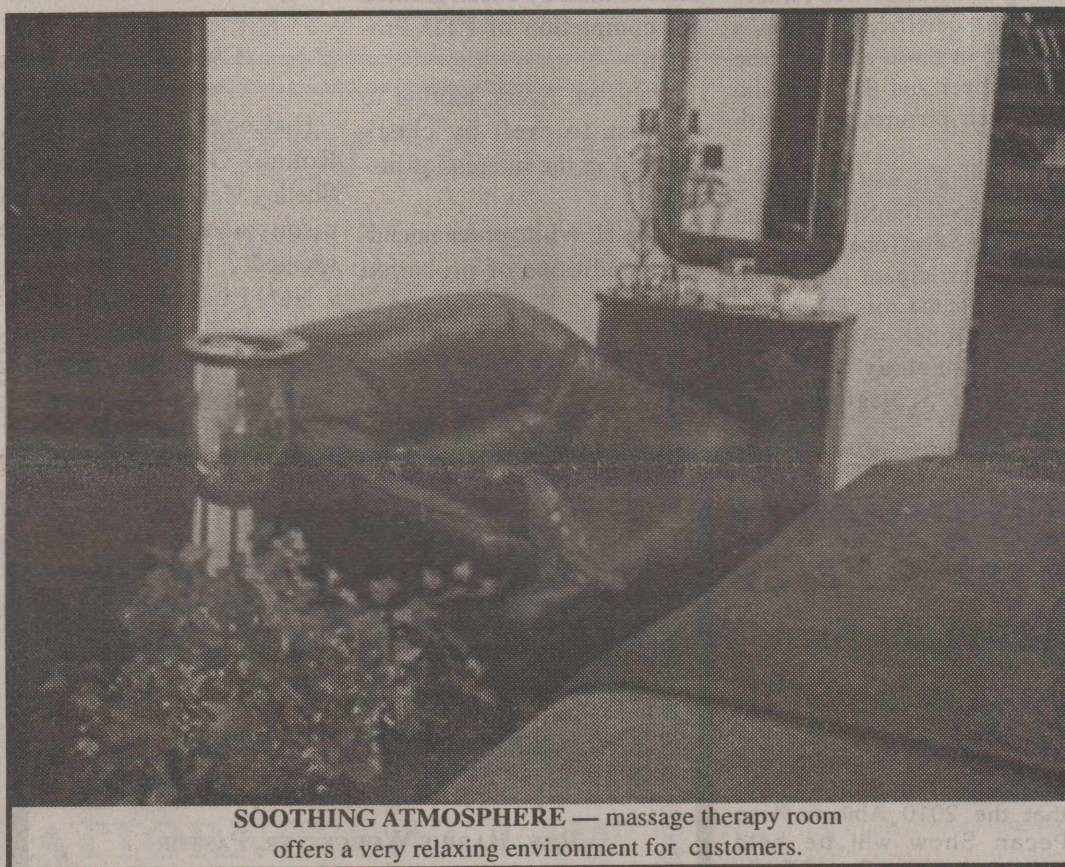

Licensed massage therapist Brandi Daliege operates Heavenly Hands located in Open Range on East Highway 36. She has ten years of experience in her specialty, having graduated from Hands on Therapy in Wichita Falls in 2000.

Brandi's husband, Kevin, is employed by the State of Texas in Coleman County. The couple have a three-year old daughter Addison, and another daughter will be arriving in January. Brandi's father is Ted McCulloch of the Nimrod community.

"I wanted to do something to help people and help them feel better," Brandi commented about her choice of profession. Her goal is to relieve the stress of daily living with a relaxing massage.

County Burn Ban reinstated by Commissioners Monday

The Callahan County Commissioners voted to reinstate the countywide outdoor burn ban effective immediately.

The commissioners' court took the action at 2:00 p.m. on Monday, November 8th during the commissioners' court emergency meeting held at the County Courthouse in Baird.

The Burn Ban order follows:
CALLAHAN COUNTY, TEXAS ORDER PROHIBITING OUTDOOR BURNING

WHEREAS, in accordance with Section 240.906 of the Local Government Code, the Callahan County Commissioners Court had found that dry conditions in the unincorporated areas of Callahan County create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning; and, whereas, such a finding authorizes the issuance of an order which prohibits or restricts outdoor burning.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDERED that the following regulations are hereby established for all unincorporated areas of Callahan County, Texas.

(1) Action prohibited:
A. A person violates this order if he or she knowingly, intentionally or recklessly burns any combustible material outside of an enclosure which serves to contain all flames and/or sparks, or orders such burning by others.

B. A person violates this order if he or she knowingly, intentionally or recklessly engages in any activity outdoors which could allow flames or sparks that could result in a fire, or orders such activities by others.

(2) Enforcement:
A. A violation of this order is a Class C Misdemeanor. B. This order may be enforced by any duly commissioned peace officer in Callahan County

(3) This order is effective and enforceable for 90 days after the date of adoption which is indicated below.

(4) This order does not apply to outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety

that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission for firefighter training; public utility, natural gas pipeline, or mining operations, or, harvesting of agriculture crops.

(5) Further, a person is not in violation if prior to the setting of any outdoor fire, he or she first obtains the permission of the appropriate volunteer Fire Chief. In this instance the Fire Chief will have the authority to set the conditions, restrictions, and/or precautions which must be observed.

(6) See Attachment A for welding precautions and Attachment B for grilling precautions.

ATTACHMENT A

Due to high fire danger and dry foliage these restrictions were put in place for the protection of the Citizens and their property in Callahan County. It was not intended to take away a person's livelihood.

WELDING WILL BE PERMITTED IF THE PROPER PRECAUTIONS ARE BEING TAKEN.

1. The individual welding must have a spotter.
2. Two wet fire extinguishers must be available.
3. Must have sufficient supply of water on hand at all times.
4. Must have water sprayer available for use.
5. Must wet down sufficient area (and re-wet as often as

necessary). These safety precautions must be taken and also, please use common sense and good judgement if the conditions are windy. If the job is not an emergency put it off until another date.

Violators will be charged with a Class C Misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of up to \$500.00. An individual, or individuals, could be liable for damages, if fire occurs. If there is a fatality, one could face possible felony charges.

ATTACHMENT B

OUTDOOR GRILLING WILL BE PERMITTED IF THESE PRECAUTIONS ARE TAKEN.

1. Individuals grilling must attend the grill at all times.

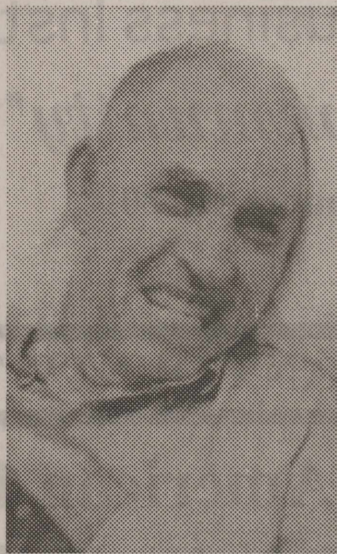

Texas AgriLife Extension Service is proud to announce that the 2010 Abilene Area Pecan Show will be held November 17, 2010. Residents of Callahan, Jones, Shackelford, Nolan, Fisher and Taylor Counties are invited to submit their pecans for competition and judging.

To enter the 2010 Abilene Area Pecan Show, submit 42 nuts of each pecan variety in a resealable, plastic bag to the Taylor County Extension Office. Entries will be accepted beginning Monday, November 8th; however, all entries are due to the Taylor County Extension Office by 5:00 p.m. on Tuesday, November 16th.

Don't worry if you are not sure of the pecan varieties that you have. All entries will be classified before they are judged. Pecans will be cracked and shelled on Wednesday, November 17th and then judged on Thursday, November 18th. Our judge for this year's competition is Larry Womack of Womack Nursery in DeLeon, Texas.

All entries will then be on display at the Extension office on Thursday, November 18th from 12:00 p.m. until 4:00 p.m. All entries must be picked up from the Taylor County Extension Office between 4:00 p.m. and 5:30 p.m. on November 18th. Entries not picked up become the property of the Taylor County Extension Service.

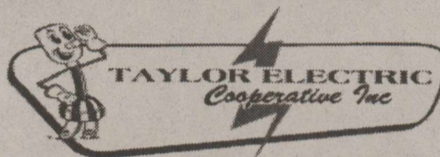

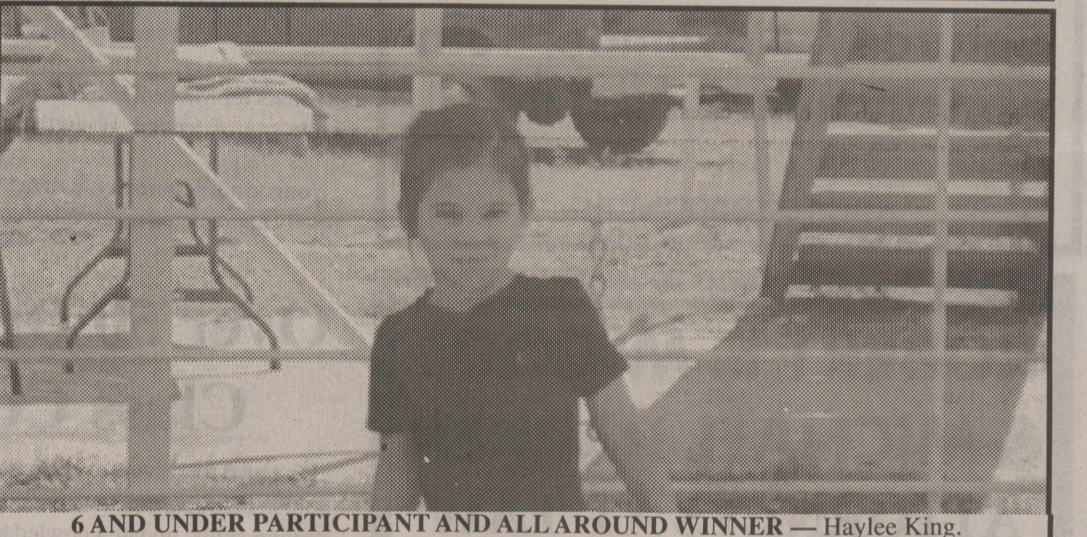

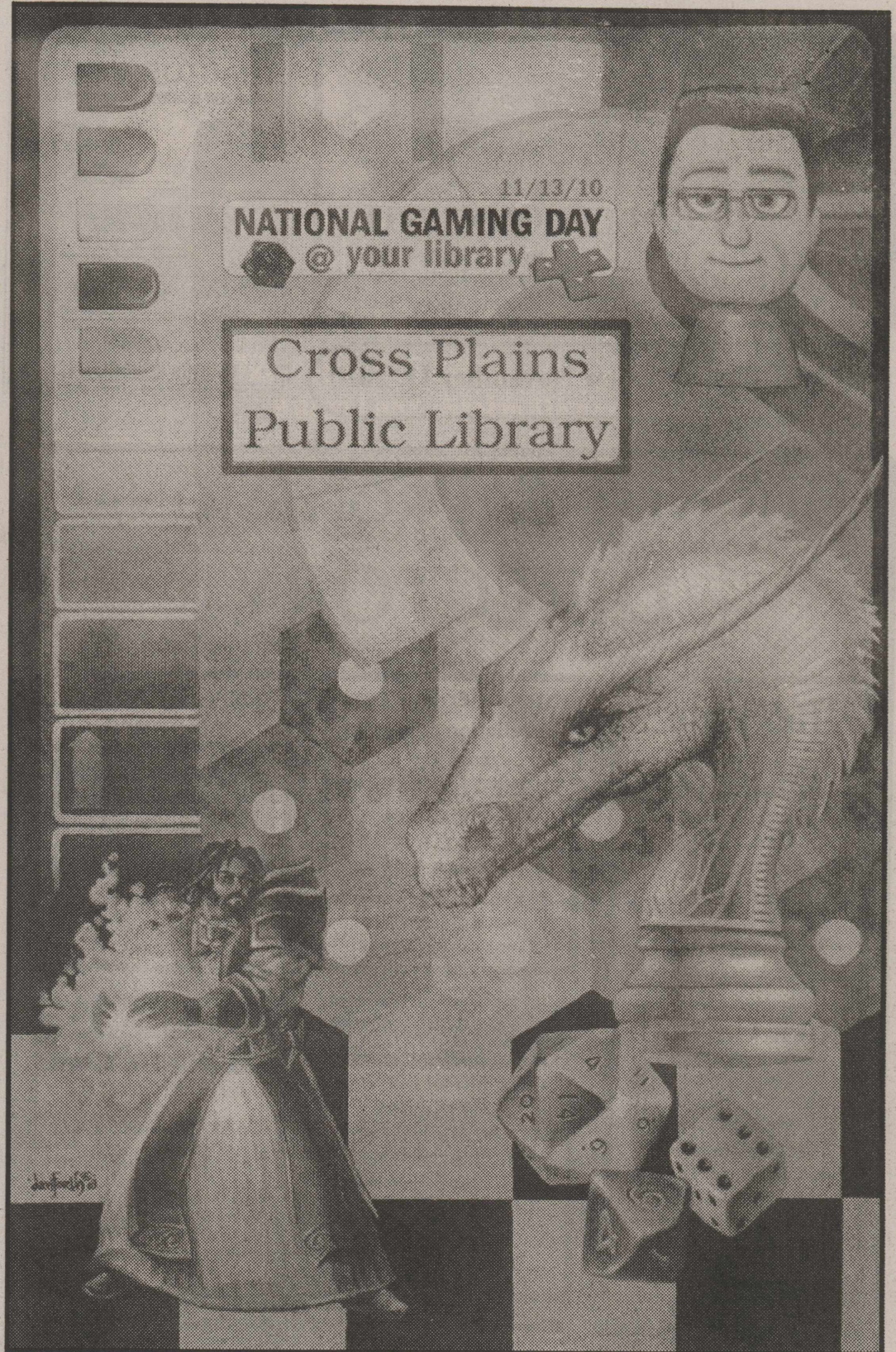
Children watched a short movie "Molly's Pilgrim", based on the book by Barbara Cohen, which has a lesson about how it takes

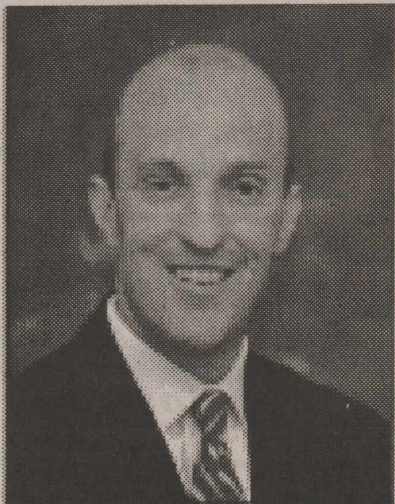

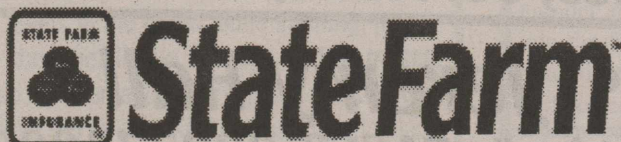

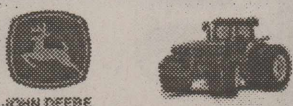

Callahan County Predator Control Association meeting set for November 16th in Baird

The Callahan County Predator Control Association would like to invite Callahan County landowners and tenants to their 1st Annual Meeting to be held on November 16, 2010 at 7:00 p.m. in the Baird School Cafeteria located on West 7th Street in Baird. This meeting is open to anyone interested in the eradication of feral hogs in the county. We will be taking membership into the Association. Annual Membership fees are \$50 plus .10 (10 cents) per acre. The objectives of this organization are to assist landowners and tenants in

eradicating the feral hogs throughout the county by working with USDA Services which can assist us in obtaining grant funds to cover a portion of the expenses. A Notice of Intent to participate in the Texas Department of Agriculture, County Grants for Implementation of Feral Hog Abatement Technologies was signed by Roger Corn, County Judge, giving Callahan County the eligibility to compete for USDA Grant Funds. Eligible Counties will be competing for one of three grants to assist in eliminating feral hogs. Grant amounts are \$25,000, \$15,000 and \$10,000. In

addition, the county with the largest contiguous tract of land with landowners who have agreed to allow trappers access could have county trappers or wildlife specialists remove feral hogs.

Some of the program details are as follows:

For the month of October 2010, participating counties will be required to document the following, by submission of a certified TDA Program Application (See Submitting an Application):

Number of feral hogs taken in the county, as certified by the county. The county will receive five points per 10 hogs taken. A feral hog is taken if it is killed during the month of October 2010, or if it is trapped, snared, or captured during the month of October 2010 for purposes of immediate slaughter. Hogs that are trapped, snared, or captured for any other purpose (such as transfer to an approved hunting area) are not considered to have been taken.

Number of individuals participating in TDA-approved educational courses about feral hog abatement technologies. Participating counties will receive one point per participant in attendance at each educational course, as certified by the county.

Number of acres in the county that landowners will commit, in writing, to allow county trappers or Wildlife Services (WS) Specialists to have access to for the purpose of removing feral hogs. The county trapper or WS Specialist must be allowed access to the property through at least September 30, 2011.
