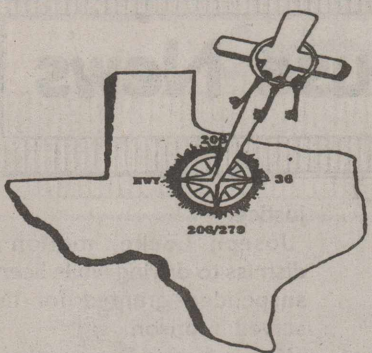

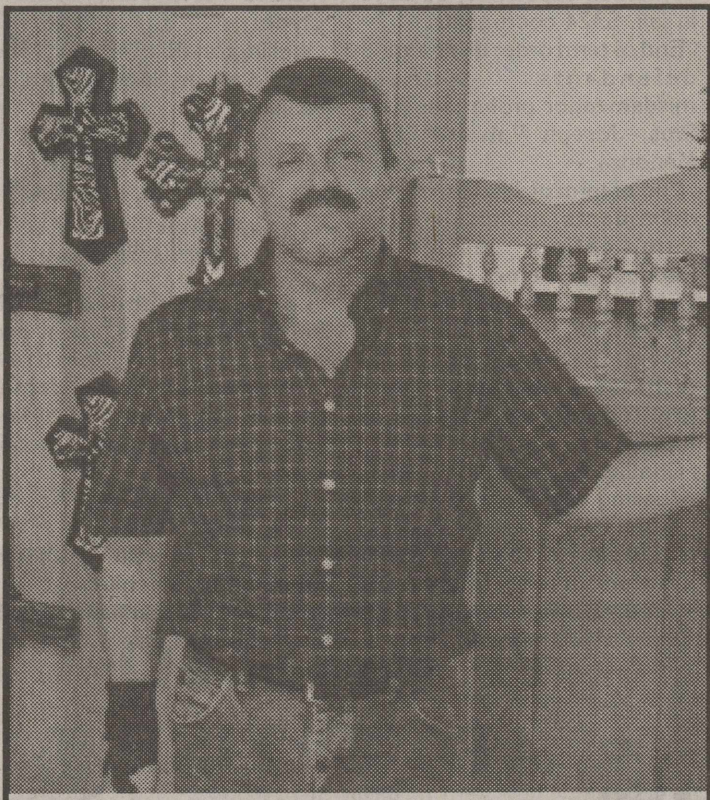

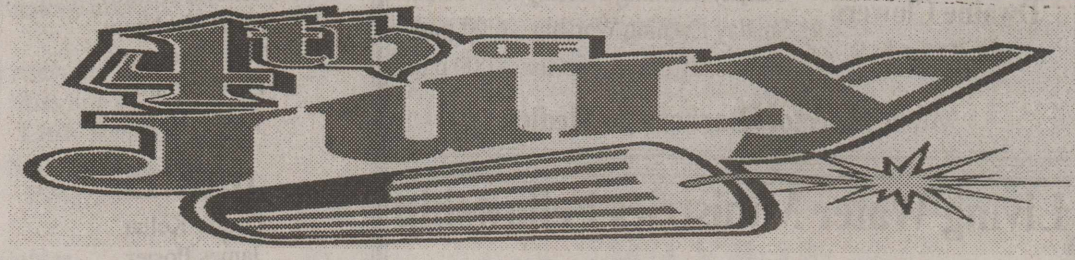

Memorial Service Held July 3rd for Glenn Winfrey

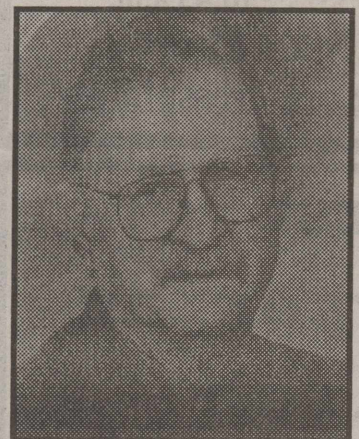
Glenn Edward Winfrey, 78, passed away Sunday, June 30, 2013, in his home with family by his side.

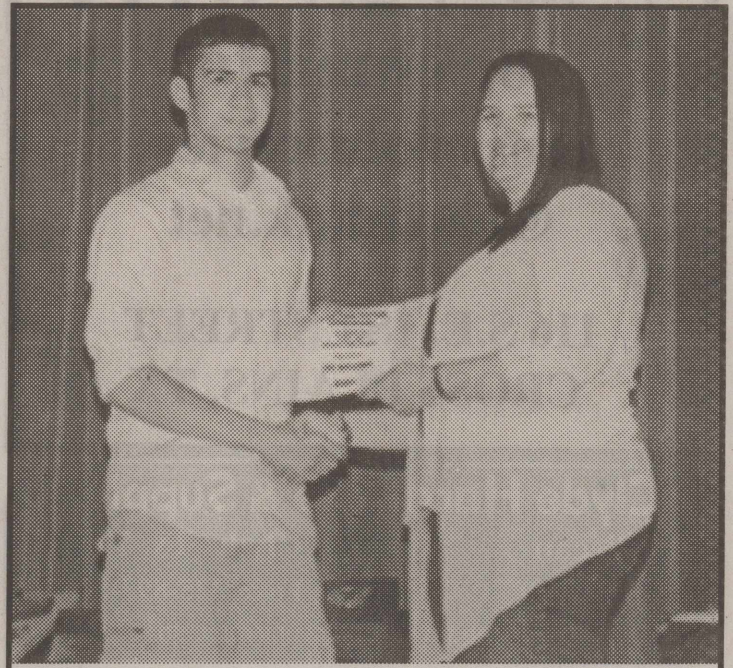

Gary Montgomery, a motivational communicator and storyteller from Louisville, Kentucky presented sessions on "Public Speaking" and Sandra Grant, a

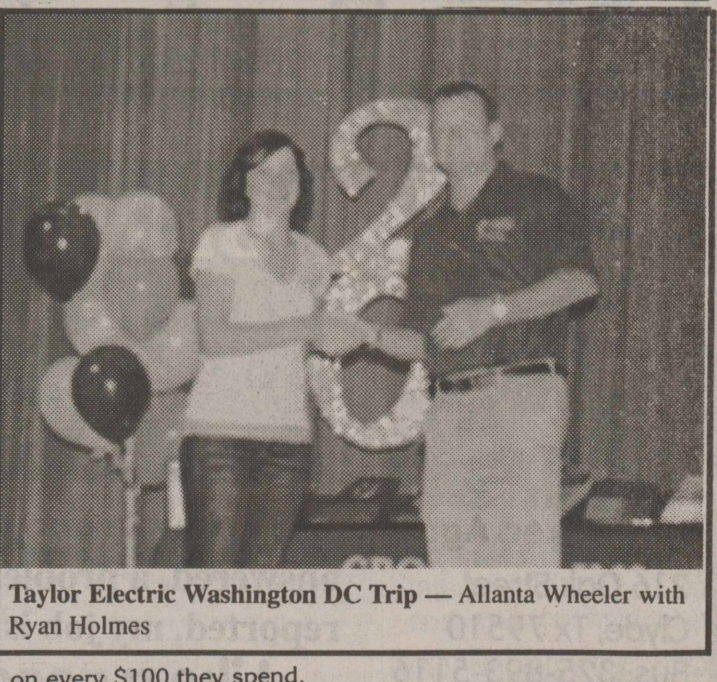

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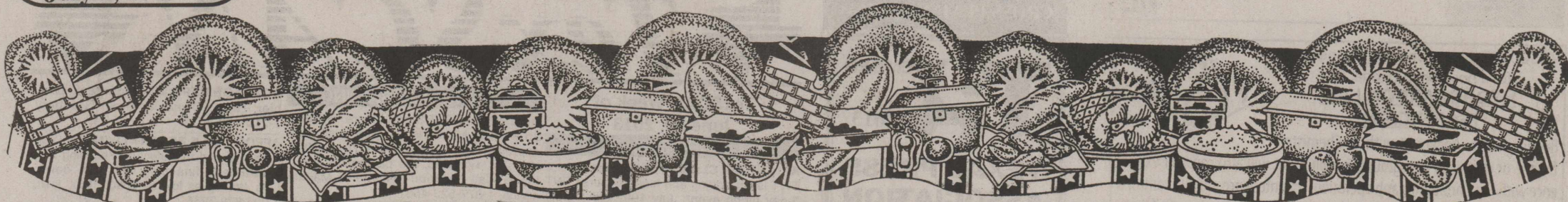
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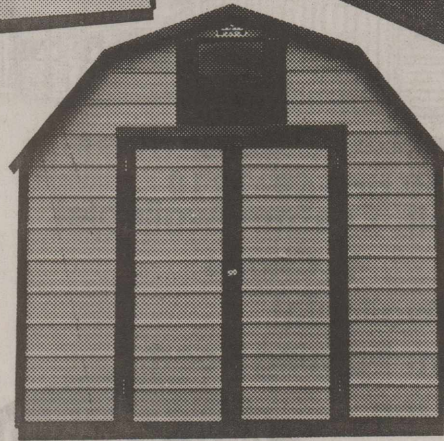
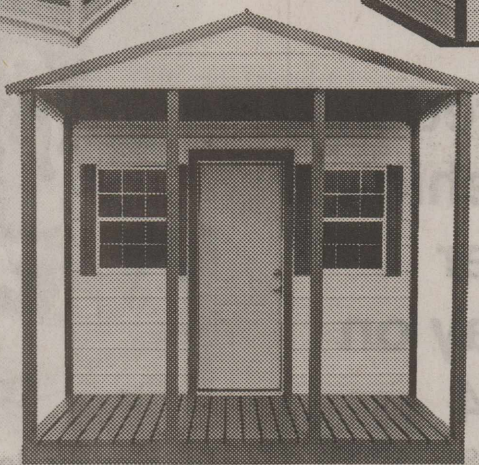
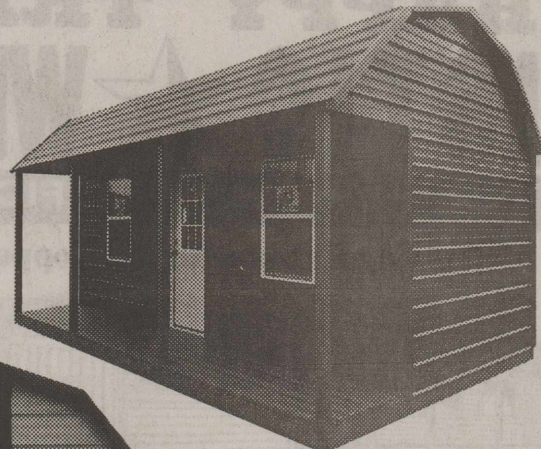
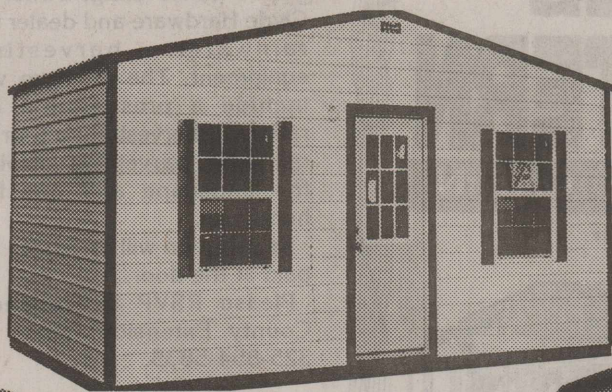
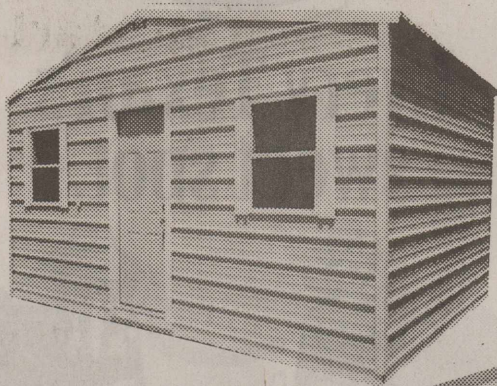
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93rd Reunion of Pioneer School Ex-Students

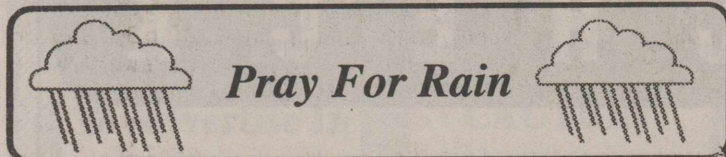

Trooper Smith said alcohol and unsafe speed were the cause of the accident.

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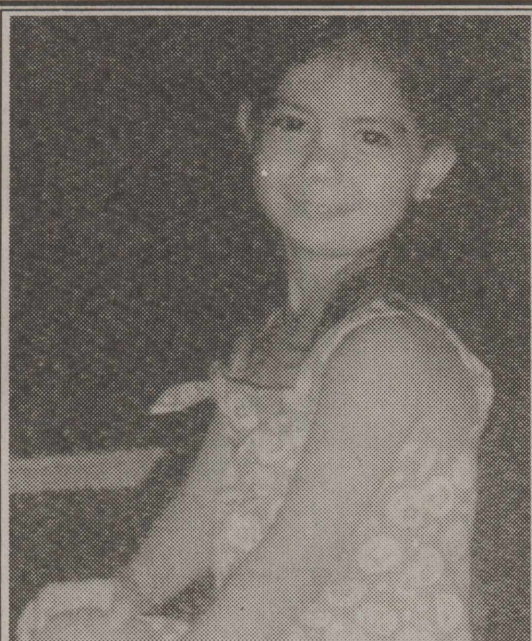

Those bands scheduled to perform on Saturday, July 6th include Transporters from 12:00 noon until 2:00 p.m. Drew Rollins & 20 West will perform from 2:00 p.m. until 4:00 p.m. Kirk House will perform from 5:00 p.m. until 7:00 p.m. Dave Hobbs will perform from 7:00 p.m. until 9:00 p.m. and the Saturday night performance will conclude with the popular Clyde performer Bo McDowell from 9:00 p.m. until 11:30 p.m.

Officials for the Fourth of July Festival at Clyde Lake reported there will again be two fireworks displays at dark on both Friday and Saturday night.

Davis said Jason Gray and Hughie Gray with Gray Electric will again provide funding for a fireworks display on Friday night, July 5th.

Davis said this year's fireworks displays will take place at dark on Friday, July 5th and Saturday, July 6th, on the south end of Clyde Lake. He said the fireworks displays will begin

around 10:00 p.m.

Davis said Jason, and his father, Hughie, will ignite both fireworks displays at Clyde Lake. Davis said both Jason and Hughie are very experienced in igniting fireworks, having set off fireworks at Lake Brownwood.

Davis said the Grays, which have set-off the fireworks at Clyde Lake the past two years, are a huge part of this year's festival again. "With them coming in (Hughie and Jason Gray), it makes a big difference," Davis said of the Festival volunteers.

Davis also recognized the Men of Clyde organization for all their help with putting on this year's Festival. He said the Men of Clyde members will again be taking donations at the entrance gate of Clyde Lake at this year's Festival both Friday and Saturday night.

The festival coordinator said a number of area businesses will again purchase fireworks for a second showing on Saturday, July 6th at dark at Clyde Lake. Those assisting with the second fireworks show include: City of Clyde, Clyde Economic Development Corporation, Blake Fulewider Dodge/Chrysler/Jeep, Edward Jones, First Bank Texas, Gray Electric, Metal Mart, and Tytan Heating & Cooling.

Davis also recognized other contributions from: Big Country Trophies, Clyde Auto Supply, Clyde Chamber of Commerce, Citizens EMS, Clyde Farm & Ranch Supply, Clyde Journal, Clyde Volunteer Fire Department, First Financial Bank, Hawk Portable Buildings, Happy Trails, Key City Septic & Plumbing, Lawrence Brothers IGA and Shady Oaks Country Club.

Shady Oaks Golf Course is also providing four golf carts to the festival organizers.

"We still need more cookoff teams," Davis said after another

cookoff event the weekend before Clyde's festival, has reduced the number of cookoff teams. Davis said right now, there are 20 and 25 cookoff teams which have registered for the Festival cookoff. He said cookoff teams can register for the Festival cookoff until 5:00 p.m. on Friday, July 5th the day of the festival's start.

The festival coordinator said some of the carnival rides scheduled to appear both Friday and Saturday include a bucking mechanical bull, and bungee cord jump area for older children. Davis said an air castle, with a slide, will be inflated at the carnival area. Pony rides will be offered by Crossroad Ranch during the fourth of July celebration. The Clyde Chamber of Commerce will be sponsoring a bounce house at the festival both days.

Davis said the Festival has several food booths slated to sell their food products, including funnel cakes, snow cones hot dogs, nachos, hamburgers, sausage, BBQ sandwiches, french fries, and fried foods at many booths. Davis said the Ramos family has again signed up to sell hamburgers and hot dogs at the event this year. He also said Pat Taylor with Little Pit restaurant at Clyde, has signed up to sell bar-b-que sandwiches at this year's Festival.

Another food booth will be provided by Cowboy Up with God's Word. The church have a nacho food booth, with all proceeds from the food booth being used to build the new church in Clyde.

Davis said of the vendors who have signed up to sell their wares include a knife seller from Odessa. Other vendors include neon items, Scentsy candles, caps, and a couple of jewelry products. Davis said that Sam's Club in Abilene has also signed up to sell memberships to the

wholesale club at this year's Festival. Also the Friends of the NRA will have a booth selling tickets for this year's Friends of the NRA banquet on September 7th.

The Project Coordinator said the carnival will begin at 5:00 p.m. on Friday, July 5th and will take place all day on Saturday, July 6th. Davis said the miniature train that appeared at last year's festival, will again appear at this year's festival.

The festival coordinator said the horseshoe pitching tournament will begin at 12:00 noon on Saturday, July 6th and the washer pitching tournament is scheduled to begin at 1:30 p.m. on Saturday.

Davis said just like last year, cookoff judging will begin at 11:00 a.m. on Saturday, and the awards will be announced under the lake pavilion at 4:00 p.m. on Saturday evening.

Davis said there will also be horseshoe and washer pitching tournaments on Saturday, July 6th.

Davis said KBCY 99.7 is planning a live remote from Clyde Lake on Saturday, July 6th from 11:00 a.m. until 12:00 noon.

The Clyde Convenience Center will not be open this Thursday, July 4th and will also close on Saturday, July 6th. The Convenience Center will open the following week during normal business hours, including Saturday, July 13th.

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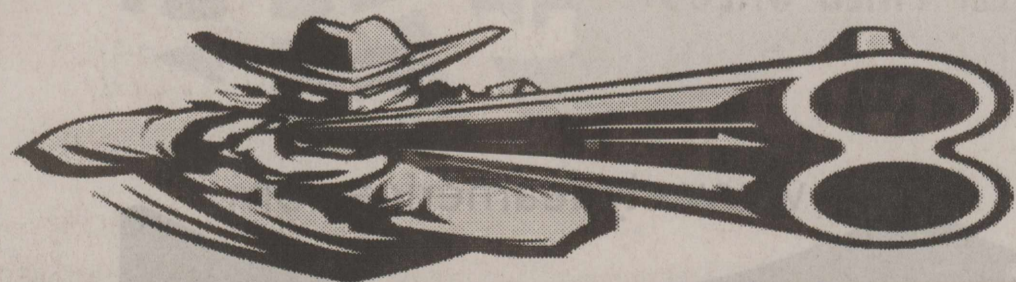

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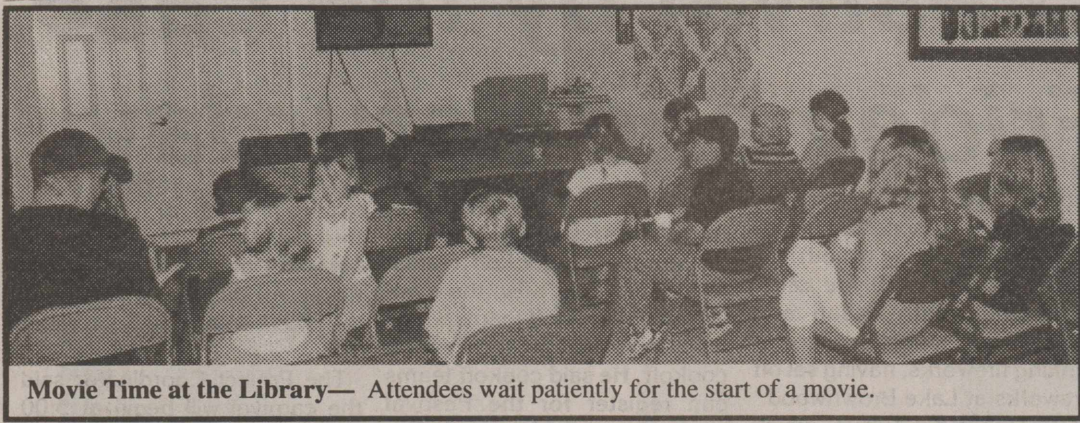


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Summer Reading Program Continues to provide Education and Entertainment

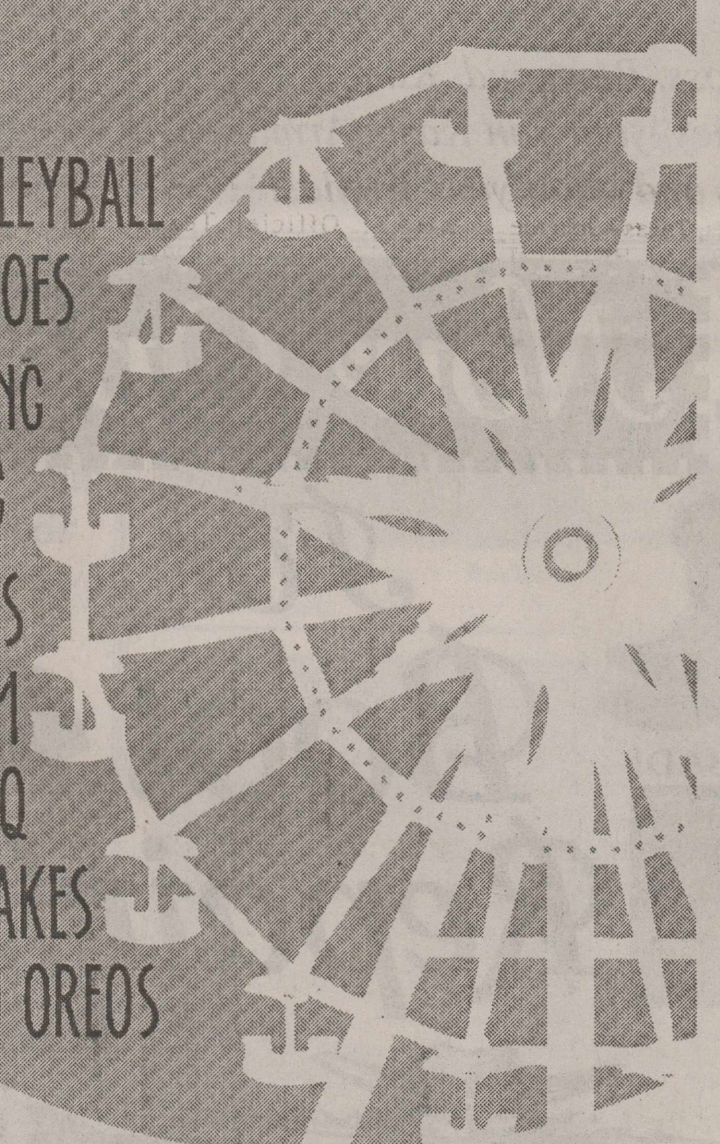

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United State Declaration of Independence

By the time the Declaration of Independence was adopted in July 1776, the thirteen colonies had been at war with the British for more than a year. Relations between the colonies and the mother country had been deteriorating since the war of 1773.

The war had plunged the British Government into deep debt, and so Parliament enacted a series of measures to increase tax revenues from the colonist. Parliament believed that these acts, such as the Stamp Act of 1765 and the Townshen Act of 1767, was a legitimate means of having the colonies pay their fair share of the cost to keep the colonies in the British Empire.

The Declaration of Independence is a statement adopted by the Continental Congress on July the 4, 1776, which announced that the thirteen American colonies, at that time was with Great Britain, regarded themselves as independent states, and no longer of the British Empire. Instead they now formed a new nation—The United States of America. John Adams was leader in the pushing for independence, which was unanimously approved on July 2. A committee had already drafted the formal declaration, to be read when congress voted on independence.

Adams persuaded the committee to select Thomas Jefferson to compose the original draft of documents, which congress would edit to produce the final version. The Declaration was ultimately a formal explanation that Congress had voted on July the 2 to declare independence from Great Britain, more than a year after the outbreak of the American

Revolutionary War. The nation's birthday was celebrated on July 4, instead of the 2nd as Adams wanted.

After ratifying the text on July 4, Congress issued the Declaration of Independence in several forms. It was initially published as the printed Dunlap broadside that was widely distributed and read to the public.

The most famous version of the Declaration, a single copy that is popular regarded as the Declaration of Independence, is displayed at the Nation's Archives in Washington, DC. Although the wording of the Declaration was approved on July the 4th, the date of its signing was August 2. The original July 4th United States Declaration of Independence manuscript was lost while all others have been derived from the original.

The source and interpretation of the Declaration has been the subject of much scholarly inquiry. The declaration justified the independence of the United States by listing colonial grievances against King George III, and by asserting certain natural and legal rights, including a right of revolution. Having served its original purpose in announcing the text of the Declaration was initially ignored after the American Revolution. Since then, it has come to be considered a major statement of human rights, particularly its second sentence.

"We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by our creator with certain unalienable rights that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness."

This has been known as one of the best sentences in the English language. Containing, "the most potent and consequential words in the American history." The message came to represent a moral standard to which the United States should strive. This was notably promoted by Abraham Lincoln, who considered the Declaration to be the foundation of his political philosophy, and agreed that the Declaration is a statement of principles through which the United States Constitution should be interpreted.

It has inspired work for the rights of marginalized people throughout the world. It provided inspiration to numerous declarations of independence around the world.

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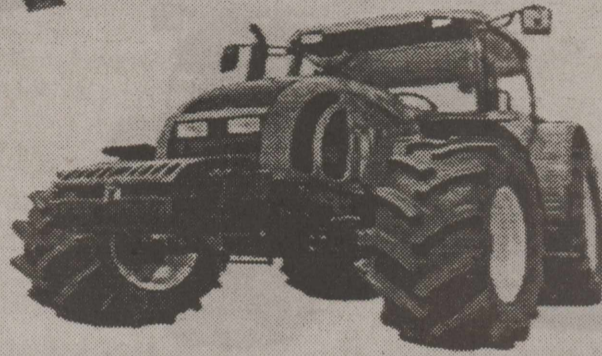
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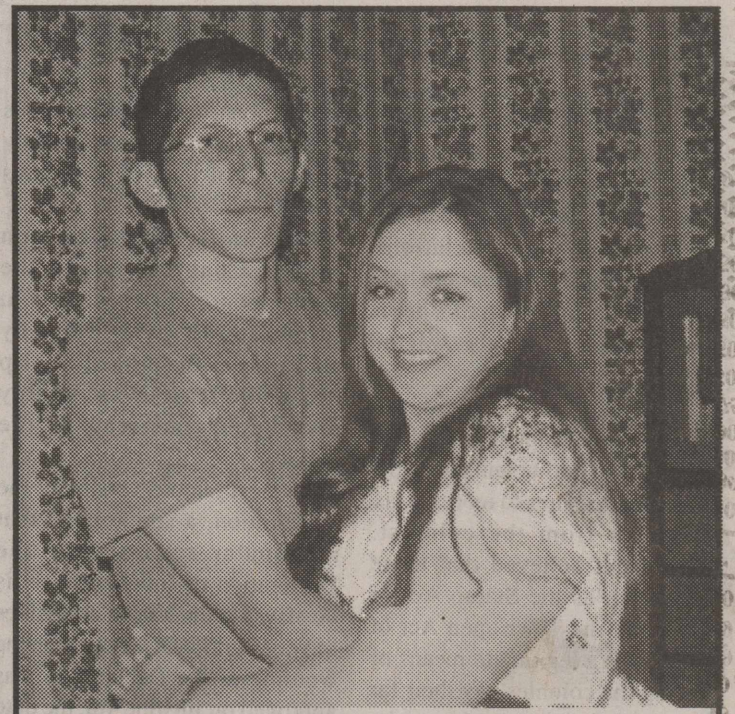

DPS boosts DWI Patrols for July 4th Holiday

AUSTIN - The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) will increase DWI patrols for a 10-day period that includes the July 4th holiday. From June 28th - July 7th, DPS troopers will focus DWI patrols in high-risk locations at times when alcohol-related crashes are most frequent.

"The Fourth of July is a time of celebration in our country, and we encourage Texans to enjoy and mark this holiday responsibly," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "Impaired driving can quickly turn a time of celebration into a tragedy, so Texans should designate a sober driver or secure another form of transportation if they plan to drink alcohol. Our troopers will also be doing their part during the holiday by increasing their

patrols to keep our roadways safe."

The increased patrols that target impaired driving are funded through a grant from the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT). During the 2012 July 4th enforcement effort, DPS troopers made 1,294 DWI arrests, and 361 of those arrests were the direct result of the increased patrols. DPS enforcement also resulted in nearly 13,700 speeding citations, more than 2,200 seat belt/child safety seat citations, 750 fugitive arrests and 518 felony arrests during this period.

According to TxDOT, Independence Day traditionally ranks among the deadliest holiday periods on Texas highways as a result of alcohol-related crashes.
