

Dean Smith, Cowboy Hero

Olympic gold-medalist and western movie stuntman, Dean Smith, was guest speaker at a fundraiser for the Cross Plains Public Library on Sunday, March 23rd, at the First United Methodist Church. Dean spoke as part of our community's celebration of The Big Read/ "Experience True Grit." The sixty seven attendees included eight students from Janna Austin's high school English classes, who are also studying "True Grit."

Library Board President, Wilma Lawrence, welcomed guests and introduced Smith's

stunts from his movies with John Wayne, Robert Redford, Dale Robertson and many other old western cowboy heroes. Smith even-had a part in the original "True Grit" movie. (See if you can spot him when the library shows the movie this Thursday, March 27th, at 5:00 p.m.) Smith also has won awards for his humanitarian efforts, most notably rodeos to benefit various cancer institutions. In 2006, the John Wayne Cancer institute honored him with the "Duke" award for his contributions to cancer re-

The forum focused on policy and issues that affect community health centers. The message at the forum was "America's Health Centers: The ACCESS Answer".

Community health centers (CHCs) originated in the mid 1960's. They have evolved from neighborhood health centers helping only the poor and underserved population to full service health clinics offering primary care for all segments of the population. CHCs are fully staffed and

Resource Care is a non-profit corporation governed by a board of directors of local residents with clinics located in Albany, Baird, Breckenridge, Clyde and Cross Plains. A majority of board members are required to be patients of the center. 90% of Resource Care board members are patients. Funding for Resource Care comes from several sources: Medicaid reimbursements, federal grant funds, private health insurance and Medicare.







You'll need to wet down the area often while you are welding. Outdoor grilling is permitted, as long as you cook in an enclosed cooker or keep the lid closed on the grill, have a supply of water available and stay with the cooker while it's cooking. Wind can easily spread embers from your barbeque pit. If you have questions about the Burn Ban or if you see smoke - call the Sheriff's office at 325-854-1444.

Bullsnake

As a general rule, large snakes bring about emotions in people that are generally not healthy, especially for the snake. However, one species that is found in west Texas is almost revered, not only for its size, but more so for what it does. That snake is the large and ordinarily common Bullsnake.

The Bullsnake (*Pituophis* catenifer sayi) is a large non-venomous serpent, with most

adults reaching sexual maturity between four and five feet in total length. The largest specimen recorded in Texas, however, was almost a whopping nine feet, making this species the second longest snake in the state behind the Indigo Snake.

Like other members of the Gopher and Pine snake genus, this species superficially resembles a venomous rattlesnake in that it has large, squarish dark blotches appearing down the back that stand out from the yellow or tan background coloration. Along its side are smaller dark blotches that appear to have no particular pattern. The tail blotches are more or less dark brown or reddish rings that are set apart from the yellow background color. The head is also yellowish, sometimes speckled with dark spots and there is often a dark bordered pale line connecting the eyes. There is also a dark line that extends from the eye to the back portion of the mouth. The belly is cream colored and is marked with indistinct dark splotches, particularly along the outer belly scales. The pupils, like other large, non-venomous serpents, are round in appearance.

Bullsnakes have a large range, occurring in a line running through the midsection of the United States from central Mexico northward to southern Canada. In Texas, they can be observed from roughly I-35 westward to the Pecos River. The closely related and virtually the same subspecies Sonoran Gopher Snake occurs throughout the Trans-Pecos. Having such a large range, Bullsnakes are habitat generalists, meaning they can and do thrive in a variety of habitats. Dry, arid spaces are preferred, although they are common in the rocky canyon areas of the Edwards Plateau, as well as the high-elevation pineforested areas of the mountainous areas of west Texas. Cultivated fields are a favored habitat, mostly due to the abundance of small mammals in such places

As with almost all other reptiles that reside in temperate climates, they undergo a period of Bullsnake (Pituophis catenifer sayi)

inactivity during the coldest months of the year, allowing sexually mature adults to generate the sperm and eggs necessary for successful reproduction in the spring. Like most other harmless snakes found in Texas, Bullsnakes are egg-laying creatures. Mating occurs primarily during the months of April and May with egg deposition happening in late June or early July. Egg clutches vary in size from three to twenty-two, depending on the size and age of the female. The eggs are large, almost the size of small chicken eggs and are buried beneath debris to hold the humidity levels at a premium to avoid desiccation.

The neonates hatch from the eggs roughly two months after deposition and average fifteen inches at hatching. The young are carbon copies of the adults in appearance, and like other snake species, they require no assistance from the parents as they are capable of fending for themselves at birth.

This species is forages for food during the morning and evening hours during the spring and fall, becoming nocturnal during the heat of the summer months.

Bullsnakes prefer small mammals such as mice and rats over any other prey, and one study estimated that an adult male Bullsnake can devour nearly one thousand field mice in one season. The benefits of such a feat are overwhelmingly convincing as evidenced by the fact that most ranchers and farmers who ordinarily have an aversion to snakes will leave the Bullsnake be. Many people also believe that the Bullsnake will consume other snakes such as rattlesnakes, but this is not the case.

Although they are completely harmless, this species puts on a display when threatened that rivals that of any rattlesnake species. When it feels in danger, it will coil its forebody up in an scoil, rattle its tail incessantly, and produce a hissing sound that sounds amazingly familiar to that of a rattlesnake rattling. This display, while fending off other natural predators, tends to have this snake mistaken for a rattlesnake and sadly killed by unknowing persons.





came in about his condition. He was battling AML M5, a very aggressive from Leukemia. A plan was made that consisted of four chemo treatments and at least six months in the hospital.

In the last 9 weeks, Owen has undergone two of the four chemo treatments. He has received so many visitors in the form of family and friends, and hospital staff that have come to love his smile. So many people have shown tremendous support for the Turners and they are forever grateful. Family and friends want to host one more event to help in the second half of their hospital stay.





The silhouette match is named in honor of longtime coach and 4-H leader in Callahan County, Charlie Greenway of Baird.


Coach Greenway is recognized as an expert black powder and pistol competitior and Callahan County competitors are lucky to have him as a coach.



USDA Encourages Early Registration for FSA Programs

2014 — The U.S. Department of control of the acreage. Agriculture's (USDA) Farm Sertor Juan M. Garcia today recommended that farmers and in FSA programs register in advance. Producers are encouraged to report farm records and business structure changes to a local FSA Service Center before April 15, 2014.

Enrollment for the disaster programs authorized by the 2014 Farm Bill, including the Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP) and the Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP) will begin by April 15, 2014.

"We expect significant interest in these programs," said Garcia. "Early registration should help improve the sign-up process and allow us to expedite implementation of the programs. I strongly encourage producers to complete their paperwork ahead of time."

Examples of updates or changes to report include:

• New producers or producers who have not reported farm records to FSA

Producers who have recently bought, sold or rented land. Those producers need to ensure that changes have been reported and properly recorded by local FSA county office personnel. Reports of purchased or sold property should include a copy of the land deed, and if land has been leased, then documentation should be provided that in-



 Producers that have changed vice Agency (FSA) Administra- business structures (e.g. formed a partnership or LLC) need to ensure that these relationships ranchers who plan to participate and shares are properly recorded with FSA. Even family farms that have records on file may want to ensure that this is recorded accurately as it may impact payment limits.

Farm records can be updated during business hours at FSA Service Centers that administer the county where the farm or ranch is located. Producers can contact their local FSA Service Center in advance to find out what paperwork they may need. In addition, bank account information should be supplied or updated if necessary to ensure that producers receive payments as quickly as possible through direct deposit.

While any producer may report farm records and business structure changes, it is especially important for producers who suffered livestock, livestock grazing, honeybee, farm-raised fish, or tree/vine losses for 2011, 2012, 2013 or 2014, and may be eligible for assistance through one of the four disaster programs

AUSTIN-The Texas Department of Transportation today tunes up one of its greatest hits as it partners with top-notch Texas musicians for a brand-new rendition of Don't mess with Texas. Now in its 28th year, TxDOT's iconic anti-litter campaign is back in the spotlight with help from Grammy-winning Tejano performer Sunny Sauceda and country music favorite Kevin Fowler. The well-known artists have each recorded new ads to educate the public on the importance of not littering.

"As litter continues to be an expensive problem for Texas, we feel it's important that the critical Don't mess with Texas message be delivered by influential artists who represent the true spirit of Texas," said Commissioner Jeff Austin III, Texas Transportation Commission. "We're so proud that these talented Texas performers are lending their

voices to this famous campaign and reminding everyone that trash belongs in a trash can and not on our "

Joining the likes of George Strait, Stevie Ray Vaughan and Lyle Lovett, this year's talented duo proudly sings the praises of Don't mess with Texas.

"It's an honor to be part of this great campaign," Fowler said. "There's nothing I love more than Texas, and I'm excited to spread the word about keeping our great state litter-free."

Researchers estimate nearly half-a-billion pieces of visible litter accumulate annually along state-maintained highways. In 2013, a study found that visible trash along more than 80,000 miles of state-maintained roadways was down 34 percent from 2009

Additionally, about one-third of Texans - particularly young adults between the ages of 16 and 34 - admit to littering.

Some of the most common litter found during roadside cleanups includes fast-food packaging, cigarette butts, candy wrappers and plastic bags.

"TxDOT wants to reduce litter and save taxpayers money," said Margo Richards, director, Travel Information Division. "Our estimates show litter clean-up, on average, costs taxpayers more than \$40 million annually. As our state's population grows by 1,000 people each day, it's important to continue reminding Texans and Texas visitors that littering isn't just unsightly, it's also against the law.

In Texas, fines for littering can be as high as \$500 for the first offense. Repeat offenders can face fines up to \$2,000 and 180 days in jail.


