


Nicole Eisenbach and Kristin Wright Named to TABC All **Region Team**

on Saturday, April 26. The full day of events will include downtown vendors (9am -5pm), rodeo parade (4pm), ranch rodeo with team penning, branding, milking and doctoring (6pm) and rodeo dance (9pm).

Sheriff's Posse was formally established in 1948. Thereafter, it purchased land, cleared it, and constructed the arena, bleachers, buildings, stock pens and fencing on US Highway 80 East one block east of its intersection with US Highway 283 South in Baird (where it remains today). It thrived for decades as one of the best professional rodeos in West Texas with parades, trail rides, dances, livestock shows and related activities. The property then fell into disrepair through neglect and non-use even becoming a trash dump for the city and citizens. A group of concerned citizens

who support our western ranching tradition organized, reinstated the Callahan County Sheriff's Posse as a Texas nonprofit corporation and restored the historical rodeo arena, bleachers, buildings, fences and grounds for community use. Today, it is a special success story, a source of pride and an excellent example of how conscientious citizens in a small rural Texas community can work together to restore an important historical property for the use and enjoyment of all.

A Canned Food Drive will also be held that night to help the Senior Center in providing hot meals every weekday at lunchtime. Bring in a few cans of food, any size will do, to help



Western Diamondback Rattlesnake

There are times when I write this column that the information about an animal is scarce and hard to come by. However, at other times the material that is available is almost overwhelming. There is so much information (true and false) that I would like to present that a column like this would quickly take up more space than is allowed, and such is the case with the Western Diamondback Rattlesnake.

The Western Diamondback Rattlesnake (Crotalus atrox) occurs from central Oklahoma through the western two/thirds of Texas westward to the southeastern border of California south to the state of San Luis Potosi. Mexico. In Texas, it is the most commonly encountered venomous snake in the Trans-Pecos eco-region, as well as the Tamaulipan thornscrub of south Texas. It is a habitat generalist, occupying a variety of habitats ranging from desert scrub near the Permian Basin to high elevation pine-oak forests of the Davis Mountains.

Western Diamondbacks are the second largest venomous snake in the United States, slightly exceeded in size only by the Eastern Diamondback Rattlesnake of Florida and other east coast states. It is by far the largest venomous snake that occurs in Texas. Adult Western Diamondbacks can achieve lengths of up to seven feet in length, although the average is much smaller than this. Most individuals max out at a length between four and five feet in total length.

The body coloration of Western Diamondbacks can vary (depending on the soil type where it occurs) from a chalky gray to a dull reddish brown. Along the spine is a series of darker diamond-shaped markings that are bordered by a black and white border, hence the name diamondback. A common nickname among those who encounter this serpent frequently is coon-tail which refers to the black and white banded tail. These tail bands are of nearly equal width, one characteristic that is used to determine this animal from the more dangerous Mojave Rattlesnake that inhabits the Trans-Pecos area of Texas as well. The head is distinctly wider than the neck, giving this animal the famous "diamond-shaped" head. The pupils are elliptical, and the rattle is large and is capable of being heard from several yards away. Diamondbacks, like other snakes, do not hibernate in thé true sense of the word, but rather employ an activity known as brumation. This means that the snake's metabolism, heart rate and breathing all slow down to a near stop, but they are quite awake and aware of their surroundings. They will often congregate in large numbers in "dens" to spend the long periods of inactivity of winter and once

temperatures achieve a level of warmth that the snake finds tolerable, usually in early to mid-March, then the males begin leaving the densite in their quest to mate. Females release a pheromone that attracts the males, and many times more than one male will encounter a female that is receptive. During these encounters, the males will participate in a dramatic "dance" as they entwine their bodies together in a wrestling match style event. The winner is the one who is able to pin the other to the ground, and mating ensues upon the dominant male's victory. Diamondbacks are oviviparous, which means they give birth to living young, and the foot-long neonates (which number from 4 to 25) are typically born in late summer and early fall. Other than having a "button" on the end of the tail, they are exact replicas of the adults and are fully capable of fending for themselves, including having fully functional fangs and venom apparatus'

Western Diamondbacks defend themselves in a variety of ways, with the main defensive mechanism being that of camouflage. Even with the gaudy patterns and colors, this snake blends in well with its primarily brushy habitats. The second defensive plan is that of crawling away from a potential predator while rattling its tail slightly. If this does not deter its assailant, then it will begin to curl up in a defensive "s-coiled" stance and aggressively vibrate it's tail,

causing the rattling sound to get louder. This behavior is typically a final stand so to speak, and many times an encounter with a diamondback does not come to this point. Out of the 300 or so diamondbacks that I encounter each summer, less than 10 percent resort to this tactic, with most being satisfied to avoid any confrontations. The last defensive mechanism is that of biting and injecting a deadly venom into a would-be attacker. This venom, depending on a huge variety of factors, can be lethal to humans, although few human fatalities actually occur. Despite these venomous propensities, the Western Diamondback is actually beneficial in the fact that it preys primarily on small mammals such as mice and rats

When participating in outdoor activities, the risk of encountering a Western Diamondback is slim, although it can and does happen occasionally. If such an encounter occurs, remember that this animal, despite its harmful capability, is more afraid of you than you are of it and it would prefer to be left alone. Most bites from this species occur when people make an attempt to either capture or kill this snake. The best course of action is to walk, don't run, in the opposite direction, making both you and the snake more at ease Editor's Note: Michael Price would love to hear from folks! 

Cross Plains' retail sales begin 2014 down 3%

The City of Cross Plains' one percent city sales tax payments in 2014 are lower by over three percent, according to the Texas State Comptroller's office.

Texas State Comptroller Susan Combs reported the city's sales tax payment on Wednesday, March 12th.

Cross Plains' 2014 sales tax payments for the year totalled \$55,240.47, which is 3.34 percent lower than the \$57,150.13 in sales tax rebate payments collected in 2013.

The payment to the city for March 2014 was \$19,645.75 which is 12.69 percent higher than the \$17,433.32 payment made in March 2013.

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs said today, Wednesday, February 12th, that state sales tax revenue in February was \$2.2 billion, up 5.8 percent compared to February 2013.

"Sales tax revenue continues its growth streak and has now increased for 47 consecutive months," Combs said. "Growth in tax collections was seen across all major economic sectors including oil and gas, wholesale trade and the services sector."

Combs will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts their March local sales tax allocations totaling \$553 million, up 4.1 percent compared to March 2013.

Combs sent Texas cities \$359.7 million in March 2014, which is higher by 3.1 percent compared to March 2013 and higher by 6.4 percent year-todate.

She reported \$35.8 million in March 2014 allocations to Texas counties, which is higher by 5.0 percent compared to March 2013 and higher by 1.6 percent year-to-date.

The Texas transit systems received \$126.0 million in March 2014 sales tax allocations, which is 4.3 percent higher than March 2013 and up 7.2 percent yearto-date.

Special Purpose Taxing Districts received \$31.5 million in March 2014 allocations, which is 14.0 percent higher than March 2013 and higher by 20.1 percent year-to-date.

\$45,415.08 in 2014, while the 2013 tax payments to the city

totalled \$29,967.77. Baird's monthly payment for March 2014 was \$11,183.20, which is 32.88 percent higher than the \$8,415.66 payment made in March 2013.

-The 2014 sales tax payments in the City of Clyde are 67.97 percent higher than the payments made to the city in 2013. The sales tax rebates for the City of Clyde have amounted to \$248,572.98 in 2014. The 2013 payments to the city during the same payment period were \$147,985.23.

The City of Clyde's monthly payment for March 2014 was \$46,433.88, which is higher by 8.08 percent compared to March 2013 when \$42,961.06 was reported.

-The City of Putnam reported the 2014 payments to the town totalled \$2,694.66, which is lower by 40.97 percent from the 2013 payments to the city in the amount of \$4,565.19.

Putnam's tax payment for the month of March 2014 was \$746.90, which is down 14.27 percent compared to the March 2013 payment of \$871.27.

-Countywide, sales tax payments for 2014 in Callahan County are higher by 46.83 percent compared to the 2013 payments in the county. Callahan County towns received sales tax payments in 2014 amounting to \$351,923.19 while the 2013 payments to the county towns totalled \$239,668.32 The tax rebates in Callahan County for the month of March 2014 was \$78,009.73, which is

\$69,681.31.

Merchants collect the state and local sales tax and send it to the Comptroller's office with their tax returns. The state keeps its 6 1/4% share and returns the local one percent sales tax each month to the local governments. Cities and counties may levy a combined tax of up to two percent above the state's sales tax.

Clyde businesses collect 2.00%, including one percent for the City of Clyde, one-half of one percent for the Clyde Economic Development Corporation and one half of one percent to reduce property taxes (Proceeds to benefit the Clyde Volunteer Fire Department).

Cross Plains collects 2.00% in local sales taxes, of which 1.00 percent is allocated to the city and 1.00% is allocated for economic development in the town.

Baird collects 2.00% in local sales tax of which 1.00% is allocated to the city, 0.50% is allocated to the community's economic development corporation and 0.50% of one percent to reduce property taxes.

Putnam collects 1.00% in local sales tax of which all 1.00 percent is allocated to the city. All local sales taxes must be approved by local voters and may be used for any legal city or county expenses. Most areas put the money in their General Fund and use it for normal operations like fire fighting, maintaining roads and law enforcement, the Comptroller said. Some cities use up to an additional one percent of city sales

tax to help fund local economic

development and to reduce

property taxes.
