

Needed: A Good Dad

"The strongest need of a child is the protection of a dad." This conclusion by Sigmund Freud about 100 years ago could use a little dusting off today. Government statistics and university studies all speak of the devastating effect of absent fathers. Eighty-five percent of youth in prison are from fatherless homes. Such children are 4.3 times more likely to smoke or engage in addictive behavior. Boys and girls without a father at home are twice as likely to drop out of school and four times as likely to exhibit both behavioral and emotional problems. Three fourths of teen suicides occur with absent dads.

While just the presence of a dad can help; an engaged dad can truly help his children overcome the assault of a culture of missing fathers. Self-centered parents who can not forgive, (and have accepted the blatant lie that divorce will solve their problem) have not stopped to count the cost on the next generation.

If you never had a dad, don't know how to be a dad, are already divorced, and need help; you must not lose hope. If you are reading this, you can turn to the source of love and by faith in the Perfect Father, be renewed, forgiven, and even empowered to overcome the statistics. You have a Father.



Olympic gold medalist among 9 inductees into Big Country Athletic Hall of Fame

Olympic gold medalist Dean Smith from Graham and former Abilene Cooper baseball coach Andy Malone. who led the Cougars to backto-back state championships in 1987 and 1988, head a list of nine new inductees into the Big Country Athletic Hall of Fame.

The 11th annual Big Country Athletic Hall of Fame induction banquet will be held May 7th at 6:30 p.m. at the Abilene Civic Center. Tickets will go on sale in February. For tickets or sponsorship information, call (325) 668-3685 or e-mail carolepickett@sbcglobal.net.

Also selected to the Class of 2012 in the BCAHOF are golfers John Paul Cain from Sweetwater and Judy Casey from Abilene, sprinter Bruce Land from Hawley, former Haskell and Cooper football coach Ray Overton, and Breckenridge native and longtime football coach Joe

Kelly Kent, a former all-state running back at Cisco who died between his junior and senior seasons at Abilene Christian University, will be honored posthumously. The third annual Legacy Award will be presented to Breckenridge brothers Ken and the late John Ford of Breckenridge, who both went on to be among the nation's leading passers at Hardin-Simmons University.

The newest class brings the total number in the Hall of Fame to 95. Here is a short synopsis of each of the nine newest inductees:

Dean Smith was an all-state running back at Graham and played football and ran track at the University of Texas. He was a halfback on the Longhorns' team that beat Tennessee in the Cotton Bowl. In 1952, he was a gold medalist on the U.S. 4x100 relay team at the Helsinki Olympics in Finland and finished fourth in the 100meter dash. Smith was drafted by the Los Angeles Rams, but when he was traded to the Pittsburgh Steelers, he quit football to become a stunt man in Hollywood, enjoying a career that lasted more than 50 years. He appeared in dozens of movies and TV shows, including many of John

Wayne's movies. Andy Malone compiled 861-345 record in 41 years as a high school baseball coach, including a 220-52 mark in seven seasons at Cooper. He led the Cougars to back-toback state titles in 1987 and 1988. His 1987 team went 33-3 and was deemed the conational champions by Collegiate Baseball. His Cooper teams won six district titles and advanced to the Class 5A playoffs seven consecutive seasons. Malone also took New Diana (1980) and Beckville (2001) to the state tournament. He coached at Fort Worth Western Hills, Cypress-Fairbanks, Texarkana Texas High, Jefferson, Hallsville and

Longview, too. John Paul Cain, a four-year letterman in golf at Texas Tech, was the 1959 Texas Amateur champion and played Ben Crenshaw in the finals of the 1973 Trans-Mississippi Mid-Amateur. After a lengthy career as a stockbroker and amateur golfer, Cain turned pro and qualified for the Senior PGA Tour. He won two tournament titles during his time on the Senior Tour.

Judy Casey, a graduate of Abilene High, is one of the best female golfers to come out of the Big Country. She was a three-time Texas Publinx champion and also won the Women's West Texas Golf Championship three times. She won the Louisiana State Amateur in New Orleans, too. Casey holds course records at Onion Creek in Austin and Diamondback Golf Club in Abilene and won the Abilene City Women's Championship numerous times.

Bruce Land broke or tied the 100-yard dash world record seven times during his track career. After twice earning all-American honors at Cisco Junior College, he then ran track at McMurry and is a member of that school's Hall of Fame. He won the 100 and 200 at the NCAA meet and qualified for the Olympic Trials, but later pulled a hamstring muscle and did not

Ray Overton is the longest tenured coach in Abilene Cooper history, spending 19 seasons at the school, including 11 years as head coach compiling a 69-40-2 record. A graduate of Paint Creek High School in 1941, he went to Texas A&M for a year and then joined the Air Force during World War II. He finished up his college education at Texas A&M and returned to the family farm at Paint Creek in 1948. The Paint Creek superintendent talked him into becoming the school's head football coach when the previous coach quit two days before the start of the season. He then spent 15 years coaching at Haskell, 10 as the Indians' head coach, before joining the Cooper staff. After leaving Cooper, he spent 10 more years as the head coach at Irving MacArthur.

Joe Crousen was a linebacker on Breckenridge's state championship teams in 1958 and 1959. He played football at Sul Ross State before starting a long coaching career that included an assistant coaching job at Mississippi State under his high school coach and fellow Hall of Famer Emory Bellard. He was the defensive coordinator on the Cooper team that reached the stat as the head football coach at Ranger College and McMurry

University. Kelly Kent was an all-state running back at Cisco in the mid-1970s and then played football at Abilene Christian University where he scored 26 touchdowns in three seasons. He was a member of the ACU team that won the NAIA national championship in 1977 in the Apple Bowl. He died unexpectedly between his junior and senior seasons at ACU.

John "Model T" Ford and Kenneth Ford of Breckenridge were among the first of many great passing quarterbacks to come out of the Big Country. Both are in the Hardin-Simmons Hall of Fame. John set 13 Cowboy passing records and ranked among the nation's top 10 passers in 1948, 1949 and 1950. His 26 touchdown passes in one season was a national record at the time. He was named the most valuable player in the North-South Shrine All-State game in 1950. Ken led the nation in passing in 1957 and finished as the fourth-leading passer in HSU history in the Division I scholarship era at the school. He was the most valuable player in the Blue-Gray game in 1957 and played for the New York Giants in 1958 and the New York Titans in 1960.

The Big Country Athletic Hall of Fame board of directors will also award eight \$500 scholarships to graduating student-athletes in the 19 counties that make up the Big Country

The Big Country Athletic Hall of Fame museum is located in the Abilene Independent School District administration building at 241 Pine in downtown Abilene and is open to the public free of charge any time the administration building is open.





Callahan County's jobless rate rises to 5.8% in December

The unemployment rate in Callahan County rose one-tenth of one percent to 5.8% in December 2011, according to jobless figures released Friday, January 20th by the Texas Workforce Commission. The unemployment rate in Callahan County one year ago in December 2010 was 5.8 percent.

Of the 6,763 civilian labor force in Callahan County, 6,374 were employed during December 2011, and 389 were unemployed, giving the county an unemployment rate of 5.8%.

Callahan County's unemployment rate was 5.7% in November, 2011. Of the 6,825 civilian labor force in the county during November, 6,438 had jobs while 387 or 5.7% were unemployed.

Previous monthly jobless rates in Callahan County included: 6.1% in October 2011, 6.7% in September, 6.9% in August, 7.4% in July, 7.8% in June, 6.5% in May, 5.9% in April, 6.3% in March, 6.9% in February, and 6.3% in January 2011, according to the unemployment fig-

Chevron Phillips to Build Plant

BAYTOWN, TX (Houston Business Journal)—Chevron Phillips Chemical Co. LP says it plans to build a new ethylene unit at its Baytown facility that will service the shale gas industry.  Check smoke detectors to ensure they are working properly and have full battery power. It's recommended that you check the batteries in your smoke alarms when it's time to turn the clocks forward or backward.

· Keep an up-to-date list of emergency fire, police, and medical phone numbers near your telephone. Show every member of your family where this information is kept and teach all children how to call for help in case of an emergency.

• Develop an escape plan with your family from multiple rooms within your home, both upstairs and downstairs. Take time to review the escape plan with your family, including a practice fire drill.

 Consider installing residential fire sprinklers to protect your family and property. To date, there has never been a multiple loss of life in a structure that had a competently installed and properly-maintained fire



Portions of Texas Interstate Highways to See Speed Limit Increase

Miles and miles of Texas highway will soon see speed limit increases following Thursday's Transportation Commission action approving 75 mph designations for close to 1,500 miles of interstate.

The speed limit changes span 60 Texas counties making it the largest conversion since a new law was passed last year. The 82nd Texas Legislature passed and the Governor signed House Bill 1353 which allows the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) to establish 75 mph speed limits on Texas highways providing speed studies show it can be done safely.

Since September, the agency has been reviewing existing 70 mph speed limits across the state to determine where a 75 mph limit may be safely posted. Four Central Texas highways were the first to see higher speeds after the new law took effect. Thursday's Commission action brings the number of miles now zoned at 75 mph as a result of House Bill (HB) 1353 to 1,618.

Posting new speed limits on 1,500 miles of interstate highway is a major milestone in implementing the new law, said Carol Rawson, TxDOT Traffic Operations Division

"Texas' economic strength depends on the efficient and safe movement of people and goods," Rawson explained. "These new speed limits increase highway efficiency while maintaining the safety of the transportation system."

TxDOT recommended to the Commission that speed limits be raised on segments of I-10, 1-20, 1-27, 1-30, 1-35, 1-37, 1-40, I-44 and I-45 after engineering studies showed that higher speeds could be posted safely. Motorists must continue to travel at the posted speed until new signs are installed, said Rawson.

"The new speed limit is not official until the signs go up,' she added.

TxDOT studies of speeds on U.S. highways, state highways, farm-to-market and ranch-to-market roads are still

Prior to HB 1353. Texas had 1,445 miles of 75 mph speed limits and 521 miles of 80 mph speed limits on certain state highways. These speed limits were previously restricted to specific rural counties and highways located mostly in West Texas. Texas now has almost 3,600 miles zoned at 75 mph or higher.


