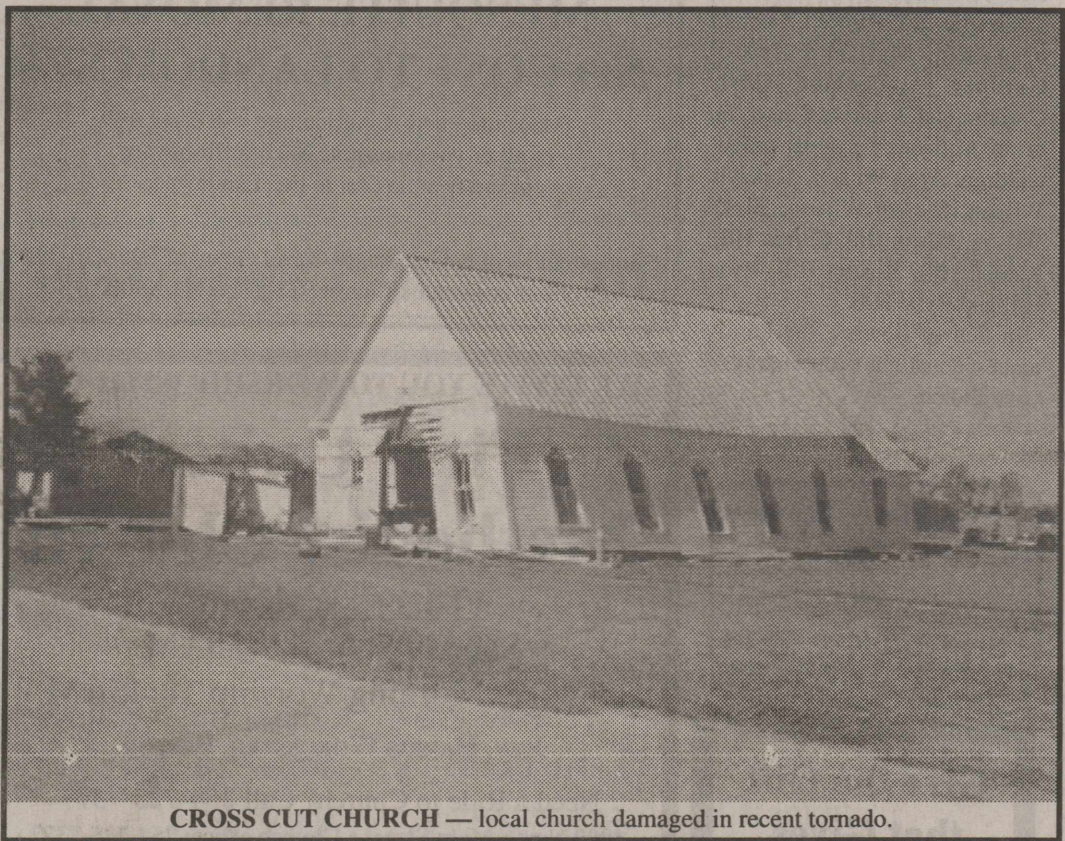

Second Tornado hits Cross Cut Baptist Church

Tuesday, August 24th, a storm started brewing around 3 p.m. in the east. Tornadoic winds proved strong enough to move the Cross Cut Baptist Church completely off its foundation. The stained glass windows, donated and installed by Mike and Bonnie Rogers, were broken out and the entrance way to the front door was completely removed from the rest of the building.

The electricity was out for over 30 minutes in Cross Plains. No electricity plays havoc with the electronic devices used daily in

most businesses. Their cash registers would not work and many businesses closed down temporarily until the energy was restored.

The first time the little church was hit by a tornado was the infamous 1994 tornado that produced so much damage in the Cross Plains area.

Scott and Keeka Byrd, of the Cross Cut Community, own the church building which they have utilized the past 14 years for an Easter service for relatives and friends. The church was actually a wedding gift from Scott to Keeka.

Juanita Byrd, mother of Scott,

remarked, "This will probably be the end of the church this time. I was at home when it hit and I didn't think it seemed like much." However her garage was basically destroyed by the wind.

Several homes in the vicinity of the church received some roof damage, etc.

A restoration project had produced donated furniture, fixtures and Cross Cut memorabilia that was displayed there. It was the only public historical building in the Cross Cut community. The sanctuary was dedicated to the memory of Scott's father, Jack C. Byrd and his mother, Juanita.

Earlier that morning there will be a Ranch Horse Competition, beginning at 9 a.m.

Responders during this day, but this is also an opportunity to reflect back on the memories of any special person who has touched your life. Cross Plains I.S.D. Enrollment up 6 Students in 2010 from 2009

Clyde CISD reported the largest student enrollment gain of the four Callahan County public school districts to report enrollment during the first day of school on Monday, August 23rd.

Clyde CISD, and Cross Plains ISD all saw student enrollment jumps for 2010 compared to the first day of school in 2009, while Baird ISD and Eula ISD both reported student enrollment declines compared to 2009.

Clyde CISD reported the largest student enrollment increase with a jump of 32 students compared to last year.

Clyde High School's enrollment, for grades ninth through twelfth, for 2010 was 418 students. That's up 17 students from 401 students at the first day of school in 2009.

Clyde Junior High School, with grades sixth, seventh and eighth, reported first day enrollment of 338 students in 2010. That's down six students compared to 344 students enrolled at the first day of school in 2009.

Clyde Intermediate School, which houses grades fourth and fifth, had enrollment of 325 students in 2010. Clyde Intermediate School reported 304 students in grades third, fourth and fifth last year.

With the construction of the new Clyde Elementary School, school officials reported 381 students in grades Pre-K through third grade. That total also includes 10 Clyde Head Start students enrolled through a joint agreement between Clyde CISD and the Head Start program.

Clyde Elementary School last year, which included Pre-K through second grade, had 381 students in 2009.

Eula ISD reported 374 students enrolled in the first day of classes in 2010, down nine students compared to 2009.

Eula High School, with grades ninth through twelfth, reported 109 students in 2010. EHS reported 112 students enrolled

in the first day of school in 2009.

Eula Junior High School, with grades seventh and eighth, reported 60 students in 2010, which is up 16 students compared to the 44 students in the first day of school in 2009.

Eula Elementary School, with grades Pre-K through sixth grade, reported 205 students enrolled in the first day of school in 2010. Eula Elementary School had 227 students enrolled in the first day of classes in 2009.

Cross Plains ISD reported 378 students in school the first day in 2010, which is up six students from the 372 reported during the first day in 2009.

Cross Plains High School, with grades seventh through twelfth, has 172 students in 2010. That compares to 147 students in 2009.

Cross Plains Elementary School, which includes students in Pre-K through sixth grade, reported 206 students in the first day of school in 2010. Cross Plains Elementary School

reported 225 students in 2009 in grades Pre-K through sixth grade.

Baird ISD reported the largest drop in student enrollment this year compared to 2009. Baird ISD reported 299 students for the first day of classes in 2010, down 35 students compared to 2009 when 336 students showed up for the first day of classes.

Baird High School, with grades ninth through twelfth, reported 97 students this year. Baird High School also reported 97 students for the first day of school in 2009.

Baird Middle School, with grades sixth, seventh, and eighth, reported 61 students in 2010. Baird Middle School reported 72 students for the first day of school in 2009.

Baird Elementary School, which includes grades Pre-K through fifth grade, reported 141 students this year. That's a drop of 24 students compared to 2009 when Baird Elementary School reported 165 students.

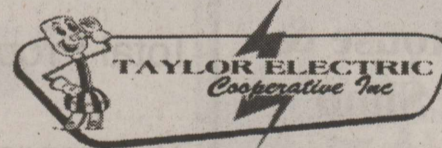
Children and Fences

The most frequent advice on raising children comes from those who do not have any, but there are some general good rules about children that everyone can use.

1. The greatest need of children is unconditional love. No matter what temperament a child demonstrates, he or she needs love.
2. No amount of words or discipline will be effective with a child that does not know he or she is loved.
3. Children need fences. A literal fence is sometimes handy, but we are talking here about boundaries in which a child is not allowed to cross without swift consequences. A child's natural selfish desires and curiosity will expose them needlessly to danger without enforced boundaries, (like little goats wandering off and eating the neighbors garden).
4. No adult can effectively set boundaries or discipline if they do not have a loving relationship with the child. A loving relationship demonstrates patience, forgiveness, fairness, gentleness, and self-control. Children test an adults' maturity in these areas constantly, thus we often "grow up again" when we raise children.
5. A child must have love. Gifts, toys, movies, televisions and video games are very poor substitutes. They leave a child empty with a sense of entitlement. Love must never be earned. THINGS MUST BE earned. Love is always a gift, without conditions, or it is not love, but selfish manipulation.

God's love is our example. It is forgiveness and patience with boundaries as simple as purity and as meaningful and complex as marriage. God's loving relationship with us is as necessary as a parent's, a teacher's, or one loving adult's relationship, is to a child.

Register Now for October ACT Test

IOWA CITY, IOWA—Registration is now open for the October 23, 2010 ACT achievement test. Students who wish to take the college admission and placement exam must register before September 17, 2010.

The ACT is a curriculum-based achievement exam. It tests what students have actually learned in school, not their aptitude for learning. The ACT also measures what students need to know to be ready for first year credit-bearing college courses based on ACT College Readiness Standards. Every student's results can be tied directly to these consistent standards.

The ACT has four sections, English, mathematics, reading and science and takes about three hours to complete. Students who take the ACT Plus Writing complete an optional writing test that requires an additional 30 minutes. Unlike other exams, students are not penalized for guessing or answering all the questions on each test section. In fact, it is beneficial for test takers to answer all questions within the time allowed.

During registration, students may select up to four universities to receive their score reports. ACT scores are accepted by all four-year colleges and universities across the United States. ACT

reports scores only when requested to do so by the student. Additional score reports are available for a small fee.

All students complete a detailed inventory of questions during ACT registration. Each test taker receives an ACT score report that includes a wide variety of information to assist with high school course selection, college readiness, career planning, and college admissions.

The cost for the ACT test without writing is \$33. When combined with the optional ACT Writing Test, the total cost is \$48. Students who qualify may apply for a fee waiver through their high school counselor.

The ACT website, www.actstudent.org, has helpful information, free sample items, and options to order inexpensive test prep materials to assist test takers get ready for the exam. However, the best preparation is to take rigorous core courses in school, study hard, and learn the academic skills needed in college.

Most students register online at www.actstudent.org. Students may also pick up registration forms from their high school counseling offices. Registration is available until October 1, 2010 for an extra \$21 fee.

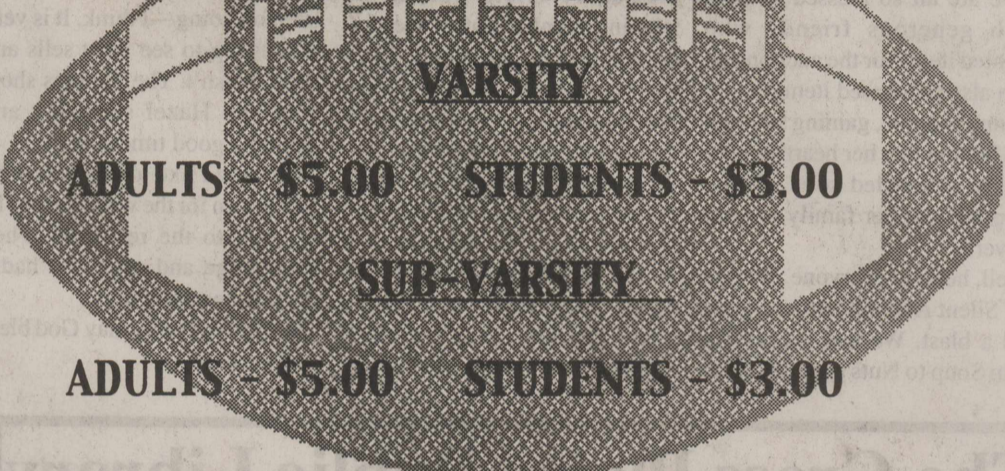
the children in Darfur, Sudan.

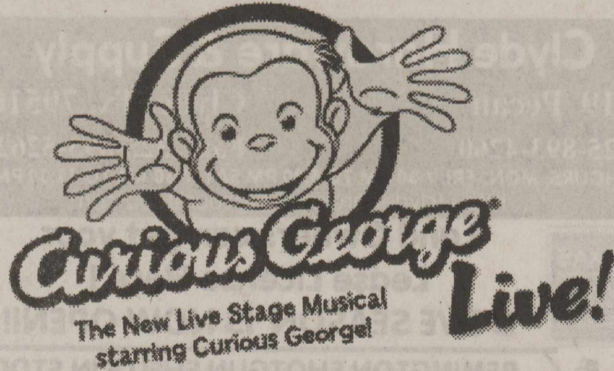

Cross Plains City Council Minutes

This was a regular meeting of the Cross Plains City Council. Members of the council present were Mayor Ray Purvis, Jerry Cassle, Lewis Fortune, Bob Kirkham & Peg Terrell. Employees present were Teresa Kennedy, Debbie Gosnell, & Don Gosnell. Members of the public meeting were Mark Norris, Era Lee Hanke, Danny Trowbridge, Cameron Gulley, Skeet & Wanda Walker. Ray Purvis called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. By general consent the council approved the minutes as presented. By general consent the council approved the police and judge's report as presented. Bob Kirkham moved to pay the bills. Jerry Cassle seconded and motion carried. Peg Terrell asked to go on record as being opposed to the fireworks display. She

commented that many of the citizens who lived through the 2005 wildfire are uneasy about the annual fireworks, even in wet years. She further stated that many of the municipalities in this area have obtained private underwriters or have begun using donations to purchase their fireworks. Cameron Gulley, city Auditor, met with the council and presented the 2009/2010 Annual Audit. Mr. Gulley commented that although reinstating the property tax was a difficult decision for the council that his opinion was that it was the most prudent thing to do and that with the additional revenue the City has been able to accomplish things that they were not able to accomplish in the past due to lack of revenue, mainly in street repair. He also commented that the 39 cent tax rate was very

commendable due to the fact that most cities in the area have a higher rate over 60 cents. He commented that the Senior Citizens Center had a \$7K deficit, and that all the tax revenue must be deposited in the General Fund and therefore the General Fund can begin taking care of the expenses that should have already been paid out of that fund. He reported that there were no material weakness (es) identified, no significant deficiency (ies) identified that are not considered to be material weaknesses, and no noncompliance material to financial statements noted.

At the close of his report he commented that he was pleased to see the improvements. Peg Terrell moved to accept the 2009/2010 audit as presented. Bob Kirkham seconded and motion

carried. Discussion was held concerning a complaint against the smell of the dumpsters at the convenience center by a neighboring citizen. The council discussed several possibilities where the center could be placed and also the fact that the smell may be coming from the sewer farm instead of the cans. Gosnell is to look into the matter and the discussion was tabled until the next regular meeting.

Skeet Walker met with the council again to discuss the purchase of the 60' Street known as SE 4th Street between Avenue C and Avenue B that separates his two pieces of property. Previous discussion had been held on the matter and Mr. Walker wanted to revisit the issue. He commented that since the Street in question is in a water way and unfit for automobile travel that he is very

interested in purchasing the property and willing to have the deed recorded that the City as well as other utility providers will have a R.O.W. access across the property and that no permanent building will be placed on this section of the property. However, he felt that the original price of \$2,000.00 plus attorney fees and associated costs was too high and asked the City to consider setting the minimum asking price for the property at \$1,000.00 plus attorney fees and any other associated cost. Mr. Walker understands that the street must be let for bids before the street can be sold. Bob Kirkham moved to reduce the minimum asking price to \$1,000.00. Jerry Cassle seconded and motion carried with Peg Terrell voting nay.

Discussion was held concerning passing a resolution closing a specific section of Avenue I. Lewis Fortune so moved, Bob Kirkham seconded and motion carried. The annual consumer confidence report was addressed; however no citizens were present for comment. Mark Norris met with the council to present them with the finalized Restroom facility plans for Treadway Park. He advised the council that the Restroom Committee has approved the plans as presented and if the council approves the plans he will present them to the EDC board on Thursday, July 15th, for their approval and if no changes are made, then it will be the restroom committee's recommendation to the council to advertise for bids at the September council meeting at which time the EDC Board will be present to discuss with the council all bids since this will be a joint effort between the City and the EDC. Norris also recom-

mended that all contractors' bidding on the job must be bonded and have builders insurance and a copy of the insurance must be submitted to City Hall prior to beginning the project. Jerry Cassle moved to approve the plans as presented contingent upon EDC approval. If changes are made, the new plans must be resubmitted to council for final approval. Lewis Fortune seconded and motion carried.

Peg Terrell moved to adjourn. Jerry Cassle seconded and motion carried.



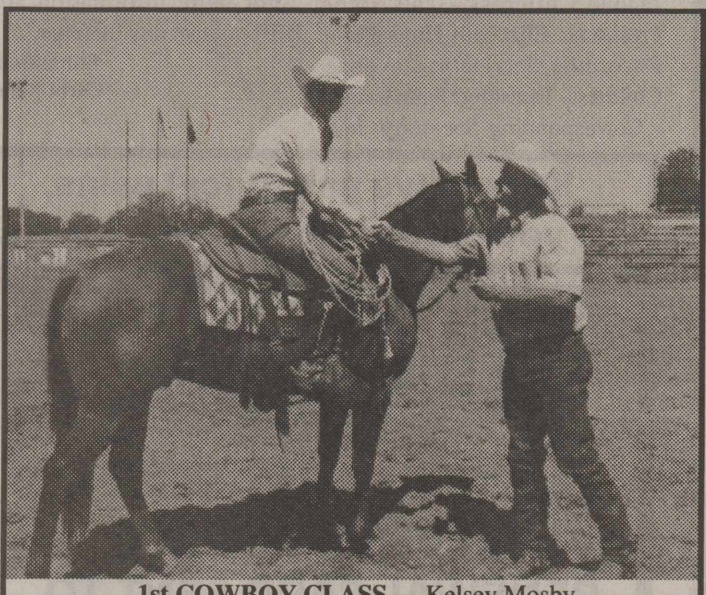

Commissioners approve petitions to hold wet/dry election in Clyde

The Callahan County Commissioners' Court voted to approve the certified petition for the Local Option election to legalize the sale of beer and wine for off-premise consumption only, as well as to legalize the sales of mixed beverages in restaurants by food and beverage certificate holders for the City of Clyde.

The commissioners' court took the action Monday, August 23rd during the court's monthly meeting held at the County Courthouse in Baird.

Tax Assessor/Collector Chief Deputy Debbie Hatchett presented both certified petitions to the commissioners' court Monday.

The first petition, for the Local Option Election to legalize the sales of mixed beverages in restaurants by food and beverage certificate holders for Tuesday, November 2nd for the City of Clyde was signed by 265 city residents. The petition required at least 241 signatures to be submitted. The commissioners' court then signed the order. The motion to approve the mixed beverages petition was made by Commissioner Bryan Farmer and seconded by Commissioner Tom Windham. The motion passed with a 4-1 vote, with Precinct #1 Commissioner Harold Hicks voting against the motion.

The second certified petition presented was for the Local Option Election to legalize the sale of beer and wine for off-premise consumption only for the City of Clyde on Tuesday, November 2nd. This petition, which required a minimum of 241 signatures, had a total of 267 city residents' signatures. The court then signed the order. The motion to approve the election for beer and wine sales for off-premise consumption was made by Commissioner Windham. Commissioner

Farmer seconded the motion and the motion was approved with a 4-1 vote. Precinct #1 Commissioner Harold Hicks cast the vote against the motion.

Other agenda items brought before the commissioners' court meeting included:

—Callahan County Judge Roger Corn called the regular commissioners' court meeting to order at 9:48 a.m. Those present included Precinct #1 Commissioner Harold Hicks, Precinct #2 Commissioner Bryan Farmer, Precinct #3 Commissioner Tom Windham, Precinct #4 Commissioner Cliff Kirkham, County Treasurer Dianne Gunter, and Deputy County Clerk Laurie Tollett.

—The minutes of the previous commissioners' court meetings were reviewed and signed.

—Under public comments, there were none.

—Doug Ford reported on the finances and daily operations of the Citizens Emergency Medical Service. He discussed running an ongoing informational article in the Baird Banner and Clyde Journal concerning 911 calls from cell phones. Mr. Ford also reported the recent purchase of a new ambulance. Commissioner Hicks made the motion to approve, with Commissioner Farmer seconding the motion. The motion carried with a 5-0 vote.

—Palace Drugstore in Rising Star has closed, and will be removed as a prescription provider under the Callahan County Indigent Health Care Resolution. Lawrence Brothers Pharmacy in Clyde will be approached to participate in the plan. Motion to approve was made by Commissioner Farmer and seconded by Commissioner Hicks. The motion carried with a 5-0 vote.

—The motion to adopt the Betty Hardwick MHMR Resolution was passed with a 5-0 vote.

The motion to approve the resolution was made by Commissioner Hicks and seconded by Commissioner Windham.

—Revisions and deletions to the Callahan County Employee Handbook were approved. The motion to approve the revisions and deletions were made by Commissioner Hicks and seconded by Commissioner Kirkham. The motion carried with a 5-0 vote.

—The Countywide Burn Ban has been reinstated. The motion to approve reinstating the burn ban was made by Commissioner Hicks and seconded by Commissioner Farmer. The motion was approved with a 5-0 vote.

—The ordering of the Tues-

day, November 2nd General Election of County and Precinct Officers was approved by a 5-0 vote. The motion to order the election was made by Commissioner Windham and seconded by Commissioner Kirkham.

—Commissioner Windham made a motion to pay the approved bills. There was a second by Commissioner Kirkham and the motion carried with a 5-0 vote.

—Commissioner Farmer made a motion to adjourn the commissioners' court meeting at 10:35 a.m. Commissioner Windham seconded the motion and the motion passed with a unanimous 5-0 vote.

Condition of County Road 100 discussed during Public Hearing

Callahan County Commissioners' Court held a second public hearing on a proposal to increase total tax revenues on Monday, August 23rd at the County Courthouse in Baird.

—Callahan County Judge Roger Corn called the public hearing of the commissioners' court meeting to order at 9:00 a.m.

—Commissioner Farmer made a motion to adjourn the public hearing at 10:35 a.m. Commissioner Kirkham seconded the motion and the motion passed with a unanimous 5-0 vote.

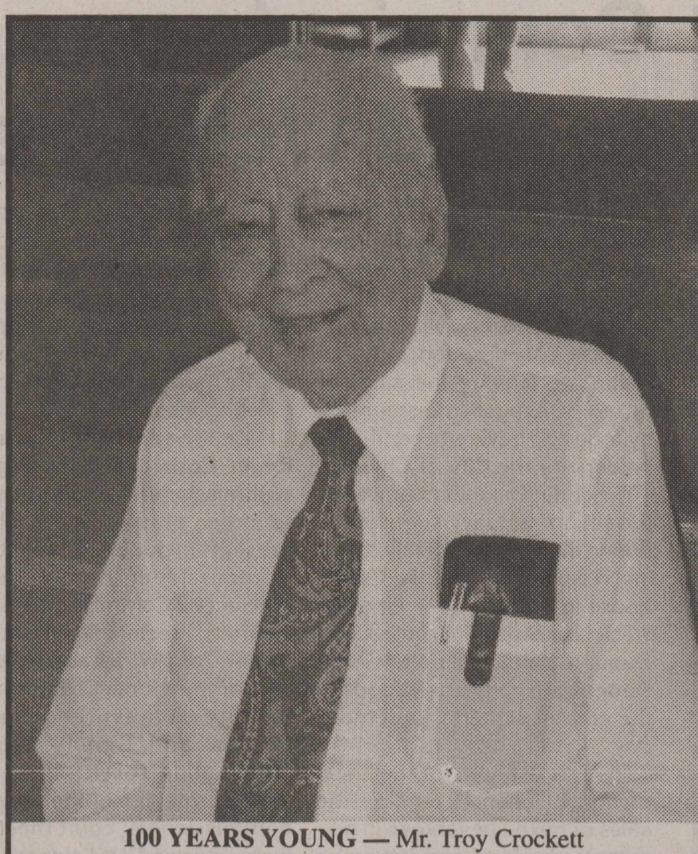
