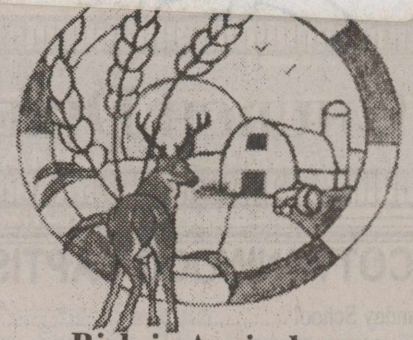

As a leader she has been President of the Student Council, NHS, FCCLA, FBLA and the Spanish Club. She also served as the Senior Class Vice-President.

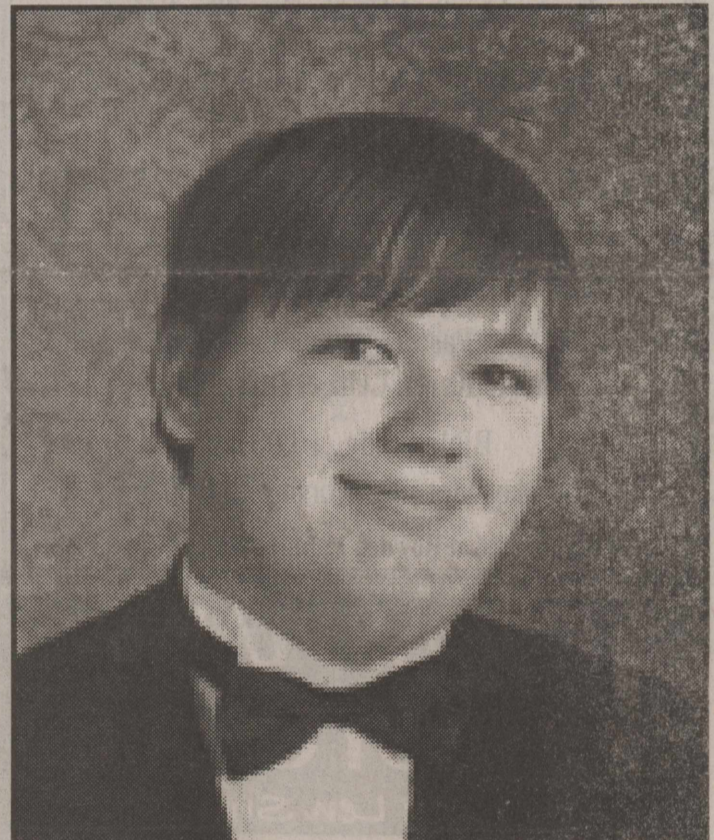

Where is Toro?

On one of our bi-weekly trips to Abilene we noticed an unusual BULL in the pasture on the north side of Highway 36 (just before the Denton Valley store). I guess that this was about 18 months ago. Not only was he noticed by us but several other families traveling to Abilene also noticed the same BULL. He was solid black with a white face and horns that had been tipped and he never moved as we were passing by.

We finally named him TORO because he was the most magnificent specimen of a beef and "rodeo type" bull we had ever seen. He was normally standing near the highway fence looking across the highway at cattle grazing on the wheat field. When he was not laying down, we do believe that he was posing. Not one eye blinked or an ear twitched as he gazed across the road.

About two months ago, we looked for TORO on our trip to Abilene but could not find him in any pasture next to Highway 36, and again, presumed he was in another pasture away from the road. Every trip thereafter we looked but could not see TORO and began to wonder what happened—did he die; was he taken to another pasture; or maybe sold to someone who needed his majesty, "our friend at

a distance," TORO.

In April we were driving toward Cross Cut on Highway 279 and for some reason, slowed down as we approached the horse facility, Mariah Ridge, which is on the east side of the highway. Mr. Pickett of Mariah Ridge confirmed that he purchased TORO about two months ago from the man who lives on Highway 36 and is now using him to produce some fancy calves from Mariah Ridge cows. True to our thinking, TORO was a rodeo bull they tried to ride 75 times but were successful only twice. Quite a record would you say?

So, if you are going south on Highway 270 just south of Cross Plains, slow down as you approach Mariah Ridge Ranch and maybe you will receive the same thrill we do each time we see TORO. (By the way, Mr. Pickett has named the bull Bullzilla like a Godzilla, for you see, he is quite THE BULL!!!).

Texas Preservation trust fund grant deadline quickly approaching

AUSTIN, Texas—The Texas Historical Commission (THC) is accepting applications for the Texas Preservation Trust Fund (TPTF) Grant Program for fiscal year 2010. The submission phase is a two-step process, first requiring a brief application form which is reviewed by the THC. The deadline to submit an initial application is June 11, 2010. Highest priority projects will be invited to proceed by submitting detailed project proposals by the fall. Final grant awards will be decided in January 2011.

TPTF grants help save and protect Texas' threatened historic structures and significant archeological sites. Grant awards can be used by communities for restoration work, architectural planning, archeological investigation, preservation planning, curatorial services, resource survey and heritage

educational training. Some past grant awards have funded stabilization and architectural improvements at the Grand Theatre in Wichita County, archeological work at Presidio La Bahia in Goliad County and architectural planning at the Houston Fire Museum in Harris County.

Created by the Texas Legislature in 1989, the TPTF Grant Program is an interest-earning pool of public and private monies. Competitive grants are awarded on a one-to-one match basis and are paid as reimbursement for eligible expenses incurred during the project.

Cross Plains City Council Minutes

April 13, 2010

This was a regular meeting of the Cross Plains City Council. Members present were Mayor Ray Purvis, Jerry Cassle, Lewis Fortune, Bob Kirkham, Peg Terrell and Karen Lenz.

Employees present were Debbie Gosnell, Teresa Kennedy and Stuart Sowell.

Members of the public meeting were Era Lee Hanke, Amber Thomas, Ricky Carouth, James Nichols, Skeet and Wanda Walker, Porcious Potter and Mark Norris.

Mayor Purvis called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m.

By general consent the council approved the minutes as presented.

By general consent the council approved the police and judge's report as presented.

Fortune moved to pay the bills Terrell seconded and motion carried.

Under citizen comments Era Lee Hanke thanked the council for their work in the community and stated her accolades to the City Dads for all they do.

Amber Thomas met with the council to give an update on the Senior Citizens Center. She informed the council that she is now a limited member of the Food Bank and will be able to receive non-USA food items such as paper goods at a much reduced rate. She commented that this will help with the budget, as will becoming a member of a Food Coop in June which will provide food at a discounted price. Ms. Thomas also informed the council that she has another breakfast fundraiser planned for Friday the 16th. Ms. Thomas informed the council that local citizens showed up Friday with a donated water softener for the ice machine and she had it installed on Monday. She also stated that a local couple had donated a 46" LCD Flat Screen TV with a wall mount to the center and someone else has donated a Wii Fit for the Seniors' enjoyment. She commented that she appreciated all the locals who donated to the Center with no strings attached.

Next, Thomas explained a new program from USDA that will provide children Kindergarten through 18 years of age one meal a day. She explained that they will pay for the meal plus a portion of the other expense during the summer months. She asked for permission to participate in this program and by general consent the council agreed that this would be a good service to both the youth and the Seniors.

Ms. Thomas, changing topics, asked the council to allow her and Gosnell to research a 501 (c) 3 Organization for the betterment of Cross Plains. By general consent the council agreed.

Next on the agenda was a letter from the Senior Citizen Renovation Committee, a committee that has raised funds for the improvement of the Senior Citizens Center. The letter proposed purchasing a water softener to be installed at the Senior Citizens Center building, if, the City will furnish the filters for the ice maker, the supplies for the water softener and service BOTH the ice machine and water softener. The letter said that the ICE MAKER and the WATER SOFTENER will be the property of the Cross Plains Senior Citizens. Ms. Thomas stated that the center currently had one filter donated for the ice machine and since someone else has donated the water softener, there is no need for the committee to purchase another one. Gosnell is to inform the committee that the softener is no longer needed.

Mark Norris met with the council on behalf of the City Planning and Zoning Commission. He informed the council that they are short two committee members and would like to recommend Roxie Thomas and Greg Turner as committee members.

Mr. Norris also informed the council that the Centennial Planning Committee is also short three members including Don Clark's position as Chairman. Norris stated that the following three members, Connie Kirkham, Ronnie Rhodes and Keith Lawrence, are recommended to fill the vacancies and will

recommend a chairman at a later date.

Norris also updated the council on the restroom facility project at Treadway Park. He advised the council that he has received two prices for a set of plans and that Hutton Construction is preparing the floor plan with specs. As soon as they are finished with the plan, he will provide them to the City and EDC for final approval and at that time will set the plans for bid.

Norris discussed the City Planning and Zoning Commission's review of recently surveyed alley ways and recommended to the council that the City begin requiring building permits for any structure that is erected within the city limits of Cross Plains. He commented that regardless of what the City charges for a permit, it will give them the ability to stop construction over city property and city utility lines. He suggested a nominal fee of \$25.00.

Porcious Potter met with the council to discuss the portion of the designated street known as Avenue H that is situated between him and Paul Neeb. The portion of street being discussed is approximately 60' wide by 150' long. Potter advised the council that the street has never been open and has no utilities to his knowledge. The back side of the street dead ends into the water way that drains into Turkey Creek. He asked the council to consider selling him this portion of the street so that he can build on to his home and to add a shop. He indicated that he had spoken with Mr. Neeb and he has no problem with the add-on or him purchasing the street. Norris commented that where this part of this particular street is, you would not ever need to be able to open it up without building a bridge over the current waterway. Skeet Walker met with the City to discuss the street that runs between two properties that he owns and asked that the City consider selling him this portion of SE 4th Street between Avenue B and Avenue C. He also discussed the fact that the west side of SE 4th Street runs into the

natural waterway and that it is such a boggy mess that it would be hard for the City to ever open up this section of the street. Both Norris and Sowell commented that you have to walk into this property to read the meter because you cannot drive due to the amount of water that holds underneath this street. However, it was noted that a water line and sewer line runs through this street. Mr. Walker stated that he would give the city a right-of-way through the property. The council asked Mr. Walker if he would be willing to pay the attorney fees for drawing up the R.O.W. and he acknowledged that he would.

By general consent the council agreed to have Gosnell check into the legal matter of selling both sections of Avenue H to Porcious Potter and SE 4th Street to Skeet Walker.

Again the council discussed the matter of citizens blocking sections of alley ways and streets. Gosnell informed the council that she had sent a certified letter to Dan Johnson asking him to remove the vehicles that are parked on the section SE 4th Street between Avenue A and Avenue B but that as of this date no vehicles have been removed.

Kirkham moved to have Chief of Police Don Gosnell talk to Mr. Johnson and give him until April 26, 2010 at 9 a.m. to have all vehicles removed off of SE 4th Street and to place the vehicles onto his own private property or the City will have vehicles towed. Gosnell is to tag the vehicles at the time of notification. Cassle seconded and motion carried.

Gosnell is also to discuss with the City Attorney sending letters of notification to property owners who have placed buildings, fences, etc. on City property that when and if the need arises the property owners will be required to move said buildings, fences, etc. Gosnell is to work with the City Attorney to get these notifications sent out.

By general consent the council agreed that the City would adopt the Bradford Pear Tree as the City Tree and the Rose as the City Flower.

Discussion was held concerning the purchase of a new maintenance vehicle. Gosnell presented the council with a bid sheet from Houston Galveston Area Councils which can provide vehicles at a much lower price to municipalities. Lenz moved to purchase the Light Duty Silverado 2500 HD, 3/4 ton, regular cab pickup, 4-wheel drive, 6.0L, V8, 5-speed Man Tran, w/OD, 9,200 lb. from Caldwell Chevrolet. Terrell seconded and motion carried with Lenz, Terrell and Fortune voting for and Kirkham and Cassle voting nay.

Reluctantly, Karen Lenz advised the council that since she would be moving from the City Limits at the end of this month she would be submitting her resignation from the council effective at the end of this meeting. She told the council she had spoken to Colby Walker about the possibility of allowing the council to appoint him to the council seat as her replacement and he indicated that he would accept the position, if asked to do so. Lenz stated she would like to recommend Colby as a replacement for her position and she would like to make a motion to appoint him to the council effective after her resignation. Kirkham seconded and motion carried.

Mayor Purvis read aloud Ms. Lenz resignation to the Council. With regret Kirkham moved to accept her resignation. Terrell seconded and motion carried.

Kirkham moved to adjourn. Cassle seconded and motion carried.

The Texas Cowboy Reunion — In 1929 some businessmen in Stamford wanted to get their town out of the depression doldrums and were trying to find something to do to pick up the spirits of the people who lived there. They decided on a rodeo. Ninety-eight cowboys participated in that first rodeo. They competed in four events: calf roping, wild cow milking, steer riding and bronc riding. The announcer used a megaphone. The town's rodeo caught the fancy of the entire southwest and by 1937 up to 70,000 people were attending. Soon it carried the title of the world's largest amateur rodeo.

In the early days and even up into the 60's and early 70's there were so many contestants competition was held around the clock. Officials slept on cots on the rodeo grounds. Years ago, area ranches brought in their chuck wagons and stayed through the entire run of the rodeo. "The cooks would pour a box of Post Toasties and a half gallon of milk in a washtub, beat on the side of it and kids would come with spoons like rugrats to eat

breakfast out of that washtub," says Dub Harrison who has worked with the rodeo for forty years. "It was just a fun place to be." Some years the rodeo is a sellout. "Quite often you'll look up and see from three to six thousand people sitting in the stands. That's larger than the entire population of Stamford." Some of today's rodeo events had their beginnings at the Stamford rodeo including wild cow milking, the cutting horse event and women's barrel racing. Dub Harrison thinks the double mugging event also started at Stamford. "That's where a cowboy ropes a yearling weighing 500 or 600 pounds and he and his partner flank it down and tie three legs down. That event has caught on here lately. That and wild cow milking were standard events at rodeos until the fifties."

Dub's grandmother entered one of the early barrel racing events at Stamford. "They were judged on their appearance and posture and their horses' appearance," says Dub. "They walked around the

cloverleaf barrel pattern and prizes were awarded to the prettiest girl and the girl with the best looking outfit. Fern Sawyer won the first barrel race here and she's the first cowgirl in the hall of fame." Other events during the rodeo include dances featuring popular western musicians and an art show that attracts prominent western artists. An old timers reunion offers the chance for pioneers in the Texas cattle industry to swap stories. "In Stamford you're kind of born into working with the Texas Cowboy Reunion. A lot of folks work hard to make sure everything goes right." The rodeo takes place the first four days in July. Members of the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association can compete at Stamford. "At one time you couldn't but we opened it up to the world and now anybody can come enter. It still means a whole lot to most cowboys to win something at Stamford. It's just a badge of honor." The event is held on fifty-five acres of land just west of Stamford.
