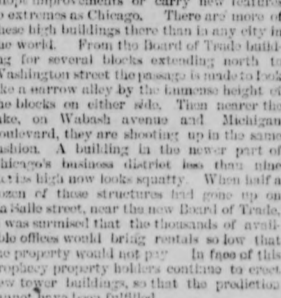

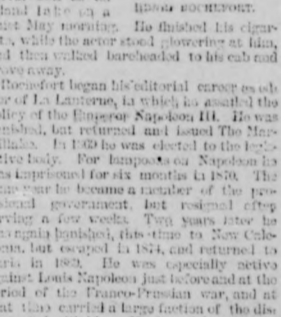

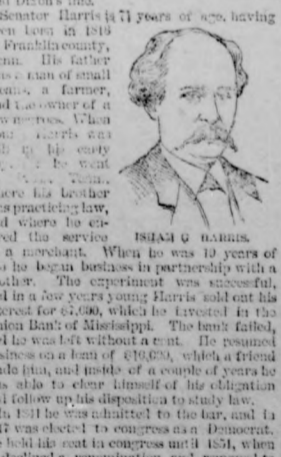

The First National Bank of Baird will increase their capital stock to \$100,000 in the near future. This step on the part of the Bank is taken in order to meet the growing demands for better banking facilities.

Western Texas needs good dirt roads and more railroads, hence the people do not favor legislation that will cripple the roads already built, and, perhaps, stop railroad building entirely.

Texas donated nearly all the public domain in Western Texas to railroads built in Eastern Texas. Eastern Texas is now clamoring for a railroad commission bill, while Western Texas needs more roads, and believes in giving the roads a living chance, at least.

Mr. Lotz in the job department, has also been working day and night for ten days. The boom has struck THE STAR office for a fact, but whether it will last a week or more, it is hard to tell. One thing sure, THE STAR is gradually "getting there with both feet," boom or no boom.

Advertisers have crowded THE STAR office for the last ten days—all wanting advertisements at "top of column, next to reading matter." Mr. Lotz has worked day and night to keep up with the extra rush of job work, and frequently had to stop to let the press cool. Take it all around, not a man in the office has had a good night's sleep for over a week. We are not kicking, and all we ask is that you will not kick if the paper does not get out on exact time, or if Mr. Lotz does not get off three or four jobs at once. Be patient, and we will get there in elegant shape bye and bye.

Capt. Powell showed a commendable spirit when he accepted the office of Treasurer of the town and offered to serve without compensation, although he was required to give ample bond for the faithful performance of his duties. In addition to this, he agreed to survey the town preparatory to street improvements, free of charge. If Baird had a hundred men who would take the same interest in improving the town, it would be a city in less than five years. Which way are you pulling? Forward or backward? If you want to see the town prosper, you will use every effort to make incorporation a success, and thus benefit your town while benefiting yourself. If incorporation fails after a fair and impartial trial, you can vote it off. It is certain to be a success if we all try to make it so.

It is currently reported on the streets that efforts will be made to "bust" incorporation by resisting the payment of the town tax. We hope there is nothing in the rumor, not that there is any danger of incorporation being "busted," but for the sake of harmony. If any really have any intention of taking a tilt at incorporation, they had as well get ready now, as the taxes have been levied and will have to be paid on or before the first day of August. Stringent laws for the enforcement of the collection of taxes will be passed, and, while it will cost the town something to figure as defendant in a lawsuit, it is going to cost somebody else something too, and a test of the legality of incorporation had just as well be made now as at any time in the future. A lawsuit involving a cost of \$500 or \$1000 for attorney fees and cost of the court is a mere nothing compared to paying \$10 or \$15 towards improving the town.

THE COUNCIL MEET. The Board of Aldermen qualified, Saturday night, and held their first meeting. The tax for the present year was fixed at 25cts. on the hundred dollars; occupation tax, same as the county, except the saloon tax which was fixed at \$25 for all spirituous liquors sold, payable quarterly in advance; \$4, on restaurants and lunch stands; \$6, on hotels; \$2, on milk wagons; \$2.50, on job wagons with one horse, and \$5, with two horses; \$1, on barber shops; \$6, on news or job printing offices; \$2.50, on insurance agents; \$1, on dogs and \$2, on bitches. A poll tax of 60cts. was also levied. The Mayor was instructed to draw up a code of laws for the government of the town, to be submitted to the Council. The ordinances will have to be passed upon by the Council and published for ten days before they become operative. The town Marshal was required to give a \$1000 bond with good and sufficient sureties. As soon as the bond is made and approved by the Mayor, the Marshal will enter upon the discharge of his duties.

No pay for the Aldermen, Mayor, or Treasurer, and only \$80 per month and the usual fees allowed by law for the Marshal, should not look much like taxes were going to be collected simply to make fat offices for a few individuals. The Board start out by inaugurating a rigid system of economy that will bring good results, if adhered to.

Baird is now incorporated and ready for business. There are a few who say that no good will result. We hope not, but, hit or miss, the present Board are determined that there shall be no leaks in the treasury, and that every dollar collected, except actual expenses, shall go towards improvements. The taxes levied will be a little heavy on some of the business men, but the money will be spent right here in town, and the business men will get nearly every dollar of the money paid out. The streets will be improved as rapidly as possible, but one should not expect to have everything needed within thirty or sixty days. Let us go slow, and what work we do let it be done in the proper place and at the proper time. The Board cannot accomplish anything without money, and not much with money if a large portion of the town should strive to make all efforts a failure. We hope all who desire to see the town prosper will give the officers every encouragement in making the town government a success.

Fred Lane, as Cyril Clifford, spoke his part very well, though his love-making to Ida was rather cold and hardly natural for a young man so deeply in love; otherwise, Fred did first-rate.

Mr. Hugh Ross, as Dr. Fargo, acted his part well. F. S. Bell, as Mr. Belmont, was all that could be desired. Master Joe Rushing, as Freddie Belmont, also did first-rate. Mr. Frank Dorsey, as Barney, did not have much to do, but what he did do was well done.

WASHINGTON LETTER. (From our Regular Correspondent.) WASHINGTON, Feb. 11th, 1889. Mr. Cleveland has removed Civil Service Commissioner Edgerton and nominated Hugh S. Thompson, of South Carolina, to succeed him. Mr. Thompson is assistant Secretary of the Treasury, at present, and a very warm friend of the President. The removal of Mr. Edgerton was not a surprise to anyone familiar with the workings of the Commission. It had several times been intimated to him that his resignation would be accepted, but he refused to take the hint, and, finally, when the President asked him in plain language to resign, he declined to do so, and the removal followed. Mr. Edgerton is a good man, but, holding the opinion he does, he should never have accepted the office in the first place. The removal leaves only one Commissioner in office, and he is Republican. For that reason it is thought that the Senate will probably confirm Mr. Thompson, as the law provides for a Democrat on the board, and there is another vacancy into which Gen. Harrison can put a Republican.

Representative Springer thinks his "Omaha" bill will yet go through in spite of the fact that the conference have failed to agree upon it. He says that three, if not more, Republican Senators will vote with the Democratic Senators to admit New Mexico. I shall only believe it when they do it. The report of the Treasury experts on the tariff bill shows that outside of the internal revenue features the measure will only make a reduction of from three to five millions of dollars. The House Ways and Means Committee will report the bill, this week, with a recommendation that it be rejected. Just what will follow if it is rejected, it is difficult to say. The internal revenue features of the bill are satisfactory to quite a number of Democrats in the House, and, unless they can be satisfied that the Cowles bill, repealing the tobacco tax, now in the hands of Mr. Randall's committee, or a similar one will be immediately reported to the House, I shall not be surprised to see the Senate bill adopted. I believe that its adoption would create far more dissatisfaction among Republicans than Democrats. Senator Vest is going to have some fun with the Republican Senators when the Senate conferees on the Springer-Omaha bill make their report to the Senate. Mr. Vest will prove by the Record that in 1875, when New Mexico was thought to be Republican, that many Republicans now in the Senate voted in the House for the admission of that Territory along with Colorado. Now he wants to know why these same men oppose the admission of that Territory. The inference is very plain to Senator Vest and everybody else. New Mexico is now Democratic. What care these Republican Senators for consistency when party interests are at stake? There is a movement here, which is said to have the President's approval, to have Senator Kenna withdrawn from the contest in West Virginia. The idea is that it is impossible to have Senator Kenna re-elected, and that some other Democrat may be elected, thus saving the seat to the party. As a compensation it is proposed that the President shall nominate Mr. Kenna Inter-State Commissioner. "Senatorial courtesy" making it certain that he would be immediately confirmed.

Secretary Bayard has once more become a target for criticism. He has demanded the resignation of H. H. Sewall, U. S. Consul General to Samon. Mr. Sewall has recently been a witness before the foreign committees of the House and Senate, and in his testimony regarding Samoan matters he took occasion to express opinions criticizing the Department of State in a somewhat severe manner. Whether Mr. Bayard has done right or wrong in compelling him to resign at this time is a question, but, like the rest of us, Mr. Bayard is human, and has punished his subordinate officer for indiscretion. Anybody else might have done the same thing under the same circumstances. So after the fourth of March Mr. Cleveland will resume the practice of law in New York City. It is said that this is the preliminary step to his being sent to the Senate as successor to Senator Everts whose term will expire in 1891. This is very probable if the Democrats can succeed in capturing the legislature of New York as they expect to do. At any rate, it is safe to say that a man of Grover Cleveland's experience, pluck, and backbone, will not be allowed to remain in private life. Such men are too rare, and too badly needed in public life. The President has sent the bill making an Executive Department of the department of Agriculture to the Attorney General for an opinion as to its constitutionality. This action has caused the circulation of the report that he was contemplating a veto of the measure. General Longstreet and Colonel Mosby are here presumably fixing up things to get something from Harrison.

So far as accomplishing much for the town in the high and exalted position of Alderman for the short time we will hold, we expect more "cussing" than pay or glory, but we have got used to that, and probably that was why a newspaper man was wanted in a place where there is neither pay, honor, or glory; and who could fill the bill better than the average newspaper man?

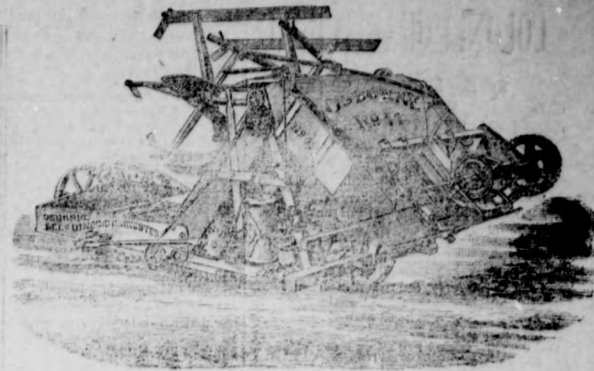
