



Opal Cox, age 100, of Necessity, died in her sleep on Sunday, August 29, 2010. Funeral services were held at 10 a.m., Thursday, September 2nd, at Necessity Baptist Church with Rev. Charles West and Rev. Joel D. Sanders officiating. Interment followed in the Necessity Cemetery under the direction of Morehart Mortuary.

Opal Elsie Satterwhite was born on December 21, 1909, in the Necessity Community of Stephens County, Texas, to parents, Benjamin Franklin Satterwhite and Fannie Clay More Satterwhite. Opal attended the Necessity School through the eight grade and went on to graduate from Breckenridge High School in 1927. She attended the College of Industrial Arts, which later became known as Texas Women's University of Denton. Opal married James D. "Jimmy" Cox on March 30, 1934 in Breckenridge. 





Statistics indicate that the Taylor County Expo foodborne illness continues to be a health issue in the United States. Each year, 1 in 4 Americans will become sick, 1 in 1,000 will become hospitalized, and 5,000 will die due to a foodborne illness.

e Health Services (DSHS) jurisdiction each food establishment is required to have one certified

food manager on site. Many of you have already received a letter from the Texas Department of State Health Services regarding this. Under these new rules, each food establishment permitted by the Texas Department of State Health Services must have one certified food manager. Food manager certificates will be

valid for 5 years. Texas AgriLife Extension Service, Taylor County, is offering a professional food manager certification training course. This program will be offered for \$110 on October 18 & 25 at Taylor County Extension Office located on

Grounds. Cost includes training, materials, and the State food manager certification examination. Registration deadline is October 1st.

If under the Texas not only prepare foodservice certification examination; it will provide valuable education regarding the safe handling of food. Almost 50 cents of every dollar Americans spend on food is spent on meals prepared away from home. Therefore, careful attention to food safety will help keep customers safe and satisfied.







Resource Care provides comprehensive primary health care services as well as supportive services (education, translation and transportation, etc.) that promote access to health care. Resource Care provides services available to all with fees adjusted based on a patient's ability to pay. Resource Care accepts Medicare, Medicaid, private pay, and most forms of health insurance.

Jones said Resource Care, which has been a non-profit for the past 15 years, will apply for federal-qualified funds to operate the clinic in Clyde. Jones, who has been with Resource Care six years, said federal funding for the Clyde clinic should be granted in November or December 2010. She said they're seeking \$650,000 in federal funds, which will be matched by grants and donations. She said funding to construct the building will be sought through separate funds to operate the clinic. She said Resource Care will be seeking additional funding though foundations, fund-raising, and

private donations. He said the health center will have a large waiting area for both medical and dental procedures. He said the plans include administrative offices for both doctors and dentists. He said the building will have two large exam rooms for installing dental chairs. He said the building plans include nine exam rooms, one procedure room for minor surgeries and stitches, and two of-

fices for health care counselors. Henson said to construct the building, Resource Care will fund it through cash on hand and a loan. He said Resource Care will also seek grant funds to equip the health center.

Henson said Resource Care has received no firm bids on what the building will cost. He said the design and facade are still in the
