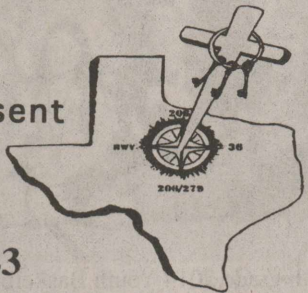

Third graders visit Museum

Mrs. Richards took her third grade class for a return visit to the Robert E. Howard Museum this week as part of their study of communities. The students had toured the inside of the Museum several months ago to see what a house was like in the 1920's and to see where Howard had written his hundreds of stories and poems.

The purpose of their visit this time was to look at the repair work that is necessary to keep the 100 plus year old house in good condition. After actually peeling some of the loose paint off and looking at window areas that need scraped and painted, the students noticed the same problem up high on the

peak of the north end. However the problem that really caught their eye was one of the porch posts that is rotted up high enough on the inside for a little hand to feel around.

Once again the of tourism was discussed with the students and how important it is to keep our town clean and attractive. The students were as amazed as Project Pride members are at the number of visitors from foreign countries who come to the USA for the express purpose of visiting Cross Plains and the REH Museum.

The visit was to be the focal point of a unit of helping their community. The students will be creating posters and decorating

cans to be placed around the school and community to encourage everybody to help the museum.

Recent donations for the repair work and for on-going maintenance of the museum have totaled \$3400.00 to date with the vast majority of this money coming from beyond Cross Plains. Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten Roundup

Cross Plains ISD will be conducting a Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten roundup Tuesday, April 15, 2014 for the 2014-2015 school year. There will be two different times that you may attend, 9:00-11:00 a.m. and 12:00-2:00 p.m.

Cross Plains Elementary offers Pre-Kindergarten to all children who will be four years of age on or before September 1, 2014. Pre-Kindergarten will be offered if a sufficient number of four year olds register for the program.

It is important that parents participate in the roundup in order to plan classes for 2014-2015. Class sizes for Pre-K may be limited.

Students who will be five years of age on or before September 1, 2014 are eligible for Kindergarten. Kindergarten is a full day program. kindergarten

is a basic part of the Cross Plains School system and the service is available to all students. If your child is currently enrolled in Pre-K at Cross Plains Elementary, you will NOT have to go through the screening process. If your child has not been enrolled in Pre-K, and will be attending Kindergarten in the fall, please come to this meeting.

Early Childhood screening will be during the afternoon session from 12-2 p.m. The early childhood program is a program to help those children ages 3-5 who show to be developmentally delayed or have a suspected disability. If you have questions about the Early Childhood screening, please call Jana or Cecil at Comanche Special Services SSA at (254)-893-2130.

Parents are reminded that, in order to enter school in Texas the student MUST HAVE a state ap-

proved birth certificate, social security card and a current immunization record.

Immunization requirements: Hepatitis B- 3 doses by age 4.

DTap- 5/4 doses with one on/ after 4th birthday.

Polio-4 doses with one on/ after 4th birthday, 3 doses if 3rd dose is given on or after 4th birthday.

Measles/Mumps/Rubella (MMR)- 2 doses with 1st dose on or after 1st birthday.

Varicella- 2 doses with 1st dose on or after 1st birthday.

Hepatitis A- 2 doses with 1st dose on or after 1st birthday.

Please bring the birth certificate, immunization record, and social security card for the child when you come to the roundup so that we can make copies.

Buffaloes Defeated by Panthers

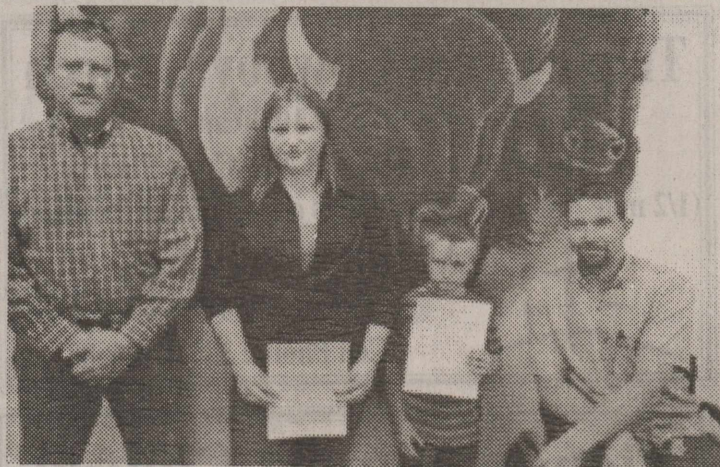

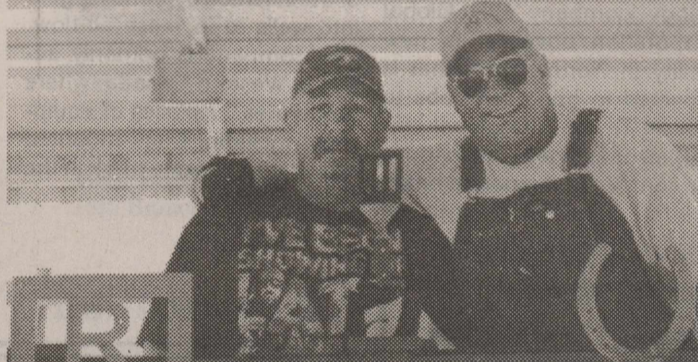

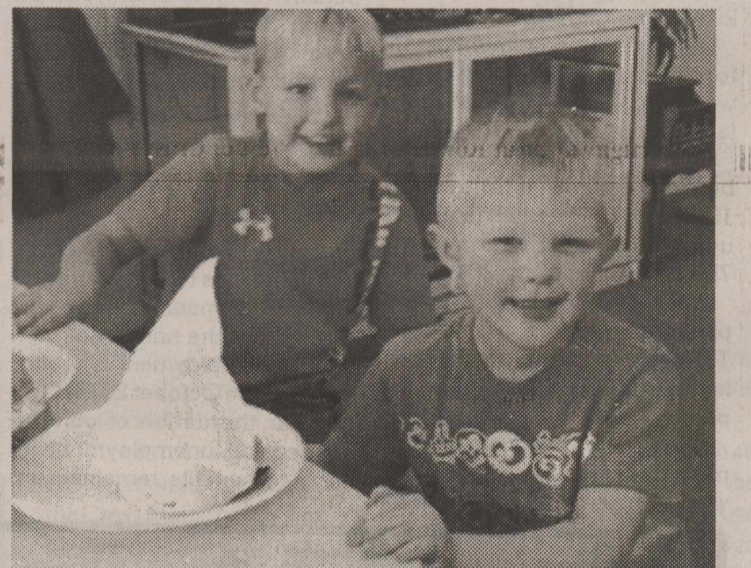

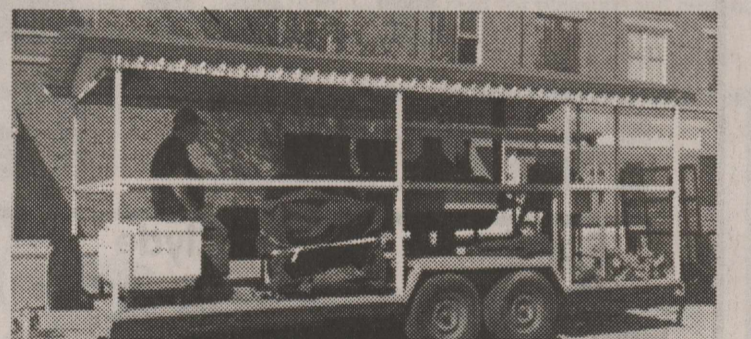

Denzel Holmes Rescheduled for "Meet the Author" April 24th

Due to inclement weather, the Cross Plains Public Library postponed its "Meet the Author" featuring Denzel Holmes. Now it has been rescheduled for Thursday, April 24th, at 7:00 p.m., in the library conference room. Holmes was born and grew up in Sheffield, Texas, near the Pecos River. Electricity had not reached south to the family home in 1940, so he was born at 3 a.m. to the light of kerosene lamps. The rural upbringing influenced his desire to write Western in later years.

After harboring the idea for forty years Denzel retired from his career as a Federal auditor and took up the pen. His first

novel, co-authored with Tom Schliesing, was an epic of the German immigration to Texas, titled *Texas Victory*, published in 2003. His book *Last Race* is based on the history of Belton, TX, where he now resides. Holmes has just published his 7th book, *Concho*, where two men from different worlds converge on the West Texas Concho River. Each has dreams that both conflict and blend. The myriad of outside dangers press both men to the breaking point.

Callahan County's jobless rate rises to 4.3% in February 2014

The unemployment rate in Callahan County rose one-tenth of one percent to 4.3% in February 2014, according to jobless figures released Friday, March 28th by the Texas Workforce Commission. The unemployment rate in Callahan County one year ago in February 2013 was 5.2 percent.

Callahan County's unemployment rate was 4.2% in January, 2014.

Previous monthly jobless rates in Callahan County included: 4.1% in December 2013, 4.3% in November, 4.5% in October, 4.9% in September, 4.7% in August, 4.7% in July, 5.3% in June 2013, 5.2% in May, 4.5% in April, and 4.8% in March, according to the unemployment figures.

Big Country area counties, bordering Callahan County, and the counties' unemployment rates for February 2014 include: Brown, 5.1%; Coleman, 5.5%; Eastland, 5.1%; Jones, 5.4%; Runnels, 4.9%; Shackelford, 2.9%; Stephens, 4.7%; and Taylor County, 4.5%.

The Abilene MSA (Metropolitan Statistical Area) unemployment rate, which includes Taylor, Callahan and Jones Counties, stood at 4.6% in February, 2014, according to the Texas Workforce Commission. The Abilene MSA Combined Labor Force is 84,500. There were 80,600 employed during February 2014, while 3,900 were unemployed, giving the Abilene MSA an unemployment rate of 4.6%.

The Abilene MSA reported the workforce was 83,800 in January, 2014. Total employment of 80,000 was reported in January 2014, while 3,800, or 4.5% were unemployed in January 2014.

The Abilene MSA unemployment rate for February, 2013 was 5.2%. The total workforce was reported at 84,000, with 79,600 employed and 4,400 or 5.2% unemployed in February, 2013.

The state's unemployment rate for the month of February, 2014 was 5.9 percent. The total Texas labor force was 12,907,100 in February 2014. The total number of Texans employed is 12,150,600. The total number of unemployed Texans was 756,500 in February 2014.

Last month's statewide unemployment rate was 5.8 percent. The state's unemployment rate in February of 2013 was 6.6 percent.

The United States unemployment rate for February, 2014 was 7.0 percent. The nation's

unemployment rate for the previous month of January, 2014 was 7.0%. The United States unemployment rate one year ago in February, 2013 was 8.1%.

Highlights of the Texas Labor Force (Not Seasonally Adjusted)

- The February unemployment rate increased one-tenth of a percentage point to 5.9 percent. This was the lowest February unemployment rate since 2008. The unemployment rate fell by 0.7 percentage points over the year. The national unemployment rate remained unchanged over the month, posting a rate of 7.0 percent.

- The Civilian Labor Force grew by 88,600 individuals to a total of 12,907,100 people. This was the largest February labor force growth since the beginning of the series. The five-year average January-to-February labor force increase was 30,400 persons. Over the year, the Texas labor force expanded by 194,100 individuals, a growth rate of 1.5 percent.

- The number of employed increased by 75,700 individuals to 12,150,600 Texans. This was the largest February gain in the number of jobholders since 2002. The five-year average gain for employed Texans in February was 56,300 people. The number of employed increased by 275,500 individuals over the year. In February, the number of jobseekers increased by 12,900 persons to a total of 756,500 people. This was the first February increase for individuals seeking work since 2009. Since February 2013, the number of unemployed persons declined by 81,400 individuals.

- The number of Texans continuing to seek unemployment insurance benefits declined by 5,100 persons to reach a total of 129,100 claimants. This was the first drop in the number of continued unemployment insurance claims since October 2013. Over the year, the number of individuals seeking unemployment insurance benefits remained un-

changed at 129,100 claimants. A decline of unemployment claim activity was shown in 22 Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs). The McAllen/Edinburg-Mission MSA experienced the largest drop in unemployment claims with a 14.0 percent decline. Two MSAs had an increase in unemployment claim activity with the Waco MSA leading at 5.7 percent. The Laredo MSA remained unchanged.

HAPPENINGS AROUND THE STATE

Telecom Supplier Relocates to DFW
ROCKWALL, TX (Dallas Business Journal)—Candace Carlisle—A California-based telecommunications supplier plans to move its headquarters and manufacturing operations to a new \$20 million facility in Rockwall. The nearly 100-year-old company, Channel Commercial Corporation, has decided to develop its new corporate offices and manufacturing operations at a 175,000-square-foot building. The move will initially create 200 jobs in North Texas.

The new facility will house the largest structural foam machine in the Lone Star state, company officials say. 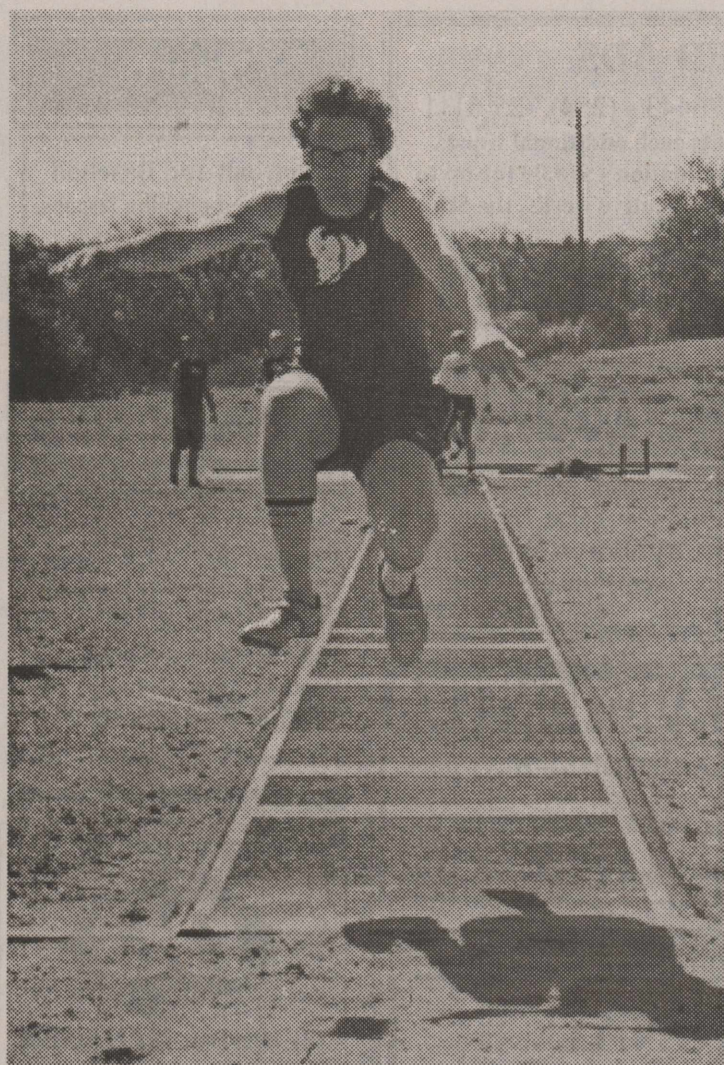

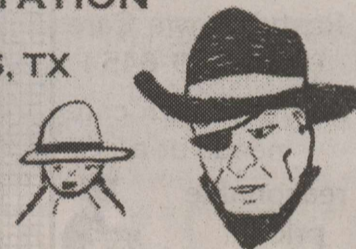

Birdwatching 101

Generally speaking, most people have a hobby or two in which they enjoy participating in aside from their daily routines. For some it is sports, for others it may be something like stamp collecting or coin collecting, and for others it may be fishing or hiking. There is a hobby that has really taken hold in the United States over the past several decades and that is birdwatching, or birding for short.

It has been estimated that more than sixty million people in the United States participate in birding annually. Western Texas is a prime area to birdwatch due to favorable weather conditions, as well as geographical placement.

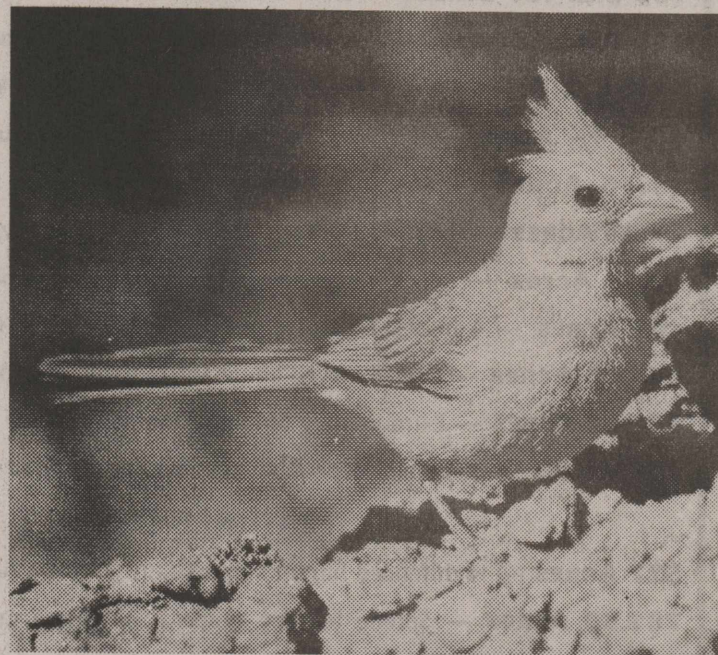
As I begin to generalize a short overview about this hobby, let me just say that the space allotted for this column is not nearly enough to cover all of the how, what, when, where and whys of birding. It is meant to literally be an overview of a tremendous opportunity to get outdoors!

If one is interested in birding, there are several items that can be considered necessities to obtain before beginning. The first is a good bird identification book. There are several quality books to choose from, and making that selection depends largely on how serious you see yourself participating in the hobby. One of my favorites is the Birds of Texas by Fred J. Alsop III. This is one of several field guides by the Smithsonian Handbook series. The next item to obtain would be a good set of binoculars. These are needed for those hard-to-see species that are small or too far away to make a positive ID. Another item would be a good digital camera. A few years ago, a digital DSLR with a large telephoto lens was the way to go. Now, there are several point and shoot cameras that have up to twelve times zoom capabilities, as well as several megapixels, available for a third of what a single DSLR telephoto lens costs. Digital cameras are really good to use in the field as they allow you to photo a bird, then zoom in for a closer look to aid in the identification.

When in the field birdwatching, there are several questions to

ask and answer about a bird's body to assist with making a positive identification. First impressions are the most important in making that ID. Is the head striped, crested, or capped? Are markings present on the face, such as masking, eye-rings, or ear patches? Is the color of the body plumage red, blue, or brown? Are the underparts spotted or streaked? Is the tail forked, rounded, long, or short? Are there distinctive markings on the tail such as spots, bands, or bars? What about the bill? Is it needlelike, or is it hooked, or is it cone-shaped?

There are also other things besides physical attributes to

observe. What is the surrounding habitat like? What kind of voice does the bird utilize? What is its behavior? Does it hop on the ground, does it fly from bush to bush, or does it soar? What is its flight pattern? Does it exhibit a direct straight line flight? Or does it hover or zig-zag?

As you can see, there are several key elements in learning how to be a birdwatcher. But with the mastery of these elements, then you are well on your way to become an experienced birder.

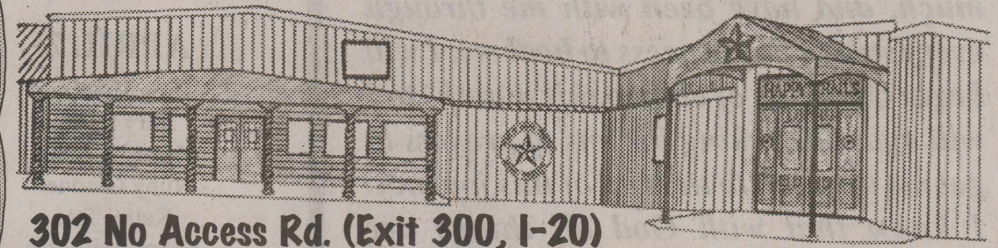

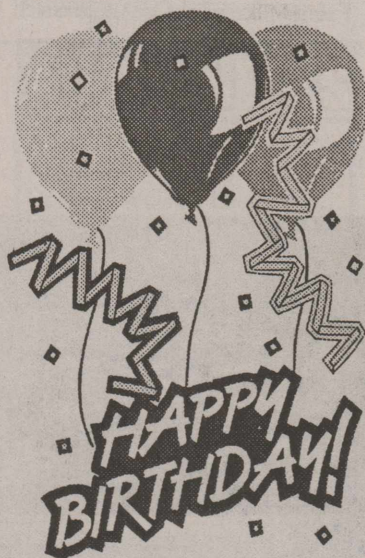

Members and Parents have worked on the range continuously, and it is one of the best 4-H ranges in the state.

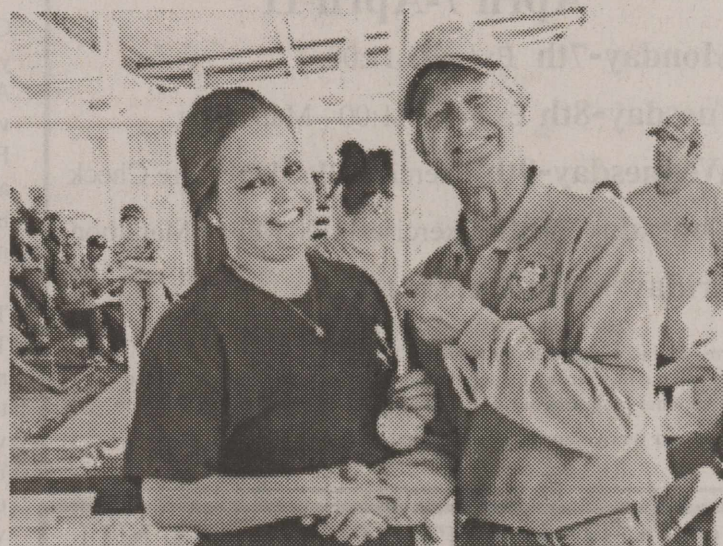
The Callahan Shooting Sports will host the District 3 P Match on April 12, 2014. (There were 100 competitors in this event in the 2013 Match).

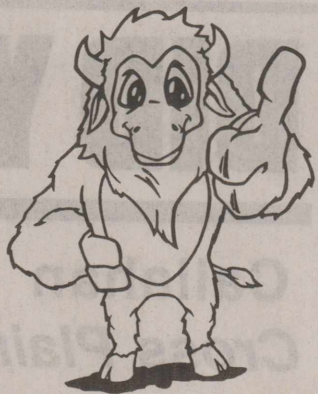

Girl Scouts send 9,769 Boxes of cookies to 40th squadron deployed out of Dyess Air Force Base this month

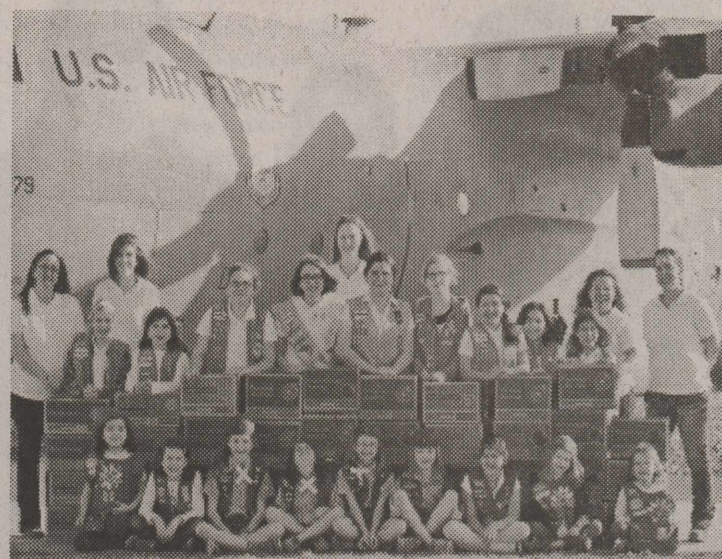
Girl Scout Troop 7200 from Abilene, Texas sold 9,769 boxes of Girl Scout Cookies during the 2014 cookie season.

Texas Historical Commission news briefs

AUSTIN TO HOST SOCIETY FOR AMERICAN ARCHAEOLOGY CONFERENCE

AUSTIN, Texas—Be part of an exclusive "behind the scenes" tour of a 17th century French shipwreck, or learn more about the state's Hispanic heritage at Casa Navarro in San Antonio during the 79th Annual Meeting of the Society for American Archaeology, April 23-27 in Austin. Many events at this year's conference are designed specifically with students in mind, including a speed mentoring session and resume review. A special student day on Saturday, April 26th will introduce high school and undergraduate students to archeology, including an archeology career panel and hands-on archeology activities.

The opening session will focus on the challenges of archeology publishing, and an evening reception will introduce attendees to officers, board members, and other Society members. Proceeds from a silent auction will benefit Native American scholarships. Off-site excursions include a trip to the nearby Bullock Texas State History Museum to view artifacts recovered from the Belle shipwreck, sailed by French explorer Robert Cavellier, Sieur de La Salle, and discovered by Texas Historical Commission (THC) archeologists in 1995. The group will view the actual timber of the ship being reassembled for exhibit, and learn about the ship's recovery from the Gulf of Mexico by Dr. Jim Bruseth, who led the excavation.

The Texas Tejano Tour is a trip through Spanish Colonial San Antonio; another tour takes visitors to the Gault site—the largest and most complex known site of occupation of the prehistoric Clovis peoples, where a three-meter-deep excavation block affords tour participants a view into the past. Workshops

and symposiums cover everything from prehistoric Texas to how to get a job in archeology.

Several current and former THC staff members are participating in this year's conference, which takes place at the Austin Convention Center and nearby Hilton hotel. To register or learn more, visit www.saa.org or contact the THC's Archeology Division at 512.463.6096.

MOST ENDANGERED PLACES DEADLINE EXTENDED TO APRIL 11TH

AUSTIN, Texas—Do you know of a historic building or site that is threatened with demolition or extinction? This is your chance to nominate that location for Preservation Texas' annual Most Endangered Places List. By calling attention to endangered places in Texas, Preservation Texas encourages local action while there's still time before the wrecking ball swings or orange takes its toll. Nominations are open to the public until midnight April 11th. Inclusion on previous lists has provided groups and individuals who are concerned about the future of a site the support, expertise, and guidance to strengthen preservation efforts. New this year, consulting services will be provided to accompany sites making the list. Selected locations will be announced on the steps of the State Capitol in Austin on May 22nd during the Annual Preservation Summit.

A wide range of sites will be considered, from public residential buildings to neighborhoods, bridges, and landscapes. Previous lists have included Texas Capitol view corridors, the 1896 Texas State Railroad, a rare moveable jail cell in Hays County, and historic homesteads that captured the state's ranching heritage.

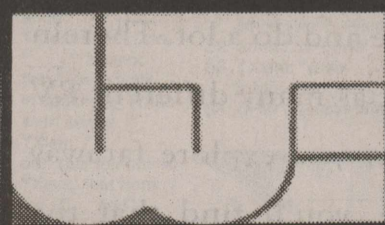
DEADLINE APPROACHING TO BECOME A MAIN STREET COMMUNITY

AUSTIN, Texas—Applications to become a designated Texas Main Street community are accepted only once a year. Communities of all sizes with a historic downtown are eligible to become a Main Street community, and that process begins with a Letter of Intent that is due to the Texas Historical Commission (THC) Main Street office by May 15th.

Each year, the THC may select up to five Texas cities for official Main Street designation. Historic neighborhood commercial districts are also eligible to apply. With the designation, communities become part of a powerful statewide and national network, and receive a range of services from the Texas Main Street Program staff, including design and technical consultation, strategic planning, on-site manager training, and more. There is no application fee.

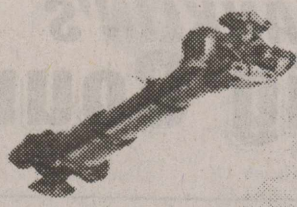

History of Mt. View Cemetery

This quiet rural cemetery was established in January 1891 at the base of Robinson's Peak and for many years was cared for by families of those who were buried there. The cemetery sits on part of a 6 acre tract of land donated by George William Baker to the county in the late 1880's for use as a school. Families in the area built Mt. View School, which was also used as a church. After many years, the school was closed; the building fell into disrepair and was finally razed. The cemetery was all that remained of the community that had once existed. Unbeknownst to the general population, the property on which the cemetery is located reverted back to the heirs of George William Baker.

The heirs had no desire to have the property and taxes were not paid for many years. The property was sold for back taxes on April 25, 2005, to a disinterested buyer who promptly put a "no trespassing" sign on the gate to the cemetery. At a gathering of interested individuals on April 30, 2005, the Mt. View Cemetery Association was created with directors and officers elected. The directors were authorized to seek out the buyer and negotiate the purchase of the land by the Cemetery Association. Mrs. Gussie Jennings advised the Board she would arrange for an accurate survey of the cemetery and the six acres which included the one acre cemetery.

To make a long story short, it was Mrs. Jennings who ultimately purchased the land bought at the tax sale (as it adjoins the property owned by her and her late husband, Arthur Jennings). Mrs. Jennings then donated the cemetery property and an additional 1/2 acre on the back side of the cemetery to the cemetery association. She also contacted Mrs. Jane Stephens Greer who actually owned the property from the front of the cemetery to the county road. Mrs. Greer donated that area to the cemetery association also. After recording these donation deeds giving the land to the Mt. View Cemetery Association, a separate document was recorded with the Coleman County Clerk dedicating the land as a cemetery, so it is no longer subject to taxes.

In September of 2005, the first official meeting of the Mt. View Cemetery Association was held at the cemetery. At this meeting the Articles of Association



and Bylaws were approved by those attending. Edwina Early offered to prepare the application to the Texas Historical Commission for an official designation of Mt. View Cemetery as a Texas Historic Cemetery. Significant donation was made at that time by the Templeton family and those funds and other donations have sustained the operations and projects of the cemetery to the current date.

In December of 2005, ground penetrating radar was performed over the entire area of the fenced cemetery, and on certain portions outside the fence where graves were believed to be located. The locations of known graves were verified, and a number of previously unknown graves were identified, one of which was outside the fence.

In 2006, Directors Joe Faries and Robert Wayne Low undertook and completed the task of erecting a pavilion near the front gate of the cemetery. The Board of Directors took an action to call it the "Gussie Jennings Pavilion" in honor of her donation of the property and other efforts to provide for the land to be protected under the control of the Association. During 2006, Joe and Robert also marked the graves of unknown persons identified by the GPR results and new fencing was erected on the south and east sides of the cemetery.

Annual meetings and workdays for the cemetery have been held each April since 2006.

General maintenance has been performed in keeping brush cleared from the fences and trees trimmed and brush cut inside the cemetery. In 2008, the Board agreed to investigate the option of installing a gate in the back section of the cemetery to allow vehicle traffic to enter from that point. Some gravestones are being damaged each time funeral vehicles and grave-digging equipment come through the front gate.

In 2010, the Association received word that the Texas Historical Cemetery designation was granted by the State Historical Commission.

In 2011 and 2012, there was discussion to move forward with clearing the half acre of land at the back of the cemetery that had been donated by Mrs. Arthur V. (Gussie) Jennings and also the brushy land at the front of the cemetery. Also under investigation was the cost of obtaining and installing a tinhorn in the ditch by the county road to accommodate putting a new gate at the back of the cemetery.

November of 2013 brought a great deal of activity. The brush and trees on the back half-acre of the cemetery and that on the front around the parking area were bulldozed. Additional work needs to be done to clear the brush piles that are left. The tinhorn and new gate at the back of the cemetery were also installed in November.

In addition, in mid-November, an application was submitted to the Texas Historical Commission for the placement of a Texas Historical Marker at Mt. View Cemetery. Word was received in January of 2014 that the application was approved. It will take a number of months for the marker to be created. A notice will be published when

the ceremony dedicating the marker will be held. We hope you will be able to attend this dedication ceremony.

Over the past few years, the participation at the annual workday and annual meeting has dwindled to a small number of people. We hope you will consider attending our next meeting this spring. Ordinarily, meetings are held the 3rd weekend of April. This year, however, that is Easter weekend and the meeting date has been changed to the 3rd weekend of May which is Saturday, May 17th.

There are still a number of items on the project list to do at Mt. View: 1) clear the three brush piles left by the bulldozing and have those areas smoothed out; 2) add more base material at and around the new gate to facilitate water runoff; 3) build/install a sign at the main driveway off the county road; 4) buy additional pavers to mark identified graves of unknown persons; and 5) obtain materials to clean and reset gravestones on an as-needed basis. We expect these projects will cost approximately \$1500-\$3000 dollars over the next few years.

We are asking you to consider making a donation to help with these projects so that our regular donations can continue to support the routine maintenance and upkeep of Mt. View Cemetery. Mt. View Cemetery is as peaceful and beautiful as it has always been, maybe even more so. We hope you will help us to keep it this way.
