US Census may be calling you soon

BBB has received a number of calls from concerned citizens worried about phone calls from the Census Bureau.

Follow up calls are being made through mid-August by Census workers. As many as 8 million households may get a call and a number of local people have already received a call. Not every household will get a call; however if you get a call the BBB offers the following tips:

The caller will identify as working for the U.S. Census Bureau and their call is to ensure

an accurate count at the right address.

Caller ID should show (IS Census Bureau or a toll-free number should show up.

Census workers will never ask you for your social security, bank account, credit card number or ask for a donation. You will never be contacted by email.

Census workers leaving a message to return a call will leave a specific case ID number. If you have any questions contact your BBB 325-691-1533.

Extended Time Outdoors Increases Risk for Skin Cancer Keep Kids Sun-Safe at Summer Camp

June 15, 2010 (New York, NY) - Without proper sun protection, a fun summer at camp can lead to painful sunburns, premature skin aging and skin cancer. Just one severe sunburn in childhood doubles the chances of developing melanoma later in life.

Children with fair skin, blond or red hair and blue or green eyes are at the highest risk of sunburn. But darker-skinned children also need sun protection.

"Fewer than one-third of children between the ages of eight and eleven wear sunscreen," said Perry Robins, MD, President of The Skin Cancer Foundation. "Parents need to teach children from an early age how to be sun-safe and reduce their risk of skin cancer."

There are many things parents can do to keep their kids sun-safe at summer camp. You may want to ask:

- Are the camp counselors trained in sun safety?
- Do counselors remind children to apply sunscreen regularly?
- Are outdoor activities scheduled in the early morning or late afternoon? Ultraviolet (UV) rays are most intense from 10 AM to 4 PM.
- Are there adequate places for campers to seek shade during outdoor activities?

Parents should also prepare their children before they leave for camp with a sun safety lesson, including how to use sunscreen. An SPF 15+ sunscreen (water resistant formulas are especially good) should be used regularly.

- Apply 1 ounce (2 tablespoons) of sunscreen to all exposed areas, 30 minutes before going outside.
- Reapply every 2 hours and right after swimming or sweating heavily.
- Remind children to cover those easy to miss spots, such as the back of ears and neck, as well as the tops of feet and

Commissioners approve new County Jail inmate telephone system

The Callahan County Commissioners' court approved a new telephone system for inmates incarcerated at the Callahan County Jail during the commissioners' court monthly meeting held Monday, June 28th at the County Courthouse in Baird.

Before approving the agreement with Crown Correctional Telephone Inc. of Granbury, Judge Roger Corn reported that he had called the references presented by Crown Correctional Telephone Inc. and the references all gave a good recommendation.

Commissioner Bryan Farmer made a motion to enter into a contract with Crown Correctional Telephone Inc. Commissioner Tom Windham seconded the motion and the motion carried with a 5-0 vote.

Callahan County Sheriff John Windham reported the company the county had contracted with for inmate telephone service previously was not performing the necessary maintenance and several of the phones were out of order.

He said several counties in the surrounding area and a number of entities in the Metroplex use Crown Correctional. He said the company will be installing a total of four telephones in the jail cells at the County Jail, along with two additional telephones in the visitation room at the County Jail. He said the visitation room at the jail currently does not have a telephone system and it is difficult for inmates to carry on a conversation with a jail guest between a separated wall with a window.

Sheriff Windham said that inmates can purchase a telephone card with a certain amount of

minutes to use through the telephone system.

"We've done our homework on this company," Sheriff Windham reported.

"This is a win/win situation for the County," Sheriff Windham reported. He said the telephone system will be installed at no cost to the county and that Callahan County will receive a percentage of all phone cards sold by Crown Correctional.

Sheriff Windham said the telephone system being installed will allow the Sheriff's Department to disconnect all telephone calls in the jail cells at a certain time in the night and to reconnect the telephone system the next morning.

Sheriff Windham said that when inmates are booked into the County Jail, their personal cell phones will be confiscated and returned when they're released from jail.

Other agenda items brought before the commissioners' court included:

—Callahan County Judge Roger Corn called the regular commissioners' court meeting to order at 9:33 a.m. Those present included Precinct #1 Commissioner Harold Hicks, Precinct #2 Commissioner Bryan Farmer, Precinct #3 Commissioner Tom Windham, Precinct #4 Commissioner Cliff Kirkham, County Treasurer Dianne Gunter, and County Clerk Donna Bell.

—The commissioners' court meeting minutes from the previous meetings were reviewed and signed.

—Under public comment, Judge Corn announced the next regular commissioners' court

meeting would be held Wednesday, July 7th due to a conflict on Monday, July 12th.

—County Clerk Bell presented to the commissioners' court the deputation of Keith Colom by the Sheriff's Department and the deputation of Laurie Tollett by the County Clerk's Office. No action was necessary.

—County Clerk Bell reported that Hart Intercivic, vendor for the County's Electronic Voting System, is offering a new annual license and support program. By signing a five year commitment to Hart Intercivic, the County would save \$4,637.18 over the next five years on annual license and support fees. Commissioner Windham made a motion to sign the addendum to the warranty, support and license agreement with Hart Intercivic. Commissioner Hicks seconded the motion. The motion carried with a 5-0 vote.

—Judge Corn read a letter of resignation submitted by County Extension Agent Hoss Sasin. The Judge made a motion to accept the resignation of Mr. Sasin with regret. Mr. Sasin will be working for Industrial Outfitter Incorporated in Abilene. Commissioner Kirkham seconded the motion and the motion passed with a 5-0 vote.

—Commissioner Farmer made a motion to pay all the approved bills. Commissioner Windham seconded the motion, which then carried with a 5-0 vote.

—The commissioners' court meeting was adjourned at 9:55 a.m. on a motion by Commissioner Windham and a second by Commissioner Hicks. The motion carried with a 5-0 vote.

CROSS PLAINS CITY COUNCIL MINUTES

This was a regular meeting of the Cross Plains City Council. Members of the council present were Mayor Ray Purvis, Jerry Cassle, Lewis Fortune and Peg Terrell.

Employees present were Debbie Gosnell and Don Gosnell.

Members of the public meeting were Mark Norris and Douglas Campbell.

Ray Purvis called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m.

By general consent the council approved the police and judge's report as presented.

Fortune moved to pay the bills. Cassle seconded and motion carried.

Mark Norris and Debbie Gosnell both provided information on behalf of the Cross plains EDC concerning the purchase of land for the Medical Clinic. Norris advised the Council that Texas Heritage Bank had entertained an offer from the Clinic and were able to settle on an offer of \$30K. The EDC Board asked for the councils approval for their commitment of \$30K for the purchase of the land from Texas Heritage Bank with the stipulation that if the clinic should go out of business they must repay the \$30K and also give the EDC the first right of refusal for the purchase of the property at that time. Cassle moved to approve the purchase. Terrell seconded and motion carried.

Norris gave the council an update on the restroom facilities at Treadway Park. He gave the council a copy of the plans provided by Hutton Construction and went over the plan in detail. The size of the facility will

provide four stalls in the men's room and three in the lady's room. All specifications of the project will be ready within a week and the restroom facility committee will finalize all details and return to the council and the EDC for final approval. Norris asked all council members to look over the plans and let him know of any changes they would like to see prior to finalization. Norris also noted that after final approval of both boards, bids would be let for construction and possibly be underway in the next couple of months.

Discussion was held concerning the Energy Efficiency & Conservation Block Grant the City received to conduct an energy audit and proposed projects. After review of the proposed projects Terrell moved to select Item 4-1 WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT which will add controllers and DO sensors for operation of the Aerators at a cost not to exceed \$25,000.00, using the grant funds of \$19,030 plus any City funds needed up to that amount and to use Jacob & Martin to do the required engineering and obtain contractor proposals for approval by the Council. Fortune seconded and motion carried.

A resolution authorizing Ray Purvis to act on behalf of the City of Cross Plains/Senior Citizens Center to negotiate a contract or contracts with the Texas Department of Aging and Disability Services (DADS) was read. Cassle moved to pass said resolution. Terrell seconded and motion carried.

Doug Campbell, representative of AMA TechTel was present at the meeting to go over services of internet and telephone for the Cross Plains Community. He advised the council that they would be bringing fiber-optic to the City Hall and provide a generator for emergency services. He discussed the charges of phone and internet services for the citizens and advised the council that for Senior Citizens the fee for both services will be \$35 and for citizens not considered senior citizens the cost would be \$50 for both services. He advised the council that they hope to be up and running by August. The council thanked Mr. Campbell for the update on the system.

Discussion was held concerning scanning documents for the reduction of paper and also for audit purposes. No further discussion was held or decision made.

Other discussion included the relay switch that signals the pumps to turn on and off at the pump house. It was noted that the switch is not working properly and only one pump is being used at this time. Gosnell informed the council that a new control panel was put in by Leonard Irrigation and MGM Controls has been down to trouble shoot the problem but have not come up with a solution. Gosnell is to check with the City Engineer on what other cities our size are doing or other possible solutions.

Fortune moved to adjourn. Cassle seconded and motion carried.

Aermotor Windmills Are Made in Texas — San Angelo is home to the Aermotor Windmill Company. "They're built right here and we ship them all over the world," says Bob Bracher, president and part owner of Aermotor. "We ship to about 25 different countries and every state in the union."

When I toured the factory, shipments were getting ready to ship to Russia and Africa. He says Russia has ordered a bunch of them because they're building up their cattle over there. Several of them are going to Nigeria, where clean water is in short supply. The company has 30 employees who turn out thousands of windmills a year.

"We build six different sizes of windmills," says Bob. "The diameter of the wheel is the way we classify them. They're 6 feet, 8, 10, 12, 14 and 16. The 16's will pump to a thousand feet. The most popular is the 8 feet windmill, which fully installed sells for \$7,500. "It'll go down 175 feet." Bob says Aermotor

is the only windmill company in Texas and one of only two such enterprises in the United States. "We're the last one that is a full service line, but there is one in Nebraska named Dempster and we compete against some knock-off windmills made in Mexico, Argentina and China.

Our company was started in 1888 in Chicago and operated there for years, and then somebody decided to move it to Argentina. They got kicked out of the country and the Argentineans took their patents and products and started making windmills. They moved back to the United States and in 1983 made some changes to make the units more efficient. They were in a few states before coming to San Angelo in 1986. We've been here ever since." Bob knows windmills. He grew up on a ranch and still ranches near Fort McKavett. He has five windmills on his property. Many parts for the windmills are made at the factory in San Angelo. "They're made right here.

Everything we use is made in the USA by American workers. We don't use anything foreign. We don't even use foreign bolts. We're a true American company."

Windmills are strong symbols of independence. Bob says some people think the railroads settled the west, but actually it was the windmills because the railroads had to have windmills to run the trains. The windmills also gave ranchers and farmers the ability to establish agricultural pursuits. Once a windmill is installed, it stays there for a long time. Some of Bob's customers in the panhandle use Aermotor windmills that are a hundred years old. For some, the windmill is nostalgic.

"A lot of people grew up on a farm or remember seeing a windmill on their grandfather's farm. They'll come in and buy a windmill and put it up, sometimes to pump water, sometimes just to see it and listen to it creak."

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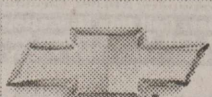

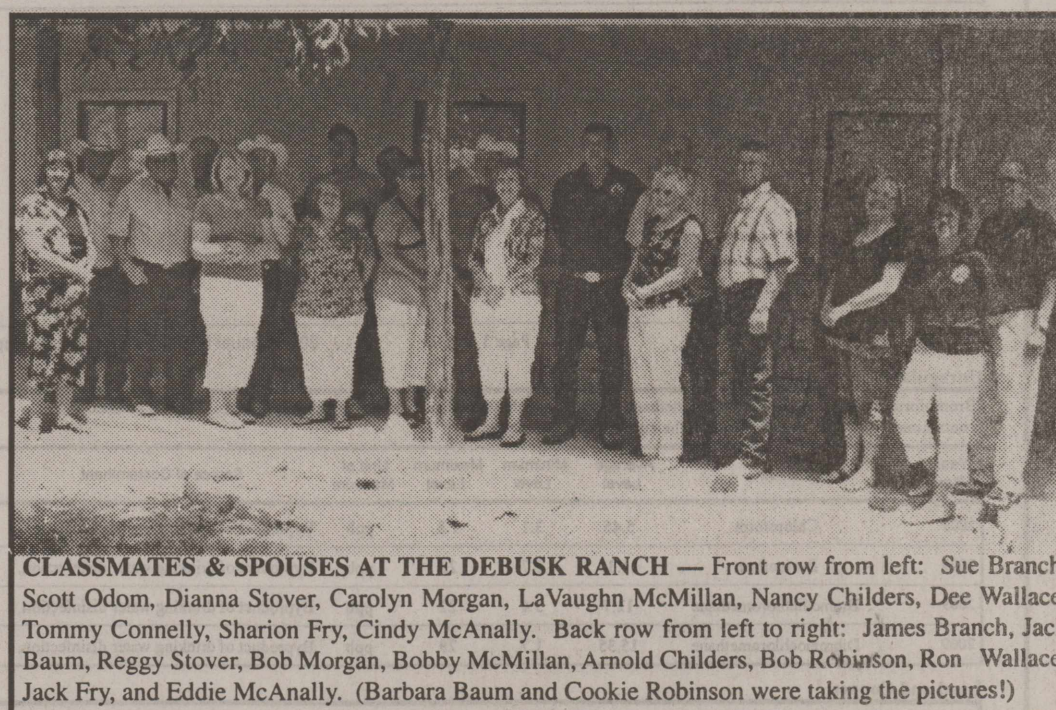

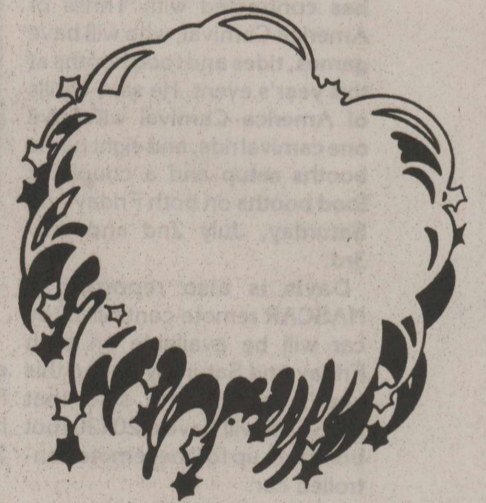

Events planned from 10-10 Friday and Saturday Food, music and fireworks highlight Festival at Clyde Lake

The City of Clyde Festival at the Lake will be held from 10:00 a.m. until 10:00 p.m. this Friday and Saturday, July 2nd and July 3rd at Clyde Lake located off FM 604, seven miles south of Clyde.

The City of Clyde employees have been sponsoring the Festival at Clyde Lake since taking over the event from the Clyde Lions Club several years ago.

According to one of this year's event organizers, Terry Davis, this year's festival will be a two-day event on Friday and Saturday, July 2nd and July 3rd.

Davis said events will be held throughout both days on Friday and Saturday.

The event organizer said the City of Clyde is planning to have its annual festival on two-days every year from now on. He said when a July 4th holiday falls earlier in the week, the Festival at Clyde Lake event will be on a Friday and Saturday on the Fourth of July weekend.

Davis also said the City of Clyde has contracted with Thrills of America Carnival, who will have games, rides and food booths at this year's event. He said Thrills of America Carnival will have one carnival ride, and eight game booths setup and a couple of food booths on both Friday and Saturday, July 2nd and July 3rd.

Davis is also reporting a NASCAR remote controlled toy car will be available on both Friday and Saturday during this year's festival. He said that NASCAR will have a 20x20 foot booth set up for the remote controlled car.

Davis said there are now enough food vendors which will sell items at this year's event, however he said they are still taking reservations for anyone who wishes to sell merchandise at the event. Davis said that merchandise booths in the 12x12 foot size can be rented for \$40.

Davis said that according to the food vendors who have already signed up, food items will include hamburgers, hot dogs, bar-b-que sandwiches, pork and sausage on a stick, pop corn, cotton candy, stuffed jalapeno peppers, roasted corn, funnel cakes and soft drinks and water.

Anyone wanting any information about this year's cook-off should contact Terry Davis at (325) 893-4234.

Davis also said forms on this year's cook-off are available on the City of Clyde's website located at <http://www.clyde.govoffice2.com/>.

The city festival organizer said unfortunately, because of the low water level at Clyde Lake, this year's bass tournament has been cancelled. He said because the lake level is so low, boats can not launch from the lake's boat ramp.

Davis said on Friday, July 2nd, the Festival at Clyde Lake cook-off will take place. He said

entry deadline is at 5:00 p.m. on Friday, July 2nd and awards will be announced at 4:00 p.m. on Saturday, July 3rd.

The event organizer said categories at this year's cook-off will include chicken, pork spare ribs, brisket, Jackpot Beans and Jackpot Desserts. A \$20.00 entry fee per category is required. Prizes will be awarded, however the amount of prizes will depend on the entries. Davis said they will pay out 100% of the entry fees to the first, second and third place in each category.

Davis reports some of the cook-off judges scheduled to appear this year include KTXS news anchor Wayne McCormick, Kelly Jay with KBCY radio, Terry Kellan with KBCY radio, and Doug Mitchel with KTXS television.

The event organizer said they currently have one campsite available for a cook-off team, but that if more cook-off teams sign up, they will move those teams to the tent area at Clyde Lake.

He reported that Cumulus radio station 99.7 will have a live remote at both days of this year's Festival at Clyde Lake. Davis said the radio station will also have a cook-off team entered in this year's cook-off.

Davis said that live music will be featured on both days and residents are asked to bring your lawn chairs to listen to the live music. He said on Friday, July 2nd, the Dave Hobbs Band will be playing from 7:00 p.m. until 10:00 p.m.

On Saturday, July 3rd, bands will also be performing live all day. Davis said bands currently enlisted to play include: Last Not Lost, Zach Harmon, Dave

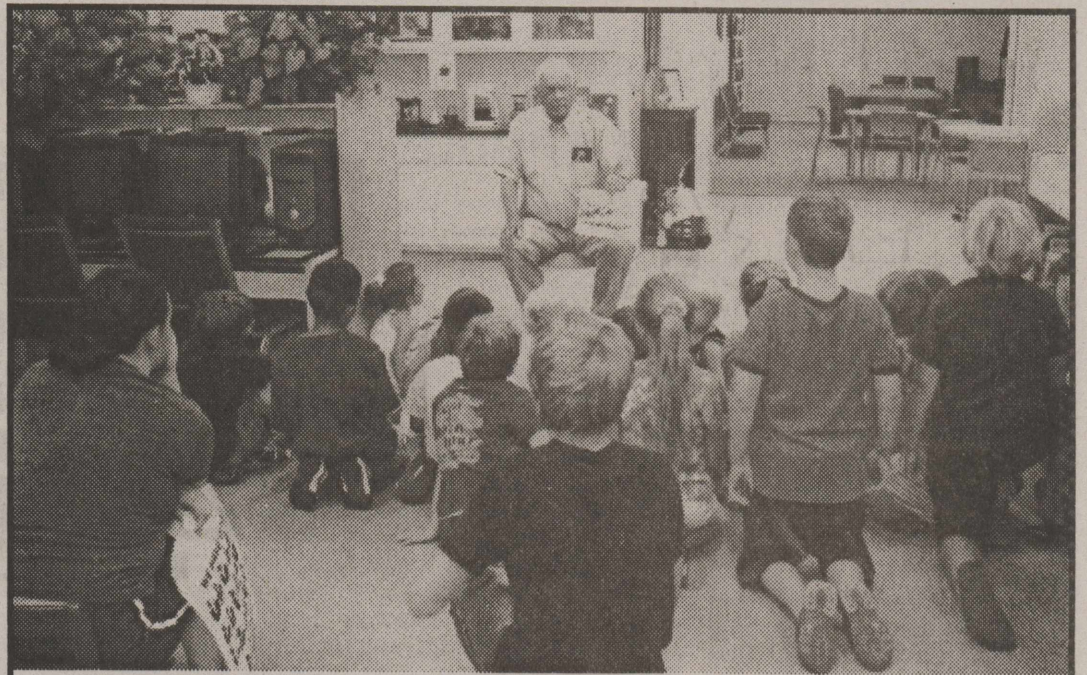
Hobbs Band, Callahan Divide, and Bo McDowell.

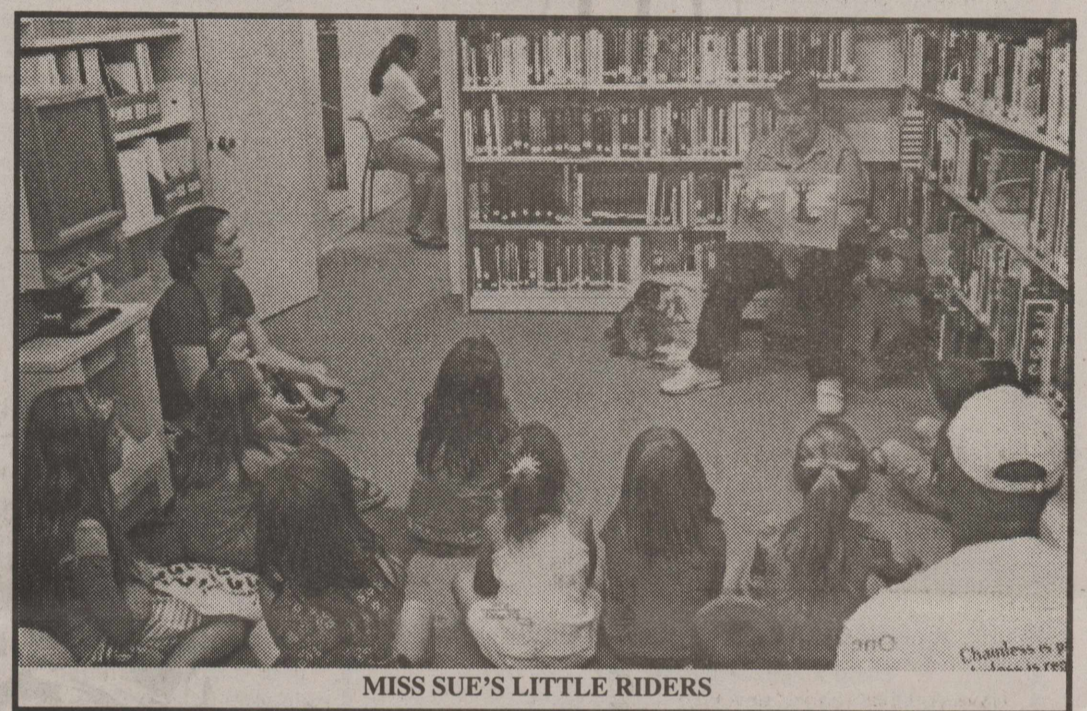

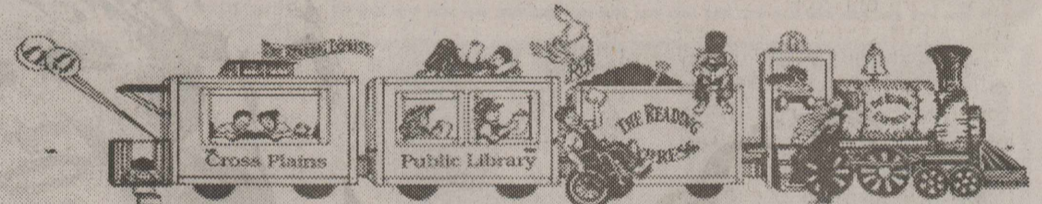

FSA County Committee Election

The election of agricultural producers to Farm Service Agency (FSA) county committees is important to ALL farmers and ranchers, whether beginning or long-established, with large or small operations. It is crucial that every eligible producer participate in these elections because FSA county committees are a link between the agricultural community and the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).

County committee members are a critical component of the operations of FSA. They help deliver FSA farm programs at the local level. Farmers and ranchers who serve on county committees help with the decisions necessary to administer the programs in their counties. They work to make FSA agricultural programs serve the needs of local producers.

County committees provide local input on:

Commodity price support loans and payments

Conservation programs
Incentive, indemnity and disaster payments for some commodities

Emergency programs
Payment eligibility

FSA county committees operate within official regulations designed to carry out federal laws. County committee members apply their judgment and knowledge to make local decisions.

To become a nominee, eligible individuals must sign nomination form FSA-669A. The form includes a statement that the nominee agrees to serve if elected. This form is

available at USDA Service Centers and online at: <http://www.fsa.usda.gov/elections>
Nomination forms for the 2010 election must be postmarked or received in the local USDA Service Center by close of business on Aug. 2, 2010.

Agricultural producers who participate or cooperate in an FSA program may be nominated for candidacy for the county committee. Individuals may nominate themselves or others as a candidate. Additionally, organizations representing minority and women farmers or ranchers may nominate candidates. Nomination forms are filed for the county committee of the office that administers a producer's farm records.

Ballots will be mailed to voters by Nov. 5, 2010, and must be returned to the FSA county office or postmarked by Dec. 6, 2010. Eligible voters must contact their local FSA county office before the final date if they did not receive a ballot.

Agricultural producers of legal voting age may be eligible to vote if they participate or cooperate in any FSA program. A person who is not of legal voting age but supervises and conducts the farming operations of an entire farm may also be eligible to vote. More information about voting eligibility requirements can be found in the FSA fact sheet titled "FSA County Committee Election - Eligibility to Vote and Hold Office as a County Committee Member." Producers may contact their local USDA Service Center for more information.

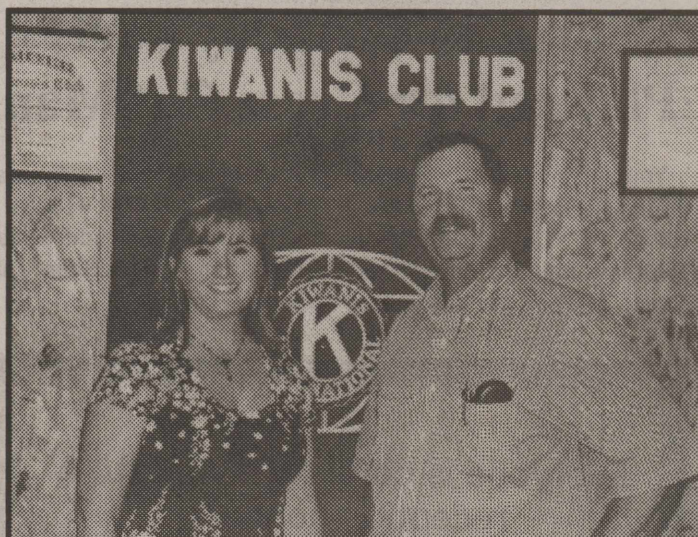
