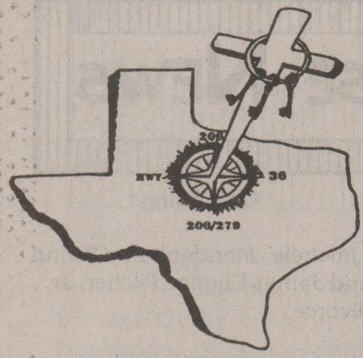

ABILENE, TEXAS---The West Texas Innovation Network is co-sponsoring an Entrepreneur Boot Camp to assist new business start-ups. The boot camp will be held Friday August 10, 2012, 8:00 to 5:00 p.m. at the Hunter Welcome Center on the ACU campus.

The program will consist of speakers from ACU faculty, successful entrepreneurs and expe-

Cross Plains Public Library Welcomes TEAL

The Cross Plains Public Library will welcome the team members of the TEAL—Technology Expertise, Access and Learning for All Texans project to our town in November to conduct computer classes for our patrons.

The Texas State Library and Archives Commission is the proud recipient of a \$7.96 million Broadband Technology Opportunities Program (BTOP) stimulus grant from the National Telecommunications and Information Administration.

With this funding TSLAC created TEAL, which will upgrade and expand the computing capabilities of more than 150 sites across the state, including 38 public libraries, community colleges, recreation centers and

health facilities.

Members of TEAL will bring their mobile computer lab to Cross plains and offer FREE daytime classes in Computer Basics, Microsoft Word, Internet Basics and E-mail.

Patrons will each have access to a laptop computer and instructors to guide them through each class. The goal is to assist patrons in their attempts to become more computer literate, and hopefully improve the quality of their lives in the process.

A complete class schedule will be available later and since seating is limited, reservations will be necessary. More details will be released in October.

during the year. It must be in the original box or bottle with their name on it. You will also have to fill out a medical form.

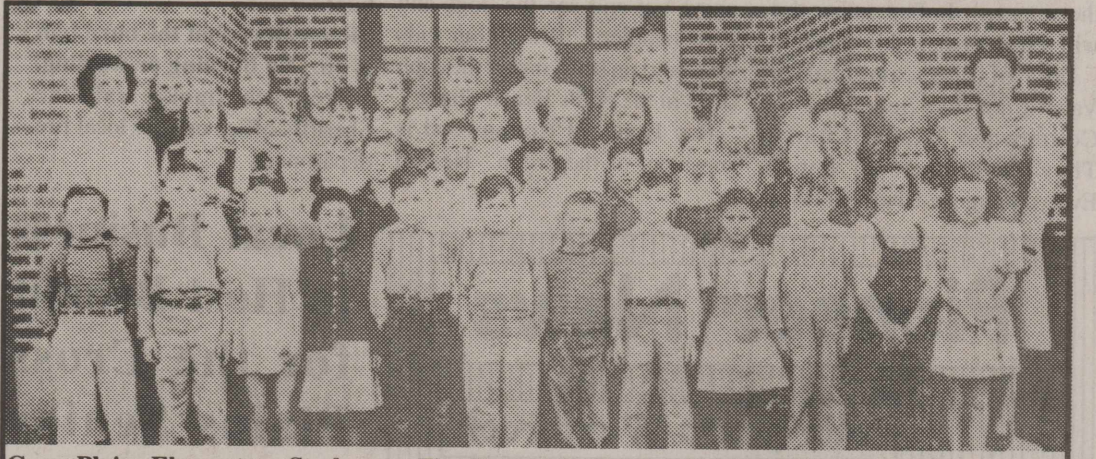
If you ordered a PTO school supply packet they will be available for pick up during registration.

But this is becoming all too uncommon a sentiment and all too difficult a goal to achieve. The idea that hard work should be rewarded, or that success should be based on merit, seems to be disappearing from the cultural landscape. And for those who have held to those fundamental principles, the promise we could once make that determination and effort would pay off is no longer a guarantee. I was stunned when the President recently said, "If you've got a business, you didn't build that. Somebody else made that happen." The idea that it is government, not hard-working Americans, who build and sustain businesses that provide jobs and support our economy is perhaps why we are looking at the first generation of young adults who are not expected to do better than their parents. I do not believe the President or Democrats in Congress have bad intentions. But I do believe they have a fundamentally different view of our country, one that has brought us to crisis. And after 41 straight months of unemployment at 8-plus percent, a stagnating economy, a faltering recovery and constant threats of looming tax hikes, it should be no surprise that the American Dream is simply out of reach for too many people. It could get worse. If Congress and the Administration fail to reach an agreement, taxes will rise for all Americans in January. That includes about 31 million middle-income Americans

who will be hit for the first time by the Alternative Minimum Tax (AMT), a tax that was created in 1969 to target a few hundred millionaires - without action, it will kick in on working people who make \$33,750 per year. Taxes on small businesses - our nation's growth engines - are set to increase, which will stall hiring and deliver more bad news to 23 million unemployed and underemployed Americans. Our corporate tax rate, now the world's highest at 35 percent, will likely drive business to friendlier climates. Without action, the landscape for Americans in 2013 is grim: the employed will pay more taxes. The unemployed will have a harder time finding a job. An economy cannot grow when burdened with tax hikes, over-regulation, massive debt and out-of-control spending. We need long-term solutions to our problems, not temporary fixes. Congress and the President must work together to enact comprehensive tax reform that offers American families and businesses the relief they need to get our economy growing again. If we act now, families could stop worrying about the future and how they will pay their bills. Businesses could move forward on projects, investment, hiring and expansion. We could revive the innovative, job-creating economy that made America great, and again offer the promise to all Americans that hard work will be rewarded and that merit will be the guarantor of success. Hutchison, a Republican, is the senior U.S. senator from Texas.

2013 Rice Leadership Development Program is now accepting applications

STUTT GART, AR—The Rice Foundation is accepting applications for the 2013 Leadership Development Program. Rice producers or industry-related professionals between the ages of 25 and 45 are eligible to apply for the program. The application deadline is October 6th. The Rice Leadership Development Program provides a comprehensive understanding of the rice industry, with an emphasis on personal development and communication skills. During a two-year period, class members attend four one-week sessions designed to strengthen leadership skills through studies of all aspects of the rice industry. The class is comprised of five rice producers and two industry-related professionals chosen by a committee of agribusiness leaders. The committee evaluates the applications of all candidates, reviews letters of recommendation and conducts personal interviews with the finalists. Interviews will be conducted at the USA Rice Outlook Conference in San Diego, CA, in December 2012. The program is sponsored by John Deere Company, RiceTec, Inc. and American Commodity Company through a grant to the Rice Foundation and is managed by the USA Rice Federation.

12th Armored Division Association 66th National Reunion to be held in Abilene, August 1-5, 2012

The 12th Armored Division, known as the "Hellcats" was one of the truly exceptional American fighting units of World War II. While they served only 5-1/2 months of combat duty, the men of the 12th participated in five separate campaigns across Western Europe. They served as the spearhead of General Patton's Rush to the Rhine, liberated Nazi Concentration Camps in Landsberg and were the first American soldiers to set foot in Hitler's "Eagles Nest" in Berchtesgarden. Local Student Named to Dean's List at HPU

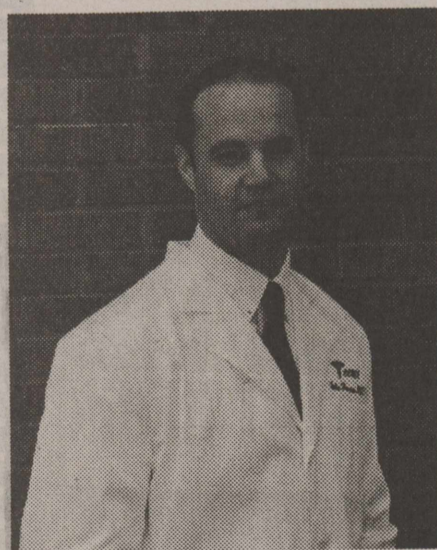
