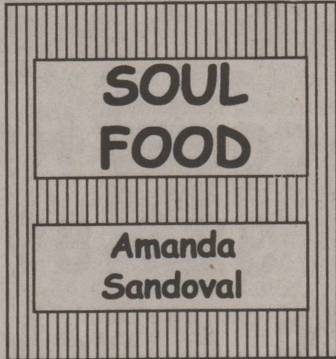
The name comes from the animals reported habits of attacking and drinking the blood of livestock, especially goats, chickens and smaller barn yard animals.

Physical descriptions of the creature varies. Eyewitness sightings have been as early as 1995 in Puerto Rico and have been reported as far north as Maine, and as far south as Chile. They have even been spotted outside the Americas in countries like Russia and the Philippines.

It size varies from that of a large dog to a small bear, with a row of spines reaching from the neck to the base of its tail.

Biologists and wildlife management officials view the Chupacabra as a contemporary legend. Research performed in November of 2007 by a biology research team at Texas State University in San Marcos determined from DNA samples that the suspicious animal was a large coyote or a coyote-wolf hybrid that was suffering from an extremely severe case of the mange and other parasites. This made it appear different from a normal animal.

Little Known FACTS

On the aluminum cap, atop the Washington Monument, in Washington D.C. are displayed two words **Laus Deo**. No one can see these words from the ground. In fact, most visitors to the monument are totally unaware they are even there.

These words have been there for many years; they are 555 feet, 5,125 inches in the air, perched atop the monument, facing skyward to the Father of our nation, overlooking the 69 square miles which comprise the District of Columbia, capital of the United States of America.

Laus Deo! Two seemingly insignificant, unnoticed words. Out of sight and, one might think, out of mind, but very meaningfully placed at the highest point over what is the powerful city in the most successful nation in the world. So, what do those two Latin words, composed of just four syllables and only seven letters mean? Very simply, they say, **"Praise be to God!"**

Though construction of this giant obelisk began in 1848 when James Polk was President of the United States, it was not until 1888 that the monument was inaugurated and opened to the public. It took twenty-five years to finally cap the memorial with a tribute to the Father of our nations, "Laus Deo!"

From atop this magnificent granite and marble structure, visitors may take in the beautiful panoramic view of the city with its division into four major segments. From that vantage point one can also easily see the original plan of the designer, Pierre Charles L'Enfant—a perfect cross imposed upon the landscape, with the White House to the north, the Jefferson Memorial to the south, the Capitol to the east and the Lincoln Memorial to the west.

A cross? Why a cross? What about separation of church and state? Yes, a cross, separation of church and state? Yes, a cross; separation of church and state was

not—is not—in the Constitution.

Within the monument itself are 898 steps and 50 landings. As one climbs the steps and pauses at the landings the memorial stones share a message. On the 12th Landing is a prayer offered by the City of Baltimore; on the 20th is a memorial presented by some Chinese "Christians"; on the 24th a presentation made by Sunday School children from New York and Philadelphia quoting Proverbs 10:7, Luke 18:18 and Proverbs 22:6.

When the cornerstone of the Washington Monument was laid on July 4th, 1948, deposited within it were many items—including the Holy Bible presented by the Bible Society. Such was the discipline, the moral direction, the spiritual mood given by the founder and first President of our unique democracy... "One Nation, Under God."

I am awed by Washington's prayer for America. It is clear when one studies the history of our great nation, that Washington's America was one of the few countries in all the world established under the guidance, direction and banner of Almighty God, to whom was given all praise, honor and worship by the great men who formed and fashioned her pivotal foundation.

When one stops to observe the inscriptions found in public places all over our nation's capital, he or she will easily find this signature of God, as it is unmistakably inscribed everywhere you look. Though many try to disprove and reason, their arguments are weak and easily disapproved. Their efforts will forever be in vain; God assures us of that. Have you noticed as of late, how many more people are coming together, affirming the fact that this nation was, from the beginning, built on God?... The truth is, we have always been one nation under God!

You may forget the width and height of "Laus Deo," its location, or the architects, but no one who reads this will be able to forget its meaning...

"Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord..." Psalm 33:12.

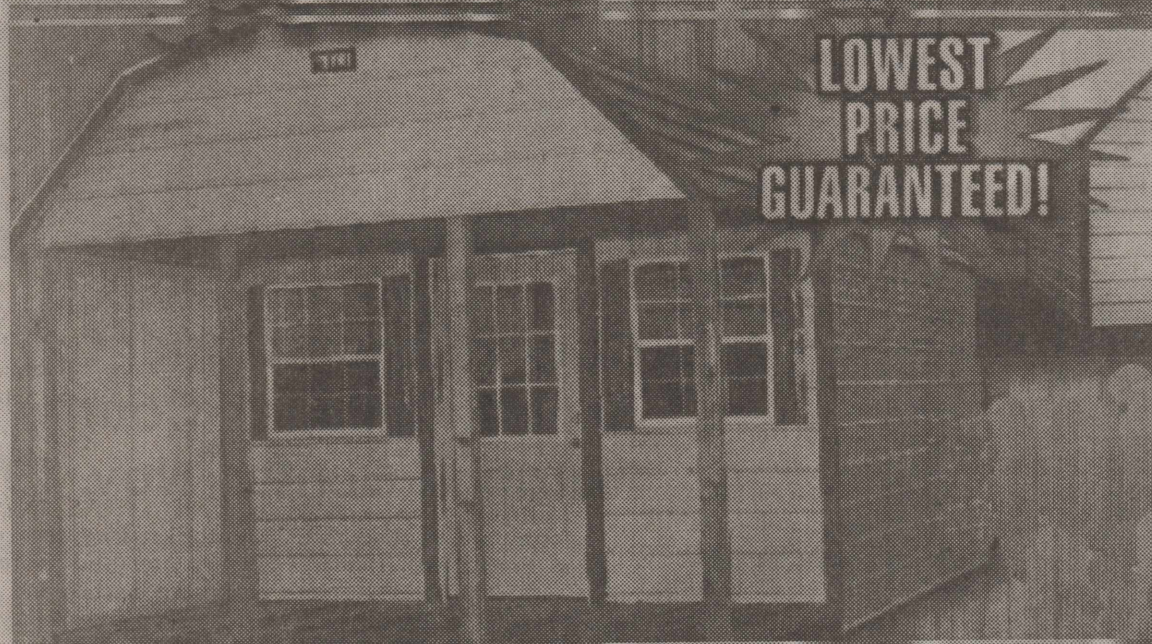

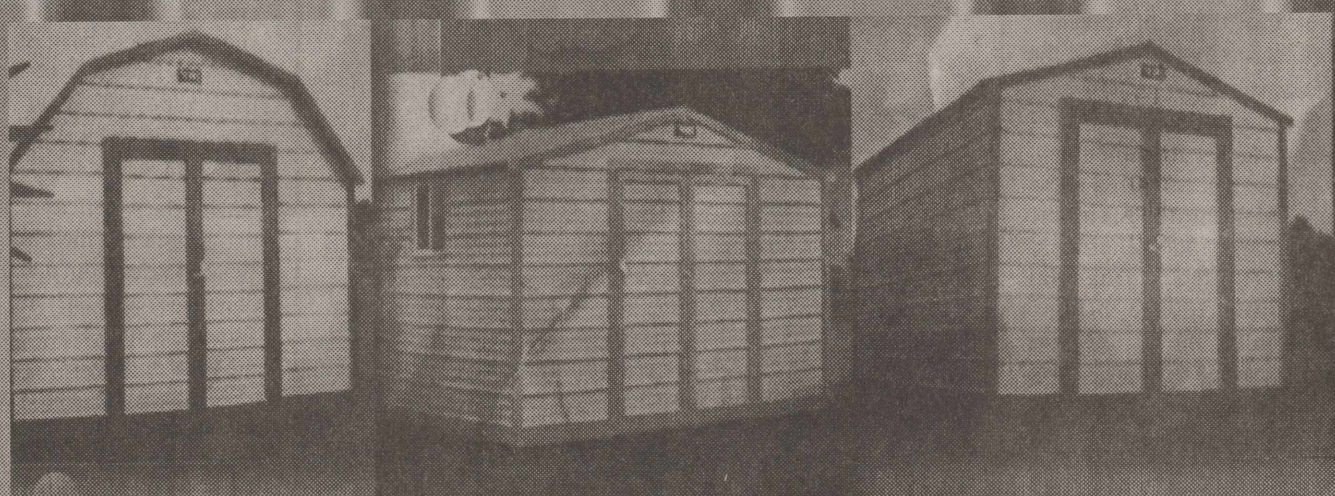

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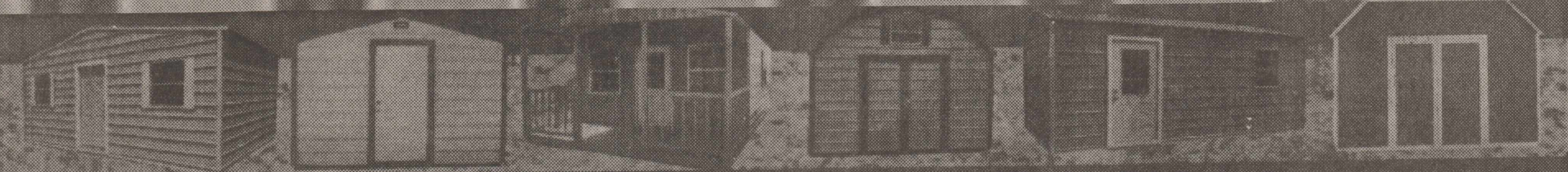

TWC Reminds Unemployment recipients against potential personal Identification scams

AUSTIN - The Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) warns Unemployment Insurance (UI) benefits recipients to be aware of unscrupulous business operators who may try to obtain their personally identifiable information such as date of birth, debit card numbers, Personal Identification Numbers (PIN) or social security numbers. Recipients should only give personal information when filing for benefits online at ui.texasworkforce.org or when speaking to an unemployment benefit customer service representative on the Tele-Center phone filing system at 800-939-6631.

Due to reports of suspicious activities to TWC, UI recipients also are reminded that unemployment staff will never call to obtain personally identifiable information, perform home visits or use text messages to contact claimants. TWC wants to ensure that Unemployment Insurance benefits go to only those who qualify and that no one is taken advantage of by someone illegally posing as a TWC staff member or by unscrupulous business operators.

TWC also wants to remind claimants that filing for benefits, as always, is free. Victims of so-called "fee-for-filing" scams could later discover unemployment claims were never filed on their behalf. Claimants should never pay for a government service that is free.

The UI program is funded through employer taxes and provides temporary, partial-income replacement to workers who have lost their jobs through no fault of their own. TWC administers and oversees the collection of taxes

from employers and the payment of UI benefits to qualified claimants.

Callahan County's jobless rate drops to 6.7% in September

The unemployment rate in Callahan County dropped two-tenths of one percent to 6.7% in September 2011, according to jobless figures released Friday, October 21st by the Texas Workforce Commission. The unemployment rate in Callahan County one year ago in September 2010 was 5.6 percent.

Of the 6,808 civilian labor force in Callahan County, 6,353 were employed during September 2011, and 455 were unemployed, giving the county an unemployment rate of 6.7%.

Callahan County's unemployment rate was 6.9% in August, 2011. Of the 6,781 civilian labor force in the county during August, 6,313 had jobs while 468 or 6.9% were unemployed.

Previous monthly jobless rates in Callahan County included: 7.4% in July 2011, 7.8% in June, 6.5% in May, 5.9% in April, 6.3% in March, 6.9% in February, 6.3% in January 2011, 5.8% in December 2010, 6.1% in November, and 5.5% in October 2010, according to the unemployment figures.

Big Country area counties, bordering Callahan County, and the counties' unemployment rates for September 2011 include: Brown, 7.9%; Coleman, 7.1%; Eastland, 7.7%; Jones, 9.4%; Runnels, 10.3%; Shackelford, 4.5%; Stephens, 8.3%; and Taylor County, 7.9%.

The Abilene MSA (Metropolitan Statistical Area) unemployment rate, which includes Taylor, Callahan and Jones Counties, stood at 7.2% in September, 2011, according to the Texas Workforce Commission. Abilene's Combined Labor Force is 79,800. There were 74,100 employed during September 2011, while 5,700 were unemployed, giving the Abilene MSA an unemployment rate of 7.2%.

The Abilene MSA reported the workforce was 79,400 in August, 2011. Total employment of 73,700 was reported in August 2011, while 5,700, or 7.2% were unemployed in August 2011.

The Abilene MSA unemployment rate for September, 2010 was 6.4%. The total workforce was reported at 83,400, with 78,000 employed and 5,400 unemployed in September, 2010.

The state's unemployment rate for the month of September, 2011 was 8.4 percent. Last month's statewide unemployment rate was 8.4 percent. The state's unemployment rate in September of 2010 was 8.0 percent.

The United States unemployment rate for September, 2011 was 8.8 percent. The nation's unemployment rate for the previous month of August, 2011

was 9.1%. The United States unemployment rate one year ago in September, 2010 was 9.2%.

Highlights of the Texas Labor Force (Not Seasonally Adjusted)

The Texas unemployment rate remained unchanged in September at 8.4 percent. Since January 2011, the unemployment rate has moved down one-tenth of a percentage point. From year-ago levels, this unemployment rate was four-tenths of a percentage point higher. The national unemployment rate declined by three-tenths of a percentage point to 8.8 percent. Texas's unemployment rate has now remained below the national unemployment rate for 51 consecutive months.

The Civilian Labor Force reached an all-new high at an estimated level of 12,371,900 Texans. This series expanded over the month by 55,000 people, which was the second-highest August-to-September change in the series. Since the beginning of this year, the Civilian Labor Force has grown by 221,300 persons. From last year, the series has added 188,500 individuals.

The number of jobholders increased this month by 54,000 people for an estimated level of 11,330,300 Texans. September's level was the highest seen in the series. Since the beginning of 2011, Texas added 215,200 persons in the employed population. Those seeking job opportunities inched up by 1,000 people for an estimated level of 1,041,600 Texans. From January 2011 to September 2011, those seeking employment increased by 6,100 persons.

The number of Texans continuing to file for unemployment insurance benefits declined by 12,900 people over the month for a count of 138,400 recipients. Since September 2010, those continuing to file for un-

employment insurance benefits has dropped by 17,900 persons. At the Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) level, all 25 MSAs experienced a decline in demand for unemployment insurance benefits. The Odessa MSA displayed the sharpest drop in demand for continued claims among the MSAs at 24.3 percent.

Of the 25 MSAs, the unemployment rate decreased in 11, nine remained unchanged, and five increased. The College Station-Bryan MSA recorded the steepest unemployment rate decline among the MSAs as it fell four-tenths of a percentage point to 6.5 percent. The Midland MSA continued to have the lowest unemployment rate as it moved up one-tenth of a percentage point to 4.9 percent.

"HAPPENINGS AROUND THE STATE"

Gulf Marine to Add Jobs

CORPUS CHRISTI, TX (Corpus Christi Caller-Times)—Gulf Marine Fabricators is adding 500 employees at its Aransas Pass yard. The jobs are most of the 700 that the parent company, Gulf Island Fabrication Inc., will add to deal with project commitments, company CEO Kerry Chauvin said. He added, "That's how much dollars we have to work off of to do projects, so it's a record backlog for our Louisiana and Texas operations."

Gulf Marine occupies more than 370 acres on the north side of the Corpus Christi Ship Channel with a fabrication yard in Aransas Pass and Ingleside. Chauvin said hiring has begun and will continue as new phases for work projects begin. It will take about six to eight months before all jobs are filled, he said. The positions include welders, pipe fitters, structural fitters, painters and crane operators, among other crafts associated with offshore drilling activity.

Distribution Center to Open in Terrell

DALLAS, TX (Dallas Business Journal)—Maines Paper & Food Service Inc. will build a 400,000 square-foot distribution center at the Terrell Airport Business Park that will employ up to 400 workers. Terrell is about 30 miles east of downtown Dallas. This will be the first distribution center for the New York-based independent food service distributor to open west of the Mississippi River.

"We're excited to be coming to Texas," said COO Terry Walsh. "We are building the distribution center in conjunction with the growth of our customers. We wanted to expand to Texas to accommodate our customers."

Maines' customers include Burger King, Wendy's, Applebee's and Subway. The center will serve 196 restaurants throughout Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana, Missouri, and Oklahoma. The company will begin to hire workers in January. The facility will open in April of 2012.

Airport Receives Federal Grant

BROWNSVILLE, TX (San Antonio Express-News)—A \$1-million U.S. Economic Development Administration grant has been made to the city of Brownsville to help build an air cargo hangar at the Brownsville-South Padre Island International Airport, the agency announced. The project is expected to create 300 jobs in the Brownsville Foreign Trade Zone and to generate \$4 million in private sector investment, according to airport estimates. The hangar will be leased to aviation operators and will serve as a transportation and logistical center.

Medical Supply Company Brings Jobs to North Texas

DALLAS, TX (Dallas Morning News)—CCS Medical Inc., a medical supply company that recently emerged from Chapter 11 bankruptcy, is moving its headquarters to Farmers Branch from Clearwater, Florida, the company said. CCS, which has about \$420 million in annual revenue, also said it expects to bring 230 jobs to North Texas over the next two years. "Selecting Texas for our corporate relocation was an easy choice. The state of Texas has a superior business climate and a strong workforce," said Dirk Allison, chief executive of CCS, which distributes home health care products and services to patients with chronic conditions. The 230 new jobs are expected to have average compensation of about \$69,000, including benefits.

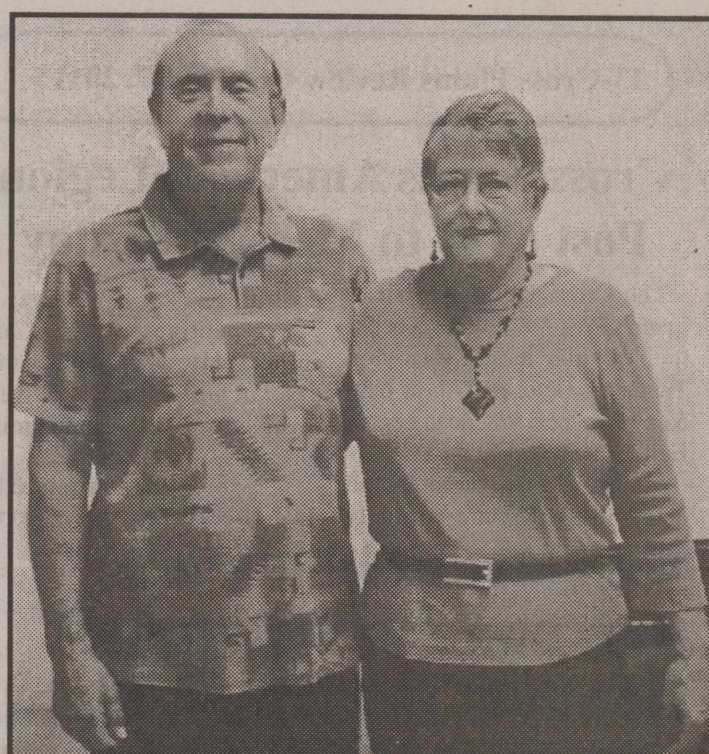
