Texas Employers Add 12,900 Jobs in June

economy added 12,900 seasonally adjusted nonfarm jobs in June. Texas' seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 7.0 percent in June, from 6.9 percent in May, and down from 8.1 percent a year ago. Texas remains well below the national unemployment rate of 8.2 per-

"For nearly two years, employers in Texas have expanded their payrolls and kept the economic engine of Texas moving forward," said Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) Chairman Andres Alcantar. "Since last year, the Texas economy has added more than 282,000 private sector jobs.'

Several industries in Texas added jobs in June, led by Construction, which expanded by 9,600 jobs. The Construction industry has posted annual gains for six consecutive months. The industry has added 24,400 jobs over the year for a 4.4 percent annual growth rate. The Other Services industry, which includes employment in equipment and machinery repair, personal care services, and social and civic organizations, gained 4,900 positions in June. The Other Services sector has seen a 4.9 percent annual growth rate over the past year.

"Texas' labor force continues seasonally adjusted). to grow, and is at an all-time high of nearly 13 million workers and job seekers," said TWC are flocking to Texas in search press/2012/praudio12.html.

Employment in Education and Health Services showed positive gains as the industry grew by 3,400 jobs in June. This industry has experienced an increase of 46,800 jobs over the last year for an annual growth rate of 3.3

Employers in the Financial Activities industry expanded their payrolls by 2,900 jobs in June. Financial Activities jobs have grown by 16,700 over the past year.

"Growth in June brought the number of private sector jobs in Texas to more than nine million," said TWC Commissioner Representing Employers Tom Pauken. "Our state's private sector has grown at a rate of 3.2 percent over the last year, compared to the national private sector's annual growth rate of just 1.8 percent."

The Midland Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) had the lowest June unemployment rate in the state at 4.3 percent. The Odessa MSA came in second at 4.9 percent, and the Amarillo MSA third at 5.5 percent (not

Stray Mexican Cattle captured in Texas

AUSTIN -Stray livestock wandering between Chihuahua. Mexico, and Texas continue to present animal health concerns along the Rio Grande River in far West Texas according to Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC) and United States Agriculture (USDA) officials.

A total of 96 head of cattle (72 adults and 24 calves) originating from Mexico were recently captured and transported to government pens for inspection and testing. Luckily, all of the animals tested negative for both bovine tuberculosis and brucellosis, diseases found commonly in Mexico.

According to Dr. Grant Wease, field veterinarian for USDA/ APHIS Veterinary Services in El Paso, the primary purpose of this gather was to prevent the introduction of livestock diseases into the State of Texas and the U.S. "We have had indications that some cattle were being taken off the river and sold through various livestock markets in Texas and New Mexico, and that is an illegal entry of animals in the U.S." Dr. Wease also stated that, "So far a total of 310 head of cattle and 140 head of equine have been captured this year along the Texas/ Mexico border."

According to the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association (TSCRA) brand inspectors, all fire brands found on the cattle appeared to be of

Mexican origin. There were 20 head of cattle that had no brands at all. "It took a cooperative effort between TAHC, USDA, local authorities, and cattle industry partners to make this gather possible," said Dr. Dee Dr. Ellis also added, "Because of ongoing border security problems and the illegal movement of livestock, Texas and the U.S. continue to be at high risk for disease introduction."

Citizens are encouraged to contact local law enforcement or animal health officials to report any unusual activity regarding livestock or poultry near the

With limited resources, the TAHC and USDA work together with state, federal and local law enforcement officials to continually monitor border areas to prevent the introduction of foreign livestock or poultry diseases from entering Texas. It is anticipated that more cattle will be captured in Texas in the future as the animals continue to move freely across the Rio Grande in certain locations.

7 Tips for Storm Stressed Pets

Thunderstorms, hurricanes, windstorms and tornados are not always predictable, making storm phobia a particularly difficult fear to treat in pets, and for owners whose pets exhibit these fears, it can be equally distressing. Cross Plains' 2012 sales tax payments for the year totalled 20 308 21 which is 3 15 percent higher than the \$116,629.46 in sales tax rebate payments collected in 2011.

The Texas transit systems received \$121.6 million in July 2012 sales tax allocations, which is 12.2 percent higher than July 2011 and up 9.9 percent yearto-date

Special Purpose Taxing Districts received \$27.1 million in July 2012 allocations, which is 30.2 percent higher than July 2011 and higher by 24.0 percent year-to-date.
