

CLYDE – Charlie Wilburn (Dandy) Bell, 79, of Clyde, died Thursday, July 03, 2014, at an Abilene hospital. Funeral services were held at 10:00 a.m. Monday, July 7, 2014, at Bailey-Howard Funeral Home Chapel with Billy Sellers officiating. A Masonic graveside service followed in the Clyde Cemetery under the direction of Bailey-Howard Funeral Home of Clyde. Visitation was from 4:00 to 6:00 p.m. Sunday at the funeral home.

Charlie was born May 29, 1935, in Cottonwood to Charlie Walter and Jeffie Wilburn (Nigar) Bell and was a 1954 graduate of Cross Plains High School. He and his wife Venita Golson Bell were classmates and sweethearts from the 8th grade on, and were married two weeks out of high school at the preacher's house in Cottonwood on June 5, 1954. Charlie went to work for Timex in July, 1954, and retired 31 years later as a Production Engineer. Timex took them to Taipei, Taiwan; Toluca, Mexico; Lisbon, Portugal; Little Rock, Arkansas; Waterbury, Connecticut; and Abilene. They moved to Clyde in 1961 and were members of Southside Baptist Church. He was a veteran of the Army Reserve and the National Guard. After retiring from Timex in 1984. Charlie owned Charlie's Classic Car Wash at S. 14th & Poplar for ten years. He worked for Lawrence Brothers IGA for 17 years, starting out as a night manager for two years, before becoming the flower delivery man for Parker Florist, located inside the store. In a 2012 article in the Abilene Reporter News about Charlie, store manager Mark Brown said "officially Bell delivers flowers, but the 43 employees and hundreds of customers know Bell does a lot more. Unofficially, you might find Charlie sacking groceries, shaking hands with an old friend or a total stranger, telling jokes or taking out the trash.'

In addition to working at IGA, Charlie worked at Bailey-Howard Funeral Home for the last 13 years, helping with funerals and keeping the funeral home open for viewings and visitations. He visited everyone who came in whether he knew them or not, took out trash, answered the phone and whatever else needed to be done. Charlie was unique in that he was related to or at least knew nearly everyone in town. He never missed a day of work, and would stay late in the evening for visitations and worked nearly every weekend and holiday. Before heading to IGA every morning, Charlie would come by the funeral home to make coffee and open up. Charlie was family. He will be sorely missed and impossible to

replace. Charlie is survived by his wife, Venita Bell, of Clyde; two daughters, Debbie Kilpatrick and husband Kelly and Sharon Lester and husband Donald, all of Clyde; one son, Jeff Bell and wife Margie of Clyde; three brothers, Kenny Bell and wife Kay and Terry Bell and wife Dana, all of Clyde, and Ronnie Bell and wife Sheralyn of Cross Plains; his sister-in-law, Teresa Bell of Clyde; eight grandchildren; 14 great-grandchildren; and numerous nieces and nephews.

He was preceded in death by his parents; his brother, Ed Bell; and two sisters, Charlene "Sis" Tucker and an infant, Wanda Myrle Bell, who was his brother, Ronnie's twin.

Forest Clayton Scott was born to Forest S. and Maudie Scott on September 21, 1924 in Cedar Bluff, TX. He went home to his Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ on July 27, 2014. He was raised on a farm in Cottonwood, Texas and attended Cross Plains High School. While at Cross Plains, Forest, an accomplished track athlete, won second in the UIL State Track Meet in the 440 yard run his senior year (quite an accomplishment since this was before athletes were divided into divisions). Upon graduation, Forest attended Rice University on a track scholarship before entering the army and serving in Europe with the 42nd Rainbow Division during World War II. He married Vida McCann on June 22, 1946; they were married for sixty-eight years. Forest resumed his education at McMurry College after the war and competed on their track team. He graduated from McMurry in 1950 with a Bachelor of Science Degree. He was later inducted into the McMurry Athletic Hall of Fame for his outstanding accomplishments on the track. Following graduation from McMurry, Forest taught for one week at Colo-Korean War with the First Cal-

After the Korean War, Forest and Vida moved to Andrews in 1951 and lived there for sixty-one years. Over a thirty-one year career with Andrews Independent School District, Forest worked as a teacher, coach, high school assistant principal and middle school principal. As a coach, he and Charlie Russell had a fortysix game winning streak with their ninth grade football teams. Forest was one of the initial organizers of the Texas Middle School Association and served two terms on the Association's Board of Directors. From 1978-1982, he was a board member of the National Association of Secondary School Principals. He served on multiple committees, chaired committees, published articles and presented programs for local, state and national school principal associations. In addition to assisting others in their education, Forest continued his education and earned his Masters of Education from Sul Ross University in 1956.

Forest and Vida were members of Andrews First Baptist Church, where he was the Adult 4 Sunday School Class Superintendent for twenty-one years. He was in the Andrews Downtown Lions Club, serving in several positions including president. Forest helped establish the first Boy's Club in Andrews and served as a president in that organization. In 1986, Forest was elected to represent The Permian Basin in the Texas first Silver Haired Legislature. He stayed active in athletics by working as a starter at many high school track meets. He was the starter for Canyon Reef Relays in Snyder for twenty

Forest was preceded in death by his parents and brother, Elvis Scott. He is survived by his wife: Vida; a sister: Lilly Bell Calhoon; three sons: Stanley and

wife Judy of Lubbock, Larry and wife Susan of Snyder, Carl and wife Renee of Eula; eight grandchildren; and one great-granddaughter.

In 1988 Alice was featured on national television in Woman Watch, produced by Ted Turner. She was also featured in 33 newspaper and magazine articles.

In 1988 the governor of Texas declared Alice a "Yellow Rose of Texas". This honor is reserved for women who have lived in Texas and contributed to ranching and living the country life. Alice retired in 1991 and moved back to Cross Plains. She will always be our "YELLOW ROSE OF TEXAS".

The commissioners' court met with Don Jones, chief appraiser for the Callahan County Appraisal District, who submitted the appraisal district's budget for the 2014-2015 fiscal year. The budget included monthly car allowances and significant employee pay raises.

The commissioners' court had some questions about these requests. The new budget did not pass for a lack of a motion.

Judge Roger Corn reported the appraisal district budget had just a flat fee for the car allowance and commissioners wanted to vote. know how many miles the appraisal district drives annually.

Judge Corn also said he believed some of the pay raises pay raises varied from over 2 percent to one employee's raise of over 10 percent. Judge Corn said all six appraisal district employees would receive pay raises.

Judge Corn said the other entities which fund the appraisal district have yet to act on the appraisal district's budget. He said the budget would be approved if three-fourths of the entities approve the district's

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Black-tailed Rattlesnake

When a person mentions the word "rattlesnake", the image immediately conjured up is that of the defensively coiled and agitated Diamondback Rattler. However, in Texas, there are eight species of rattlesnakes, and one of my favorites is the variety that rarely makes its presence known by utilizing the telltale


The Black-tailed Rattlesnake (Crotalus molossus) occurs from southeastern Arizona eastward through the Chihuahuan Desert portions of southern New Mexico and western Texas to near Austin, then south to the Mexican states of Jalisco and Oaxaca. In Texas, it is most frequently observed in the mountainous areas of the Trans-Pecos, less often in the Hill Country. Unlike its close relative the Western Diamondback Rattlesnake, Blacktailed Rattlesnakes are habitat specialists, living primarily in the canyons and streambeds of these areas.

This is a moderately large species of rattlesnake that can attain lengths of up to four feet, with the record size being fiftytwo inches, although most adults average just over three feet in length.

very unique and distinctive coloration and pattern characteristics. The most obvious is the dark tail that ranges in color from jet black to a charcoal black. Another is the black nose and forehead that gives this snake the appearance of having dipped the front part of its face into black ink. The background is primarily black along the spine, with a pattern of variably colored patches of pale scales along the first half of the body. At least in the confines of this state, these pale patches range in color from light tan to yellow to greenish. Specimens from the limestone-filled Edwards and Stockton Plateaus typically are lighter in coloration than the ones that inhabit the igneous rock mountains of the Trans-Pecos. No other rattlesnake that lives in this animals range exhibits these

characteristics. Like other rattlesnakes, the head of this species is distinctly wider than the neck, giving this animal the famous "diamondshaped" head. The pupils are elliptical, and the rattle is large and is capable of being heard from several yards away.

Unlike other large species of rattlesnakes, the Black-tailed Rattlesnake does not winter together in large numbers. The process of brumation, (not hibernation as the animal does not sleep through the winter, but

rather just slows its heart rate and metabolism) generally takes place between late October to mid-March. Even in mid-winter, this species may make an appearance on exceptionally warm days to bask in the heating rays from the sun, particularly females that are carrying fertilized

Breeding takes place in the fall, with the female holding on to its mates sperm over the winter until spring, when ovulation actually takes place. Several Black-tailed Rattlesnakes have studies have shown that this species of snake will actually "mate for life", reproducing with the same mate year after year while cohabitating in the same area. Blacktails are oviviparous, which means they give birth to living young, and the nine inchlong neonates (which number from 6 to 10) are typically born in late summer and early fall. Other than having a "button" on the end of the tail, they are exact replicas of the adults and are fully capable of fending for themselves, including having fully functional fangs and venom

This species is typically crepuscular (active at dawn and dusk) during the spring and fall when nighttime temperatures begin to fall and are nocturnal (active at night) during the sum-

mer months when the daytime temperatures exceed intolerable highs. It uses its venom to obtain its prey, which is primarily made up of rodents of various sizes. Juveniles will occasionally add lizards to its diet.

Black-tailed Rattlesnakes as a whole are not as high-strung and temperamental as the more common Western Diamondback Rattler, and their venom is only about eighty percent as potent. This does not make them any less dangerous, but because they live in areas that are generally inaccessible to the general public, they are not considered by most to be a serious threat to people. In fact, many ranchers will often leave the "colas negras" alone, while exterminating any and all Diamondbacks on sight.

When participating in outdoor activities, the risk of encountering a Black-tailed Rattler is remarkably slim, although it can and does happen occasionally. If such an encounter occurs, remember that this animal, despite its harmful capability, is more afraid of you than you are of it and it would prefer to be left





The resolution follows:

RESOLUTION

CONCERNING UNACCOM-**PANIED FOREIGN MINORS**

WHEREAS, the current influx of unaccompanied minors across the Southern border of the United States has overwhelmed the capacity of the federal authorities to process these persons in an efficient manner; and

WHEREAS, federal law requires a judicial proceeding to determine whether minors from Guatemala, Honduras, and San

Salvador are the victims of human trafficking or gang violence * before deportation; and

WHEREAS, the housing of these minors while awaiting required proceedings for deportation may severely strain local resources and impose an un-The resolution states that no supportable burden upon local taxpayers; and

> WHEREAS, the care and custody of these minors is a responsibility of the federal government; now

Treated wastewater vital to easing Texas' water woes'

With the drought continuing into another year and a thirsty population poised to outgrow finite resources, water providers are turning to a source you might not expect.

Texas' population is expected to double to nearly 50 million in the coming decades, and officials are weighing a variety of means to quench that mighty thirst. Among the ideas being considered are some that are novel, such as seeding clouds with chemicals to increase rainfall, and others that are costly, such as building plants to treat salty sea water from the Gulf of flows. For some, there might be Mexico.

When wastewater passes through a sewage plant it undergoes a rigorous treatment process, where solids are removed, odor is reduced dramatically and harmful microorganisms are killed. When the final product is deemed safe for the environment it is released into streams, where it is further treated by ultraviolet light from the sun. It mixes with water already in the environment, and some of it makes its way downstream to water treatment plants to rejoin the public water supply.

Effluent reuse is a major part of the 2012 State Water Plan. According to the Texas Water Development Board, regional water planning groups estimate that existing supply from water reuse is projected to produce about 614,000 acre-feet of water per year by 2060. That number would jump to about 1.5 million acre-feet if all reuse recommended in the State Water Plan is implemented. This would average up to about 10 percent of all new supplies.

One North Texas city recently generated dramatic news headlines when officials announced they were considering a more direct reuse of effluent. Last year the city of Wichita Falls built a 63,000-foot-long pipeline connecting its water and wastewater treatment plants, with the goal of adding 5 million gallons a day to the water supply. This will be no small improvement for the city of more than 100,000.

After more than two years of drought, Wichita Falls' main water supply, Lake Arrowhead, was down to about 23 percent of its capacity and the city was under a Stage 5 Drought Catastrophe under its drought contingency plan at the beginning of

City officials have sought to ease concern about the reuse of effluent. On their website they highlight the several-step treatment process before the effluent will join the public potable water supply. You can find that and more information here. Currently the process is being tested and the results will be sent to the Texas Commission for Environmental Quality to approve before this added source of water is allowed into the public water supply, officials say.

Many cities in the Brazos River basin, and across the state, have already been using effluent in other ways, such as watering landscape, cooling power generation plants and to meet other non-drinking water needs. This takes pressure off public water supply systems by reducing the amount of treated drinking water used for such projects.

For instance, within the Brazos River basin, Lubbock and Abilene use effluent to water grasses and other vegetation in roadway medians as well as local golf courses. The city of Cleburne provides about 2 million gallons of treated wastewater to industrial customers each day. In the Waco area, effluent is used in part to help operate a nearby power generation plant. The list goes on and on.

However it is used, effluent will certainly continue to be a part of Texas' water supply. As bad as it is, history has shown us that drought conditions do end. The reservoirs will fill and the immediate strain on our water supply will ease. But as long as our population continues to grow, the need for water is going to increase, and innovative strategies such as wastewater reuse will play a vital role far into the

There are many ways that each of us can do our part to conserve water, from fixing a leaking faucet to planting drought tolerant landscapes. You may not be aware but several city governments and other organizations are busy spreading the word about water conservation, and offering tools or guidance to make it happen.


