Sheriff's Corner

Monday afternoon, while at the Callahan County Co-op station in Baird gassing up my County issued patrol pickup, a Callahan County Rancher and friend stopped to report an attempted scam. He said that he had just received a phone call, on his home phone, from someone who spoke broken English.

The caller told him that he (the rancher) had made a fraudulent tax return and he needed to call another number within 24 hours to fix the problem.

The caller tried to sound as convincing as possible with the letters IRS appearing on the called ID. My rancher friend hung up on him and wanted me to remind everyone to be aware of this particular scam.

Callahan County Dispatchers informed me that they have been receiving several calls from county residents concerning this type of scam. These scams may increase as tax season is upon us.

Now, I know that Callahan County citizens are smart enough not to fall for any of these scams, but it doesn't hurt to remind everyone to be

aware. If you are not sure if the call is real or is a scam, just call the Sheriff's Office at 854-

According to the IRS Consumer Alert here are five things that scammers often do, that the IRS will NOT do.

1. The IRS will not call to demand immediate payment, or call about taxes owed, without having first mailed you

2. The IRS will not demand that you pay taxes without giving you the opportunity to question or appeal the amount they say you owe.

3. The IRS will not require you to use a specific payment method for your taxes, such as a debit card.

4. The IRS will not ask for credit or debit card numbers over the phone.

5. The IRS will not threaten to bring law enforcement to have you arrested for not paying.

These calls usually come from another country, like Jamaica, where law enforcement can not reach them. I suggest that you keep reporting them to local law enforcement anyway, just to keep everybody aware.

CP Cemetery Marker Dedication March 24

One hundred sixty-two years ago next week, James Knight, an early Texas merchant and one of Stephen F. Austin's original colonists, received a bounty warrant for 320 acres from the Republic of Texas for his service during the Mexican War. On December 17, 1854, a tract of land 30 miles east of Caddo Peak was patented in his name. After being transferred to several different owners, the land was deeded to George C. Steele in 1857. It is doubtful any of these owners ever lived on the land, and most likely unbeknownst to them, the town of Turkey Creek (later renamed Cross Plains) began using the unoccupied land as a cemetery.

The first burial was in 1882. A marker was later placed on the grave by the Old Settlers Association which identified the

deceased as the "son of 'Uncle Johnnie' Lard." His headstone announces that he was "The first to be laid in rest in CrossPlains Cemetery." The money for the marker was furnished by J. M. Coffman and other old timers. No records have been found to identify the Lard/Laird family. It is possible they were only passing through when the death occurred.

About 1900, the Steele children, subdivided a portion of the Knight tract into lots and several large blocks, which was called the Steele Addition to the city of Cross Plains. On December 22, 1905, the Steele children deeded the cemetery land to the cemetery trustees. The trustees in 1905 were H. L. McDaniel, S. F. 'Fos' Bond and S. C. 'Sam' Barr, well-known early residents of Cross Plains.



Quite a discussion has been engaged in as to the rain that fell Saturday and Saturday night. Some of our citizens who had nail-kegs, oyster cans and paint buckets in yards, gardens, etc., claim about six inches of rain fell. We learn from Mr. Richardson's measurements, which are presumed to be very accurate, that on Saturday there fell 3.05 inches, and on Saturday night 0.76 of an inch, thus giving us nearly four solid inches of rainfall in about 12 hours. The creeks in this section were higher

than for several years. It should be noted that less than eight inches of rain had fallen here from the first of December last. We have had now eleven inches rainfall from 1st December, 1881, to May 7, 1882-a pretty fair rainfall.

Our present general outlook is very encouraging. Capital and enterprise will, for many years to come, continue to be directed to this western section with increasing volume. Flocks of sheep and blooded livestock of every kind will soon cover the hills of Callahan County while farms and orchards smile in the valleys. Lands will treble in value and new sources of wealth and avenues of business will be opened up that are not yet dreamed of. Already large capital is investing in gypsum and coal beds, and now comes the new of the discovery of gold in Eastland County. The day is certainly dawning upon our western land.

Cross Plains' retailsales start 2015 higher by 7%

The City of Cross Plains' one percent city sales tax payments in 2015 are just over seven percent higher than 2014, according to the Texas State Comptroller's office.

Texas State Comptroller Glenn Hegar reported the city's sales tax payment on Wednesday, March 11th.

Cross Plains' 2015 sales tax payments for the year totalled \$59,520.33, which is 7.74 percent higher than the \$55,240.47 in sales tax rebate payments collected in 2014.

The payment to the city for March 2015 was \$20,235.71, which is 3.00 percent ahead of the \$19,645.75 payment made to Cross Plains in March 2014.

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar said today, Wednesday, March 11th, that state sales tax revenue in February was \$2.46 billion, up 11.7 percent compared to February 2014.

"This marks the 59th consecutive month of year-over-year growth—an encouraging sign that Texas' diverse economic engine continues to drive spending growth in households and businesses all over the state," Heaar said.

"Receipts from manufacturing and wholesale and retail trade showed strong growth," Hegar said, "And despite the decline in oil and natural gas prices, tax receipts from the oil and natural gas sector were once again up sharply over last year."

Hegar will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts their March local sales tax allocations totaling \$590.1 million, up 6.7 percent compared to March 2014.

Hegar sent Texas cities \$381.5 million in March 2015, which is higher by 6.1 percent compared to March 2014 and higher by

7.3 percent year-to-date. He reported \$38.6 million in March 2015 allocations to Texas counties, which is higher by 7.5 percent compared to March 2014 and higher by 9.7 percent year-to-date.

The Texas transit systems received \$134.1 million in March 2015 sales tax allocations, which is 6.5 percent higher than March 2014 and up 7.7 percent year-

Special Purpose Taxing Districts received \$35.9 million in March 2015 allocations, which is 13.8 percent higher than March 2014 and higher by 13.6 percent year-to-date.

Total sales tax allocations were \$590.1 million in March 2015, which is 6.7 percent higher than March 2014 and up 7.9 percent year-to-date.

The sales tax figures represent January sales reported by monthly tax filers.

Other Callahan County towns reporting sales tax payments for this month include:

-The City of Baird reported that sales tax payments in 2015 started the year 13.02 percent higher than the 2014 payments. The city has received \$51,329.75 in 2015, while the 2013 tax payments to the city totalled \$45,415.08.

-The 2015 sales tax payments in the City of Clyde are 34.32 percent lower than the payments made to the city in 2014. The sales tax rebates for the City of Clyde have amounted to \$163,245.04 in 2015. The 2014 payments to the city during the same payperiod \$248,572.98.

The City of Clyde's monthly payment for March 2015 was \$45,777.95, which is 1.41 percent below the \$46,433.88 payment made in March 2014.

-The City of Putnam reported the 2015 payments to the town totalled \$3,165.91, which is higher by 17.48 percent from the 2014 payments to the city in the amount of \$2,694.66.

Putnam's tax payment for the month of March 2015 was \$958.14, which is 28.28 percent higher than the payment of \$746.90 made to the city in March 2014.

-Countywide, sales tax payments for 2015 in Callahan County are lower by 21.21 percent compared to the 2014 payments in the county. Callahan County towns received sales tax payments in 2015 amounting to \$277,261.03 while the 2014 payments to the county towns totalled \$351,923.19.

The tax rebates in Callahan County for the month of March 2015 was \$79,839.38, which is 2.34 percent higher than the March 2014 payments of \$78,009.73 made to the Callahan County cities.

Merchants collect the state and local sales tax and send it to the Comptroller's office with their tax returns. The state keeps its 6 1/4% share and returns the local one percent sales tax each month to the local governments. Cities and counties may levy a combined tax of up to two percent above the state's sales tax.

Clyde businesses collect 2.00%, including one percent for the City of Clyde, one-half of one percent for the Clyde Economic Development Corporation and one half of one percent to reduce property taxes (Proceeds to benefit the Clyde Volunteer Fire Department).

Cross Plains collects 2.00% in local sales taxes, of which 1.00 percent is allocated to the city and 1.00% is allocated for economic development in the

Baird collects 2.00% in local sales tax of which 1.00% is allocated to the city, 0.50% is allocated to the community's economic development corporation and 0.50% of one percent to reduce property taxes.

Putnam collects 1.00% in local sales tax of which all 1.00 percent is allocated to the city. All local sales taxes must be Baird's monthly payment for approved by local voters and may be used for any legal city or county expenses. Most areas put the money in their General Fund and use it for normal operations like fire fighting, main-

Mesonet stations helps NWS with forecasts

Clyde to get one of two new Texas Tech **University West Texas Mesonet Stations**

Two new Texas Tech University West Texas Mesonet (WTM) Weather Stations were recently installed at Fort Chadbourne and Fort McKavett.

These West Texas Mesonet Stations (WTM) are invaluable to the National Weather Service and to all others who use this near real time data. A mesonet station records weather observations at various levels. This data is transmitted to the web every 1 to 5 minutes and can be accessed at the following website: http://www.mesonet.ttu.edu/

Texas Tech University has worked tirelessly and graciously to install these stations in datasparse areas. The map below shows where the new, current and future stations are located within the NWS San Angelo County Warning Area.

Two additional mesonet stations are planned to be installed in Clyde and at Fort Lancaster.

According to Joel Dunn with the National Weather Service, the Mesonet tower stands about 30 feet tall. It measures wind speeds at various heights, along with temperature, humidity level, precipitation, solar radiation, sky cover, evaporation, soil temperature and soil moisture.

Dunn said the Clyde site has not be determined, along with an installation date.

He said the second Mesonet station in fort Lancaster is located in Crockett County, west of Ozona.

Meteorologists at the National Weather Service use a variety of data sources when looking at current conditions. National Weather Service uses this near real time WTM data to prepare forecasts, advisories and warn-

Wes Burgett is the lead installer for the WTM and has installed numerous stations across a large part of West Texas. Forecasters from NWS Lubbock and San Angelo often assist Wes with these installations.








Red-Spotted Toad

The Red-spotted Toad (Bufo punctatus) is one of nine species of "true" toads that occur in Texas, and it is arguably the most distinguishable. It can be observed throughout Texas in all but the eastern 1/2 of the state. It also occurs in most of the southwestern states, as well as far south as the state of Hidalgo, Mexico.

The habitats that this toad prefers to occupy vary from rocky deserts, open prairies, grasslands, although it can also thrive in open range, mesquite-filled pastures, and creosote flats. More often than not, it is associated closely with permanent or semi-permanent water sources. whether the water source be natural such as creeks or springs, or man-made such as cattle tanks. In addition to water sources, this species can live anywhere that has loose enough soil where it can bury itself deep enough to escape the heat and drought conditions.

The Red-spotted Toad is a moderately small amphiblan that has dry, wart-covered skin. It is one of the smallest "true" toads that inhabit this state, with adult females (the larger sex) attaining a total body length of just over two inches. The background coloration can vary from any shade of brown to olivebrown to olive gray. As the common name implies, it frequently is adorned with numerous small red dots, although in many individuals these dots are just a darker shade of brown. The belly coloration is off-white to white in coloration and oftentimes has small irregular dark spots. The paratoid glands are the large "bumps" immediately behind each eye, and in this species, they are round to slightly oval in appearance. Each toe on the hind feet end in a sharp black point, and there are two sharp tubercles on each hind foot. The innermost tubercle is crescentshaped.

Red-spotted Toads, like other amphibian species, live a duallife. In fact, the word amphibian itself means "double-life". When the spring and summer rains begin, males of this species will congregate at shallow pools to begin to attract a mate. This attraction consists of calling in long, high-pitched, trill-like bursts. When just one or two males is calling, the noise is nothing more than background noise. However, like other "true" toads, when a large group begins to call in a chorus, the noise can be deafening.

Once a male successfully attracts a mate, they engage in the process of externally fertilizing the eggs. This process is known as amplexus. During this time, a male will wrap his forelegs around a receptive female





Above and beyond the call of duty: **Doris Miller's story from Waco to WWII**

Doris Miller failed eighth grade once.

Then he failed it again. Then he was rejected by the

Civilian Conservation Corps. By the time he was 19, Doris was deemed unsuitable for a Depression-era government assistance job. It'd be hard to blame anyone for thinking Doris' life was headed nowhere - and getting there fast.

But setback after setback didn't discourage this son of Waco-area sharecroppers, who was plenty familiar with hard work and tough circumstances. Instead of being defeated, Doris walked into a Navy recruiter's office in Dallas and signed himself up.

President Roosevelt had opened up the Navy to African-Americans seven years earlier, but only under the condition that they serve in segregated mess units serving their white counterparts. Doris took his position as a Mess Attendant. Third Class on the USS West Virginia sailing the Pacific

He was a great fit for the Navy, especially when it came to the sport of boxing.

Doris, so-named because his parents had expected a girl, took no prisoners in the boxing ring on the Pearl Harbor-based USS West Virginia, eventually becoming the ship's heavyweight boxing champion. But, the sparring in the ring would soon make way to more serious fighting.

On the morning of December 7th, Doris was collecting soiled laundry when he felt the blow

of the first of nine Japanese bombs hit his ship. He hurried to the main deck to assume his battle station and began aiding his fellow wounded sailors, moving them out of the openfire to temporary safety.


As an African-American sailor with much less training than the white sailors, Doris had no experience with antiaircraft weapons. In fact, he had never fired a .50 caliber Browning anti-aircraft machine gun until he spotted an unmanned station and took aim at the incoming Japanese bombers.

No one would have guessed that the young mess attendant had no formal training with that weapon. He continued to return fire at the Japanese attackers until he was forced to abandon the sinking ship. Men who served alongside Doris that day recall him shooting down as many as six Japanese bombers, although the true number has never been known.

Doris' heroic service in defense of his country tragically came to an end two years later when a single Japanese torpedo dealt a fatal blow to the USS Liscome Bay on the morning of November 24, 1943.

Of the 916 men on board at the time of the attack, just 272 survived and Doris was not one of them.

Doris truly was an American hero. He was the first African-American to earn the Navy Cross in 1942.

Over 70 years later, his valiant story has not been forgotten. Schools, parks, auditoriums - even a Navy ship, the USS Miller - have been named after him. You may have even seen him on postal stamps throughout the years. And now the newest addition to his legacy will be right here in Texas at the Doris Miller Veterans Affairs Medical Center in Waco, thanks to a Congressional Resolution, we passed last year.

As we know, Doris' story is just one of the many incredible biographies that started here in Texas. I'm proud to share my home state with him and to honor Doris' legacy in celebration of Black History

The State of Water in Texas

corded transatlantic telephone nity call from New York to San Francisco. He had already invented the telephone, but sought to transform the way people communicated even more. As was the case 100 years ago, the month of January tends to brim with resolutions and commitments to improvements, innovations, and ideas that will make the world a better place.

The Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) is seeking to make advancements in water that will benefit Texans and set the standard for the sustainable and affordable development of water throughout the world. And just as Alexander Graham Bell significantly improved his own invention, the TWDB is transforming itself from the agency it was when created in 1957.

In 2013, the 83rd Texas Legislature passed House Bill 4 and called for a constitutional amendment that would facilitate the investment of \$2 billion from the state's Rainy Day Fund for water projects across the state. After Texas voters overwhelmingly approved that amendment, the TWDB started establishing the framework for the State Water Implementation Fund for Texas, or SWIFT. In 2014, the TWDB embarked on an aggressive strategy to bring sustainable and affordable wa-

> With this fund, the TWDB will provide the financial assistance needed for communities to conserve and develop enough water during times of drought. The TWDB has provided more than \$15 billion in financial assistance for water projects through other funding programs since 1957. SWIFT will build on that history by funding approximately \$800 million in water projects every year for the next 10 years (an estimated \$27 billion in the next 50 years). The TWDB will also continue its support of Texas' agricultural and conservation needs by dedicating at least 10 percent of these funds to rural and agricultural projects and 20 percent to conservation and reuse projects.

One of the most significant enhancements to the TWDB has been the interactive work of its three, full-time Board Members. Throughout the year, Chairman Carlos Rubinstein and Board Members Bech Bruun and Kathleen Jackson have traveled the state in every direction and back again to visit and learn from Texans who know firsthand the water needs of their communities.

Now, because of the hard work and dedication of the many stakeholders, liaisons from state-

wide regional water planning groups, and TWDB Board Members and staff, the implementation of SWIFT is four months ahead of schedule. As a result, it is expected that complete applications will be accepted in the spring (abridged applications for funding prioritization are due by February 3) and funds will be disbursed by the fall.

As SWIFT carries out its first round of funding this year, the TWDB will continue its commitment to science, planning, education, and the agency's other funding programs. With 44 percent of the state still in moderate to exceptional drought (as of 12/30/14 per the U.S. Drought Monitor) and the state's population expanding by almost 1,000 people per day, the TWDB's water planning, data collection, and financial and technical assistance services to the citizens of Texas are as important as

Texas will often be in a state of drought. In the past 100 years there has been a drought in almost every decade, but the state of water is strong. Texas is home to the most innovative solutions and proficient planners in the world. With the support of the people of Texas, the lone star state is at the forefront of drought-proofing possibilities, and on the horizon is a prosperous future for all Texans.
