Hunters Provide Over 600,000 Servings of Venison

This year, the Texas Hunters for the Hungry program pro- creased since we moved to our vided 153,082 pounds of venison to nearly 100 organizations that serve low income people across Texas. That is more than 600,000 servings of lean protein in the diets of those hungry, or at risk of hunger. The program, administered by the Texas Association of Community Action Agencies, Inc. (TACAA), has exceeded nine million servings of venison over the last two decades.

Hunters for the Hungry thanks the hunters and participating meat processors for helping alleviate hunger in their local communities. For most food pantries and the families they serve, meat items are hard to come by and relatively expensive. Because venison donations are distributed free of charge, it helps stretch both the food assistance organization's and the family's budgets by not having to buy meat. Dollars can be leveraged for other needed resources:

"Our client families often have to choose between basic food items and buying meds or paying for housing and utilities. Meat is a luxury - but the venison donated through your program has made a difference in providing protein and nutrients they would not have." - Hill Country Daily Bread Ministries, Boerne





Emergency Farm Loan Applications being accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by Drought beginning January 1, 2012 and continuing are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Anson, Texas, Richard G. Young said today.

Callahan, Coleman, Eastland, Jones, Shackelford and Stephens Counties are 6 of 252 counties in Texas recently named eligible for loans to cover part of production and physical losses resulting from the Drought beginning January 1, 2012 and continuing. Richard G. Young, said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 100% of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue the agricultural business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is currently 2.25 percent.


"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan", Richard G. Young, said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance program will have to consider proceeds from those programs in determining their loss. "Applications for loans under

this emergency designation will be accepted until March 12, 2013, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing, with possible delays into the new farming season", Richard G. Young said.


FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who meet U.S. citizenship requirements and to farming partnerships, corporations, or cooperatives in which U.S. citizenship requirements are met by individuals holding a majority interest.

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Nearly 1 in 5 People Have a Disability in the U.S., Census Bureau Reports

About 56.7 million people- August 2010. Disability statis- activity of daily living was cited 19 percent of the populationhad a disability in 2010, according to a broad definition of disability, with more than half of them reporting the disability was severe, according to a comprehensive report on this population released today by the U.S. Census Bureau.

The report, Americans with Disabilities: 2010, presents estimates of disability status and type and is the first such report with analysis since the Census Bureau published statistics in a similar report about the 2005 population of people with disabilities. According to the report, the total number of people with a disability increased by 2.2 million over the period, but the percentage remained statistically unchanged. Both the number and percentage with a severe disability rose, however. Likewise, the number and percentage needing assistance also both increased.

"This week, we observe the 22nd anniversary of the Americans With Disabilities Act, a milestone law that guarantees equal opportunity for people with disabilities," said Census Bureau demographer Matthew Brault. "On this important anniversary, this report presents a barometer of the well-being of this population in areas such as employment, income and poverty status."

The statistics come from the Survey of Income and Program Participation, which contains supplemental questions on whether respondents had difficulty performing a specific set of functional and participatory activities. For many activities, if a respondent reported difficulty, a follow-up question was asked to determine the severity of the limitation, hence, the distinction between a "severe" and "nonsevere" disability. The data were collected from May through

tics from this survey are used by by agencies, such as the Social noninstitutionalized adults. Security Administration, Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Seron Aging to assist with program planning and management.

The report shows that 41 percent of those age 21 to 64 with any disability were employed, compared with 79 percent of those with no disability. Along with the lower likelihood of having a job came the higher likelihood of experiencing persistent poverty; that is, continuous poverty over a 24-month period. Among people age 15 to 64 with severe disabilities, 10.8 percent experienced persistent poverty; the same was true for 4.9 percent of those with a nonsevere disability and 3.8 percent of those with no disability. DPS Launches Online Version of Texas Prescription Drug Monitoring Program

DPS officially launched PAT in June 2012, at which time the database became available to a select group of practitioners, pharmacists and law enforcement professionals. This week, DPS has extended program access to additional physicians and law enforcement, mid-level practitioners, medical board and nursing board investigators.

"Prescription drug abuse is a serious problem, and the new online prescription drug monitoring program will help the state of Texas combat this issue," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "It is essential that doctors and pharmacists have quick access to the information they need to identify potential prescription drug abusers and traffickers before they fraudulently receive the drugs. Law enforcement access to this information is also crucial to investigating those individuals or organizations engaged in the trafficking of prescription drugs. This new tool will allow a proactive approach to prevention, assist with criminal investigations, provide historical reporting and identify trends."

DPS launched a pilot version of the PAT in August 2011, which has since proven successful. Each registered user must provide licensing information to ensure data is released quired by statute, the PAT database includes Schedule II months only, and pharmacists must report prescription data within seven days of the prescription being filled.

Texas has brought this critical database online so our healthcare professionals and investigators can quickly and easily identify potential prescription drug abuse, patients who are doctor shopping, forging prescriptions and physicians who are illicitly prescribing drugs."

In 1982 the Texas Legislature created the original prescription drug monitoring program, which is now called the Texas Prescription Program, as an efficient, cost effective tool for investigating and preventing drug diversion. Since then authorized users have had access to this information through a manual paper process

PAT, the new online version of the database, represents a substantial upgrade by allowing instant, 24/7 access to authorized users. In addition to this week's expansion of access to PAT, additional users will continue to be phased in over the next two months. Pharmacists and pharmacy board investigators are on track to acquire access to the system in mid-August, and podiatrists, dentists, veterinarians; board investigators for each of those three professions; and outof-state practitioners are scheduled to obtain access near the end of August.

Texas law restricts access to prescription data to practitioners and pharmacists who are inquiring about their patients, and to various regulatory and law enforcement personnel cononly to authorized users. 


