

He then enjoyed his lifelong interest in antiques, opening "Ray's Relics" in Georgetown, Texas. His last years were spent in Denver, Colorado, with a son and two grandchildren.

We plan on having a "Sponsor Board" with names of those individuals or businesses who help with this event.



Texas A&M Forest Service urges caution during July 4th holiday

COLLEGE STATION – There are many ways to celebrate July 4th, and while sitting by the campfire, grilling a favorite dish, or using fireworks are common activities - they could spark a wildfire.

According to Texas A&M Forest Service Prevention Specialist Jan Amen, 90 percent of wildfires are started by humans, so it is imperative to be mindful of the risk of starting a fire - even with recent rainfall.

"In Texas there are currently no areas of concern over the holiday but it's still important locally to be careful with the use of fireworks," Texas A&M Service Predictive Services Department Head Tom Spencer said. "It's still possible to start a fire.'

Due to the recent rains in May and June the potential for wildfire has decreased across much of the state. However, TFS encourages everyone to use caution and stay safe this Independence Day.

Fireworks safety tips:

· Before you celebrate, always check with local government officials to ensure fireworks and outdoor burning are allowed in your county. Be sure to comply with all restrictions.

· Read and follow all warnings and instruction labels on fireworks.

• Use fireworks only under close adult supervision and in safe areas away from structures, dry grass and brush.

 Keep a hose, bucket of water and wet towels nearby in case of a malfunction or fire. • Dispose of used fireworks in a bucket of water.

 Never ignite fireworks in a container, especially a glass or metal container.

Note: Burn bans and fireworks restrictions are determined by county government. Texas A&M Forest Service does not take a position on the use of fireworks, nor does the agency determine, set or lift restrictions.







The training program begins on August 14th and runs through October 28th. Classes are held weekly, on Tuesday nights, with two Saturday excursions and two Thursday programs.

Those completing classroom training and passing the final exam will be required to complete a minimum of 40 hours of volunteer service within a one year of training graduation.

Individuals completing the training become certified Master Naturalists, assisting both the Texas A&M Extension Service and the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department through community education in natural resources.

The training is based upon Texas Master Naturalist state guidelines and has been focused to fit our region of the state. Teachers, ag producers, conservationists, environmental advocates and people simply interested in our natural treasures, have taken the course and remain active in the organization.

August 1st is the deadline to register for this year's class. The fee for the class is \$100.00 per person and includes resource books and material. Class size is limited to 20 people, and acceptance is based on applicants' willingness to volunteer.

Statewide Boat-draining Rule Takes Effect July 1st

their boat and on-board receptacles before leaving or approaching a body of fresh water anywhere in Texas.

The new Texas Parks and Wildfurther spread of zebra mussels and other invasive species. It applies to all types and sizes of boats whether powered or not: personal watercraft, sailboats, not require draining, and there is kayaks/canoes, or any other an exception for governmental vessel used on public waters.

The regulation requires the draining of livewells, bilges, motors, and any other receptacles or water-intake systems coming into contact with public waters

Live fish, including personally caught live bait, cannot be transported from the water body where the fish were caught in or aboard a vessel in water from the water body where the fish were caught. Personally caught live bait can be used in the water body where it was caught.

Anglers are allowed to transport and use commercially purchased live bait if they have a receipt that identifies the source of the bait. Any live bait purchased from a location on or adjacent to a public water body that is transported in water from of Grapevine, Water Oriented that water body can only be used as bait on that same water body.



DPS Increasing DWI Patrols for July 4th Holiday

AUSTIN – The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) will increase DWI patrols for an 11-day period that includes the July 4th holiday. From June 27th – July 7th, DPS troopers will focus DWI patrols in high-risk locations at times when alcohol-related crashes are most frequent.

"As we prepare to celebrate the Fourth of July, DPS urges Texans to do their part to help keep our roadways safe during the holiday," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "Individuals should always designate a sober driver or find other means of transportation if they plan to drink alcohol. During the holiday, DPS troopers will be performing increased patrols aimed at protecting all travelers and removing dangerous drivers from the road.'

The increased patrols that target impaired driving are funded through a grant from the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT). During the 2013 July 4th enforcement effort, DPS troopers made 1,124 DWI arrests, and 173 of those arrests were the direct result of the increased patrols. DPS enforcement also resulted in 720 fugitive arrests, 602 felony arrests, more than 15,700 speeding citations and more than 2,400 seat belt/child safety seat citations during this period.





However, there is another species of horned lizard found in west Texas that is just as intriguing and that is the Round-tailed Horned Lizard. The Round-tailed Horned Liz-

ard (Phynosoma modestum) is one of three species of "horny toads" that live in Texas, and it has the second-largest area of distribution. It occurs throughout the Trans-Pecos, where it can be quite abundant. It is the smallest horned lizard that inhabits this state, with adults reaching a total length of a mere four inches, although the average is between three and three and one-half inches. The background coloration can be various shades of tan, brown or even brick red, matching the color of the soils where it is living. The pattern along the back can vary from having prominent large brown blotches to almost being patternless. Aside from the size, it differs from the larger Texas Horned Lizard by the absence of a row of fringe scales along the sides of the body. There are only four horns that adorn the head with all of them being the same



ard is oviparous, which is a fancy way of saying that it lays eggs. After emerging from the winterlong brumation period (reptiles do not hibernate in the true sense of the word), males will search out females to mate. After mating, the female will lay anywhere from two to thirteen eggs in moisture retaining soil. After approximately two months of incubation, the miniscule onequarter inch long young emerge prepared to fend for and care for themselves.

Populations of this misnamed "horny toad" (they are not amphibians, but rather reptiles) are apparently quite stable. It is extremely shy, and prefers to rely on camouflage rather than flight for defense. Many are almost stepped on before they make a short dash. They will then stop abruptly, blending in with the substrate to the point of being difficult to detect again.
