She has been active in sports participating in basketball, track and Cross Country. Shera is a member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.





The Confederate Decoration Day used various dates of April 26th, May 10th, May 30th and June 3rd. Union graves were marked on May 30th. Over the years the wounds slowly healed and May 30th has become the universal day for honoring the American dead of all wars. During those years the day's name was changed from Decoration Day to Memorial



#### CELEBRATE **RECOVERY WORKS**

Celebrate Recovery follows the 12 Step Recovery Program. The purpose is to focus on God's healing power through fellowship with others. By working the 12 steps and the 8 Beatitude Principles, we become willing to accept God's grace in solving our problems.

The first step is, "We admitted we were powerless over our addiction and compulsive behaviors, that our lives had become unmanageable." I know that nothing good lives in me, that is, in my sinful nature. For I have the desire to do what is good, but I cannot carry it out. (Romans 7:18)



## Library Creative Writing Winners

Again this year, the Cross Plains Public Library sponsored a creative writing contest for all students attending or eligible to attend the Cross Plains school. Entries came from Kindergarten through Grade 6 and they were "blind" judged by two retired teachers of English and composition.

At the school's awards assembly, ribbons were awarded for 1st, 2nd and 3rd place in each grade. Additionally, the best three entries received plaques for the Lou Rodenberger Award for **Outstanding Writing.** 

It is both interesting and heartening to review the writing efforts of students from kindergarten through the sixth grade. One could easily compare the teaching/learning process to the skill of riding a bicycle. The training wheels and helpful hand that produce confidence in young riders are steadily taken away as they become more competent riders (writers). The growth that is evident in this set of entries invites the judges to say, "Good job, teachers, and well done, students."

#### Kindergarten

These young writers are full of imagination and whimsey, but most of them also include some good life lessons in their stories. It is refreshing to read good stories like these from such young

1st Place - Kaitlyn Foster - This is very cute story with several good images (word pictures) and a humorous ending.

2nd Place - Billy Jones - This story tickles the imagination and also contains a good lesson about eating too much candy.

**3rd Place - Autumn Nickerson** - This story is full of action and reveals the young writer's sense of right and wrong.

#### First Grade

Several of these young writers display excellent imaginations and also the ability to slip into the mind of butterfly. These stories, with their pleasantly colored illustrations, were fun to read. They clearly come from a precious group of young people. 1st Place - Hannah King - This story is full of good descriptive details, and it becomes real and poetic as it mentions "play(ing) tag with my friends."

2nd Place - Morgan Buchanan -This charming story brings a smile with its description of the butterfly getting "a little disey." 3rd Place - Brooklyn Duncan -This story also personifies the butterfly as it plays "hide and go 'seke" with its friends. Good imagination at work here.

#### Second Grade

These young writers used the writing prompt as a springboard to create some wildly imaginative stories. Their enthusiasm is evident, and the results are entertaining. These stories undoubtedly fertilized the writing bug in several of these youngsters.

1st Place Kaydence Smoot - The wild imagination of this young person presents a kaleidoscope of images that suggest a broad range of interests. This young person is probably a delightful conversation partner. 2nd Place - Trent Tollett - This young writer has a great sense of

humor and a good delivery. 3rd Place - Cole Bryan - This fantasy story combines the everyday (playing ball) with the unlikely (alien being) to create a cute little tale.

**Third Grade** This set of essays reveals the passion available in young people. Their concern for the environment and all endangered species is evident, and they use good details to paint appealing pictures of the animals they chose to study. This is a good writing

1st Place - Hannah Crockett -"Madagascar Day Gecko" - This essay contains many good detail. It is also written from an objective point of view (no first-person pronouns), which sets it above most of the other papers in this group. Another good technique is the way the writer saves the endangered species

information until the closing, which makes for a strong impact. 2nd Place - Hannah Fortune -'White Cave Velvet Worm' - This writer uses many details to paint a clear picture of this worm and its place in the world. By explaining how the worm contributes to the environment, the writer makes a good case for protecting this endangered

3rd Place - Jacy Bien -"Jaguarundi" - This young writer includes many details about the Jaguarundi but also spells out the steps we should take to protect it. 4th Grade - The assignment that created these "rat" stories was undoubtedly welcomed by the class. They clearly enjoyed themselves and created several creative and attractive stories along the way.

1st Place - Brittany Crouch -"Rats" - This delightful story is full of good images and creative details. The writer clearly enjoyed the assignment and created a cute story that stands out above the

2nd Place - "Rats" - This writer weaves an intricate story with a good blend of fantasy and implied understanding of human science gone awry. The plot pulls the reader along, and the conclusion is strangely acceptable.

3rd Place - "The R.M.A." - This story is an entertaining romp through several "spy story" cliches. The funny acronyms show that the writer doesn't take himself/herself too seriouslythis was written for fun. It was no doubt fun to write, and it is fun to read.

#### Fifth Grade

This set of stories includes several that are packed with good images and interesting plot development.

1st Place - Hannah Cowan -"The Kidnap" - This creative writer puts a special "local color" twist to his/her story. Packed with action and detail, this short story provides interesting reading for the target audience—the citizens of Cross Plains.

2nd Place - Mackenzie Byrd is packed with barrel-racing details and an extended plot. This young writer obviously enjoyed the assignment and this pleasure translate into a well-written, appealing story.

3rd Place - "Kidnapped" - This amusing story reflects the writer's sense of humor. Also, the short, punchy sentence structure helps to create the convincing narrator's vice for the story.

#### 6th Grade

These older student writers were obviously given a broader range of possibilities in their assignment and this collection of stories is varied and interesting as a result. This was the most difficult set of entries to judge. The top seven stories were very close in reader appeal. All of the stories reflected additional maturity that comes with being in the sixth grade. Several of these writers will probably write more and grow more in the future.

1st Place - Hunter Thomas -'When I Was a Boy" - This tender story has a good plot and a solid message that invites introspection. The writer seems wise beyond his/her years.

2nd Place Brayden Kennedy -"Feels Like The Beach" - As one of the most original stories. this brief tale suggests a writer with a strong intellect and a wry sense of humor. This writer might have more to say later in life. 3rd Place - Rebekah Crockett -

"The Time Machine" - This story plots an emotional journey as well as a trip through time. The main character's yearning is very well depicted and this story could be a favorite for young girls everywhere.

Overall Winners - Received the Lou Rodenberger Award for **Outstanding Writing** 

1st Place - Brittany Crouch -"Rats" - This story stands out because it is packed with images (word pictures) that come at the reader in a rapid-fire manner almost every sentence paints an additional picture at least adds

progress. The little story is very readable and is complete in its present form.

2nd Place - Hunter Thomas -"When I Was Boy" - This story is notable because it appeals to a wide audience. Even though the main character is a boy, he is encouraged to think about adult concepts. ## Cross Plains' retail sales in 2010 remain higher than 2009

The City of Cross Plains' one percent city sales tax payments in 2010 are running slightly higher than 2009 sales tax payments, according to the Texas State Comptroller's office.

Texas State Comptroller Susan Combs reported the city's sales tax payment on Wednesday, May 12th.

Cross Plains' 2010 sales tax payments for the year totalled \$79,635.01, which is 1.34 percent higher than the \$78,579.92 in sales tax rebate payments collected in 2009.
