## Hunter Safety Course Friday and Saturday in Clyde

A Hunter Safety Course will be offered by Mike Driskell at Bible Baptist Church, 557 Hunt St., in Clyde on Friday and Saturday, July 13th and 14th.

Who is required to take Texas Hunter Education?

Every hunter (including out-of-state hunters) born on or after Sept. 2, 1971, must successfully complete a Hunter Education Training Course, or be accompanied\* while hunting. Minimum age of certification is 9 years of age.

If you were born on or after September 2, 1971 and you are:

- under 9 years of age, you must be accompanied\* while hunting.
- age 9 through 16, you must successfully complete a hunter

education course, or you must be accompanied\* while hunting.

• age 17 and over, you must successfully complete a hunter education course; or purchase a "Hunter Education Deferral" and you must be accompanied\* while hunting.

The course will be Friday, July 13th at 5:30 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. and on Saturday, July 14th from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. You must attend both days. No one day people will be accepted in this course.

The cost will be \$15.00.

You must be pre-enrolled to attend the course.

## Memorial Services were Held for Doris Gail Ransdell Monday, July 2

Doris Gail Ransdell passed away on June 29, 2012 in Abilene, having lived an adventurous seventy-three year life.

Gail was born July 31, 1938 in Bowling Green, Kentucky to John William Ransdell and Marguerite Lawrence Ransdell. At age five the Ransdell family moved from Kentucky to New Mexico for her father's health. She graduated from Robertson High School in Las Vegas, New Mexico in 1956. She attended New Mexico Highlands University in Las Vegas, New Mexico and earned a Bachelor of Arts in Music, followed by Master of Arts in Piano and Organ.

Her lifelong love and gift was playing the piano. She used her talent playing in churches, musical theatre and teaching various ages from Kindergarten to college all over the world. She taught music at many public New Mexico schools including Carlsbad, Santa Fe, Gallup and Aztec. After working at the Institute of American Indian Arts in Santa Fe she went to work as a music teacher and dormitory counselor for the Department of Defense Military Dependents Schools. She spent the next nine years overseas: one year in Pusan, Korea; one year in Ankara, Turkey; one year in Alconbury, England; and six years in Madrid, Spain.

She returned to the United States and completed four years working for another government agency, the Bureau of Indian Affairs, and was placed in three Navajo reservation schools in New Mexico and Arizona: Newcomb, Tohatchi and Toyey.

She owned a successful piano studio for five years in Gallup, New Mexico and during this time taught at the University of

New Mexico. She retired in 1992 after a successful kidney transplant and lived in Farmington, Albuquerque, and moved to Cottonwood Community near Cross Plains, Texas in March of 2002.

Gail is survived by her mother, Marguerite L. Ransdell; sister Jacque Childress and brother-in-law Scott Childress, all of Cottonwood; niece Stephanie Childress and great-nephew Ian of Austin; a multitude of family in different parts of the United States; and many other loved ones from all over the globe.

She is preceded in death by her father, John W. Ransdell.

A Memorial Celebration of Gail's life was held on July 2, 2012 at First Baptist Church, Cross Plains, officiated by Pastor Ronnie White and Tim Tolosa. Final interment will take place in Albuquerque, New Mexico at Sunset Memorial Gardens.

## "Meet the Author" Features Western Writer Bill Neal

The Cross Plains Public Library will feature rancher, retired country lawyer and author, Bill Neal, on Tuesday, July 17, at 7:00 p.m. in the library conference room for its "Meet the Author" series. Neal has authored numerous books about law and justice on the western frontier; his latest work is titled Vengeance Is Mine: The Scandalous Love Triangle That Triggered the Boyce-Sneed Feud. It is Number 11 in the A.C. Greene Series.

During his 40 years of cases in numerous courthouses in West Texas, Neal heard many tales of notorious killings and fascinating murder trials that had happened, including several killings that had been committed during murder trials. Shortly before his retirement from active law practice, Neal conceived the idea

of resurrecting these old tales of frontier justice—and injustice—by researching them in the basements of courthouses, back shops of country weeklies, family histories, and interviews with old-timers.

The result was a sizable collection of riveting stories, most of them about violent killings and murder trials. However, instead of simply collecting and writing individual stories, Neal conceived the idea of stringing those tales together chronologically and by theme in order to tell the larger story of how justice on the frontier progressed from Judge Winchester to Judge Lynch and finally to Judge Blackstone including many misfires along the way as the nascent criminal justice system of courtroom justice under the written laws of

the state struggled to supplant the unwritten laws of the old South and the western frontier.

The end result of this project was a trilogy of books published by Texas Tech University Press including Getting Away With Murder on the Texas Frontier: Notorious Killings and Celebrated Trails (2006); From Guns to Gavels: How Justice Grew Up in the Outlaw West (2007); and Sex, Murder & the Unwritten Law: Courting Judicial Mayhem Texas Style (2009).

So mark your calendars to join us for an entertaining evening on July 17th, at 7:00 p.m. in the library conference room. Refreshments will be served, and Neal will have books for sale and be available for autographs.

## Texas lake and river swimmers reminded of potential health risks

WACO, Texas (June 14, 2012) -With summer starting to heat up, people across the Brazos River basin are heading to nearby rivers and lakes. However, the conditions that make the water temperature so delightful can also encourage the growth of a rare but dangerous microorganism.

The Brazos River Authority encourages visitors to enjoy the water, while being aware of health risks associated with swimming in or around stagnant or slow-moving water.

Primary amebic meningoencephalitis (PAM), which is most common during the summer, is a rare disease caused by *naegleria fowleri*, an amoeba found in almost all untreated, fresh surface water and in soil. The amoeba thrives in low levels of fresh water that is warmer than 80 degrees and stagnant or slow-moving. The PAM infection occurs when water containing the organism is forced into the nasal passages - usually from diving or jumping into water or from water skiing. The amoeba makes its way into the brain and spinal cord, destroying brain tissue.

Symptoms of the nearly always fatal infection include severe headache, high fever, stiff neck, nausea, vomiting, seizures and hallucinations as the condition worsens. Although PAM is rare - affecting about one to three people a year in Texas - those infected usually succumb to the disease within a week.

There were 10 known cases of

PAM in Texas between 2000 and 2010, according to state health officials. No cases have been diagnosed in Texas since the beginning of 2011. Worldwide, only a few hundred cases have been reported over the last 30 years.

To prevent infection, it is recommended that those taking part in warm, fresh water-related activities use nose clips or hold their noses shut while jumping into water. With the amoeba often found in soil, it is best to avoid stirring up underwater sediment. The Texas Department of Health recommends that people avoid stagnant or polluted water and take "No Swimming" signs seriously.

While the BRA tests for a variety of contaminants, such as *E.coli* at more than 100 sites, no testing is conducted for the PAM microbe.

PAM cannot be spread person to person nor by drinking water. Swimming pools and hot tubs that are properly cleaned, maintained and chlorinated are generally safe, as is salt water.

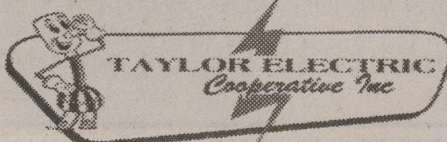

## National School Lunch and Breakfast Program

The Cross Plains Independent school District participates in the National school Lunch and School Breakfast Program. Children in households receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits (formerly the Food Stamp Program) or TANF can get free meals regardless of your income. Your benefit letter from the Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC) is your documentation for free meals. If you have not already received a letter from your school stating that your household is eligible for free meals, you may take your HHSC benefit letter to the reviewing official to be certified for free meals. If a child in your household is directly certified due to receiving SNAP or TANF benefits, all children in

your household are eligible for free meals. If you have questions, call the school at 254-725-6122 to speak to Margie Sowell, the reviewing official.

Your children can get free or reduced price meals if your household income is within the limits on the Federal Income Chart. For an application and Income Chart please call or come by the school offices and one will be provided to you. Application forms will also be included in the registration packet of each enrolling student. Only one application per household should be completed; all children in the household can be included on one form.

It reminds us that freedom is not free—that generations of American heroes have sacrificed to enable us to live in the land of

the free and the home of the brave. It is a reminder that we must do all we can to show our appreciation to our service members, not just on the Fourth of July, but on every day of the year.

Let us remember with gratitude their sacrifices and live with purpose the charge so aptly put forward by John Adams in 1777, "Posterity! You will never know how much it cost the present Generation to preserve your Freedom! I hope you will make good use of it."

May God bless you and may He continue to bless Texas.

In the plain vanilla division, Wally Bennett's creamy, smooth concoction earned him first place in that category.

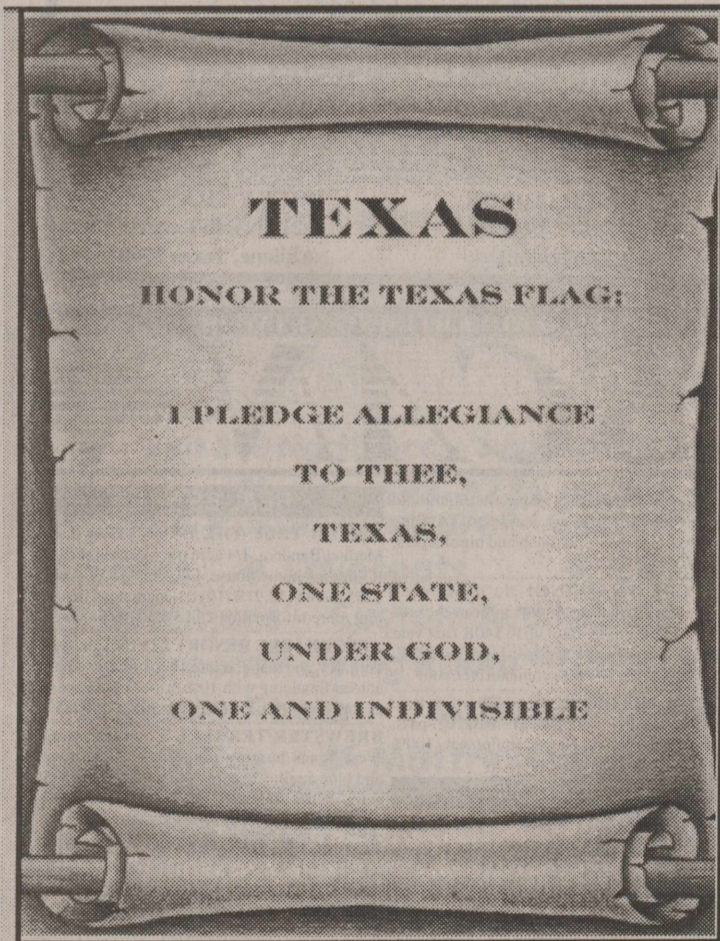
