

Cross Plains' retail sales begin 2014 down 10%


The City of Cross Plains' one percent city sales tax payments in 2014 are lower by over ten percent, according to the Texas State Comptroller's office.

Texas State Comptroller Susan Combs reported the city's sales tax payment on Wednesday, February 12th.

Cross Plains' 2014 sales tax payments for the year totalled \$35,594.72, which is 10.37 percent lower than the \$39,716.81 in sales tax rebate payments collected in 2013. The payment to the city for 2014 February was

Combs said today, Wednesday, compsum.html. February 12th, that state sales tax revenue in January was \$2,3 billion, up 8.3 percent compared to January 2013.

"Increases were seen across all major sectors of the Texas economy," Combs said. "This indicates continued expansion in both consumer and business spending, and brings the growth in fiscal year-to-date collections to 4.6 percent compared with the previous year, Sales tax revenue has increased for 46 consecutive months."

Combs will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts their January local sales tax allocations totaling \$802.1 million, up 8.2 percent compared to February 2013.

Combs sent Texas cities \$526.0 million in February 2014, which is higher by 8.0 percent compared to February 2013 and higher by 7.8 percent year-todate.

She reported \$49.3 million in February 2014 allocations to Texas counties, which is higher by 0.8 percent compared to February 2013 and higher by 0.3 percent year-to-date.

The Texas transit systems received \$178.8 million in February 2014 sales tax allocations, which is 7.2 percent higher than February 2013 and up 8.4 percent year-to-date.

Special Purpose Taxing Districts received \$47.0 million in February 2014 allocations, which is 25.2 percent higher than February 2013 and higher by 22.6 percent year-to-date.

Total sales tax allocations were \$802.1 million in February 2014, which is 8.2 percent higher than February 2013 and up 8.2 percent year-to-date.

The sales tax figures represent monthly sales made in December, as well as October, November and December sales by businesses that report tax quarterly.

Other Callahan County towns reporting sales tax payments include:

-The City of Baird reported that sales tax payments in 2014 started the year 58.83 percent higher than the 2013 payments. city has received The \$34,231.88 in 2014, while the 2013 tax payments to the city totalled \$21,552.11.

Baird's monthly payment for February 2014 was \$20,027.90, which is 49.65 percent higher than the \$13,382.87 payment made in February 2013

-The 2014 sales tax payments in the City of Clyde are 92.46 percent higher than the payments made to the city in 2013. The sales tax rebates for the City of Clyde have amounted to \$202,139.10 in 2014. The 2013 payments to the city during the same payment period were \$105,024.17

The City of Clyde's monthly payment for February 2014 was \$158,090.38, which is higher by 144.81 percent compared to February 2013 when \$64,575.09 was reported.

According to R.J. DeSilva with the Texas Comptroller's Office, the Comptroller's Office performed an audit on one company in Clyde in which a large one-time payment was made to the City of Clyde for city sales tax. DeSilva said he could not give the name of the company, or what industry the company was involved with.

-The City of Putnam reported the 2014 payments to the town totalled \$1,947.76, which is lower by 47.27 percent from the 2013 payments to the city in the amount of \$3,693.92.

Putnam's tax payment for the month of February 2014 was \$1,143.72, which is down 25.72 percent compared to the February 2013 payment of \$1.539.89

-Countywide, sales tax payments for 2014 in Callahan property taxes.

han County towns received sales tax payments in 2014 amounting to \$273,913.46 while the 2013 payments to the totalled county towns \$169,987.01.

The tax rebates in Callahan County for the month of February 2014 was \$197,760.42, which is higher by 96.91 percent compared to the February 2013 payment in the amount of \$100,429.76.

Merchants collect the state and local sales tax and send it to the Comptroller's office with their tax returns. The state keeps its 6 1/4% share and returns the local one percent sales tax each month to the local governments. Cities and counties may levy a combined tax of up to two percent above the state's sales tax.

Clyde businesses collect 2.00%, including one percent for the City of Clyde, one-half of one percent for the Clyde Economic Development Corporation and one half of one percent to reduce property taxes (Proceeds to benefit the Clyde Volunteer Fire Department).

Cross Plains collects 2.00% in local sales taxes, of which 1.00 percent is allocated to the city and 1.00% is allocated for economic development in the town.

Baird collects 2.00% in local sales tax of which 1.00% is allocated to the city, 0.50% is allocated to the community's economic development corporation and 0.50% of one percent to reduce property taxes.

Putnam collects 1.00% in local sales tax of which all 1.00 percent is allocated to the city. All local sales taxes must be approved by local voters and may be used for any legal city or county expenses. Most areas put the money in their General Fund and use it for normal operations like fire fighting, maintaining roads and law enforcement, the Comptroller said. Some cities use up to an additional one percent of city sales tax to help fund local economic development and to reduce.


After falling behind in the first quarter, 14-10, the Lady Buffs tightened their defense and established their strong inside game and took a 24-21 lead at halftime.

Bullfrog

As a herpetologist (one who studies reptiles and amphibians), I have spent the majority of my time researching the former group. However, there is a species of amphibian that has always intrigued me, not only due to its large size, but because of its uses to man as a food source, as well as a bait item. This species is the familiar Bullfrog.

Bullfrogs (Rana catesbeiana) belong to a family that has eight representatives here in Texas. This particular frog family is known as the "true" frogs based on their long legs, extraordinary jumping ability and habitat selection. As with other members of this family, Bullfrogs prefer to live in areas of permanent water such as lakes, ponds, rivers, and creeks. Immature specimens are often seen basking on or along the shorelines, while the adults, who have fewer predators, will frequent the deeper waters, choosing to bask in the sun while perched atop lily pads and other vegetation debris.

As a species, the Bullfrog naturally occurs throughout the eastern three quarters of this state. However, displaced specimens can occasionally be observed in the drier climates of the Trans-Pecos region. Outside of Texas it can be observed from western Oklahoma eastward to the mid-Atlantic states.

The dorsal coloration of this large species of frog is always some shade of green, ranging from lime to an almost black hunter green. The face area is typically where the brightest green appears. The front legs are short, and are generally flecked with dark spots. The back legs are disproportionately long, with feet that are extensively webbed. There is no webbing on the front feet, nor are there any toe-pads. The eardrums are exposed on the side of the head and are known as the tympani. The skin is relatively smooth, save for several small tubercles on the back and a prominent skin ridge that runs along the head from the back of the eye to just above the front

proaches the male, he will clasp

externally fertilize up to twenty

thousand eggs. This activity is

known as amplexus. Once the

eggs hatch, the fish-like tad-

poles are primarily herbivorous,

although they have been known

to feed on small water-living in-

vertebrates and even tadpoles

of other species. Bullfrog tad-

poles can grow quite large with

individuals over five inches be-

ing reported. Metamorphosis can

occur quickly (several weeks)

or be prolonged, up to two years.

The time parameters are chiefly

dependant upon things such as

sorbing the tail, and developing legs

Bullfrogs are alert and shy, and can be extremely difficult to approach too closely, especially during the day. Once they hop into the water for safety, watch for them to emerge at the surface several feet from the shoreline. However, they are quite approachable at night, and many will sit completely still when the light from a flashlight is pointed in their eyes. This species is still hunted for food (their legs are the traditional frog legs that appear on many menus) and biological studies, but does not appear to be in decline. In fact, in many areas where this species has been introduced it is considered a menace to local frog life. Bullfrogs consume any smaller vertebrate that it can fit into its large mouth, including other frogs. These introductions have generally come about due to incidental releases by fisherman, as the tadpoles of this species are utilized for fish bait.

Callahan County Businesses reminded to render taxable property by April 15th

If you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income, you must file a rendition with the Callahan County Appraisal District by April 15, 2014.

A rendition is a report that lists all the taxable property a person owned or controlled on Jan. 1st of this year. Property includes inventory and equipment used by a business. Owners do not have to render exempt property, such as a church property or agriculture producer's equipment used for farming.

Chief Appraiser Don Jones said "The Appraisal District may use the information submitted in the rendition to set property values." You can also file a report of decreased value to notify the district of significant depreciation of your property. For example, if your property was damaged by a storm, flood or fire last year, you should file a report of decreased value. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 2014.

The last day to file a rendition or report of decreased value is April 15, 2014. If a rendition if filed late or incomplete or not at all a 10 percent will be imposed, if a fraudulent rendition is files, a 50 percent penalty is mandated. Property owners who need more time to file their renditions may file a written request with the chief appraiser on or before April 15, 2014 to receive an automatic extension to May 15 or the next business day.

Dean Smith was born January 15, 1932, in Breckenridge, TX - where he now resides - and was raised in Eliasville, TX. Smith grew up watching westerns at the local theater and dreamed of following in his many heroes footsteps. He was an outstanding athlete in Graham High School, making Look magazine's All American in the 100 yard dash. He won eight Southwest Conference titles and won every major relay in the US, including the National Championships. At the 1952 summer Helsinki Olympics, he got beat in the 100 meters in the closest finish in Olympic history, but when on to win gold as the leadoff leg for the American 4x100-meter relay team.

After graduating from the University of Texas at Austin, Smith played professional football for the Los Angeles Rams during exhibition season and was traded to the Pittsburgh Steelers, at which time he decided to enter the movie business. Early voting begins on February 18th and runs through the 28th; the Primary will be held on March 4th. All voting will be done at the Clyde Justice of the Peace office at 208 Oak Street in downtown Clyde.
