

14 Month Old Owen Turner back at home

Life Changing Moments

Owen was a healthy 8 month old boy. He was jabbering, cutting teeth and trying to figure out how to get two hands and two feet to move at the same time to crawl, and then a stroke took away his ability to use the right side of his body in a matter of minutes. Rushed to the ER his family is given the news that cuts through their heart. We are so sorry to tell you according to lab work, your baby has leukemia and a helicopter will take him to Cook Children's Hospital in Fort Worth. The next 5 days are a whirlwind of tests, tears, and love as doctors determine the type of leukemia Owen has and friends and loved ones join together to support this young couple and their only

Owen was diagnosed with an aggressive form of leukemia AML M-5 and the chemotherapy treatment would be just as aggressive as the disease. As with any medical treatment there were side effects that his little body would have to endure to rid him of this terrible disease and the chemo that went into his body to fight it. Always smiling and lighting up the hospital room that became his world. His whole world was confined to a room with a couch, a recliner, crib, toys, and TV in addition to all kinds of medical equipment. Owen was young enough to accept his surroundings and knew his mommy and daddy were always with him so he was safe and loved and welcomed nurses and doctors in with a wave of his fingers and a big, sometimes crooked grin.

Six months have passed and after being in the hospital at Fort Worth for 5 months and at St Jude Children's Research Hospital in Memphis, the past month, Owen has been treated for this cancer, but his parents

also chose to help other boys and our eyes open to the needs of girls by being a part of a treatment program through St Jude's that is developing a natural killer cell (extracted from the blood of a parent) treatment for AML.

Owen finally got the news everyone has been so anxiously waiting for and was able to return home with his parents on July 3, 2014. Owen is becoming a healthy 14 month old jabbering, cutting teeth and trying to figure out how to get his right hand and right foot to move like his left hand and foot does, but his family and friends surround him with love and marvel at the restoration of health inside this little body and believe his ability to walk and throw a ball with his right arm and talk will be the next miracles to be witnessed.

Although you are never ready for any tragedy, disease, or disaster to be in your life or those that you love, even in the midst of the trials, we knew then and know still that God is in control. As we look back over the past few months, we have seen so many miracles and lives that have been forever changed by the circumstances of the illness suffered by Owen Clay Turner. We thank God for all the love, prayers and support for our family and the strength that was received from each act of

There is always something good in every situation and every person and sometimes you have to look hard to find it, but through Owen's illness, we did not have to look, the Glory of God was and is shining bright and the song I keep playing over and over in my mind is "I will praise You in the storm"

We are blessed beyond measure by each of you and will never be able to express our gratitude so we will just keep others to pay it forward.

Journey of Hope cyclists stop in Cross Plains

The Journey of Hope cyclist groups made their way through the center of Cross Plains on Wednesday, July 2, 2014.

The Journey of Hope is one of the many Push America groups made up of members of the Pi Kappa Phi Fraternity. Each summer they cycle across the United States to raise funds and awareness for people with disabilities. While on their journey they will participate in various activities and team members are able to spread the message of understanding for people with disabilities across the country.

All of the groups that make up Push America's Organization believe and stand by the "People first language". By using "People first language" it puts the person before their disability, for example you may say "person with a disability" instead of "disabled" or "handicapped." By doing this it defines the individual first and foremost as a person and not by his or her disability.

Through fundraising and sponsorships this event alone will raise more than \$600,000 annually. The money raised will help with camps for those individuals with disabilities, making community facilities accessible, and spreading awareness.

Their mission and vision is building leaders of tomorrow by serving people with disabilities today. Nick Brady, a member of the 2012 Journey of Hope said " As a team member, you often receive praise for "sacrificing" your summer for such a worthy cause. I have come to learn that we are not the ones that "sacrifice"; we are the ones that have the privilege to participate in such a unique opportunity.... I am confident that my teammates and I will continue to live out the Ide-

als of Push America." Traveling in groups of 3 for safety these cyclists started in Long Beach, California on June 6th and have already cycled over 1800 miles. The team is made up of 27 cyclists of all ages and 11 crew members.

Cycling at a pace of 15 - 30 mph they will stop about every 10 miles to refill water bottles and take a small break. Churches, school gyms and sponsors will open their doors for these members to sleep, rest

The journey will end in Washing DC after traveling over 3800 miles.




These students were sponsored by Callahan-Shackelford County Farm Bureau. They joined more than 305 high school juniors and seniors from over 120 counties across the state.

The purpose of the conference is to provide the students with a better understanding of their American heritage, the capitalistic free enterprise system, and to inspire leadership development, said Phil Williams, president of the Callahan-Shackelford County Farm Bureau.

During the weeklong event, three areas are emphasized: Patriotism, Leadership and Responsibility. Students discuss topics on the free enterprise system, the Constitution, money management, leadership and goal setting, and are encouraged to meet with school and civic groups upon their return home to share what

Texas Spotted Whiptail

The Texas Spotted Whiptail (Cnemidophorus gularis gularis) is one of eleven species of "racerunners" that live in Texas, and it arguably has the largest area of distribution. It can be observed statewide, save for a small portion of the Texas and Louisiana border, and the northern-most section of the panhandle. It also occurs to the north in the southern 1/2 of Oklahoma, west to southeastern New Mexico, as well as southward to the central portions of San Luis Potosi, Mexico.

The habitats that this elegant lizard prefers are arid to semiarid grasslands, rocky arroyos, and rocky hillsides. They are most common on sandy soil here there is a of shrubs and trees. They are vember, and unlike many other also commonly observed near residences and in parks where there is ample moisture from irrigation.

The Texas Spotted Whiptail is an elongated reptile that is covered with small granular scales of equal size along its back and whiptail species that occur in Texas, with adults reaching a total length of one foot, although and nine inches. The background coloration is tan or brown, and the back is adorned with either seven or eight light of saying that it lays eggs. After stripes that run lengthwise from the neck to the tail. These lines can be white, yellow, or occasionally faint green. There are numerous light spots that appear in random order in between these light stripes, giving this animal the common name. The long tail, which can be up to 65% of the animal's total length, is either brown or orange in coloration. The belly scales are much larger and plate-like in appearance, and in females are light in coloration. Males have dark blue-black mottlings on the belly and orange chins during breeding season.

Texas Spotted Whiptails, like other lizard species, are "coldblooded", or ectothermic. This means that they do not generate heat from the inside of their body, as mammals and birds do, but rather are dependent on outside sources for heating and cooling. They are active throughout the day from March to No-

reptile species, the high metabolism of this lizard enables it to be observed during the hottest part of the summer afternoons.

After mating, the female will lay a small clutch of eggs (between two and six) in moisture retaining soil. Older, large females can lay two to

three clutches of eggs per summer. After approximately two months of incubation, the delicate four inch long young emerge prepared to fend for and care for themselves.

These lizards are nervous and can be quite wary. They are constantly on the move, foraging for food in the ground cover and loose soil. Occasionally they will stop to bask in between meal items, but their metabolism is such that they will begin to forage within minutes of stopping. Their movement is based on short bursts of speed, rarely more than a few feet at a time unless they feel threatened. Look to observe this speedy lizard in and around city parks and nature trails.

Governor Perry issues proclamation on law prohibiting employment discrimination

TWC's Civil Rights Division celebrates 50th anniversary of Civil rights Act of 1964

AUSTIN - Today marks the 50th anniversary of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, which was signed into law by Texan and then-President Lyndon B. Johnson.

The prohibits Act discrimination in public places, provides for the integration of schools and other public facilities, and makes employment discrimination illegal.

In honor of the 50th anniversary of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Gov. Rick Perry issued a proclamation commending the Texas Workforce Commission's (TWC) Civil Rights Division (CRD), which is tasked with enforcing employment and housing discrimination laws.

"Fifty years ago, President Lyndon Baines Johnson signed the Civil Rights Act of 1964, prohibiting discrimination in the workforce based on an individual's race, color, religion, sex or national origin," Gov. Perry said in his proclamation. "Building upon this foundation, the Texas Legislature later passed the Texas Commission on Human Rights Act, codifying our state's commitment to protect the public from employment discrimination.



A business partner in the 1980's with George H.W. Bush, Conaway said he was appointed by Governor Bush for seven and one-half years to the State Board of Accountancy.







"When people with disabilities or the elderly become ill or depressed, sometimes they can no longer care for themselves. Sometimes they quit trying. That's when others need to step in."

APS is joining with many community, civic, and professional groups during May to raise awareness and understanding about adult abuse and neglect through conferences, presentations, and other events.






