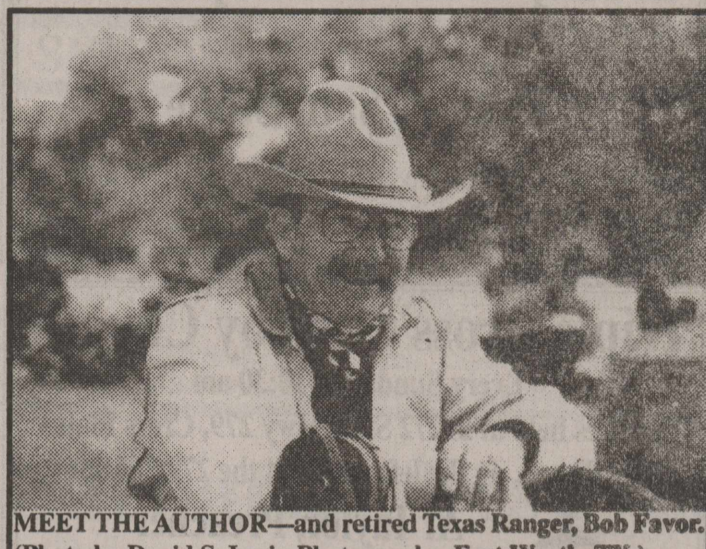

## A Very FAVORable Meet the Author

When asked, how many people would say they dream of being a Texas Ranger? A cowboy? How about a Texas hunting guide? Work for a major Texas oil company? Work on a movie location? Well, Bob Favor, author of *My Rangering Days*, has done all these things and more.

Bob has lived in Callahan County off & on for most of his life. He graduated from Eula High School in 1951 and served in the US Navy from 1952-1956. He had 42 months of sea duty aboard minesweepers. In 1954, he married his high school sweetheart, Beth Farmer. They have 4 daughters and 7 grandchildren, and just celebrated their 56th anniversary!

Favor joined the Texas Highway Patrol in 1958 serving in Seminole, Abilene, and Baird. He was accepted into the Texas Rangers in 1967 serving for 25 years working in Corpus Christi, Brady, and Midland. While on duty, he tracked 2 escaped convicts, apprehending one in Dayton, Ohio, and the other in Shelby, Montana. He retired

from active duty in 1992 and moved back to Clyde in 1998.

Since 'retiring,' he has worked as a contract investigator for a major oil company in Midland, New Mexico, and Louisiana; done security work on two movies filmed in West Texas; cooked on a chuck wagon for various events in Texas and Oklahoma; been a guest speaker for the Sundowners Club of the Cowboy Hall of Fame in Oklahoma; and worked as a hunting guide on a large ranch in the Davis Mountains.

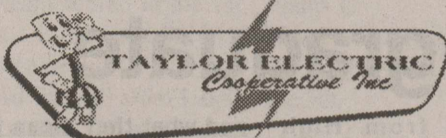

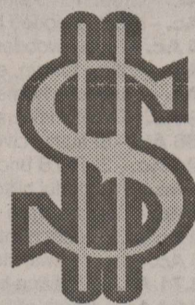

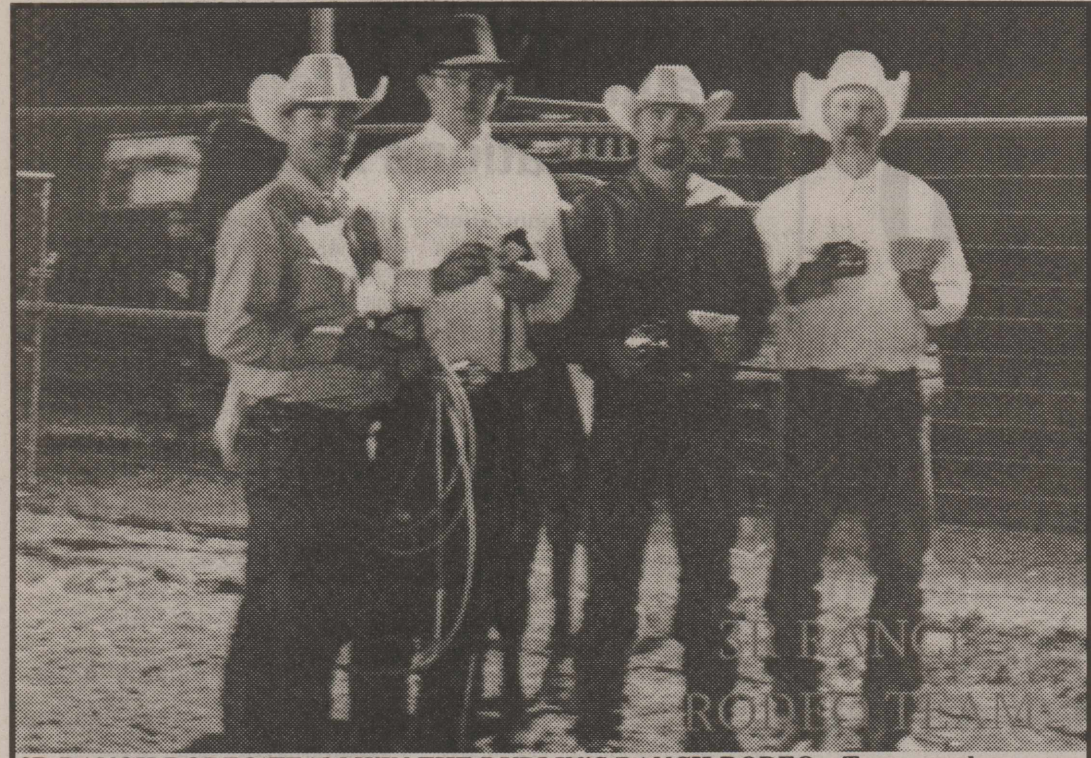

## Taylor Electric members gather for annual meeting

Taylor Electric Cooperative will host its 71st Annual Membership Meeting at the cooperative's headquarters on

Thursday, April 29th, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., at 226 County Road 287, just south of Interstate-20 between Abilene and Merkel.

Founded in 1939 to provide electricity to rural communities, Taylor Electric is a member-owned, not-for-profit utility with 10,000 member-owners in 11 counties. The annual business meeting is when members gather for fellowship, elect directors for the board, receive capital credit refund checks, and

hear updates about the energy industry and news about their utility company.

## TUMBLEWEED SMITH

"I'm the chicken lady. My son in law calls my house the chicken coop." Helen Wilkerson lives at Carterville, just north of Garden City. She collects porcelain chicken figurines.

"The very first chickens I got were from a friend of mine when I got married. I really like chickens so I'd keep bringing a chicken or two in and finally my husband said 'if you bring another chicken in this house I'm leaving.' So I quit for a few years and decided he wasn't going to leave so I started again. I have around four thousand now." I told her she can never move. "I know that. And I'm getting older. I've wondered what in the world I'm going to do with all these chickens. It would take a moving van just to move the chickens."

Each of her chickens is numbered and referenced in a book to tell where it came from.

Her collecting is on hold now. "I ran out of space. I had to quit. There's no place to put another chicken. I look at them longingly when I see one I don't have, but so far this year I've been able to pass them up."

Helen has bought a lot of the chickens, but her friends and family give them to her because they know how much she likes chickens. One wall of her house has been converted into a display area for her collection. "These are shadow boxes that I have put together and painted. I really enjoy looking at them. A woman saw my collection and told me there was medication for people like me."

The wall full of chickens is eight feet by twelve feet. It takes a while to dust her chickens.

"Well over two days. That's the only thing about my chickens I don't like. I have to take a cloth

and take each one out of its little compartment and dust it, dust the compartment and put it back. It takes a long time. I have to stand on a ladder to reach the top ones." Helen's house has pictures, doilies, place mats, cups, aprons, shirts and robes all in a chicken motif. Chickens make her happy. During our visit, she laughed every time she said something.

"Everything in my house has to do with chickens. My sister and I travel a lot together and everywhere we go we try to get a chicken. That's fun to look at them and remember when we were on the trip and where we got them."

Her favorites are some salt and peppershakers called noddors. They're like bubble heads that nod up and down.

First, let me respond to the reinstatement of city taxes. Again, James, no city puts the "tax" issue out to the voters. It is the City's right to establish a tax to help pay for the City's budget. The citizens of Cross Plains were blessed for 30 years to NOT have a City tax. Now mind you, you paid a school tax and a county tax to fund those organizations with no complaining, but when the economy reached the point where the City needed the revenue to operate, you didn't like that. Well guess what, neither did the council, but using good sound logic and common sense, the Council knew it must be done.

Now let's discuss the water & sewer rates. The City's minimum cost is \$17.00 for Water w/\$3.75 per thousand and \$18.00 for Sewer. Let's look at some of the other cities in the area. Santa Anna, Water \$32.00 minimum w/\$5.50 per thousand thereafter, Sewage \$12.00 w/\$2 each thousand gallon water usage up to \$24; Clyde \$19 for 1st 1,000 gallons, \$3.45 2nd 1,000 gallons, and the price continues to rise as water usage does, Sewage fee \$20.95 minimum, and \$1 up to 8,000 gallons; Baird, Water \$13.00 minimum w/\$4.25 per 1,000 up to 12,000 then the price continues to rise. Sewage is \$16 flat rate. Santa Anna's tax rate is .7756 per 100 valuations, Baird's is .81904 per 100 valuations and Cross Plains is .39875 per 100 valuations. Notice James that we are still very comparable to these cities and they have been charging taxes for years.

And what about that \$1 donation to the improvement to Treadway Park. Now let's see, that's \$12 a year, right James. There are no usable restroom facilities at this site and have not been for several years now. Oh, there are restrooms there, but I have heard over and over women say that there was no way they were going in THOSE restrooms. So why have them if they are unusable. The roping club tries to have events down there and they are forced to pay hundreds of dollars every time an event is held just for portable restrooms, as does the City when they have events there. This is not a frivolous want, this is an actual need, if you don't believe me, ask all the folks who have been involved the last couple of years trying to raise funds to help defray the cost of the restroom facilities. You see James, if you were involved on one of these committees like I am, you would see that the community is the ones who have been pursuing the facilities and not the City Council. This is a need that the community has approached the City Council for and the Council has listened to its citizens. Please James, don't donate, that way when Treadway Park is finished and we have restroom facilities and other amenities you can stand up and say that you had no part in it.

Now let's talk about Jarrod Potter being sent to school to be our next Police Chief. Well you are right that the City paid Jarrod's tuition of \$1,200 with the understanding that if Jarrod did not finish the school or stay with the City for two years, he would have to repay the City for the tuition and other incidental costs associated with the school. After talking with the City Council, it is my understanding that they decided that since the City was wanting to replace our last patrolman, who stayed one year, and the fact that prior to Don Gosnell becoming the City's Chief, the City had went through 25 policemen in 25 years. (Gosnell is currently working on 12 years) The council felt that it would be a good idea to hire someone from Cross Plains who wanted to raise their family here. Since Jarrod already worked for the City they felt he would be an ideal candidate. After discussing the issue with Jarrod in great detail, all was agreed that this situation would be best for the City. The "travel" car that you refer to, in my opinion was a long overdue need the City has put off for a long time. The fact that Jarrod is using the car to go back and forth to school in is due to the fact that his city issued pickup will not make the daily drive. Upon completion of this school all city employees will use the car when traveling. Currently, when City personnel travel in their personal vehicle the City reimburses those employees at a rate of 55 cents per mile for travel costs. This vehicle will in the long run save the city a lot of money. If this is such a poor idea of the City Council, why does our local school system have several travel cars, as well as all the surrounding cities. No James, this was not a bad idea, it was a really good idea and will save the City many dollars, which you claim should be the main goal. Why are you against saving money?

You know James, not only do I have sixteen (16) years experience working for the city, I continue to work closely with the City Staff in and advisory position, I serve on the EDC Board, and I Chair the Planning and Zoning Board. I also serve as chair of the "Restroom Facility" committee. Maybe you should become more involved with hands on activities so that you can know what is REALLY taking place instead of sitting and listening to all the local negative gossip directed toward City Hall.

## USDA reminds local farmers to submit your annual report of acreage by May 1, 2010

Robert Frost, Executive Director of USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) in Callahan County today reminded producers to submit their annual report of acreage to their local FSA county office to meet FSA program eligibility requirements.

"Producers must file their reports accurately and timely for all crops and land uses, including prevented and failed acreage, to ensure they receive the maximum FSA program benefits possible," said Frost.

Accurate acreage reports are necessary to determine and maintain eligibility for various programs, such as the Direct and Counter-cyclical Program and newer programs authorized in the 2008 Farm Bill. Programs include the Supplemental Revenue Assistance Payments Program (SURE), Average Crop Revenue Election Program (ACRE), Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP), Tree Assistance Program (TAP), and Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees, and Farm Raised Fish Program (ELAP).

Acreage reports are considered timely filed when completed by the applicable final crop reporting deadline, which is May 1, 2010 for Callahan County. Prevented acreage must be reported within 15 calendar days after the final planting date. Failed acreage must be reported before the disposition of the crop. Producers should contact their county FSA office if they are uncertain about reporting deadlines.

Late-filed provisions may be available to producers who are unable to meet the reporting deadline as required. Reports filed after the established deadline must meet certain requirements to be accepted and may be charged late fees.

Producers should visit their county FSA office to complete acreage reporting. For questions on this or any FSA program, including specific crop reporting deadlines and planting dates, producers should contact their county FSA office. DO NOT complete the release form which is attached to the letter and DO NOT release any

information to the facsimile number cited in the letter.

The US Department of Transportation warns the letters are fraudulent!

The last batch of these letters came thru the Abilene area in March of last year. These fraudulent letters request that current or potential contractors register with DOT by submitting their company's financial information on a release form entitled, "Authorization to release financial information".

Please be aware that the Department of Transportation does not require any financial information to be submitted in order to be eligible for procurement.

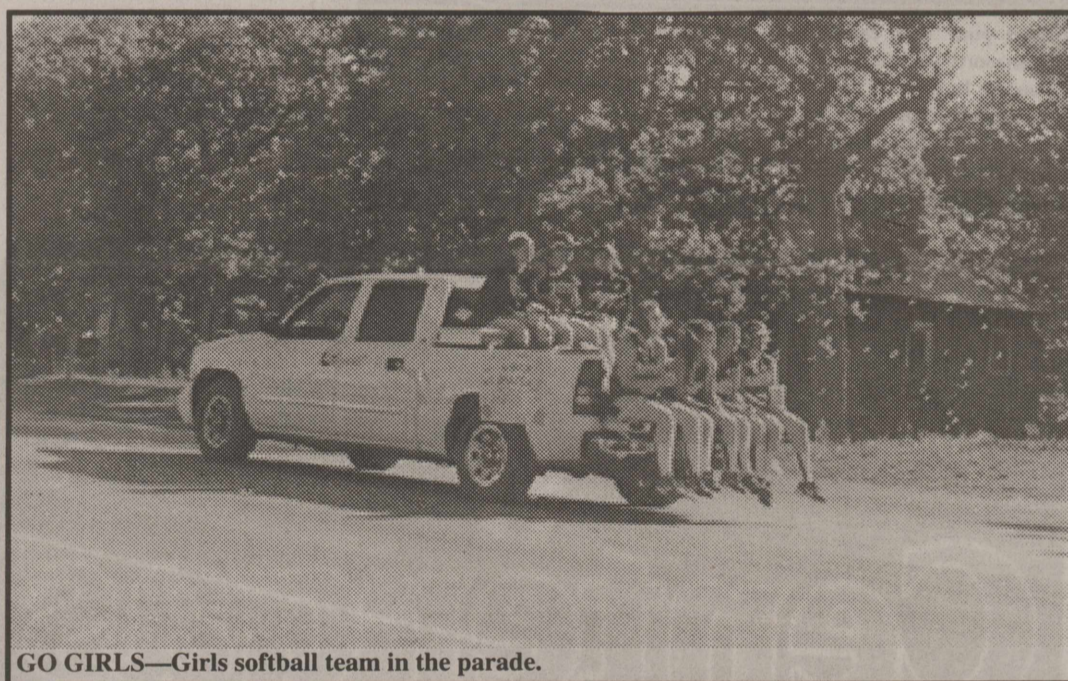

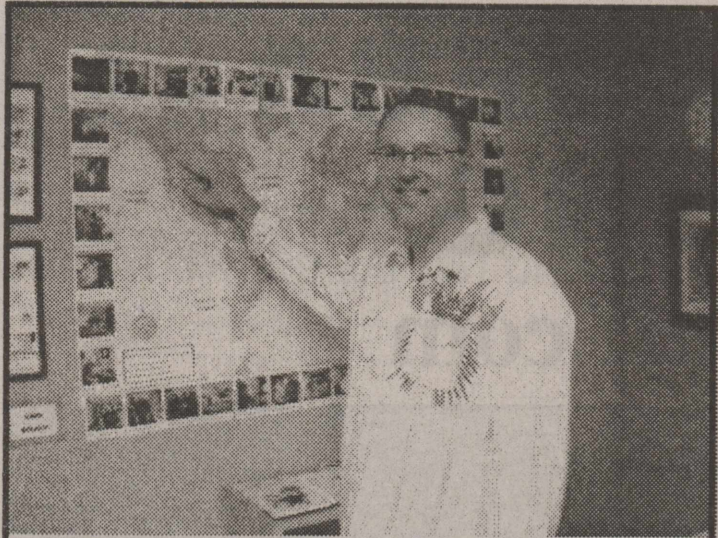

"Washington cut \$7 billion in the 2008 Farm Bill while almost doubling the amount spent on nutrition assistance for government welfare programs," Williams said. "Agricultural spending accounts for less than 1 percent of the federal budget.

Now they plan to cut even more."

Producers are now facing an Obama administration proposal that would cut \$812 million from the budget for the 2011 fiscal year. Research funding, along with farm and crop insurance programs, were cut in 2008. Support for nutrition assistance programs is a major part of the 2008 Farm Bill.
