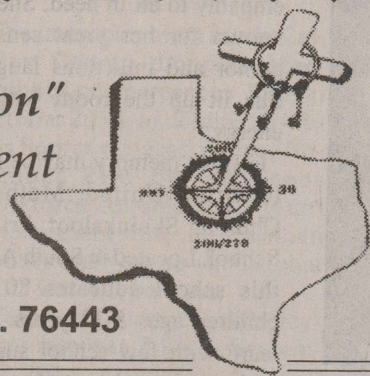

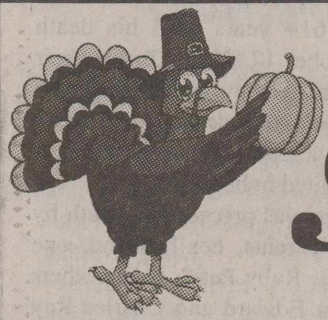

## Higginbotham's celebrating 100 years

The History of Higginbotham Brothers began in late 1880 when J.M. Higginbotham, along with his family, moved from Water Valley, Mississippi to Dublin, Texas to make their home. According to recorded documents, the trees were just cleared for the town site and the Central Texas Railroad had just made it advent in the area, when two brothers decided to open a General Mercantile in De Leon, Tx. So began the first link in the Higginbotham Brothers Chain.

By the Early 1900's the brother along with other relatives, opened eight other General Stores in towns such as Ballinger, Comanche, Dublin, Rising Star, and Stephenville. In June of 1914 R.W. Higginbotham purchased the property for the Cross Plains Store. Six lots were bought from

four different owners for a total of \$1722.40

A building was built and operated under the name of Higginbotham Trading Co., which is on the vault that is still being used today. They opened the doors of Higginbotham Trading Co. on a Monday, November 30, 1914. Incorporators R.W., J.M. and B.T. (Taylor) Higginbotham Jr. R.W. Higginbotham, president of this company, deeded the property to Higginbotham Brothers and Company in 1917 for the consideration of \$20,884.68. In the early years the stores did a tremendous amount of credit business. Many times they would carry the farmers from early spring to fall when the crops were harvested. The store either bought the crops or saw to it that the farmers were paid full

market prices for what they had to sell. There were some notably tough years with drought, the Great Depression and boll weevils but the company adjusted and continued to prosper.

It can be said that in most towns, Higginbotham Brothers served the customers from their birth to the grave. All locations sold dry goods and clothing and most also operated and undertaking department, along with of coarse lumber and the above, the company dabbled for a time in the automotive industry as well as farm implements. You can come by the store now and see the wagon which was originally sold out of the Higginbotham Brothers and Company in Cross Plains, in 1977 the wagon was located in a shed at State Electric company in Ft. Worth. The company immediately contacted its owner, Mrs. Marie L Schmidt and the General office purchased the covered wagon.

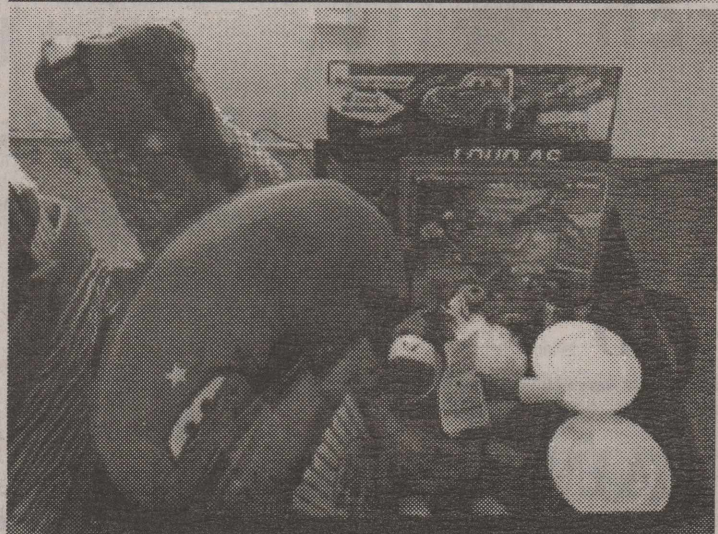
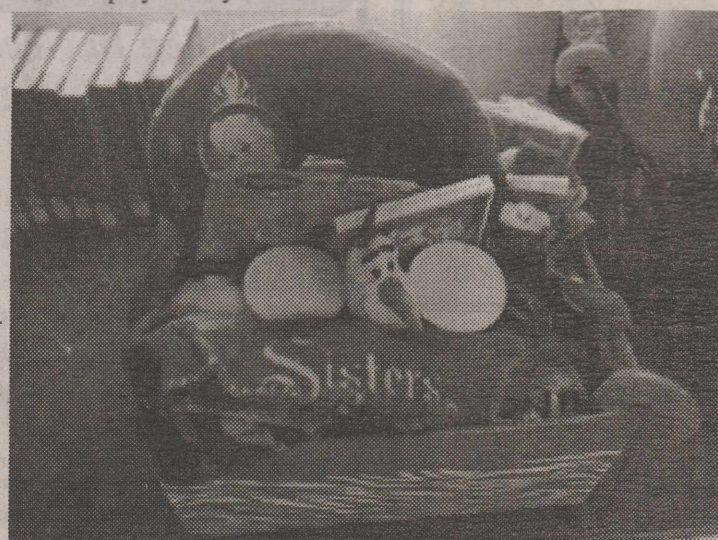

In 2001 the Higginbotham-Bartletts of West Texas were added to the Higginbotham family.

Higginbotham brothers today operates 35 locations within Texas. Through the years, many components of the business have changed we have replaced dry goods with a notable hardware department. The existence and continued success of Higginbotham Brothers is due to the dedicated and hard working staff and the communities that have supported the stores since 1881. The Cross Plains Higginbotham Brothers will celebrate 100 years in operation on November 30, 2014. 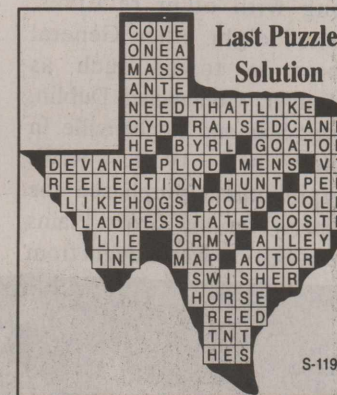

# Callahan County's jobless rate drops to 3.6% in October

The unemployment rate in Callahan County dropped three-tenths of one percent to 3.6% in October 2014, according to jobless figures released Friday, November 21st by the Texas Workforce Commission. The unemployment rate in Callahan County one year ago in October 2013 was 4.5 percent.

Callahan County's unemployment rate was 3.9% in September, 2014.

Previous monthly jobless rates in Callahan County included: 4.1% in August 2014, 4.1% in July, 4.1% in June, 3.6% in May, 3.4% in April, 4.0% in March, 4.3% in February, 4.2% in January 2014, 4.1% in December 2013, and 4.3% in November, according to the unemployment figures.

Big Country area counties, bordering Callahan County, and the counties' unemployment rates for October 2014 include: Brown, 4.2%; Coleman, 4.5%; Eastland, 4.0%; Jones, 4.9%; Runnels, 4.5%; Shackelford, 2.0%; Stephens, 3.9%; and Taylor County, 3.8%.

The Abilene MSA (Metropolitan Statistical Area) unemployment rate, which includes Taylor, Callahan and Jones Counties, stood at 3.9% in October, 2014, according to the Texas Workforce Commission. The Abilene MSA Combined Labor Force is 83,400. There were 80,200 employed during October 2014, while 3,200 were unemployed, giving the Abilene MSA an unemployment rate of 3.9%.

The Abilene MSA reported the workforce was 83,600 in September, 2014. Total employment of 80,200 was reported in September 2014, while 3,400, or 4.0% were unemployed in September 2014.

The Abilene MSA unemployment rate for October, 2013 was 4.8%. The total workforce was reported at 84,200, with 80,100 employed and 4,100 or 4.8% unemployed in October, 2013.

The state's unemployment rate for the month of October, 2014

was 4.8 percent. The total Texas labor force was 13,067,700 in October 2014. The total number of Texans employed is 12,442,100. The total number of unemployed Texans was 625,600 in October 2014.

Last month's statewide unemployment rate was 5.0 percent in September 2014. The state's unemployment rate in October of 2013 was 6.1 percent.

The United States unemployment rate for October, 2014 was 5.5 percent. The nation's unemployment rate for the previous month of September, 2014 was 5.7%. The United States unemployment rate one year ago in October, 2013 was 7.0%.

### Highlights of the Texas Labor Force

(Not Seasonally Adjusted)  
The October unemployment rate dropped two-tenths of a percentage point to 4.8 percent. This was the lowest October unemployment rate since 2007. The decline in the unemployment rate was typical for October due in part to the beginning of the holiday season. The rate followed the five-year average September-to-October unemployment rate decline of two-tenths of a percentage point. The Texas unemployment rate decreased 1.3 percentage points over the year. The national unemployment rate decreased two-tenths of a percentage point to 5.5 percent. The Texas unemployment rate remained below the national unemployment rate.

The civilian labor force increased by 23,900 individuals to a total of 13,067,700 Texans. The civilian labor force has increased in seven months out of the last 10 and has been above 13 million persons since June 2014. The civilian labor force increased by 243,500 people over the year, bringing its annual growth rate to 1.9 percent.

The number of employed Texans increased over the month by 52,200 individuals to a total of 12,442,100 persons. The past three months have shown an average increase of 30,900 employed people per month. The number of jobholders in Texas increased over the year by 399,000 persons, a growth rate of 3.3 percent. The number of Texans seeking work fell by 28,300 individuals over the month to a total of 625,600 persons. This was the largest September-to-October decline in the number of jobseekers since 2011. Over the year, the number of unemployed persons has declined by 155,500 individuals.

The unemployment rate decreased in 24 Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs), while one MSA showed an increase over

the month. The Beaumont-Port Arthur and the McAllen-Edinburg-Mission MSAs had the largest over-the-month rate changes, each falling 0.6 percentage points. The Midland MSA had the lowest unemployment rate at 2.5 percent.

The number of Texans seeking continued unemployment insurance benefits decreased by 6,900 people over the month to 98,400 individuals. October was the first month in which the number of Texans seeking continued unemployment benefits fell below 100,000 people since May 2008.

### Happenings Around The State

#### Methanol Plant Construction Starts

BEAUMONT, TX (Houston Business Journal)—Natgasoline LLC, a fully owned subsidiary of the Netherlands-based fertilizer producer and construction contractor OCI NV, plans to begin "full-blown" construction of a billion-dollar methanol plant this month. Construction can move forward because the Environmental Protection Agency approved the greenhouse gas permit for the plant. OCI indicates the plant would be the largest methanol production facility in the U.S.

Construction is expected to create 3,000 jobs over three years, and the company plans to create 240 permanent jobs when the plant is complete. It should be operational by late 2016. The Greenfield plant is intended to have a capacity of up to 5,000 metric tons per day of methanol—up to 1.75 million metric tons per year. Like other chemical companies expanding throughout the Gulf Coast, OCI will take advantage of the low cost of natural gas at its new methanol plant.

#### Ground Broken for 1,000-Room Hotel

AUSTIN, TX (Austin American-Statesman)—Shonda Novak—Officials have broken ground on a \$370-million Fairmont convention hotel in downtown Austin that they say will be the largest in the luxury brand's portfolio to date.

The Fairmont Austin hotel will rise 37 stories at East Cesar Chavez and Red River Street and add 1,066 rooms to the market when it opens in June 2017.

An elevated walkway will connect from the hotel across Red River to the Austin Convention Center.

The project will add more than 700 construction jobs while it is built during the next 30 months. Once open, the hotel is expected to generate 1,000 permanent jobs; more than \$15 million in hotel occupancy taxes and \$6 million in property tax annually, most of which will go towards improvements to nearby Waller Creek.

#### Indoor Ski Resort Headed to Dallas Area

GRAND PRAIRIE, TX (CultureMap Houston)—The Dallas suburb of Grand Prairie plans to add a new tourist attraction named The Grand Alps. The \$215-million indoor ski resort and hotel will be located near Interstate 30 and Belt Line Road. The city of Grand Prairie estimates around 2,000 jobs will be created with more than 1.3 million visitors annually. Construction of the hotel and ski facility is slated to begin in January, with hopes of opening in 2018. It will include beginner, intermediate, and expert ski runs; in addition to ice climbing, luge track, and Olympic half pipe. A snow dome will house the longest indoor ski run in the world, which will be more than 1,900 feet in length.

#### Food Manufacturer Brings Jobs to Seguin

SEGUIN, TX (Copperfield Sun)—Governor Rick Perry announced the state is investing \$800,000 from the Texas Enterprise Fund (TEF) in Siro Group USA to close the deal on a manufacturing facility in Seguin that will create more than 200 jobs. The parent company, Grupo Siro, is one of the biggest names in the Spanish food industry, with 19 production facilities, a research and development center, and headquarters in five countries. The company produces baby food, cookies, pastries, pasta, frozen desserts, bread and cereals, with more than half of its total output sold to retailers as private label products. Governor Perry said, "This TEF investment in Siro Group USA will create jobs for Texans in Seguin while expanding our state's diverse manufacturing and production base."

**Reduce those winter heating bills**

Everyone knows that summer temperatures are cooler in the shade, but trees can help cut winter energy costs, too. The most common approach is to plant evergreen trees and shrubs on the north and northwest sides

of your property.

"To reduce winter heating costs, plant evergreen trees and shrubs as windbreaks," says Tchukki Andersen, BCMA, CTSP\* and staff arborist with the Tree Care Industry Association (TCIA). "Generally, most cold winds come from the north or west, so on those sides of the building plant a dense row of evergreens that maintain branches low to the ground. To provide additional insulation for your building, evergreen shrubs should be planted slightly away from the foundation."

The ultimate goal of planting a windbreak or living snow fence is weather control. By creating a design that takes into account wind speed and direction, snow accumulation patterns and areas of high and low usage, spring and summer plantings can offer homeowners benefits ranging from reduced energy costs to more efficient water management.

"Wind barriers can channel winds away from your house and cut down on cold drafts getting into your house," Andersen advises. "In addition, shrubs, bushes and vines planted near a house can help insulate the home in winter and summer."

How far away should you plant? Allow enough space in the tree's root zone for roots to grow. A qualified tree care provider can assist you with tree selection, if you aren't familiar with how much room a mature tree's roots will need. Install physical root barriers if concerns about the foundation arise.

Whether your goal is to reduce the chilling effects of winter winds or control the accumulation of snow, the density of the plantings is key. A rough estimate of density can be determined by estimating the ratio of the "solid" area (branches, trunks, leaves, etc.) to the total area of the barrier.

For example, a row of deciduous trees might offer a density of roughly 30 percent, which means that the row consists of 30 percent trees and 70 percent open space in winter. By comparison, a row of conifers might have a density of 50 percent or 60 percent in winter.

Higher density windbreaks are better at slowing wind speed enough to cause snow to drop to the ground and accumulate both on the windward and leeward side of the row (or rows). These types of living snow fences are extremely useful for keeping roads, driveways and other high-use areas clear of drifts, which means less plowing, less shoveling and less aggravation.

On the other hand, trees should not be planted on the southern sides of homes in cold climates because the branches of these trees will block some winter sun. Open blinds and drapes on the south side of your home during winter days and close them at night. Sun angles are low in winter, allowing substantial solar heating through all south windows. If there is vegetation that shades southern exposure windows, a tree care provider can determine if some of this tree growth can be pruned without harming the tree.

Remember, every location is different, and there is no perfect design that will be effective in all situations. A professional arborist can conduct the proper research and planning to plant an effective windbreak that will offer homeowners a variety of benefits for years to come.

## Callahan County Airport

Shortly after WWII, the first official Callahan County Airport opened. Baird businessmen Ralph Ashlock and Earl Johnson leased this land from William H. Hardy where two decades earlier Mr. Hardy operated a county poor farm. With help from local welder and mechanic Rusty Higgins, they built a large hangar.

Ex-military aviators like Reaves Hickman and Wendall Jones continued their flying experiences in surplus aircraft acquired by the airport owners. Jones also gave flight instructions. The most modern plane in Baird, a 1947 Luscombe Silvalaire, was owned by Wm.

Hardy. Another local, Eldon Dunlap, flew a 1930s Fairchild 24.

Many local residents took their first airplane ride in Baird-based planes with names like "Sweet pea" and "Ol' Yellow and Silver." Only one significant accident occurred as a plane flying cross-country ran out of fuel and crashed just short of the runway. After about 10 years, interest in flying waned; only Hardy and Dunlap had planes in the hangar when an unusually heavy snowfall collapsed the roof crushing one of the planes and ending operations at the Callahan County Airport.

# Wild About Texas

## Collared Peccary

With west Texas being the featured area of the Wild West in books, movies, and lore, it is no surprise that many of the creatures that inhabit this area are world renowned. Sometimes, the legendary animals are mis-named, as is the case with the Collared Peccary, or the animal known to most as the Javelina.

The Collared Peccary (*Pecari tajacu*) can be observed throughout the western and southern halves of Texas with somewhat regularity. Formally, its range extended to the Brazos River Valley to the east and the Red River Valley to the north. Habitat destruction and fragmentation, as well as the introduction of the feral pig have caused population declines in those regions.

Population densities in their current range appear to be somewhat stable.

This pig-like species prefers to live in rocky areas such as dry arroyos and canyons, although it can also be seen in dense thicket areas of prickly pear or scrub oak, as well as grasslands and arid woodlands.

Short and stubby, adults of this species of ungulate stand approximately thirty inches at the shoulder, while the body averages between thirty-four and forty inches in length. The tail is minuscule, only achieving a length of one-half inch. The body fur is coarse and colored black and grayish. Along the spine there is a dark stripe that extends from the neck to the tail. Upon close inspection, a whitish collar can be seen across the shoulder area. The snout is elongated and pig-like, and there are four hoofed toes on the front feet but only three on the back feet. These are moderately heavy animals, with adults averaging somewhere between twenty-eight and fifty-five pounds.

Collared Peccaries are highly social animals, often living in bands ranging from five to several dozen. These herds are usually active in the early morning or late afternoon hours, although it is not uncommon to see them along roadsides in the middle of the night while in appropriate habitat. The boundaries of their home range are marked by a musk gland, and are very distinctive in odor.

Primarily herbivorous, this spe-

cies will feed on various cacti, as well as an occasional grub or terrestrial insect. Stomach content studies have revealed that prickly pear cactus is a staple, and mesquite beans, lechuguilla, and sotol are also consumed with regularity. Unlike feral pigs that root up items out of the ground, peccaries instead will push items around the surface, rarely if ever actually digging.

Peccaries are the only native ungulate in North America that breeds year-round. Litter sizes vary from one to five, although two young is usually the result of the breeding. Gestation is generally about five months, and just before giving birth, the female will separate herself from the herd. Once born, the one pound young look like the parents except rather than gray-brown, their fur varies in color from reddish to yellowish. Upon birth, the young are unable to walk for the first few days but

once they are mobile, they follow their mother and return to the herd.

Peccaries are the subjects of exaggerated tales of rooting up plant-life to the point of being unsustainable, as well as being fierce enough to attack and severely injure humans. It is for this reason that many are wantonly killed by inexperienced hunters. This killing is generally due to fear rather than for food or sport. While it is true that dogs are occasionally injured or killed by peccaries, in every instance it is the dog who is the instigator of the conflict, and the peccary is just doing what any animal will do by defending itself. This animal is completely harmless to people, livestock, and the land.

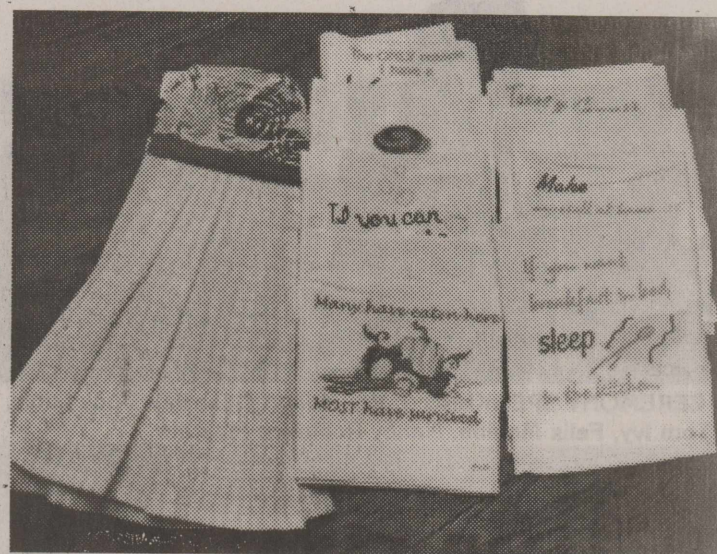

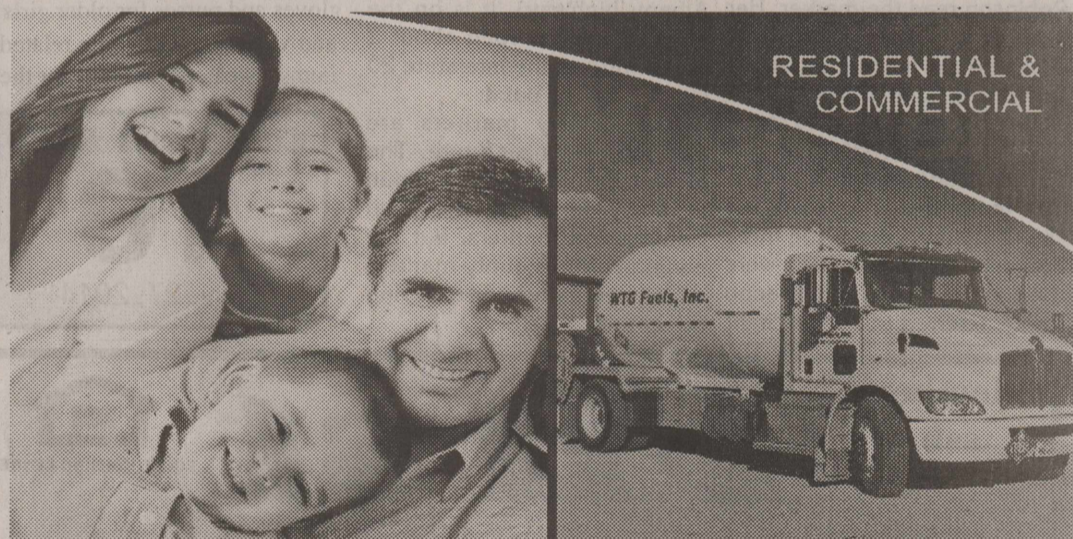

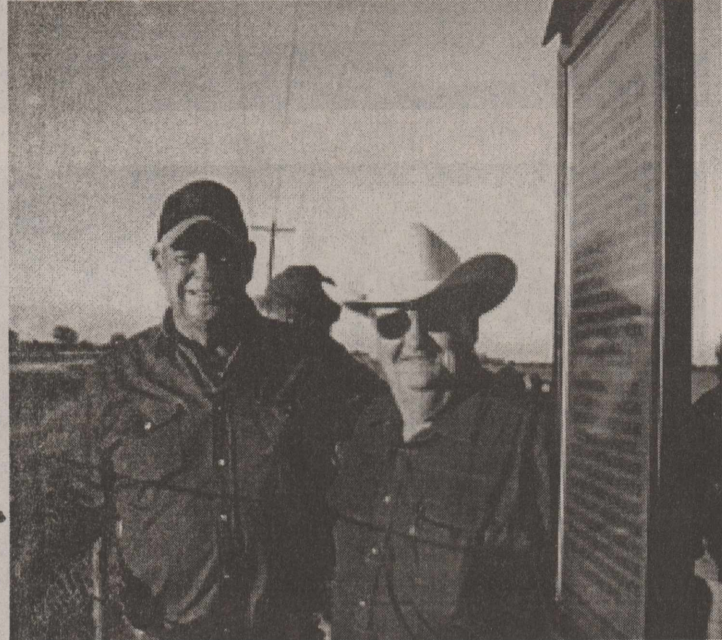

## New County Marker Dedicated

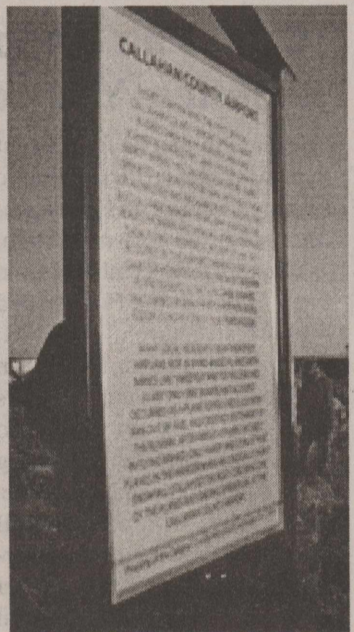
The first ever Callahan County historical marker was dedicated November 20th at the Jim Snyder ranch north of Baird, Texas. The twenty-five in attendance included community members and members of the Callahan County Historical Commission. The ceremony was led by Chairman Judy Luter and member Nancy Robinson Masters. The subject of the marker is the history of the Callahan County Airport, which came into existence in 1947. Firsthand experiences were related by Tom Ivey and also from a letter sent by Jim Ashlock and read by Felix Manion. Special thanks to Felix, Tom and Lee Abernathy for their hours spent researching the background facts.

The program was preceded by a tribute flyover by five vintage airplanes from the Commemorative Air Force, based in Elmdale. Cookie Robinson read the marker. Her husband, Bob Robinson designed and built the attractive framework. Jim Snyder provided the location and also made a generous donation to the Commission for future markers.

All that remains to mark the site of the airport are the three concrete triangles which were the base of the airport beacon tower, referred to as the "light

line", and the base of the airport flagpole. The marker can be viewed from highway 283 (the Albany highway). It is on the right side of the road about 2 miles north of the Interstate 20 intersection of Baird.

More county markers are planned in the near future. The local commission will continue to apply for State Historical Commission markers, but the addition of the county markers adds a new dimension to saving our county's history.

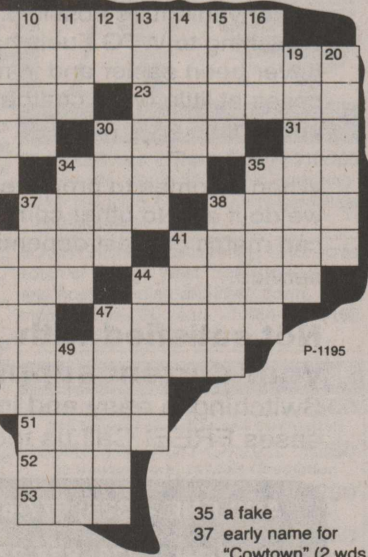

## Callahan County Airport Marker

The old Callahan County Airport has received the first Callahan County Marker. The dedication was held at 4:30 Thursday, November 20. The Flight of the Big Country Squadron Commemorative Air Force performed a Flyover which included a Missing Man Formation to honor those from Callahan County who flew for our country. Nancy Robinson Masters, whose husband, Bill, flew the lead airplane, explained the meaning of the formations. She and Tom Ivey shared interesting and sometimes funny memories of the airport. Felix Manion told of the marker

research process and read stories relayed by Jim Ashlock who could not attend. Ivey and Ashlock are thought to be the last pilots to have flown out of the airport which closed in the early 1940s. The old airport is on Jim and Kim Snyder's land 2.5 miles north of I-20 on Highway 283 in Baird.

This is the first of the Callahan County Historical Commission's county markers which will tell the history of people, places or events that either do not have enough known details to qualify or do not have enough financial backing for a Texas Historical

## Authorities searching for information in Potter County Stolen or Missing Cattle Case

Amarillo, Texas - Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association (TSCRA) Special Rangers Dean Bohannon and Harold Dempsey are seeking information on the theft of 25 head of livestock that were stolen from a Potter County Texas ranch sometime between Feb. 1, 2014 and Oct. 16, 2014.

According to Bohannon, Dustin Parson, of Albany, Texas, leases the ranch located 20 miles north of Amarillo, Texas on Hwy 287, where the livestock were stolen. Parson is the owner of the missing or stolen cattle. Bohannon said one 5 year-old Charolais bull, 10 head of 3-8 year-old Corriente cattle, nine head of 3-8 year-old black cows and five 500 lbs. black yearling heifers or steers are missing or stolen in this case.

Each head of livestock are branded with an "E" on top of a "Z," behind their right shoulder. Bohannon and authorities have searched extensively in the area for the cattle, however have been unable to retrieve any of them thus far. Bohannon said he assumes the cattle have been stolen since they have been unable to find any of the missing livestock.

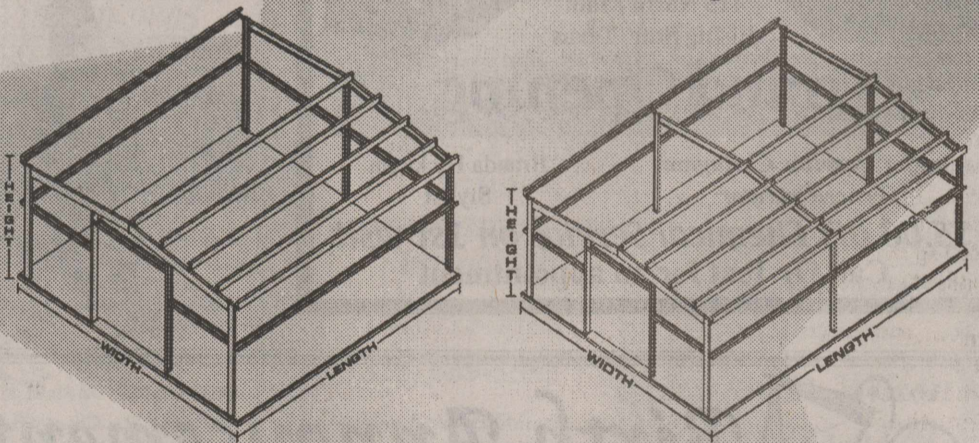

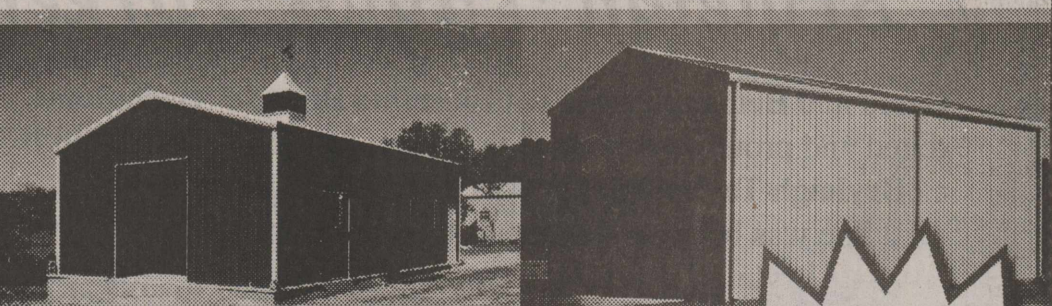

## Commissioners remove guns on list of bid items from Sheriff's Department

Also attending the meeting were Sheriff Terry Joy and Rick Jowers.

—The minutes from the previous commissioners' court meetings were reviewed and signed.

—Under public comments, there were none.

—There was no action taken on the Countywide Burn Ban. The Burn Ban remains lifted.

—Sheriff Terry Joy presented the October 2014 Sheriff's Report. After some discussion, Commissioner Farmer made a motion to accept the report. Commissioner Windham sec-

onded the motion and the motion carried with a 5-0 vote.

Commissioner-elect Miller said that the announcement of his appointment of Representative Kleinschmidt was the first of several announcements concerning key staff members at the Department of Agriculture.

"I want to welcome Tim Kleinschmidt and congratulate him on his new role as General Counsel. My transition team and I are working hard to find strong, capable, and experienced leaders to join the ranks of the hundreds of dedicated TDA employees already on the job and serving the people of our great state," Commissioner-elect Miller concluded.

## Texas Sets Annual Job Growth Record Unemployment rate falls to 5.1 percent in October

AUSTIN—The Texas economy added 35,200 seasonally adjusted total nonfarm jobs in October. Over the year, Texas added 421,900 total nonfarm jobs, setting a record for jobs added in Texas for the third consecutive month. In September, the Texas economy grew by a revised 414,700 jobs over the year. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate fell to 5.1 percent in October, down from 5.2 percent in September, and down from 6.2 percent in October 2013.

"We have witnessed the Texas economy growing stronger and stronger over the last several years, culminating in another record-breaking month," said Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) Chairman Andres Alcantar. "The diversity of our growing industries, businesses, and skilled workers, has made for a prosperous Texas. I'm proud of all of them for making the Lone Star State great."

Eight of 11 major industries added jobs in Texas over the month, led by Trade,

Transportation, and Utilities with 17,500 jobs added in October. This industry has added 102,700 jobs over the year, growing at a pace of 4.5 percent. In the last 12 months, every major industry in Texas has shown positive annual growth, with seven out of 11 growing at or above 3.5 percent annually.

"It's great to see the continued job growth here in Texas along with the declining unemployment rate," said TWC Commissioner Representing Labor Ronny Congleton. "Clearly opportunities are there for the hard-working people of Texas, including job seekers, and I encourage them to visit [texasworkforce.org](http://texasworkforce.org) to learn how to find them."

All three major Goods Producing industries in Texas showed positive growth in October. Employers added 1,500 Manufacturing jobs, while Construction grew by 9,200 jobs. Mining and Logging, which includes oil- and gas-related jobs, grew by 4,100 positions. Mining and Logging grew at a

rate of 11.3 percent over the year, faster than any other major industry in Texas.

"The private sector continued to drive growth in Texas, adding 38,900 jobs in October for a total of 387,700 jobs over the last 12 months," said TWC Commissioner Representing Employers Hope Andrade. "I applaud once again the employers who have helped bring such a culture of growth and innovation to Texas."

The Midland Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) had the lowest October unemployment rate in the state at 2.5 percent. The Odessa MSA came in second at 3.0 percent and the Amarillo MSA ranked third at 3.5 percent (not seasonally adjusted).

## Farm bill decision making process will headline Taylor County Extension Marketing Club's December Meeting

Abilene - The Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service's Taylor County Marketing Club will host their annual December program, inviting anyone interested in agriculture to join the session, organizers said.

"This year's format is a little different than we've had in the past, and we'll be meeting in a new location," said Bill Thompson, AgriLife Extension economist at San Angelo.

The session is set for 9 am Dec. 4th at the Region 14 Education Service Center, 1850 U.S. Highway 351, Abilene, TX. "We will have two distinct sessions this year," Thompson said. "The morning will feature Dr. Mark Welch, AgriLife Extension state grain marketing specialist at College Station and myself. Dr. Welch

will provide a brief market outlook and then discuss some of the factors that may impact Big Country wheat producer marketing plans. These might include our current early season prospects for a potentially good yield next spring and the positive El Niño-based rainfall predictions forecasters continue to predict for the winter and spring. Other factors could well be the availability of storage locally and at terminal elevators and the effect lower corn prices may have, the strong U.S. dollar vs. the weak Russian ruble and other export factors.

"Dr. Welch will then outline some marketing strategies to address some of these issues, and ways Big Country wheat producers could implement some of these strategies."

"Thompson will then finish the morning session with a recap of the 2014 farm bill decision making process facing producers, specifically detailing the data necessary to run the on-line decision aid."

The afternoon session will be held in the service center's computer lab. This session is designed so producers can sit at a terminal with high speed internet access with the resources and expertise at hand to help them enter the necessary information about their operation into the Agriculture and Policy Center's decision aid.

## New tip reward program to target Stash Houses

AUSTIN - The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS), in conjunction with the Office of the Governor and Texas Crime Stoppers, today announced the implementation of the Texas Stash House Rewards Program. The new program, funded by the Governor's Criminal Justice Division, is designed to encourage Texans to help combat transnational crime by anonymously reporting information on stash houses used to facilitate human trafficking, drug smuggling and smuggling of people.

"Crime Stoppers is an important part of our state's law enforcement efforts, empowering Texans to take a stand to ensure their communities aren't victimized by crime," Gov. Rick Perry said. "Texas has taken strong steps to fight transnational crimes associated with our porous border, and the Texas Stash House Rewards Program is another way for Texans to help stop crimes in their neighborhoods."

"Stash houses play a significant role in the ability of Mexican cartels and their criminal associates to successfully smuggle people and drugs across the Texas-Mexico border," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "This new program will leverage the public's awareness to help law enforcement shut down these criminal safe havens and protect our communities."

Texas Crime Stoppers will pay rewards up to \$2,500 for information leading to the identification of stash houses used in transnational crimes.

"As Texans we need to do our part to assist our local, state and federal law enforcement agencies in detecting and

arresting individuals responsible for the trafficking of humans and drugs," said Texas Crime Stoppers Council Chair Jorge E. Gaytan. "Rewards to anonymous tipsters have proven to be a powerful tool in locating and arresting criminals, and recovering property and drugs. We are confident the Texas Stash House Rewards program will strengthen that effort and further empower citizens to fight crime."

For decades paying rewards to anonymous tipsters has been a proven method in the apprehension of criminals in Texas. The Texas Stash House Rewards Program builds on the success of the state's existing tipster reward programs: the Texas 10 Most Wanted Fugitives and Texas 10 Most Wanted Sex Offenders programs. Through those two programs - in 2014 alone - DPS and other agencies have already arrested 22 Texas 10 Most Wanted Fugitives and Sex Offenders, and \$48,000 in rewards has been paid for tips that resulted in arrests.

To be eligible for the cash rewards, anyone with information on stash houses can provide anonymous tips in four different ways:

- Call the Crime Stoppers hotline at 1-800-252-TIPS (8477).
- Text the letters DPS - followed by your tip - to 274637 (CRIMES) from your cell phone.
- Submit a web tip by clicking the following link: Submit a Tip - Texas Stash House Rewards Program.
- Submit a Facebook tip at <http://www.facebook.com/texas10mostwanted> by clicking the "SUBMIT A TIP" link (under the "About" section).

All tips are anonymous - regardless of how they are submitted.

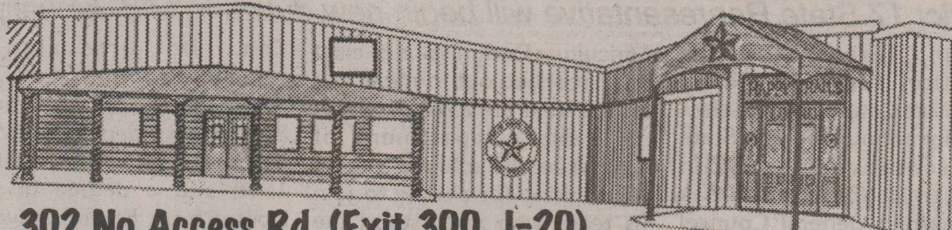

## Vehicle Criminals prepare for Holiday Shopping

The holiday season is upon us! And just as we prepare for Black Friday, Cyber Monday, and visiting the malls and shopping centers, thieves are also preparing to shop . . . in your vehicle!

The Texas Auto Burglary and Theft Prevention Authority (ABTPA), a division of the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles, reminds drivers that a vehicle is burglarized every two minutes and stolen every eight minutes in the state. These crimes can escalate during the holiday season when drivers frequently shop for gifts and travel to visit friends and family. During these times, drivers are more likely to leave belongings within view inside vehicles. The hustle and bustle of the season may also cause drivers to become negligent in locking doors and taking keys. To make matters worse, a thief won't necessarily stop with taking your vehicle and the things inside. They may also look for personal documents and items that can help them steal your identity or gain access to your home, where they can burglarize additional property. In other words, the theft or burglary of your vehicle may simply be a gateway to the commission of additional crimes.

"Auto burglars are more likely to scout malls, shopping centers, entertainment venues,

hotels, and other business parking lots this time of year looking for opportunities to break into vehicles," said Michelle Lanham, program coordinator for ABTPA's Reduce Auto Theft in Texas (RATT) public awareness task force at Denton Police Department. "Drivers need to understand that almost anything they leave inside their vehicles can be valuable to a thief. And when vehicles are left unlocked and unattended, drivers are inviting thieves to walk away with everything they see inside, which often includes gifts, purses, wallets, packages, electronics, suitcases, garage door openers, keys, and personal information."

According to the Texas Department of Public Safety, thieves committed 214,294 acts of vehicle burglary and stole 65,671 vehicles in Texas during 2013. In some jurisdictions, more than half of the vehicles stolen had unlocked doors and keys left inside. But drivers can avoid becoming part of these statistics. The ABTPA and its 29 vehicle crime task forces in Texas promote a basic vehicle crime prevention philosophy: "Protect It, It's Yours." Motorists should practice three basic safety tips to help prevent theft and burglary during the holidays and throughout the year: remove belongings from view,

secure vehicles, and never leave keys inside. In addition to practicing these prevention methodologies, drivers should park in areas that are well-lit, near surveillance cameras (if available), and near heavy foot and vehicle traffic. The more thieves feel threatened by detection, the less likely they are to focus on targets in such areas.

The Texas Auto Theft Prevention Authority (ATPA) was created by the Texas Legislature in 1991 to fund law enforcement programs to reduce vehicle thefts. The passing of House Bill 1887 in 2007 expanded the scope of the agency to include automobile burglary and added that term to the Authority's title. The TTX was an unclassified interagency and public/private sector exchange that focused on a complex terror attack scenario.

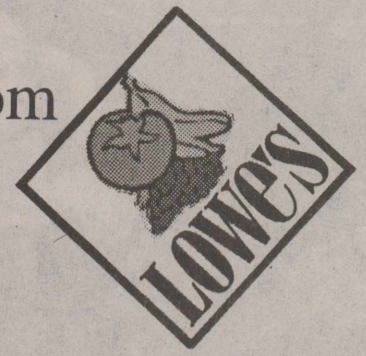
The discussions and objectives focused toward executive level and key subordinate leaders who are responsible for pre-incident planning, command and control, and immediate and sustained operations.

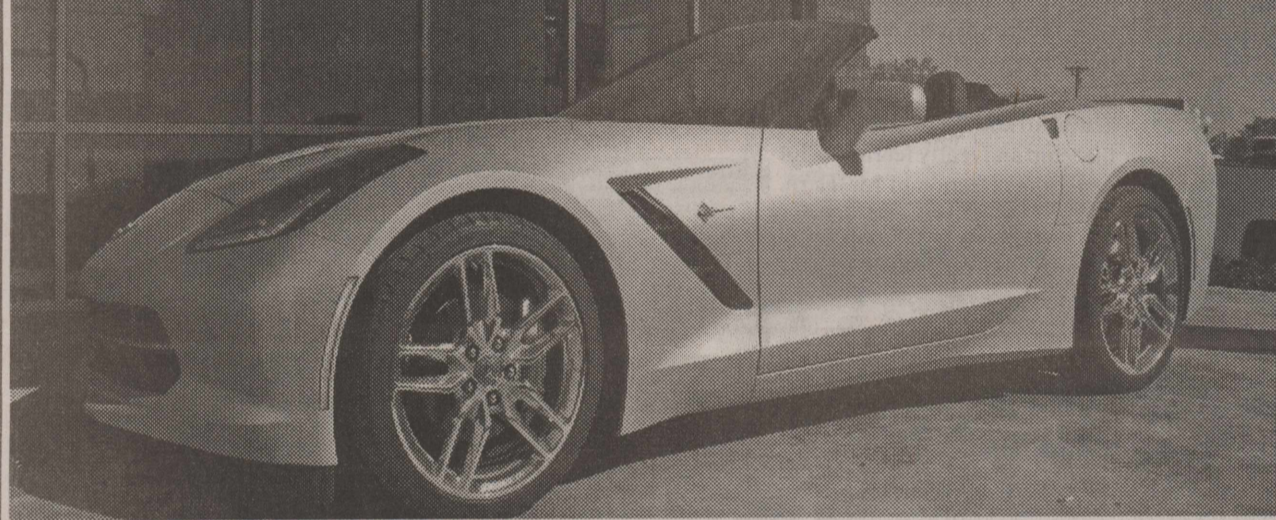

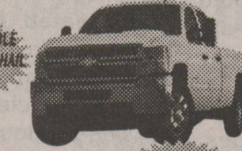
