He has been on the stringing teams at the prestigious Wimbleton tournament in London, the China Open in Beijing, the NASDAQ 100 Open in Key Biscayne FL twice, the Indianapolis Tennis Championship in IN once and several challenger tournaments in Dallas as well as numerous tournaments at the Lakes Tennis Academy and various country clubs.

Those who follow professional tennis will recognize some of the big names that Stephenson has worked for--Bob and Mike Bryan, John McEnroe, Rafael Nadal, Maria Sharapova, James Blake, Carlos Moya, Thomas Johannson and Mardy Fish. One of the players on the Israel team in the Davis Cup World Group has a brother in Dallas, who buys his racquets from Randy and then ships them to wherever the Davis Cup is being played.

One early challenge for Randy was becoming a certified Master Racquet Technician in 1996. As tough as that test was, he soon found himself in fairly elite company of professional stringers. Currently there are only 350 or so MRTs in the world and these are the folks who are selected to the stringing teams for major tournaments like the 4 Grand Slams that are played in Australia, England, France and the U.S.

One in Four Texas Households with Children **Report Inability to Afford Enough Food** Data Show Widespread Struggle in Austin, Houston, San Antonio, Dallas/Fort Worth

Austin - Texas households with children suffered extraordinarily high rates of food hardship during the recession, according to a new national report released today. In five years of telephone surveys conducted through 2012, over one in four (27.4%) of these households said they couldn't consistently afford enough food.

Despite this high level of food hardship, Congress is preparing to debate a bill that would cut \$39 Billion from funding for SNAP (aka food stamps), which aids many of these families and is the backbone of our national response to hunger.

"Given the struggles that continue to persist in Texas, it is outrageous that Congress is even debating cuts to nutrition programs like SNAP," said Celia Cole, CEO of the Texas Food Bank Network. "Our elected leaders should act to help, not hurt struggling families, and the first step is to pass a Farm Bill with no cuts to SNAP.

with Gallup-Healthways Polling, is consistent with USDA data released earlier this month. The earlier federal data showed that 18.4% of Texas households were food insecure during the years 2010 to 2012. New data also released yesterday by the U.S. Census Bureau showed that the national poverty rate has remained at elevated rates since the recession began.

"All these data tell the same story - hunger and poverty rates spiked at the beginning of the recession and have stayed high ever since," said Cole. "Despite modest gains in the economy, people at the low end of the economic ladder are still struggling to afford basic needs like food. Cutting SNAP now would hurt these families and undermine our economic recovery."

Texas Unemployment Rate Falls to 6.4 Percent in August 274, 700 Jobs Added **Over The Year**

AUSTIN - The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate in Texas fell to 6.4 percent in August, down from 6.5 percent in July, and from 6.8 percent a year ago. Texas' unemployment rate remained below the national unemployment rate of 7.3 percent. Between August 2012 and August 2013, Texas has added 274,700 jobs.

An upward revision of July's total nonfarm employment figures showed 36,800 jobs added. Total nonfarm employment in August decreased slightly by a net total of 6,400 jobs. Texas has added 26,600 jobs over the last three months.

"Every major industry in Texas showed positive annual job growth and Texas employers added 274,700 jobs over the year," said Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) Chairman Andres Alcantar. "We encourage Texans to visit their local Workforce Solutions office to access the many job search tools available to them free of charge."

Employers in Mining and Logging expanded their payrolls in August, adding 1,900 jobs to the industry, which has the highest annual growth rate among the major industries in Texas at 5.5 percent.

"A number of industries are showing strength in Texas,

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


