## King House Fire Sparks Need for More City Police City Property Tax Rates and Trash Cost Increased

A regular meeting of the Cross Plains City Council met with members Mayor Ray Purvis, Lewis Fortune, Peg Terrell, Bob Kirkham, Colby Walker and Jerry Cassle present. Employees in attendance were Debbie Gosnell, Teresa Kennedy, Stuart Sowell, Doug Dugger and Don Gosnell. Members of the public included Mark Norris, Era Lee Hanke, Terry and Betty Lichty, Benny Callaway, Lucille Koenig, Gerald Brown, Terri Brown, Gilbert Ibarra, Louis Grindstaff, Jim Grindstaff, Diane Smith, Arnie Smith, Brian Smith, Norma Farmer, Jan Yeager, Allen Phillips, Alfred Birch, Ricky Carouth and David Estes.

Terry Lichty met with the council to discuss the King house fire that occurred on May 23, 2010. Mr. Lichty stated that the fire at the home of his wife's late parents, was an act of vandalism. He noted that he would like to have police on duty and patrolling at night for the protection of our community. He wanted to let the council know that he has been out on occasion and sees kids running the streets at all hours of the night. He also questioned the council on the possibility of a curfew for the youth. Mr. Lichty then read the letter he had previously ran in the *Cross Plains Review*.

Betty Lichty started out by letting the council know that the statements she wanted to make were her own opinion and not influenced by her husband. Mrs. Lichty stated that her car had been broken into about 3 months prior to this incident and that the King house had also been broken into before it was burned. She also mentioned the fact that kids ran

the street at all hours and there had been several burglaries committed against other local citizens.

Mrs. Lichty also questioned the council on why they were not hiring an experienced officer now, instead of waiting on someone new who was going to school and being trained to patrol the community.

Alfred Birch stated that he did not believe that Officer Don Gosnell was at fault, he also commented that he knew there were complaints about Jerad Potter being trained as a new officer. He felt it was the best decision for the community to have an officer that planned on raising his family in Cross Plains.

Verna Mathews stated she, like most other citizens, have seen the community grow over the years and would like to continue to see it grow. But as Cross Plains grows she thought we need more police protection at all hours and not just during the day. Mrs. Mathews also stated that she did not believe that the King house fire was Officer Gosnell's fault. At this time City Administrator Debbie Gosnell stated that there has been a lot of community disapproval about hiring a second officer.

Officer Gosnell addressed the council and stated that he had spoken with surrounding area Police Departments who have 24 police surveillance and they have the same problems as Cross Plains. He stated he may not catch the suspect in the act, but he does have a 90 percent conviction rate, which is better than most surrounding communities. Officer Gosnell also stated he was on vacation at the time of the King house fire, but the suspects have been caught and he is filing charges against them in juvenile

and criminal courts.

By general consent the council approved the new property tax rate to change from 0.3802 to 0.39857.

Under citizens comments David Estes, representing Texas Heritage Bank, wanted the Council to know that the bank needed a written agreement made with the City for the use of the Community Center as a secondary location for the bank to conduct business in case of an emergency.

Members of the Cross Plains and Cottonwood Volunteer Fire Departments discussed the need for a location between Cross Plains and Cottonwood for the fire trucks to refill with water. City Administrator Debbie Gosnell stated that the city would like to see this need met. She would like to meet with both fire chiefs and go over all the options and get back to the council at next months meeting.

Allen Phillips, representing Jacob and Martin Engineers, wanted to go over the current infrastructure of the City's water system, sewer system, street system, drainage system and show them (with the use of maps) the current systems and then on a new map the proposed upgrades. Mr. Phillips stated he had been working closely with the city employees to take care of the needs of the citizens using the existing structures. All maps were left with the council for discussion.

The city administrator informed the council that Allied Waste would be increasing their cost to \$0.28 to all customers as of October 1, 2010. By general consent the council approved this increase.

Mark Norris ask the council to consider changing the current

## Cross Plains I.S.D. Classes Begin Monday

Monday, August 23rd, marks the first day of school at Cross Plains I.S.D. Classes begin a little earlier at 7:55 a.m. and dismiss at 3:35 p.m. for elementary students. High school students meet at 7:55 a.m. and dismiss at 3:38 p.m.

In an effort to provide a safer environment for all students and staff, the only area for dropping students off is in front of the school on Main Street. Upon arrival students will go to the cafeteria and high school students

will go to the area between the office and library. The parking lot behind the cafeteria/auditorium area will become a one-way traffic area for busses. All vehicular traffic is to enter behind the auditorium (north end of the complex) and will exit between the Ag barn and gym. All traffic will move from north to south only. Parking at H.S. remains the same.

The administration at Cross Plains I.S.D. takes a pro-active

approach to the educational needs of their students and also to any safety concerns of the students, their parents, and the community. The district would like to remind the public of the policy when visiting any school campus.

The School Safety Center requires that signs be posted on the campus stating that "All visitors must sign in at the office". This is not just a sign, it is a legal requirement. Even in a community where we know everyone, it is required that EVERY visitor to a campus sign-in at the office and receive a visitor pass before going to ANY part of the building. If these rules are not followed, district personnel will ask the visitor to leave or take the visitor to the office to sign-in or call appropriate law enforcement officials. This is for the safety and security of all students, faculty and staff. The Cross Plains I.S.D. appreciates everyone abiding by these rules as we work every day to keep our children safe while providing a quality education for all students.

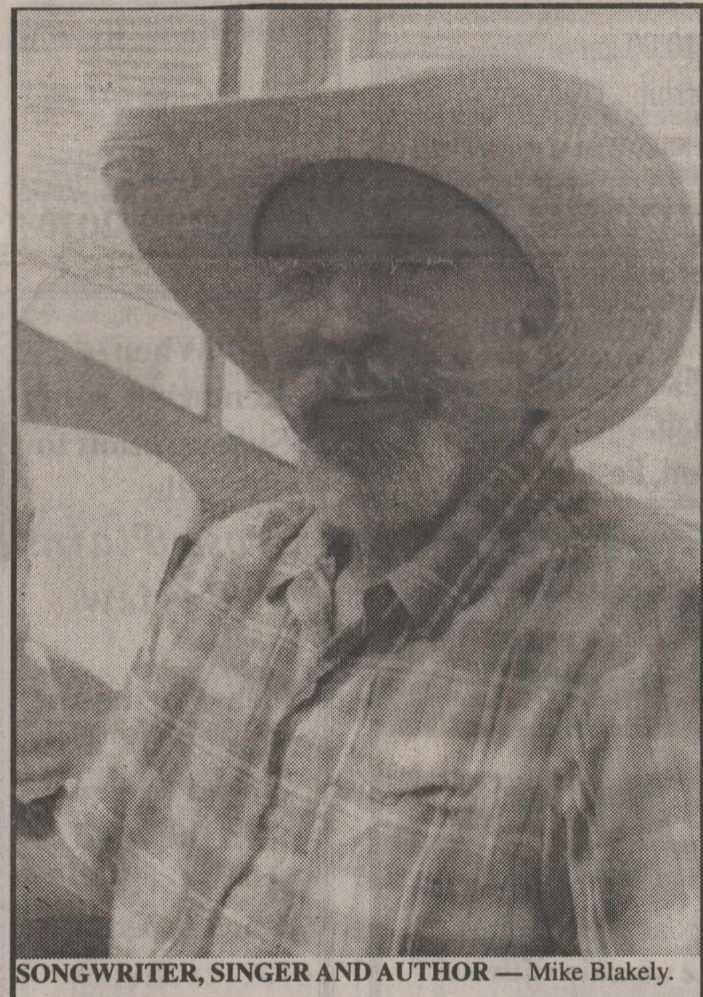

## Blood Donations Needed at Meek Blood Center

The Meek Blood Center bloodmobile will be at First Baptist Church in Cross Plains on Tuesday, August 24 from noon until 6:00 p.m. Eighteen donors participated in the blood drive in Cross Plains on June 29, resulting in thirteen pints of blood. Those who gave blood on June 29 will be eligible to donate again on August 24.

"Blood donations dropped dramatically this summer," said Frances Baker, donor recruiter. "The blood supply is critically low and all blood types are needed. The need for blood is always there. There are many patients who depend on volunteer blood donors to save or sustain their lives while they receive treatment for cancer, illnesses, surgeries and injuries. Many lives would be lost needlessly unless blood is available when it is needed," Baker continued.

Donors must be at least 17 years old (age 16 with signed parental consent), weigh a minimum of 120 pounds and in general good health. All donors must present a photo ID. # Hunter Education Courses starting now

AUSTIN—As summer winds down and fall starts to approach, so too does the beginning of hunting season, and Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is encouraging hunters who need to take the mandatory hunter education course to start looking for courses in their area.

Courses in many counties are starting this month, and the number will begin to taper off as hunting season nears.

Terry Erwin, coordinator for hunter education at TPWD, said courses are scheduled daily, so he advises interested hunters to check the calendar online frequently for the latest updates of courses in their area. By law, the agency is required to offer the hunter education course at least once in each county every year.

"Nobody in the state should have to drive far to find a course," Erwin said.

Hunters can take the traditional two-day course that must be spread over a minimum of ten hours during that time, or they can opt to take the knowledge-base portion online then attend one day of training in the field. The hunter education course costs \$15, but there are often separate facility-use or range fees associated with the course.

To pass the course, students must take a 50-question

written exam and get 70 percent correct if they take the traditional two-day course or 80 percent if they take the course online. The certification is valid for life and will be honored in all other states.

Anyone born after Sept. 1, 1971, is required to take the Hunter Education Training Course to hunt in Texas, and individuals as young as 9 can take the course.

Erwin said the agency is currently printing hunters' certification numbers on their licenses, eliminating the need for hunters to carry their certificate of completion with them into the field. Hunting licenses for the 2010-2011 season go on sale on Aug. 15th.

Hunters who are at least 17 years old and have not completed the hunter education course can defer completion for one year. However, hunters who took a deferral last year must complete the course this year to hunt legally this season.

"The deferral is only available once," Erwin said. "The license point-of-sale vendors are not allowed to sell a deferral once it has been purchased by an individual."

A database keeps track of hunters who have previously opted for a deferral and will not allow a second deferral to be

sold to an individual.

As a result of hunter education courses, hunting-related accident rates in Texas have noticeably decreased since 1966 when 12 accidents per 100,000 hunters were reported. This rate has decreased to 2.9 accidents per 100,000 hunters during the last four years. In fact, based on 100,000 participants, football players are more than 390 times likely to be injured in their sport than are hunters.

"Our focus is to keep students safe in the field," he said.

Erwin said the agency is also looking for volunteers to become certified instructors of the hunter education course.

Michael Palmer was raised in Clyde, TX and graduated from Clyde High School.

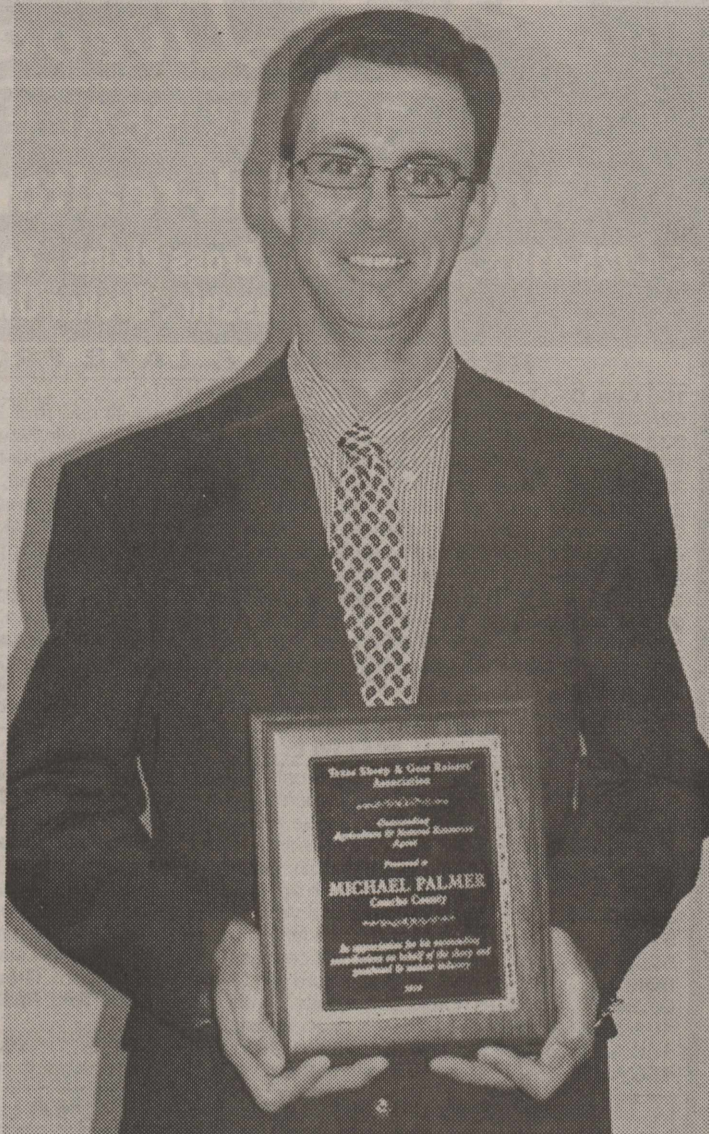

## AEP Texas Reminds Electricity Users to Always Call 811 Before Digging

Austin, Texas (Aug. 10, 2010)— AEP Texas urges all electricity users to us the 8/11 calendar date as a natural reminder for residents to call 811 prior to any digging projects to have underground utility lines marked. The need for this reminder is reinforced by a recent report from the Common Ground Alliance, which determined an underground utility line is damaged during digging projects once every three minutes nationwide.

When you call 811, homeowners and contractors are connected to the local one-call center, which notifies the appropriate utility companies of their intent to dig. Professional locators are then sent to the requested digging site to mark the approximate locations of the underground lines with flags, spray paint or both.

Striking a single line can cause death or injury, repair costs, fines and inconvenient outages. Every digging project, no matter how large or small, warrants a call to 811.

Installing a mailbox, building a deck, planting a tree and laying a patio are all examples of digging projects that need a call to 811 before starting. Callers should contact the 811 Call Center at least two days prior to any planned digging. In some areas, the 811 phone number may not work, and in these cases, please call 800-344-8377.

"On August 11 and throughout the year, we remind homeowners

and professional contractors alike to call 811 for digging to greatly reduce the risk of striking an underground utility line," said David Hooper, vice-president of Distribution Services for AEP Texas. "Failure to call before digging results in more than 60,000 unintentional contacts with underground utility lines annually. We value the safety of our customers and our employees and do not want anyone's project to become part of this troubling statistic."

The depth of utility lines can vary for a number of reasons, such as erosion, previous digging projects and uneven surfaces. Utility lines needed to be properly marked because even when digging only a few inches, the risk of striking an underground utility line still exists.

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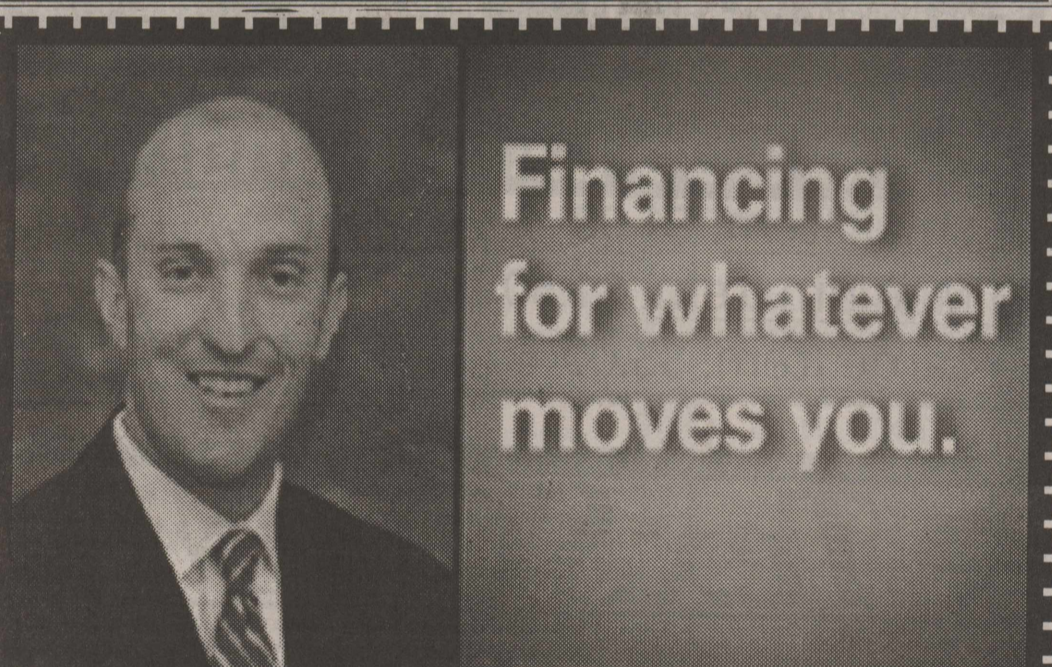
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## Jerry Warren selected as new County Extension Agent

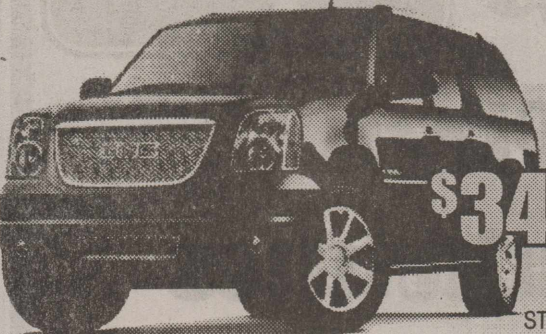

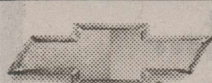

In a crowded situation like a mall or standing in line for a movie, the boys thought nothing of linking arms with their dark shades in place and waving the white cane around in front of them. Teresa added that the maneuver cleared the way in a hurry.

Raul laughed about the time a scorpion stung Nicholas and he ran screaming from the room. Running in to see what the ruckus was all about, Raul asked Michael where Nicholas went. The quick response was, "And you expect me to know?"

Being visually impaired did not deter Michael and Jessica from enjoying every aspect of the Museum. Michael has been an avid fan of Howard's writings since he was a young boy and has dreamed of visiting Cross Plains

for years. When he was invited to touch one of the maps that Howard had created as a fictional land for a number of his stories, Michael rapidly moved his fingers over the map, identifying each area and story line.

The Espinozas are both in education: Kerri in her 24th year of teaching English at Buda High School and Jesus has been the Principal at one of Round Rock's High Schools for 20 years. Saldivar works for the ASML Technology Manufacturer in Austin where they produce semi-conductors and Teresa is the manager in the collection department of the IRS in Austin.

Both families were able to check out our Public Library for additional Howard resources before grabbing a bite to eat and heading on their way. Both young men are planning to return to Cross Plains next June for the annual Howard Days.

New law offers one time \$250 rebate checks for eligible medicare beneficiaries

## Affordable Care Act offers Prescription Drug Cost Relief to 42,247 Texas Medicare beneficiaries

Today, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius announced that the third round of one-time, tax-free \$250 rebate checks have been mailed to eligible Medicare beneficiaries whose drug costs are so high they have reached the Medicare Part D prescription drug coverage gap known as the "donut hole."

Experts estimate that more than a quarter of Part D enrollees hit the donut hole and often stop following their drug regimen as a result of the added cost burden.

The \$250 rebates will go a long way in preventing seniors from having to make such difficult and almost certainly harmful health decisions.

In Texas, 42,247 seniors and persons with disabilities who rely on Medicare for access to health care have received new help with their prescription drug costs to date, thanks to the Affordable Care Act.

Across the country, more than 750,000 Medicare beneficiaries have already received checks this year, and more beneficiaries will be receiving checks in the coming months as they enter the coverage gap.

"High prescription drugs costs are a problem for many seniors and other Medicare enrollees with limited incomes," said Secretary Sebelius.

"These checks are an important first step in helping them afford the medications they need - and are evidence of how Americans are already seeing the very real benefits of the Affordable Care Act. From strengthening the long-term future of Medicare as evidenced by the recent Medicare Trustees report, to saving seniors and the disabled money on everything from prescription drug costs to preventive services, the Affordable Care Act is helping to preserve and protect Medicare."

The rebate checks will partly close the donut hole this year, with the \$250 one-time checks for beneficiaries who enter the gap. In 2011, the Affordable Care Act takes an additional step for Medicare beneficiaries in the donut hole by providing them with a 50 percent discount on their brand name medications.

Every year from 2011 to 2020, the Affordable Care Act will take progressive steps to close the donut hole.

In addition to savings on prescription drugs, the new law takes a series of steps to strengthen Medicare. Under the Affordable Care Act:

Medicare beneficiaries will receive free preventive care services like mammograms and certain colon cancer tests and a free annual physical starting in 2011.

By 2018, seniors can expect to save on average almost \$200 per year in premiums compared to what they would have paid without the new law, and most beneficiaries will also see a significant reduction in their Medicare coinsurance as a result of the Affordable Care Act.

The life of the Medicare Trust Fund is extended by 12 years. "These checks represent just one way that Medicare is going to work better for seniors and persons with disabilities under the Affordable Care Act," said Don Berwick, administrator for the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services.

Seniors will see lower prescription drug costs when they are in the donut hole, preventive services and annual wellness visits without cost-sharing, and higher quality care.

And our efforts to crack down on fraud and waste are making beneficiaries safer and Medicare stronger financially, adding years to the Medicare trust funds."

"Often, seniors reach the donut hole because they are on costly medications to help them manage chronic conditions such as high blood pressure or diabetes," said Kathy Greenlee, assistant secretary for aging. "These checks will help America's seniors afford the medications they need to manage those illnesses, keeping them healthy and improving their quality of life."

Medicare beneficiaries who do not already receive Medicare's Extra Help receive these checks automatically in the mail when they reach the donut hole; there is no requirement to sign up.
