We are very pleased to have Adrian joining the administrative team in Muleshoe."

Meador has twenty seven years experience in education and has served as a math and science teacher, assistant principal, principal, and superintendent.

Meets In

Regular Session

The Muleshoe City Council met Tuesday morning in the council chambers of the City Hall.

Mayor Darrell Turner called the meeting to order and minutes of the May 19 meeting were approved as printed.

Andy Martinez, president of the Parish Council at the Immaculate Conception Catholic Church, and Fred Anzaldua met with the councilmen to discuss blocking off two streets during the Jamaica Celebration scheduled July 19 at the Catholic Church.

"At the Parish Council meeting we came to the decision that we needed help in controlling the traffic. This is our only money making project, and we are asking the councilmen to barricade these

at length. Superintendent Moore stated that students are required, by the state, to attend at least 80 days per semester. Moore recommended that anyone missing more than eight days per semester be given the opportunity to make these days up on Saturday before they are given credits on their subjects.

MHS Recognized Outstanding Effort Performance Gain

Muleshoe High School has been recognized for Outstanding Effort in Performance Gain in the Texas Education Agency's 1991-92 Texas successful Schools Award System. The criteria used for this recognition are taken from the state's Academic Excellence Indicator System which compares MHS to other high schools in the state that are similar size and student body makeup.

Among the indicators used are scores on the TAAS tests, attendance, drop out rate, and graduation rate. In order to have received this level of recognition, Muleshoe High School was in the top 10 percent of its comparison group on overall gain and met 100 percent of the criteria established by the Commissioner of Education and State Board of Education.

"The administration, the staff, and the student body at Muleshoe High School are to be congratulated for this award. They have all contributed to the outstanding effort recognized here by the TEA and State Board of Education. We certainly have room for continued improvement, but this indicates that we are headed in the right direction and gain is being made," said Superintendent Bill Moore.

Muleshoe Resident Named Instructor For Grant Program

The Admissions and Records Office of Clovis Community College released its summer schedule of community service classes for 1992. Unique to this year's directory is a course being offered at absolutely no charge. The course, **Parenting of Youth** is made available by a grant program through Mental Health Resources, Inc.

Carolyn Johnson, a Muleshoe resident, ---a Prevention Coordinator for the state of New Mexico will be the instructor for the course.

Parenting of Youth is designed to educate the public about high risk behavior among youth involved in drugs and alcohol, and crime. Participants enrolled in the course will learn:

- 1. The common signs and symptoms of drug abuse
- 2. Manifestations of specific drugs
- 3. The disease concept of chemical dependency
- 4. The emotional, economic, and social realities of early sexual involvement among today's youth
- 5. Local youth's involvement in juvenile crime and
- 6. Proper communication and human relation skills in dealing with high risk youth.

TCU Scientists Studying Roads

Runoff from rooftops, roads and parking lots all play a role in water pollution.

Mapping these impervious surfaces using satellite imagery and determining the effects on urban water quality are the subjects of several first-of-a-kind studies being conducted by a pair of environmental scientists at Texas Christian University.

When their studies are completed Drs. Ken Morgan and Leo Newland believe the findings will offer cities nationwide a simple method to determine the future impact on area water supplies from existing and new development.

While long-term effects of watershed pollution in agricultural environments have been documented, little research has been done on sources of urban water pollution, Newland said.

Urban regions account for less acreage but have the potential to affect a larger number of people, Newland added. Runoff can produce large volumes of water containing petroleum products, fertilizers and other substances potentially harmful to water supplies.

"When you have impervious cover, you decrease the water quality and increase the quantity," explained Morgan, a geologist who heads TCU's Center for Remote Sensing and Energy Research.

The facility is being used to evaluate satellite and aerial photographs to identify the amount of coverage in a given area. Images collected from the aircraft and NASA satellites are scanned into a computer system, which assists the scientists in analyzing the percentage of impervious cover. Site visits have shown the imagery data to be 95 percent accurate, Morgan reported.

The scientists expect to complete the studies within five years. Results could be available sooner if major funding for the research becomes available.







FmHA Loan Program Targets Disadvantaged

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) has activated a loan program designed to help members of socially disadvantaged groups acquire land for farming.

The Socially disadvantaged Outreach is mandated by the Agriculture Act of 1987 and defines a Socially Disadvantaged Applicant (SDA) as "an applicant who has been subjected to racial or ethnic prejudice or cultural bias because of their identity as a member of a group without regard to their individual qualities."

Applicants must be a member of the following race/ethnic origin groups: 1. black (Not of Hispanic origin), 2. Hispanic, 3. American Indian or Alaskan Native, 4. Asian or Pacific Islander.

UNDER THE NEW program FmHA will try to find persons in those categories who are interested in farming and can also be prepared to sell or lease to them a farm held in its inventory if any are available in that county. FmHA can also provide other loan and technical assistance, if needed, to help the borrower get started.

For additional information, interested persons should contact their local FmHA county supervisor. The FmHA is a rural credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The Muleshoe County FmHA office is located at 111 E. Ave D., Box 1007, Muleshoe.

Scale Insects Attacking Area

Live Oak Trees

A small insect, Lecanium scales, can pose a big threat to live oaks and other area trees, but timely inspection and pesticide application can help protect valuable trees, says County Extension Agent Curtis Preston.

These scales are hemispherical in shape and dark brown. They are

about one-eighth-to one-fourth-inch in diameter.

Lecanium scales damage trees by reducing vitality and causing dieback of infested branches. While they are most damaging to live oaks, they also occur on red oaks, maples, honey locust and crab apples, the county agent said.

Eggs are produced underneath the female in late spring. Hatching takes place in May on the South Plains. The immature insects feed on the undersides of leaves during the summer. They migrate to twigs in the fall and overwinter there. There is only one generation a year.

Scale insects are most susceptible to control soon after hatching, Preston said. Therefore, insecticide treatments to control Lecanium scales will be most effective if applied now. Heavily infested trees will require two applications two weeks apart.

Insecticides recommended for control include orthene, dursban, sevin, malathion and diazinon. Through coverage will improve the effectiveness of sprays. Always read and follow insecticide label instructions carefully, the county agent cautioned.

State Parks Rank High In Survey

State parks scattered across Texas have been chosen by Texas Highways magazine readers as some of the best places to visit and camp, according to a survey included in the magazine.

Last July, the magazine asked readers to select their "bests" in several categories. More than 2,000 readers responded and the results will be published in the July 1992 issue. All of the questions on the survey were opened.

The best accommodations in Texas are not some fancy hotel in one of the state's major cities, according to those responding to the survey. The number one choice is Indian Lodge at Davis Mountains State Park in West Texas.

Two state parks were listed as the favorite "offbeat sight or site." Enchanted Rock State Natural Area, a huge granite mountain between Fredericksburg and Llano, was chosen number one. Number three was the unusual spire and pinnacle formations at Palo Duro Canyon State Park near Amarillo.

State parks accounted for 19 of 22 of the choice camping areas in the survey. Big Bend National Park was first, followed in the top five by Garner State Park near Concan, Inks Lake State Park near Burnet, Davis Mountains State Park near Fort Davis and Palo Duro Canyon State Park.

Rounding out the top 10 were Bastrop State Park near Bastrop, Lost Maples State Natural Area

near Vanderpool, Tyler State Park near Tyler, Enchanted Rock State Natural Area and Pedernales Falls State Park near Johnson City.

Others on the list include Possum Kingdom State Park near Caddo (11th), Lake Whitney State Park near Whitney (12th), Daingerfield State Park near Daingerfield (13th), Brazos Bend State Park near Richmond and Guadalupe River State Park near Boerne (tie, 15th); and Caprock Canyons State Park near Quitaque, Fairfield Lake State Park near Fairfield, Kerrville State Park near Kerrville, Martin Dies Jr. State Park near Jasper and Palmetto State Park near Luling (tie 17th).

In the top tourist attraction category, the San Jacinto Monument and the Battleship Texas near Houston placed 7th, Palo Duro Canyon was 8th, followed by the LBJ National and State Parks near Johnson City and near Fredericksburg, TEXAS Production in Palo Duro Canyon and Washington-on-the-Brazos State Park and Star of the Republic Museum near Brenham in a tie for 20th.

Fort Davis and the Davis Mountains area came in 7th as the favorite vacation destination, followed by Garner State Park (15th) and Palo Duro Canyon (19th).


