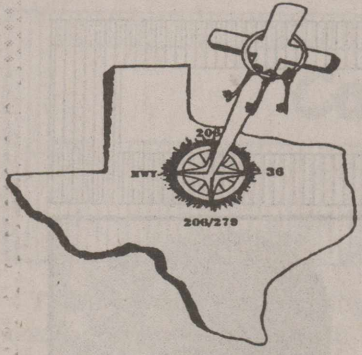

Randy Turner, KTAB's weather forecaster, will be the guest speaker.

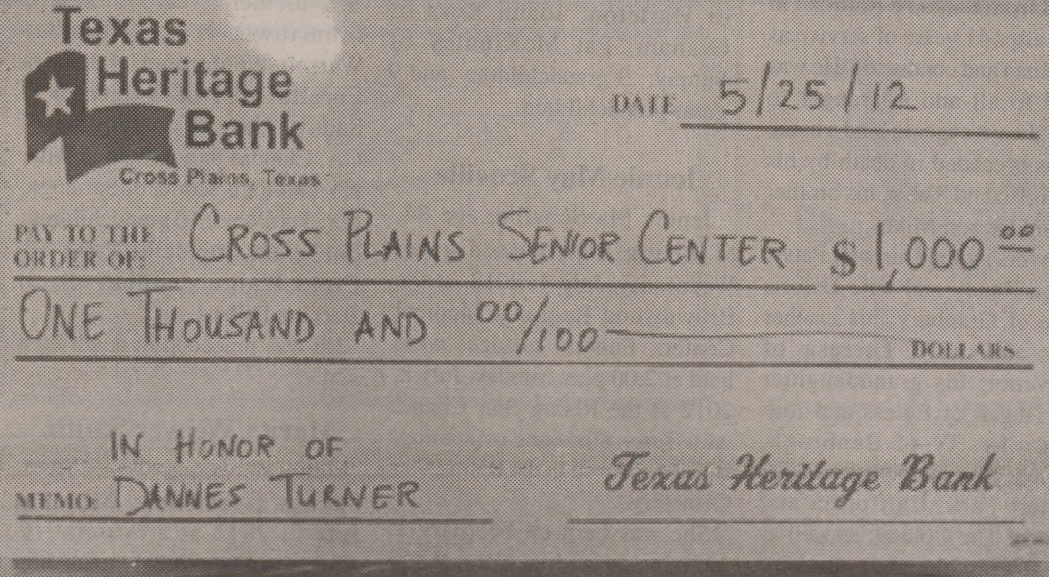

Crime Rate in Texas Drops for Second Consecutive Year Data shows decrease in measured crime by 8.3 percent in 2011

AUSTIN—The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) today, Friday, July 6th, announced that for the second consecutive year the major crime rate in Texas has dropped significantly. According to data compiled by the DPS Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) program that was released in the *Annual Report of 2011 UCR Data Collection*, the overall crime rate — the number of crimes per 100,000 people in Texas — decreased by 8.3 percent in 2011.

"The continuing downward trend in index crimes is directly linked to the outstanding efforts of local law enforcement in Texas," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "The dedication and perseverance of all Texas law enforcement agencies in protecting the citizens and visitors of this state is commendable."

The report also shows violent crime and property crimes both decreased in 2011 compared to 2010. The violent crime rate

was down 9.3 percent in 2011, and the property crime rate decreased by 8.2 percent.

The UCR program collects reported crimes in eight categories (index crimes) from Texas law enforcement agencies. The eight categories are: murder; rape; robbery; aggravated assault; burglary; larceny/theft; motor vehicle theft; and arson. "While decreased crime as measured by the index crime rate is encouraging, unfortunately it is not an accurate reflection of all crime in Texas, and does not properly illustrate the threat posed by criminal enterprise organizations operating in Texas," said Director McCraw. "Contemporary organized crime is increasingly transnational, opportunistic and hidden. Drug smuggling, human trafficking, extortion, corruption, and kidnapping are just a few of the crimes committed by criminal enterprise organizations that are not reflected in

index crime reporting. Greater participation in the National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS) will provide increased accuracy and utility to Texas crime statistics."

NIBRS collects all of the data for the index crimes, plus data in 38 additional offense categories, which can be found at: <http://www2.fbi.gov/ucr/faqs.htm>.

If more Texas law enforcement agencies adopted NIBRS, Texas would have more accurate and meaningful crime data to aid all levels of government in the development of impactful crime reduction strategies as well as the appropriate deployment of resources, and would better assist law enforcement leaders in their decision-making process.

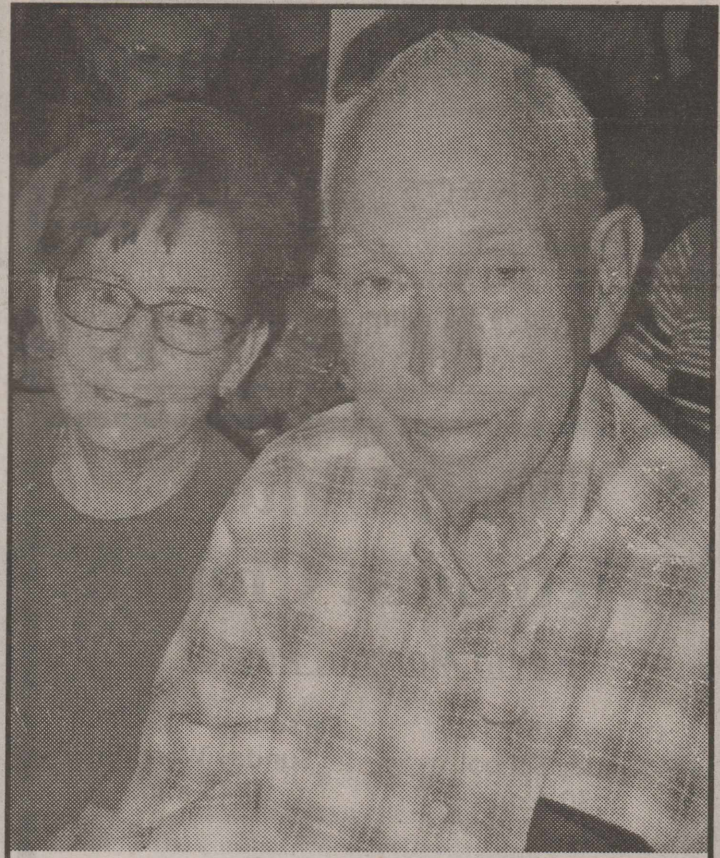
Brisket Orders are Being Taken Now for upcoming Labor Day Weekend

Thomas Ames McDaniel

Thomas Ames McDaniel, 58, died Saturday at the VA Memorial Hospital in Temple. Funeral services were held at 2:00 p.m. Tuesday, July 10, 2012 at Higginbotham Funeral Home Chapel in Cross Plains. He was born August 6, 1953, in Fort Worth, the first child of Esther James Ames and Thomas Wayne McDaniel. He grew up in Texas and pursued a variety of career throughout his life including carpenter, plumber, oil rig worker, social worker, author and poet. Known to his family as a youngster by his middle name "Ames," he switched to "Tom" later and still answered to both names throughout his life.

As a young man, Tom attended Texas A&M University on a scholarship to study meteorology, but left Texas A&M his freshman year in 1971. Later in life he returned to college and attended the University of Central Florida. This time he studied English, writing poetry and novels. He again took some time off, still writing, though, and later finished that degree in 1995 after Texas, Permian Basin. He wrote hundreds of poems in journals such as *Blue Unicorn*, *The Florida Review*, *The Texas Review*, and *Kansas Quarterly*. His proudest publication, however, was likely *Beto's Burrito*, a children's book authored in 2011 and illustrated by his daughter Cassie.

While serving in the Navy in Florida, he met his first wife Ann McDaniel. He married Ann in 1975 and they had three children together: Rudy, Nathan and Cassie. Following the construction industry, he moved with his family from Colorado to Texas to New Mexico to Florida. Later in 1988, he and Ann divorced and he moved back to Texas. In 1992 he remarried to Gina Trevino McDaniel, and they had a son together, Jonathan. Living in Midland, Tom prospered finding a good job as a social worker and helping to improve lives of disadvantaged children. One winter in 1998 when it snowed heavily and didn't seem like it wasn't going to stop, he emailed his Florida children and described the snowmen, snowball fights, snow ice cream and barbecue pit that kept them in good spirits.

Later in life, Tom enjoyed working as a DJ for online radio stations and hosting various radio programs and playing music for listeners from all over the world. He was a fluent Spanish speaker and prided himself in learning more about Spanish culture and interacting with Spanish speakers from all walks of life. After her passing, he moved into his mother's former home in Cross Plains and later married his current wife Angela. They lived together with her son James since 2010.

He is preceded in death by his parents.

Survivors include his wife Angela; his stepson James; three sons, Thomas Rudy McDaniel and Nathan Ames McDaniel of Orlando and Jonathan McDaniel of Midland; his daughter Cassie Lynn McDaniel of Toronto; his sister Martha Stott of San Jose; nieces, Rachel Stott Sumney of Dallas and Meredith Stott of San Jose; and his four grandchildren Aubrey McDaniel, Annabelle McDaniel, Brighton McDaniel and Benjamin McDaniel.

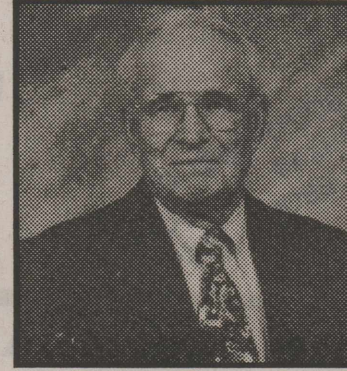

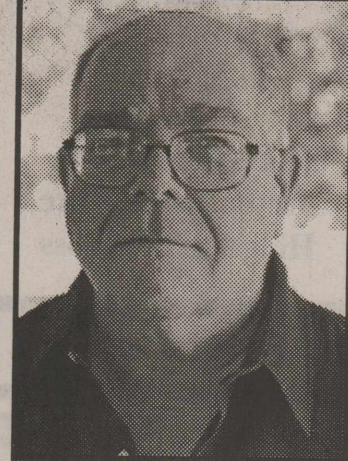
Jennie May Scoville

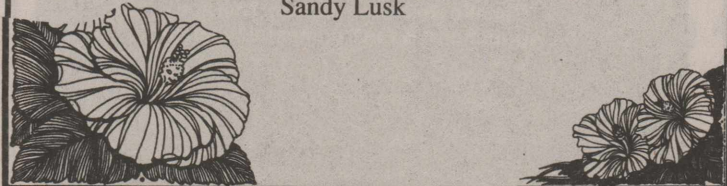

Attract Birds & Butterflies No Matter What Size Your Landscape

By Gardening Expert, TV/radio Host & Author Melinda Myers

Add a little extra color and motion to your summer garden with containers designed to attract birds and butterflies. Many garden centers continue to sell annuals throughout the summer and many of these mid-season annuals are a bit bigger, providing instant impact.

It's easier than you think to attract birds and butterflies and the good news is you don't need a lot of space to do it. Container gardens give you the ability to attract wildlife to your backyard, patio, deck or even balcony. Simply follow these four steps and your garden will be filled with color, motion and a season of wildlife.

1- Provide food for birds and butterflies. Include plants with flat daisy-like flowers like pentas, zinnias, and cosmos to attract butterflies. For hummingbirds, include some plants with tubular flowers including nicotiana, cuphea, salvia, and fuchsia. And don't forget about the hungry caterpillars that will soon turn into beautiful butterflies. Parsley, bronze fennel, and licorice vines are a few favorites that make great additions to container gardens. You can even create containers that will attract seed-eating birds. Purple Majesty millet, coneflower, coreopsis, and Rudbeckias will keep many of the birds returning to your landscape.

2- Include water for both the birds and butterflies. It's a key ingredient and a decorative small

shallow container filled with water can be included in a large container. Or include a free-standing birdbath within your container collection. I used a bronzed leaf birdbath in just this way. It created a great vertical accent, added interest to a blank wall and provided a water supply for the birds.

3- Give them a place to live and raise their young. Add a few evergreens, ornamental grasses, and perennials to your container garden. Use weather resistant containers that can tolerate the extreme heat and cold in your garden. Then fill with plants that are at least one zone hardier. Or add a few birdhouses. These can be included in the container or mounted on a fence, post, or nearby tree.

4- Skip the pesticides, please. Nature, including the birds you invite into your landscape, will devour many garden pests. Plus, the chemicals designed to kill the bad guys can also kill the good bugs and wildlife you are trying to attract. And, if pests get out of hand, use more eco-friendly products like soaps, Neem, and horticulture oil as a control mechanism. And, as always, read and follow label directions carefully.

And to conserve time and energy, try using one of the self-watering containers or hanging baskets that are on the market. This helps to make it both easy and convenient when time constraints and vacations get in the way of providing ideal care. I recently tried using one of the

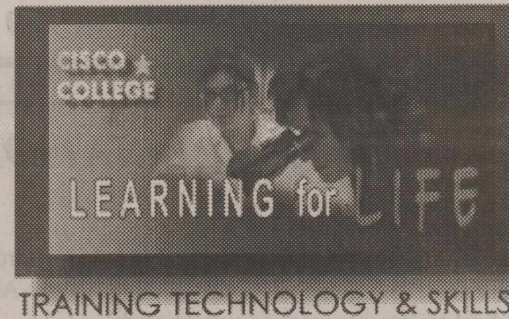
Gardener's Supply Easy Roller self-watering containers. I filled one with wildlife-friendly petunias along with papyrus and golden moneywort. After a five-day trip during hot dry weather I returned to find my container garden in great shape and hummingbirds visiting the flowers.

So gather your family and get started planting your wildlife container garden today.

State set to invest in purifying brackish water for commercial sale in Central Texas

AUSTIN—Along Interstate 35, between Austin and San Antonio, the Texas Economic Miracle is thirsting for water. Tight restrictions on the Edwards Aquifer and the high costs of pipelines are choking off the potential growth of homes and businesses.

But on one 2,000-acre tract of land north of New Braunfels still parched from last year's drought, Texas Land Commissioner Jerry Patterson hopes he's found the water needed to help end Central Texas' water crisis.

As chairman of the School Land Board, which manages the real estate portfolio of the state's \$26 billion Permanent School Fund, Patterson is investigating the feasibility of tapping into Texas' abundant brackish groundwater, desalinating it, and selling it.

"We don't need to live one step away from crisis and drought," Patterson said. "Texas may be short on water, but not innovation. Desal is part of Texas' water future and we're going to start right here."

Patterson said the General Land Office has contracted with experts to study the hydrology and geology of several Permanent School Fund tracts of land along the I-35 corridor. "If the water is there, then I think the School Land Board is ready to invest the time and resources needed to deliver an entirely new and drought-resistant source of water for Central Texas," Patterson said. "This is a game-

changer, a common-sense fix for the Texas water crisis."

The impact of developing a new source of water in Central Texas will be seen all the way downstream, Patterson said, potentially benefitting rice farmers, petrochemical facilities, utilities and even the health of the state's bays and estuaries. "Adding desal to the mix would help mitigate the impact of a drought on the Highland Lakes," Patterson said. "Desal in Central Texas would help all the way to the coast."

Patterson said he hopes to develop a groundwater desalination model that could be replicated on other state-owned tracts of land all over Texas. "Texas has an abundance of brackish water," Patterson said. "I hope to put the General Land Office in the water business state-wide."

The coming Texas water crisis was highlighted in this month's *Texas Monthly*, which points out the importance of finding solutions now, before the state's population doubles in the next 50 years.

After all, Patterson said, necessity really is the mother of invention. "We can't plan on taking any more fresh water from the Edwards Aquifer. It takes 30 years to get a new lake permitted and filled. Pipelines cost a fortune," Patterson said. "If we want to keep growing, we need water and I think desal is a common-sense part of that solution."

Bill Neal Featured at "Meet the Author"

Rancher, retired country lawyer, and author Bill Neal, will be guest speaker at Cross Plains Public Library's "Meet the Author" on Tuesday, July 17th at 7:00 p.m. in the library conference room.

Neal was born 1936 in Quanah, Hardeman County, Texas. His ancestors were ranchers and he was raised on a family ranch south of Quanah. He graduated from Quanah High School in 1953 and from Hardin-Simmons University in 1957, where he majored in economics and was editor of the college newspaper.

After serving as an Infantry Officer in the U.S. Army, he worked as a reporter, first for the *Abilene Reporter-News* and then for the *Amarillo Daily News*. In 1961, he enrolled in the University of Texas Law School, graduating in 1964 as the Grand Chancellor of his class. He was also Comment Editor of the *Texas Law Review* that year. During the next year, 1964-65, he served as a briefing attorney for Justice Ruel Walker of the Texas Supreme Court and then returned to Quanah to practice law.

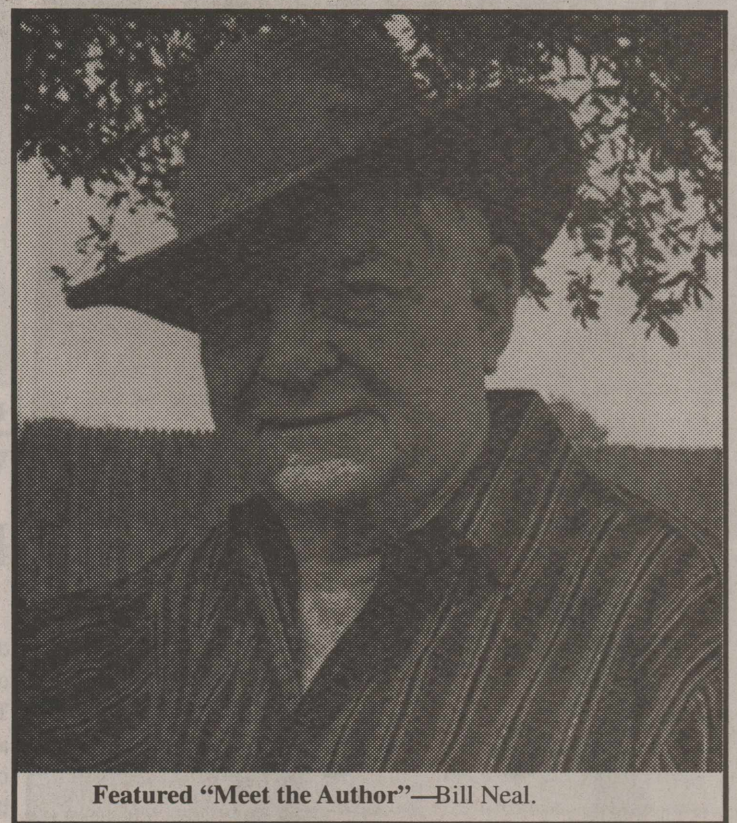
In 1972 Neal purchased his own ranch near Quanah. In 1968 he was elected as District Attorney for the 46th Judicial District of Texas which includes Wilbarger, Hardeman and Foard Counties. Retiring from that office in 1976, after serving two terms, he opened a private law office as a general practitioner with emphasis on criminal defense work.

In 1992, he was elected District Attorney again, this time for the 50th Judicial District composed of Baylor, Know, Cottle and King Counties, where he served three terms before retiring from that office and from active law practice in 2004.

Even while engaged in active law practice, he exhibited an interest in writing historical works. He wrote two books on local history: *The Last Frontier: The History of Hardeman County Texas* (1966), and a collection of oral histories of his rural community, *Medicine Mound, entitled Legends of the Mound: The Medicine Mound Settlers Community Scrapbook* (1997).

During his 40 years of trying cases in numerous courthouses in West Texas, Neal heard many tales of notorious killings and fascinating murder trials that had happened in the various communities during the late nineteenth century and the early twentieth century, including several killings that had been committed during murder trials.

Although sensational, accounts of most of these tales of early-day killings and trials had never been widely circulated outside the smaller communities where they happened, because news coverage was usually limited to the local weekly newspaper and by late twentieth century were almost forgotten. Another reason most of these stories had slipped into obscurity was due to the tradition of families—and communities—in those earlier times of sweeping their scandals under a rug. In most cases even subsequent county histories simply ignored those unpleasant episodes.

Shortly before his retirement from active law practice, Neal conceived the idea of resurrecting these old tales of frontier justice—and injustice—by researching them in the basements of courthouses, backshops of country weeklies, family histories and interviews with oldtimers. The result was a sizeable collection of riveting stories, most of them about violent killings and murder trials.

However, instead of simply collecting and writing individual stories, Neal conceived the idea of stringing those tales together chronologically and by theme in order to tell the larger story of how justice on the frontier progressed from Judge Winchester to Judge Lynch and then finally to Judge Blackstone including many misfires along the way as the nascent criminal justice system of courtroom justice under the written laws of the state struggled to supplant the unwritten laws of the Old South and the western frontier.

The end result of this project was a trilogy of books published by Texas Tech University Press including *Getting Away With Murder on the Texas Frontier: Notorious Killings and Celebrated Trials* (2006); *From Guns to Gavels: How Justice Grew Up in the Outlaw West* (2007); and *Sex, Murder & the Unwritten Law: Courting Judicial Mayhem, Texas Style* (2009). All the books have a preface written by Gordon Morris Bakken, professor of history at California State University at Fullerton, and are used in his classes on the development of justice on the western frontier. The last book has been designated by Texas Tech University Press as the first volume in a new series it will publish entitled *American Liberty & Justice*.

Awards to date for these books include the following: For *Getting Away With Murder on the Texas Frontier*, finalist for a Spur Award for the 2007 Best Nonfiction Book awarded by the Western Writers of America; finalist for the 2007 Violet Crown Award for the best work of nonfiction by the Writers' League of Texas; "Best Book of the Year" award by the

National Association for Outlaw and Lawman History; and the 2007 Rupert Richardson award for the best nonfiction book of the year by the West Texas Historical Association.

For *Guns to Gavels*, the 2008 Richardson award for the best nonfiction book of the year by the West Texas Historical Association, and best nonfiction book of the year award by the North Texas Book Festival. The third book, *Sex, Murder & the Unwritten Law*, was published in September 2009, and was a finalist for the Center for Great Plains Studies best nonfiction book of the year award.

In 2011, the University of North Texas Press published Neal's latest book, *Vengeance Is Mine: The Scandalous Love Triangle That Triggered the Boyce-Sneed Feud*. It is Number 11 in the A.C. Greene Series.

During the past three years Neal has authored two articles appearing in annual historical publications: "Arduo in the Courts: Sex and the Law in Frontier Texas," in the 2010 West Texas Historical Association's Year Book, and "Courtroom Gladiators of Yesteryear: Tales of the Texas Panhandle's Pioneer Lawyers," in the 2010 Panhandle-Plains Historical Review. The May 2012 edition of the Wild West Historical Association's Journal magazine, featured an article written by Neal entitled "The Frontier Sheriff, the Mail-Order Bride, and the Handsome Gambler."

Since his retirement from active law practice, Bill Neal and his wife, Gayla, have made their home in Abilene, Texas. He still, however, owns and operates his own ranch near Quanah. He has three children; Monte, Max and Kay Neal and two stepdaughters: Nicole Todd and Joy Ulrich.

So, mark your calendars to join us on Tuesday, July 17th, at 7:00 p.m. in the library conference room for an interesting evening on the western frontier.

Texas cattle deaths due to prussic acid 'isolated incident'

COLLEGE STATION — Texas AgriLife Extension Service experts said Tuesday the deaths of 15 cattle in Bastrop County recently were likely an isolated event and that no further problems are anticipated.

"There's a lot of information and misinformation that continues to circulate about this recent isolated case of cattle dying after consuming a Bermuda grass hybrid known as Tifton 85," said Dr. Ron Gill, AgriLife Extension livestock specialist. "It should be known that there is not a widespread problem or concern related to this forage or its use for grazing livestock or the production of hay for livestock consumption."

The single incident occurred when 15 cattle died with clinical signs and preliminary diagnostic results consistent with prussic acid poisoning, said Dr. Tom Hairgrove, AgriLife Extension animal health specialist. The cattle were in a pure field of Tifton 85 Bermuda grass.

Results of analyses of rumen contents and fresh forage from the field in question by the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory, an agency that is part of The Texas A&M University System, indicated potential prussic acid toxicity, and at this time there are no other known reported cases of prussic acid toxicity on Tifton 85 Bermuda grass, said Dr. Tom Hairgrove, AgriLife Extension animal health specialist.

"Tifton 85 is a hybrid Bermuda grass released from the forage breeding program at the USDA-ARS station at Tifton, Georgia in 1992 by Dr. Glenn Burton," said Dr. Larry Redmon, AgriLife Extension state forage specialist. "Dr. Burton is the plant breeder who released 'Coastal Bermuda grass in 1943.'"

To date, there have been millions of acres of Tifton 85 Bermuda grass planted across the southeastern U.S., Redmon said. Since its release in 1992, Tifton 85 has become the most com-

monly planted Bermuda grass in Texas.

Due to its ease of establishment, excellent drought tolerance and excellent animal performance, literally millions of cattle, horses, sheep and goats have grazed Tifton 85 Bermuda grass since its release without incident, he said.

"Many forage species, including Tifton 85, have the potential to produce prussic acid, a volatile and toxic compound," Hairgrove said.

"However, those levels have not been known to produce problems with grazing livestock," he said. "With production for more than 20 years across millions of acres in the south, we have not been able to identify a previous report of prussic acid toxicity in livestock grazing in or fed Tifton 85."

The pasture where the cattle died had been severely drought stressed from last year's unprecedented lack of rainfall. A moderate amount of fertilizer was applied in mid- to late-April and the pasture received approximately 5 inches of precipitation within the previous 30 days and was at a hay harvest stage of growth, Redmon said.

"Thus, the pasture did not fit the typical young flush of growth following a drought-ending rain or young growth following a frost we typically associate with prussic acid formation in other species of forage," he said.

Because of this unique situation, AgriLife Extension and Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory personnel have conducted multiple site visits and forage analyses of plants from several field environments across Texas in an attempt to confirm levels of prussic acid accumulation in Tifton 85 Bermuda grass.

The diagnostic lab has also collaborated with other laboratories to perform quantitative forage analysis of prussic acid levels, said Dr. Tammy Beckham, Texas Veterinary Di-

agnostic Laboratory director. Repeated analysis is ongoing to assess potential for prussic acid accumulation in Bermuda grasses in Bastrop County. In addition, the U.S. Department of Agriculture has conducted DNA analysis to confirm the grass as Tifton 85.

Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory, Texas AgriLife Research and AgriLife Extension were recently funded to implement a pilot project on an enhanced passive surveillance system to provide early detection of animal diseases, including cases resulting from environmental factors.

"The EPS program involves 40 veterinary practices and more than 100 large animal practitioners reporting as one of five data streams," Hairgrove said. "In addition, three diagnostic laboratories in two states, livestock markets and harvesting facilities, and wildlife information is also included to provide a comprehensive view of animal health surveillance."

"This incident was reported to the EPS, which is currently being used to monitor animal health over a broad geographic area in Texas and New Mexico, in coordination with the Texas Animal Health Commission and New Mexico Department of Agriculture. Through the EPS, there have been no other reported problems with Tifton 85."

While any livestock loss is unfortunate, currently this episode in Bastrop County appears to be an isolated incident, Hairgrove said.

"Federal, state and local animal health officials and participating private veterinary practitioners will continue monitoring for other signs of animal distress, as well as continue to sample plants to assess potential for prussic acid accumulation."

Drought killed trees could become liability issues for landowners

COLLEGE STATION, Texas — A tree that falls in a lonely forest may not make a sound, but what about the tree that falls on your neighbor's house?

The sound it makes? Chancing.

Texas Forest Service is encouraging homeowners and landowners to remove fire- and drought-killed trees that are within falling distance of neighboring homes, roads and pathways. Failure to do so, agency officials say, could make you liable for damages.

"Be aware that your tree could fall onto someone else's property," Texas Forest Service Central Texas Operations Department Head Jim Rooni said. "The rules vary from place to place, but generally the owner of the tree is responsible. Bottom line: You could be liable."

Rooni said foresters received an influx of calls following the deadly wildfire that ripped through Bastrop last September, destroying roughly 1.5 million trees. But the liability issue isn't limited to trees killed by fire, he said.

Texas is emerging from one of the most devastating droughts and one of the most unprecedented wildfire seasons in state history. Though there is no official count for the total number of trees killed by wildfire, foresters and analysts have estimated that as many as 500 million trees in rural forested areas and another 5.6 million trees in populated urban areas were killed as a result of the 2011 drought.

The sheer volume of dead trees (especially those standing in populated areas) poses a significant hazard, Rooni said.

"Standing, dead trees are dangerous and unpredictable," Rooni said. "If they fall, they can cause serious damage and even death."

If your tree still has yet to sprout green leaves, forestry experts say it's most likely dead. If you're not sure, read our Texas Forest Service tree assessment guide, check out our facebook photo album to see examples of trees in varying states or contact a certified arborist.

If you have questions regarding liability on public land or rights of way, contact your local county sheriff's department or county commissioner's office. For questions regarding liability issues on private property, seek counsel from a reputable legal source.

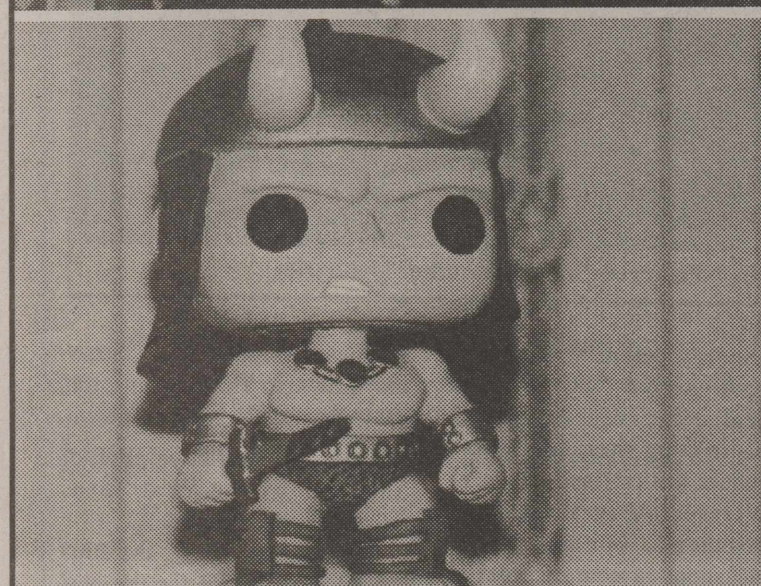

Sims was the one who had the real interest in Howard's writings, as he has been reading various genres since a young teen-ager. He recalled reading his first Conan story in a paperback with

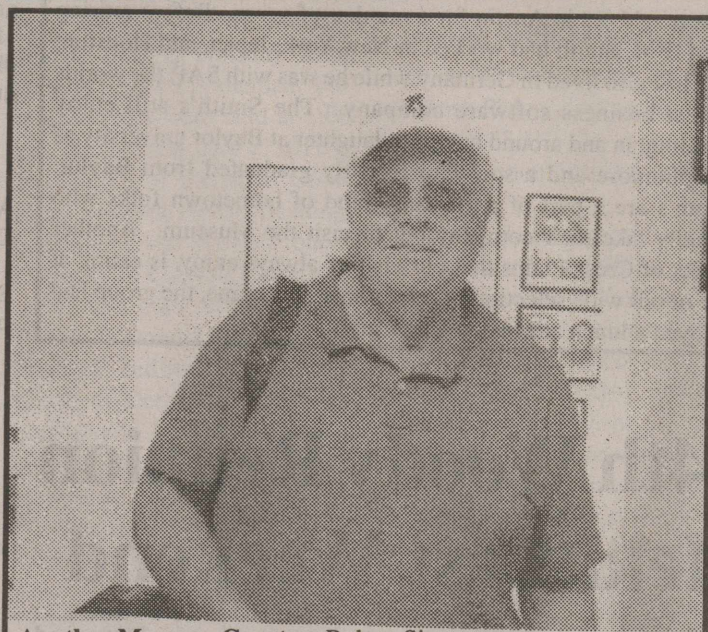
