

I-20 drug bust nets \$18,000 in methamphetamines


A drug bust on Interstate 20 Sunday afternoon, August 11th, resulted in the seizure of methamphetamines valued at

Taylor County Department of Public Safety Trooper Justin Tabor stopped a 2011 Chevrolet travelling westbound for speeding at the 294 mile marker of Interstate 20 around 1:00 p.m. Sunday driven by a 31-year-old female from the Metroplex. She was the only occupant in the vehicle. The woman said she was on her way to Snyder. Upon obtaining a consent to search the vehicle, Trooper Tabor found 188 grams of methamphetamines in the vehicle, which was being rented.

When the methamphetamines was discovered, the woman began running on foot across Interstate 20 and down the center median. Trooper Tabor quickly tackled the suspect and arrested the individual. While on the way to Callahan County Jail to be booked, the African-American woman also confessed to having marijuana hidden between

Trooper Tabor, a 2000 graduate of Clyde High School, was a member of the CHS cross country and track teams during his high school career.

Trooper Tabor said the street value of the methamphetamines is valued at about \$100 a gram, or \$18,000. Also, another 1.5 ounces of marijuana was seized The 31-year-old woman was marijuana.




family first. Family was Linda's true love and she lived her life the way she wanted to, enjoying her family.

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Big Country Beef Conference is Thursday, August 22nd in Abilene

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service's Big Country Beef Conference has been set for Aug. 22nd in Abilene. This year's event will focus on the current state of the industry, stocker/yearling management and heifer development.

The conference is the largest and most comprehensive educational beef program in the Big Country. We typically draw speakers and participants from across Texas.

Session 1 of the program will begin with a state of the beef Crumley. Heath is from Robinson, Texas and is a sales consultant with Tyson Foods.



Jeff Geider will then discuss cattle market analysis. Jeff is a marketing professor and director of industry outlook given by Heath the TCU Ranch Management Program in Fort Worth, Texas. Session 2 will begin with Kent Mills discussing nutrition management for grazing small grains. Kent is a range nutritionist with Hi-Pro Feeds with responsibilities over range cattle nutrition and mineral supplement development. Stan Bevers, Extension economist from Vernon, will fol-

low with a discussion on the deciding whether to graze-out or go to harvest with our winter wheat crop. We will then have a distance education session with Dr. Larry Redmon. Dr. Redmon, Professor & State Forage Specialist from College Station will conclude session 2 with a look at Pasture Management: During and After Drought.




