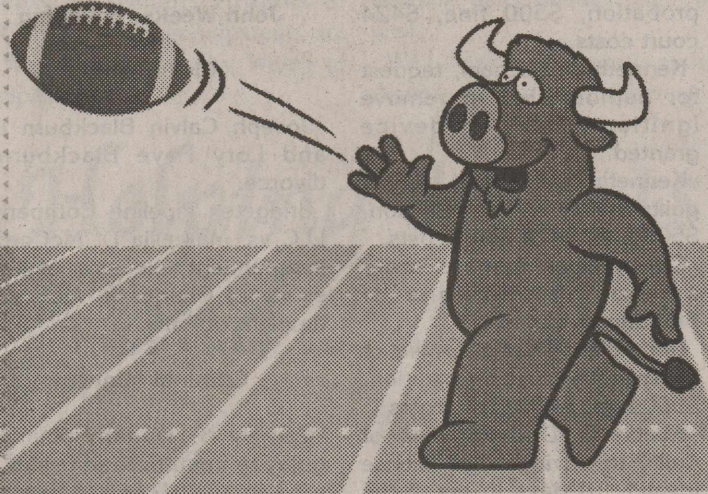

Callahan County reminds voters photo ID is required

Baird, TX. — Callahan County Voter Registrar Tammy Walker and County Clerk Donna Bell remind voters that photo identification will now be required for voting in person.

"In Callahan County we are working to make sure our voters understand the ID requirements and have all the information they need to cast their ballots," said Walker.

A voter will be required to show one of the following forms of photo identification at the polling location before the voter will be permitted to cast a vote:

- Texas driver license issued by the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS)
- Texas Election Identification Certificate issued by DPS
- Texas personal identification card issued by DPS
- Texas concealed handgun license issued by DPS
- United States military identification card containing the person's photograph
- United States citizenship certificate containing the person's photograph
- United States passport

With the exception of the U.S. citizenship certificate, the identification must be current or have expired no more than 60 days

before being presented at the polling place.

This photo ID requirement is for voters casting a ballot in person, not by mail. Voters age 65 and older may vote by mail.

Election officials are encouraging voters to update their voter registrations to reflect the names on their IDs. Voters may use IDs that do not exactly match the name on their IDs if the names are substantially similar but will have to sign an affidavit stating they are the same person. Voters may look up their registration online at votetexas.gov and if their name is not an exact match they can update their voter registration online at votetexas.gov.

"By preparing now, voters can help make sure voting goes smoothly when it comes time for the election," said Bell.

To check and update their registrations, voters can visit (direct to VoteTexas.gov) or call (325) 854-5820.

The Constitutional Amendment Election on Tuesday, November 5, 2013 is fast approaching. The last day to register to vote is October 7, 2013. Applications must be returned to the Tax Office/Voter Registrar's Office located at 100 West 4th Street, Suite #101, first floor in the Callahan County Courthouse, in Baird or be postmarked no later than October 7, 2013.

The pass and catch combination of quarterback, Tristen Stephenson, and receiver, Colton McWilliams was too much for the Gorman Panthers Friday night as the Buffaloes beat the Panthers 47-13 in a huge district road game. Stephenson hit his target, McWilliams, 3 times for touchdown passes of 35, 60, and 35, none bigger than the 60 yard strike with 25 seconds to play in the first half to give the Buffaloes a 26-13 lead going into the locker room.

Running back, Rylan Laminack started things off for the Buffaloes as he took a pitch and rushed in from 75 yards out on the second play of the game. Josh Branch's PAT was no good to give the Buffaloes a 6-0 lead at the 8:49 mark.

After each team exchanged punts, the Buffaloes offense would strike again, when Stephenson would find McWilliams behind the Gorman secondary for a 35 yard touchdown pass and catch. Branch's PAT was true to give the Buffaloes a 13-0 lead. The ensuring Panther drive would result in a touchdown. After a big sack by Josh Branch, the Panthers were forced to punt. Gorman lined up in punt formation, but a direct snap to up back, Yovani Polacios and a pass to uncovered receiver, Jose Maldonado, lead to a 75 yard touchdown. Gorman's PAT was no good to make it 13-6.

The second quarter would lead to some excitement, as the teams combined for 3 touchdowns in the

quarter, all 3 coming in the last 2 minutes. On a 9 play drive, Rylan Laminack would get the edge and scamper 25 yards for a Buffalo touchdown, the PAT by Branch was no good with 1:23 to play in the half. Gorman would respond, this time on a 3 play drive. Polacios would sneak in from 2 yards out. The kick was true to bring the tally to Cross Plains 19, Gorman 13, with 49 seconds in the half. With 28 seconds in the half, after a Korbin McLean return to the 36 yard line, Stephenson would fake a hand off and hit McWilliams on a 60 yard strike, for McWilliams 2nd touchdown reception of the game with seven seconds to play. Branch's PAT was true to make it 36-13 going into half time.

Defense adjustments at half time would stop the Gorman offense and shut them out in the second half. The scoring by the Buffaloes would continue as Stevens would hit McWilliams on his third try, from 35 yards out, McWilliams catch and run would put him in the end zone to give the Buffaloes a 23-13 lead after Branch's kick was good. With 9:45 to play in the fourth quarter, Stephenson would find a new receiver to throw to as he hit his tight end, Josh Branch for a 62 yard touchdown. Branch's kick was good to bring the score to 40-13. The Buffaloes had drives 3 consecutive scoring drives, the last drive was a 5 play, 4 minute drive that ended with fullback, Justin Willis, finding pay dirt from 27 yards out. Branch's kick was good again, as the Buffaloes

would take a 47-13 lead with 2:42 to play, and that would be the final. The Buffaloes defense held the Panthers to 239 total yards of offense. Josh Branch had a big night on defense from his defensive end position tallying, 6 solo tackles, 1 assist, 4 tackles for a loss, 4 sacks, and six quarterback hurries, he also caused one fumble. McWilliams, Willis, and Kiefer Steinle, played well with 9, 6, and 8 tackles respectively. Outside linebacker Rylan Laminack had two big hits on the evening. The Buffaloes offense finished with 478 total yards of offense. Stephenson finished the night 5 of 6 for 205 yards and 4 passing touchdowns.

The Buffaloes' win puts them at 1-0 in district play, setting the stage for a big game this Friday, vs 1-0 Roscoe. The Buffaloes will host the Plowboys spread attack at Buffalo Stadium. Kickoff is slated for 7:30 p.m.

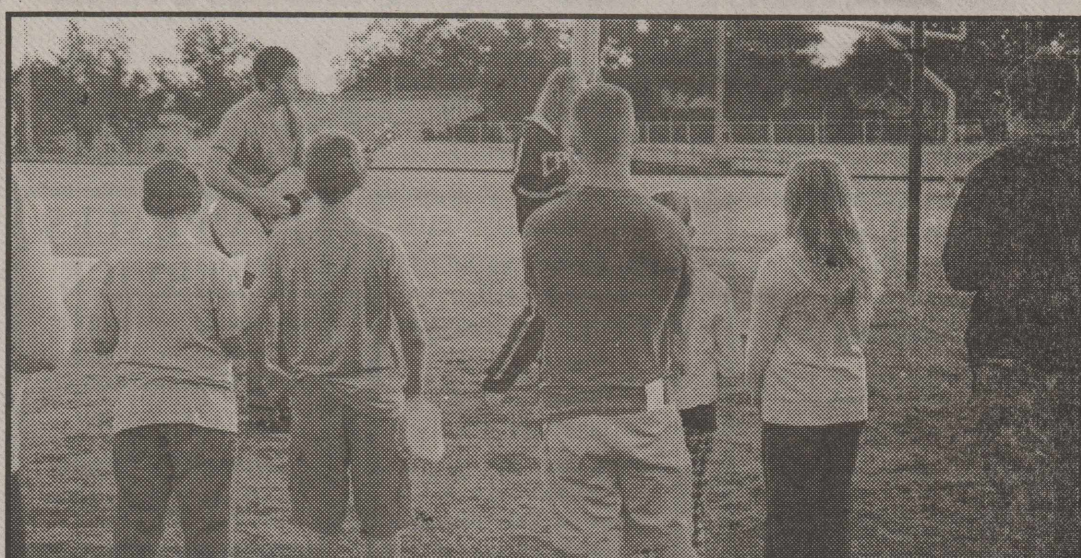

Finding A Home for Renewable Energy and Transmission

Lyons, Nebraska — A report released this week lays out clear steps that utilities must take in order to involve America's farmers, ranchers and rural landowners in the critical decisions of how and where to build new energy transmission infrastructure.

"A clean and efficient power system requires wires to transmit and distribute electricity where it is most needed," said Johnathan Hladik, Center for Rural Affairs Energy Policy Analyst and co-author of the report. "Today's aging grid struggles to achieve this as consumers are increasingly demanding efficiency and clean energy."

Hladik was joined by Carl Zichella of the Natural Resources Defense Council in authoring *Siting: Finding A Home for Renewable Energy and Transmission*, one of eight white papers making up *America's Power Plan*, a report curated by the Energy Foundation in partnership with Energy Innovation.

Hladik and Zichella's paper focuses on the institutional innovations that can help modernize America's power grid, by making changes to the way we plan for, site and permit clean power

Report examines cooperation between rural landowners, affected rural communities and transmission developers

generation and transmission infrastructure.

According to Hladik, policymakers have many options to accelerate siting for new generation and transmission needs. This includes changes to the way landowners are compensated for the value of their land. Hladik and Zichella's paper goes on to focus on reforms needed to locate, coordinate and expedite any new generation or transmission that the grid system requires.

In short, the report calls for policymakers to:

- Optimize existing grid infrastructure,
- Fully use available planning processes,
- Employ "Smart from the Start" criteria,
- Improve interagency, federal-state and interstate coordination,
- Work with landowners to develop new options for private lands, including innovative compensation measures,
- Refine the process to support siting offshore wind developments.

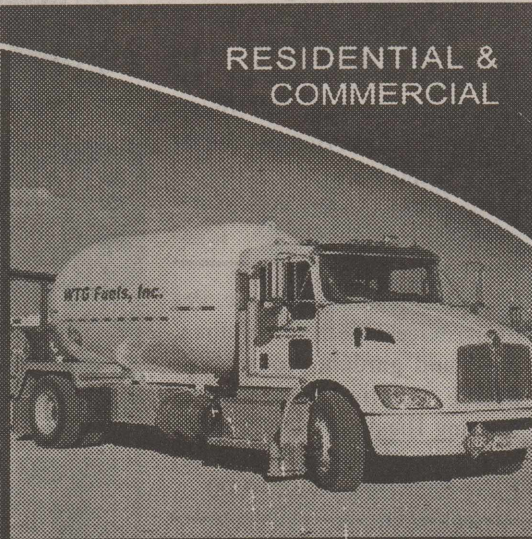
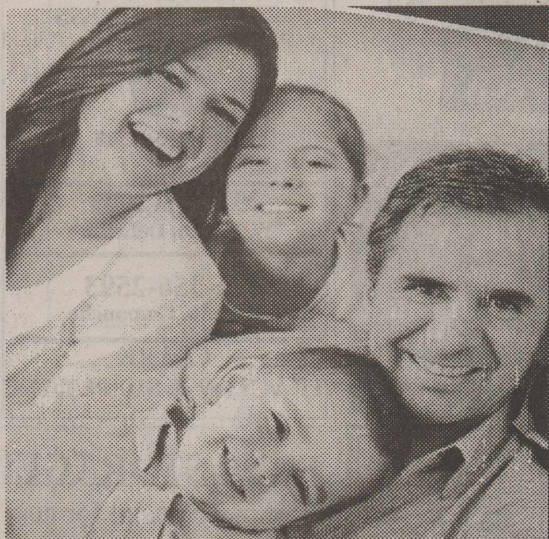
"Today's siting process can be

a particular challenge for transmission line projects that cross many different jurisdictions," explained Hladik. "But the changes we've described here can help accelerate smart siting."

Hladik and Zichella were among over 150 leading energy analysts from academia, industry and the non-profit sector that were tapped for their analysis in the commissioning of *America's Power Plan*, the first national effort to take a comprehensive look at the challenges faced by the electric power system and outline potential policy and market solutions. The report is intended to tackle the tough questions about America's energy future and serve as a toolkit for state and local decision makers as they seek to address these challenges.

The objectives of this organization are to assist landowners and tenants in eradicating the feral hogs throughout the county.

Over the past 3 years we have participated in the USDA Services Program and the Texas Department of Agriculture Grant Program. During this time we have eradicated over 2,725 feral hogs and 679 coyotes. The Association has received a total of \$17,500 in TDA Grant Funds that have been used to pay a large portion of the aerial services. The Board of Directors

would like to see this program continued as we have received feedback from landowners and hunters that the turkey and quail seem to be making a comeback during the past year. We feel that part of this is due to the success in removing at least a number of the feral hog population in the county.

The agriculture department estimates that hogs cause about \$450 million in damage yearly. They are predators of lambs, kids and calves as well as nesting birds such as turkey and quail. They also destroy crops and wildlife habitats rooting for bugs and seeds for food and wallowing during the hotter months. "Feral Hogs commonly destroy urban yards, parks and golf courses, as well as rangeland, pastures, crops, fencing, wildlife feeders and other property," according to the agriculture department. The hogs also spread E. coli and other diseases through streams, ponds and watersheds.

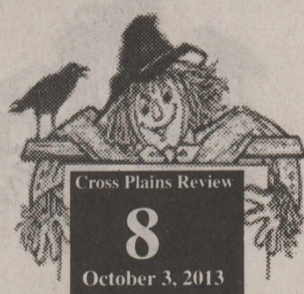

TAHC Adopts Rules Relating to Animal Disease Traceability and Brucellosis

AUSTIN - The Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC) adopted rules during the September 10th, Commission meeting. The following rules will go into effect on Monday, October 7, 2013.

Chapter 50, Animal Disease Traceability: The purpose of the new rule is to establish standards for facilities which must be approved by the TAHC to identify livestock as part of the federal disease traceability program. The rule specifically establishes the requirements for approved tagging sites. All facilities such as livestock markets receiving certain classes of livestock without official identification must be designated as approved tagging sites or be affiliated with one. Feed yards and slaughter plants receiving adult cattle must also be designated as approved tagging sites if the cattle are not harvested within three days of arrival at the establishment. TAHC and USDA-VS personnel will be meeting with proprietors in the coming weeks to further explain the requirements.

Chapter 35, Brucellosis, Cattle from the Brucellosis Designated Surveillance Areas of Idaho, Montana, and Wyoming: The Commission added post entry test requirements for sexually intact cattle entering Texas from the Brucellosis Designated Surveillance Area (DSA) within the states of Idaho, Montana and Wyoming, because Brucellosis is prevalent in bison and elk in those areas. All sexually intact cattle entering Texas that reside in the DSA must obtain an entry permit and a post entry test 60-120 days after entry, or 30 days after first calving for heifers.

TAHC personnel will perform the testing at no charge to producers. Breeding cattle that previously resided in the DSA must meet the same entry requirements as those moving directly from the DSA, unless the cattle tested negative at least 60 days after leaving the DSA or 30 days

after first calving for heifers.

Breeding bulls and post parturient female cattle entering Texas from these states are exempt from the post entry test requirement if the accredited veterinarian issuing the certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI) verifies and includes a statement on the CVI that the cattle never resided in the DSA or have been tested at least 60 days after leaving the DSA. Heifers are exempt from the post entry test requirement if the accredited veterinarian verifies and states on the CVI that the heifer never resided in the DSA.

"The DSA rule is necessary because Texas fought and ultimately won the long and difficult battle against this disease to gain Brucellosis "Free" status. Texas must remain vigilant in monitoring for new incursions of Brucellosis and protecting our state's animal agriculture industry from possible threats," Dr. Dee Ellis, Texas' State Veterinarian, said.

"I would also like to clarify that animals from the DSA will not be placed under a rigid quarantine upon arrival to Texas. The rule allows the TAHC to work with Texas producers on an individual basis to accommodate unique management practices," Dr. Ellis said. "This includes practices that may require cattle to be moved prior to testing or testing at timeframes outside those specified."

The TAHC is committed to working with producers from Texas, Idaho, Montana and Wyoming to consider other factors that may warrant future modifications to the post entry test requirement.

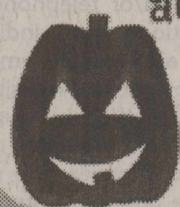

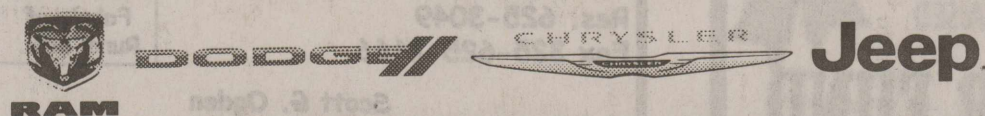
FFA organization and with career-focused experiential program.

A DPS report said Ramos' ve-

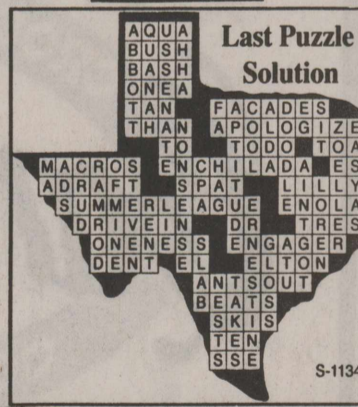

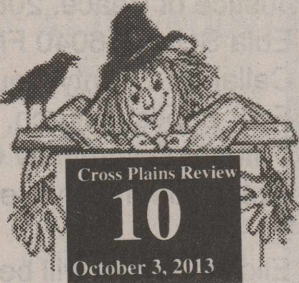

TWC Warns Texas Job Seekers About False Employer Scams

AUSTIN—The Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) today, Friday, September 27th, warned Texas job seekers to be aware of unscrupulous people posing as potential employers who may try to obtain personally identifiable information such as date of birth, debit card or bank account numbers, Personal Identification Numbers (PIN), or Social Security numbers.

Reported incidents include job seekers receiving unsolicited online and/or telephone communications from individuals posing as potential employers from job matching websites such as TWC's WorkInTexas.com. These false employers may request to interview job seekers over the phone or internet and then, following the interview, offer them a position on condition that they cash a company check and/or send a money order to purchase equipment or training needed to begin work with the company.

Texas residents are reminded that legitimate employers will never ask for money as a condition for starting work. Job seekers also should never provide personally identifiable information to an employer prior to a face-to-face meeting.

TWC encourages individuals to check their bank or other online accounts for unusual activity if they suspect they are victims of a similar scam. To report suspicious activity, please call TWC's Fraud and Program Abuse Hotline at 800-252-3642. To avoid becoming a victim of scams, visit the Texas Office of the Attorney General online at www.oag.state.tx.us/consumer/scams.shtml or www.onguardonline.gov, managed by the Federal Trade Commission, for more information.

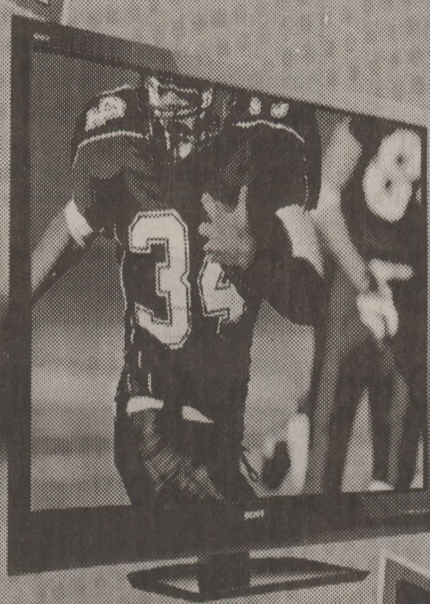

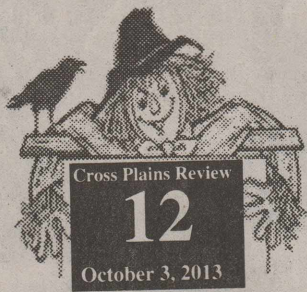
Weight Warriors News

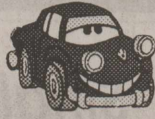
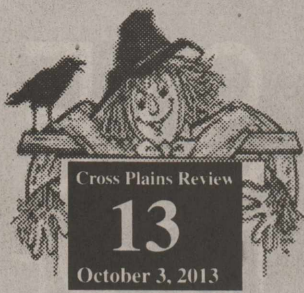

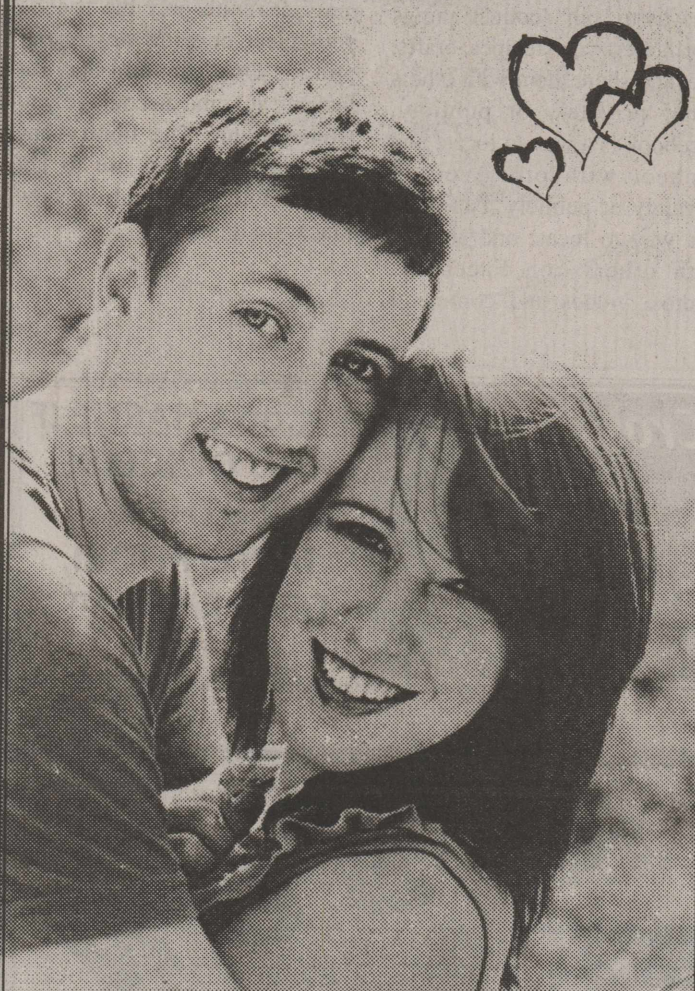

Come on out for some great food and fellowship with old friends or come meet some new ones.

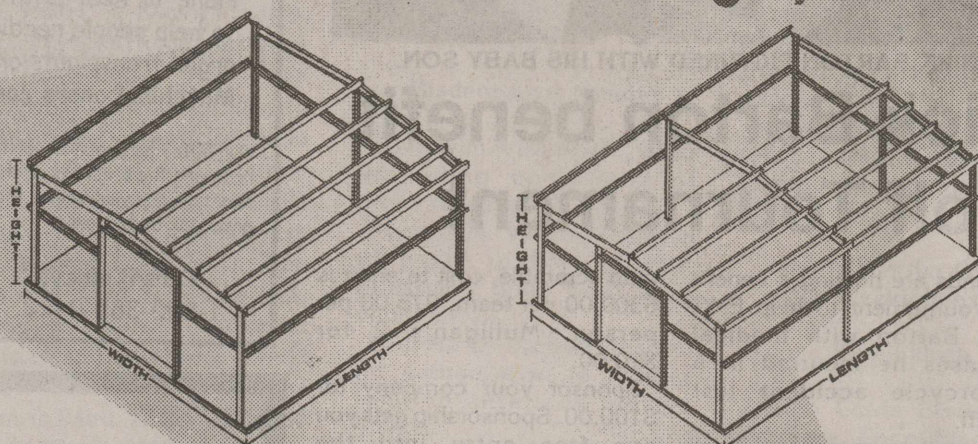
