Texas Oil & Gas Report

Chairman Lena Guerrero and Commissioner Robert Krueger reviewed oil companies' May nominations to buy a total of 1,769,127 barrels of Texas oil per day. The nomination total, a decrease of 9,131 barrels daily when compared to April purchaser nominations, estimates Texas oil purchases in the coming month. May 1991 nominations totaled 1,868,705 barrels daily.

Chairman Guerrero also reported that May nominations for the purchase of Texas gas totaled 19,002,149 Mcf/d (thousand cubic feet per day). May 1991 nominations totaled 19,993,104 Mcf/d.

Major purchasers filed these May nominations from the floor at the hearing: Exxon Company, U.S.A., 117,000 barrels per day, down 2,500 barrels; and Amoco Production Company, 142,000 barrels per day, unchanged.

Chairman Guerrero reported that crude oil and petroleum products imported into the U.S. averaged 6,888,000 barrels per day for the month of February 1992. This was an increase of 44,000 barrels per day from the same period a year ago.

Fine Line Exists Between Discipline and Abuse

No one really knows how many children are abused physically, sexually or emotionally each year because most abuse occurs in the privacy of homes and many victims do not report abuse because they fear breaking up the family, suffering punishment or not being believed if they do tell.

But it is know that an alarming of child abuse cases are reported to the Texas Department of Human Services each year. In fiscal year 1991 (September 1990-August 1991) 91.094 cases of child abuse were reported, and 34,875 cases were confirmed. Of those 34,875 cases, there were 55,392 victims of which 103 died.

April is National Child Abuse Prevention Month, and Texas PTA reminds parents and teachers that the line between discipline and abuse is a fine one.

"While having children is one of the most natural things in the world, being a good parent may not be," Shirley Igo, Texas PTA president said.

The Texas PTA, in affiliation with National PTA, opposes corporal punishment. True discipline is corrective, and when given by either parent or teacher, in wisdom and a spirit of love, tends to strengthen the will of the child towards appropriate behavior. Good discipline leads and directs, rather than threatens and coerces through fear.

According to the National Committee for Prevention of Child Abuse, "discipline is not punishment; discipline is not shame; discipline is not guilt; discipline helps the child to think; discipline helps the child to learn so that present and future behavior is changed; discipline helps the child to grow intellectually and emotionally--it enhances his selfconfidence and self-image; discipline is best taught by example."

Abuse satisfies the need of the parent. It only helps children think in terms of pain, hatred, revenge and hostility.

Discipline should help a child develop a sense of self-worth--the most important ingredient necessary for a child's positive

behavior in the future. Following are suggestions for parents and teachers to follow when creating loving relationships with children while still setting and enforcing the limits they need:

*When children misbehave, let them know that it is their action that is disliked and not who they

*Rewarding good behavior is more effective than punishing misbehavior

*Try to "catch" children being good. Be generous with praise.

*Discuss report cards with children. Find at least one good thing for which to praise the child, even if it is for attendance--no tasks.

*Punishment should be used to

*Physical punishment teaches a child that hitting is okay.

*Words hurt. Telling a child that he is stupid or lazy will lower his self-esteem.

*Make it a habit to spend time together.




