

that we have had another successful Archery shoot at the Callahan County Shooting Sports Complex. The events called End of School Blowout, was a blast for all that attended. The shoot consisted of Modified 600 and Field Archery. Modified 600 is a variation from Olympic style FITA. Shooters would shoot 60 arrows at 3 different distances depending on their age group. Senior (14 to 18) would shoot 18 arrows each at both 60 yards and 50 yards, and 24 arrows at 40 yards, Intermediates (11-13) would shoot 18 arrows each at both 50 yards and 40 yards, and 24 arrows at 30 yards, and Juniors (8 and in the 3rd grade or 9 - 10) would shoot 18 arrows each at both 30 yards and 25 yards and 24 arrows at 20 yards. A perfect score would be 600 points.

The other event was Field Archery where shooters had 14 targets, shooting 4 arrows per target at known distances between 60 yards to as short at 20 feet. A perfect score would be 280. Following 4H rules, Seniors will shoot up too distances not greater than 60 yards, Intermediates will shoot up too distances not greater

than 50 yards, and Juniors will shoot up too distances not greater than 30 yards in any given event. There are several different bow classifications that the kids shoot. Compound Bow Aided, Compound Bow Unaided, and Recurve/ Longbow.







AUSTIN-Since May 9th, at Game Wardens, an unusually horsepower. high number of fatalities before supervising the operation of a the Memorial Day weekend. vessel by another must be 18 With the big weekend years of age or older and approaching, Texans are exempt from the boater heading to lakes, rivers and coastlines to enjoy the water. Game wardens and boater education experts are doing everything they can to make it a safe boating season, but could use a little help.

Last year in Texas, 146 accidents were reported by the U.S. Coast Guard, 31 of which ended with deaths. Statistics show many of these tragedies could have been prevented. Nearly 85 percent of boating accident victims were not wearing life jackets.

"The numbers speak for themselves," said Cody Jones, **TPWD** Assistant Commander for Marine Enforcement. "Wearing a life jacket increases your chances of surviving on the water and can prevent your trip from turning into a tragedy.

State law requires that a personal floatation device is available for each occupant of the boat, but only children under 13 years of age are mandated by the law to wear one while the boat or paddle craft is underway or drifting. Despite this law, last year in Texas, more than 700 citations were issued for children not





In 2013, 208 citations were internet\_courses.phtml issued in Texas to boaters who were intoxicated. And five of the state's boating deaths in a discounted rate from their 2013 were alcohol-related, boating insurance provider. highlighting the importance of not drinking while operating a boat.


# CPVFD & EMS collect donations

# **Praying Mantis**

Many animals can be adequately described by their namesake. The name Trans-Pecos Ratsnake tells one where that species can be observed. The name Eastern Bluebird tells one what color the bird is. The name Giant Centipede describes the size of that species. But there is one particular species of insect that occurs throughout Texas whose namesake is still the debate of many entomologists and that arthropod is the Praying Mantis.

Praying Mantis The (Stagmomantis limbata) can be observed throughout Texas, and it does not seem to be more common in one particular habitat. They are commonly observed in the dry desert areas of the Chihuahuan Desert of the Trans-Pecos region as often as the lush forested areas of east Texas. The main requirement for this species is actually not the habitat itself, but rather the



abundance of the food supply. Outside of Texas this particular species of mantid is common in Arizona, New Mexico and Mexico. Other members of this family (known as Mantidae) can be found worldwide, except in the cold harsher environments.

This amazing insect varies in color from brown to tan to green, depending on many factors such as age, size, and species. Most commonly observed colors are brown, tan, and green. Like other insects, mantises have six legs and three body parts; the head, the thorax, and the abdomen. The head is triangular in shape, much like the multitude of alien creatures from Hollywood culture lore. The eyes are large and compound, and as such, have the appearance of having a small pupil. The thorax is where the legs and wings are attached, and it is long and flexible, and the abdomen (where all of the vital organs are stored), is soft and almost pudgy. There is a distinctive sexual dimorphism, which means males and females are different in appearance. In males the abdomen is narrow and straight while the wings are long. In the opposite sex, the abdomen is quite thick, almost hip-like in look. The wings are much shorter in females, and as such, they are not as quick to flight as the more aerodynamic males are.

What sets this insect apart from others as well as causing the debate on the namesake are the front legs. These forelegs are rather thick and long, and have multiple sharp spikes. When not being utilized, they are folded at two joints per leg in an almost penitent posture of prayer. That is where the namesake probably originated from. However, these forelegs are used to obtain food items by impaling the victim and holding it in place while the mantis feeds at its leisure, giving it the namesake of Preying Mantis.

This species is very beneficial to gardeners as it feeds on harmful insects such as aphids, and it has a voracious appetite. Many thousands of egg sacs, known as the ootheca, are sold com-

mercially to gardeners as a biological pest control. Besides other arthropods, it also has been known to feed on small lizards, snakes, and even small rodents.

Mating for the male Praying Mantis is quite a dangerous event. Females are cannabillistic and will feed on the males as soon as copulation is completed. Only the quickest and most alert males are capable of breeding with multiple females. In the early fall, after several weeks following successful copulation, the female will lay the ootheca, which is a hardened encasement for the thousands of eggs. The eggs incubate in the ootheca over the winter months and survival during the cold, harsh winter is not always a sure thing.





# **Memorial Day Weekend very busy for Texas Game Wardens**

AUSTIN - Texas game wardens investigated seven drowning deaths and another four boating-related fatalities over what proved to be one of the state's deadliest Memorial Day weekends.

In addition to handling those tragedies, game wardens issued hundreds of water safety citations and made numerous arrests, including 31 persons for boating while intoxicated, 7 for driving while intoxicated, 14 for public intoxication and 36 on various drug-related offenses.

"Texas game wardens will remember this Memorial Day weekend for years to come," said Lt. Col. Danny Shaw, Deputy Director of Law Enforcement for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. "Tragically, this

 Provide a link on their government website to the Comptroller's website about transparency in government at www.texastransparency.org.

• The chief executive (e.g., mayor, county judge, superintendent or executive director) signs a pledge to post, on their government website, information about proposed bond packages and existing debt and provide the Comptroller's office with a link to this information no later than one business day after the chran County Auditor Danny



# "Click It Or Ticket" campaign warns Texans to buckle up or pay up

AUSTIN - Motorists who don't buckle up in compliance with state seat belt laws face fines and court costs up to \$200 as stepped up enforcement gets underway this month during the Texas Department of Transportation's 13th annual "Click It or Ticket" campaign, May 19th to June 1st.

"Seat belts save lives," said John Barton, TxDOT deputy executive director. "That's a fact. Buckling up will keep you from getting a ticket, and more importantly, it could save your life. Whether you're the driver or a passenger, everyone in the vehicle is required by law to wear a seat belt for every trip. The cost of not using one just isn't worth it."

The "Click It or Ticket" campaign is credited with motivating millions of motorists to always use their seat belts. Only 76 percent of Texans used seat belts when the campaign began in 2002. Today, 9 out of 10 Texans buckle up. The National Highway Traffic Safety estimates that since its inception, the "Click It or Ticket" campaign in Texas has resulted in 3,962 fewer traffic fatalities while preventing 66,823 serious injuries and saving more than \$15 billion in related economic costs.

In 2013, there were 943 fatalities and 5,383 serious injuries in Texas resulting from crashes in which drivers or

passengers were not wearing seat belts. Wearing a seat belt increases the chances of surviving a serious crash by 45 percent. In pickup trucks, that number jumps to 60 percent as those vehicles are more likely than cars to roll over in a crash. In roll-over crashes, seat belts help keep occupants from being ejected from the vehicle. Texas law requires everyone in a vehicle to be buckled up, including back seat passengers. # DPS, U.S. Department of State join forces to Fight Crime

AUSTIN - The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) announced today that it has partnered with the U.S. Department of State (DoS) to help support criminal justice assistance programs abroad. The program, managed by the DoS Bureau of International Narcotics and Law Enforcement Affairs (INL), is designed to help foreign law enforcement personnel combat criminal networks where they develop and help reduce criminal threats both in the United States and partner countries. DPS Director Steven McCraw and Ambassador William Brownfield, who is the Assistant Secretary for the INL, made the announcement today at a ceremony in Austin, where they signed the Memorandum of Understanding for this partnership.

"Crime today is alarmingly transitory, transnational, organized and covert, and it is not enough for governments to focus solely on protecting

public safety and disrupting crime within their borders - the efforts must be global," said Director McCraw. "DPS. is pleased to be partnering with the U.S. State Department today in an effort to help bolster the law enforcement efforts of other nations and work with our world partners to combat criminal activities everywhere."

The U.S. Department of State has partnered with more than 70 state, county and municipal criminal justice agencies across the United States that work with INL to assist with the training and mentorship of foreign law enforcement personnel. The program is intended to ultimately help reduce crime within U.S. borders and beyond by enhancing the ability of other nations to fight crime, administer justice and protect citizens.


