Hunter Ed Overview Every hunter born on or after Sept. 2. 1971, must successfully complete a Hunter Education Training Course. Minimum age of certification is 9 years of age. If you were born on or after

September 2, 1971 and you

am to 5:00 pm. It will be at Bible • age 9 through 16, you must successfully complete a hunter education course, or you must be accompanied*.

• age 17 and over, you must successfully complete a hunter education course; or purchase a "Hunter Education Deferral" and you must be accompanied*.

* Accompanied means: By a person who is at least 17, who is licensed to hunt in Texas, who has passed hunter education or is exempt (born before Sept. 2, 1971), and you must be within normal voice control. Proof of certification or deferral is required to be on your person while hunting. Note: Certification is not required to purchase a hunting license.

The language of the course can be difficult for the 9-10 year olds. They reduced the age but the course work and testing is still at a level around 6th grade. If your child is ages 9 or 10 I suggest you attend the course with them.

Yellow Mud Turtle


Over time, the temperature and rainfall fluctuations have been anything but consistent in this area of the country, and this year is a prime example of that. Every living organism that calls west Texas its home has adapted to tolerate and even thrive in such conditions, and one species of turtle in particular has made a habit of disappearing during the brutal times of near intolerable heat and drought conditions.

Yellow Mud Turtles (Kinosternon flavescens) are one of three mud turtle species that occur in Texas. Their distribution in this state lies primarily west of the I-35 corridor, and encompasses the entire Panhandle, Edwards Plateau and Trans-Pecos eco-regions. Outside of Texas they can be observed from Nebraska, southwestward to southeastern Arizona, and then southward into northern Mexico.

This species is primarily an aquatic turtle, although many heads and tails, are the largest are found far away from water of the two sexes. as they wander cross country for a different water source. Habitat favorites include lakes, canals, and irrigation ditches. Like most other American members in the mud turtle family, this species is generally dull and rather bland. The carapace, or top shell, of adults and juveniles is olive-tan or olive brown. The only other coloration on the carapace is the darker pigment ney back to the water on their that borders each one of the own. scute scales. The scutes along the vertebral area of the carapace are typically flattened a bit. almost to the point that a coffee mug could be balanced on the back. The bottom shell, or plastron, is yellowish and unpatterned save for dark markings on the seams that connect the plastron scales together. The top of the head and neck usually mimic the dull colors of the carapace, while the cheeks and chin are bright yellow, the only colorful area on the body of this species. It is this yellow color that gives this turtle its namesake. There are also two fleshy

barbels on the chin. Of the three species of the genus that occurs in Texas, this

variety is the mid-sized version. Sexually mature adults are usually between four and five inches in carapacial length, although just over six inches is the record size. Males, who can be differentiated from the females in the fact that they have slightly larger

Mating in this species occurs in the springtime, and large, healthy females may lay one to two clutches of eggs annually. Females will oftentimes choose mile away from water, quite a distance for such a diminutive testudine. Once the eggs are laid in the nest, which is dug out with the hind legs of the mother, they incubate for approximately three to four months. Once the 3/4 inch young hatch, they must make the long and perilous jour-

Yellow Mud Turtles are strictly carnivorous in their dietary requirements. Invertebrates such as insects and worms make up the majority of the diets of younger specimens, while older animals can and will occasionally feed on vertebrate animals such as injured or dead fish. However, they do not adversely affect the population of game fish with their diet.

During times of severe drought and heat, this species has adapted to living life out of sight. Studies have shown that this species will bury themselves sev- . eral inches under ground, and have been known to stay there until substantial moisture arrives, often waiting weeks or even months. This process is known as aestivation, and is very similar to their winter brumation activity. They do not sleep, but rather their metabolism slows almost to a halt, allowing only for minimal oxygen exchange and no more.

The concession stand will be open for the event.


