

#### **Graveside Services Held For** FLU N.L. "Razz" Dillard Sunday



### **Commissioner Staples** announces \$250,000 in grants to expand Texas Wine Industry

Funds will help support state's booming wine sector

AUSTIN-Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples today announced the Texas Department of Agriculture is accepting applications for its Wine Grape Investment Grant Program from farmers wishing to expand existing vineyard operations by at least five acres or start new ones.

"The grape grants are an important investment that will produce results for production agriculture and the Texas wine industry," Commissioner Staples said. "The Texas wine industry ranks fifth in the nation and contributes \$1.35 billion annually to our state's economy. It is critical to continue the expansion of this important industry. The wine grape grant will help support growers committed to increasing their wine grape production."

TDA initiated this first-of-itskind program in 2008 and awarded \$250,000 in grants to 10 Texas vineyards. Those grants yielded a total new capital investment of \$1.4 million into the grape industry.

The Wine Grape Investment Grant Program is housed under TDA's Rural Economic Development Division. Applications will be accepted through March 3, 2010. For program details and eligibility requirements, producers may

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### **Texas Unemployment Rate** 8.3 Percent in December

employment gains, Texas employers reduce jobs

AUSTIN-The Texas seasonally adjusted unemployment rate rose to 8.3 percent in December, up from 8.0 percent a month ago, but continued to trend well below the U.S. seasonally adjusted unemployment rate for December of 10.0 percent. Total nonagricultural employment in Texas decreased by 23,900 jobs in December. Texas has gained nearly 50,000 jobs in the last three months.

"Texas continues to feel the effects of this serious national recession with unemployment in our state now at 8.3 percent," said Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) Chairman Tom Pauken. "Nonetheless, unemployment in Texas remains well below the national level of 10.0 percent."

Education and Health Services employment increased by 4,800 positions in December, representing the addition of 60,400 jobs in the past 12 months. Mining and Logging employment posted a modest gain of 300 jobs in December.

"December job losses offset some of the gains from the last couple of months," said TWC Commissioner Representing Labor Ronny Congleton. "TWC

After two months of are committed to assisting Texas job seekers and connecting them with available iobs."

Trade, Transportation and Utilities represented the bulk of December's job losses at 7,400 jobs. Leisure and Hospitality employment was down 6,500 jobs in December, and Professional and Business Services recorded a loss of 5,300 jobs.

"Education and Health Services continued to add jobs while other industries experienced a tough month in December," said TWC Commissioner Representing the Public Andres Alcantar. "Job seekers are encouraged to register on WorkInTexas.com, TWC's

online job matching Web site." ### Texas has largest 10-year growth in **Private Sector Jobs among all States**

AUSTIN - Texas Workforce Commission Chairman Tom Pauken today released figures showing that Texas created more private sector jobs than any other state in the nation over the last 10 years and has the lowest unemployment rate among the 10 largest states in the nation. Pauken cited the U.S. Department of Labor Bureau of Labor Statistics January 22, 2010 release of **Current Employment Statistics** for December 2009 showing Texas created 724,300 more net private sector jobs as compared to December 1999, the largest private sector job decade.

Pauken also noted that among the 10 largest states as ranked by civilian labor force percentage net gain of 9.30 same period with 259,500 net jobs gained for a percentage net gain of 4.31 percent from December 1999 to December 2009. The other 8 large states showed a net loss of private

sector jobs over the same period. Nationally, over the last

decade, the private sector experienced a net employment loss of 1.408 percent or 1,549,000 jobs lost.

"While these are obviously difficult economic times even in Texas, it is important to recognize what happens when a state has economic policies which encourage private sector job creation," said Pauken. "While the rest of the nation has only seen net growth in government jobs, Texas' business, tax, and economic policies have created an environment where businesses can succeed and create the jobs that will allow Texas to lead our nation out of this national recession."

For December, Texas showed the lowest overall seasonally-adjusted unemployment rate of large states at 8.3 percent, compared to 10 percent nationally. Comparing the other of the two largest states. California's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was over four percentage points higher than Texas at 12.4 percent. Over the last decade, California saw a net decline in private sector

employment of 2.72 percent. "When Texas faced declining revenues in 2003, Gov. Perry and the Legislature cut spending rather than raise taxes or run massive government deficits to finance government growth as they did in Washington and in states like California," said Pauken.

"Our nation cannot continue to spend its way out of the recession by incurring ever increasing amounts of government debt. The debt bubble is already hurting our nation's efforts to grow private sector jobs and decrease unemployment. That's why states with large amounts of debt like California are performing markedly worse than low debt states like Texas in both unemployment and private sector job creation."

Pauken concluded, "For more than a year now I have been warning that Washington policymakers have failed to develop an economic policy designed to encourage capital investment and private sector job creation here in the United States. We need to act quickly in order to avoid a jobless recovery. Let's put Americans back to work."






Clyde Fire Department receives check from Texas Farm Bureau
