

## Callahan County **Receives Top Grant Funds For Feral Hog Control**

Callahan County participated is killed during the period of in the 2015 Texas Department of Agriculture sponsored grant program and received \$20,000 grant to combat feral hogs in Callahan County. This program is designed to encourage counties to make a concentrated and coordinated effort to reduce the feral hog population and the damage caused by these ani-

The program began September 1st and ran through November 30, 2014, and proposed activities to continue abatement throughout the year.

Current abatement methods in Texas vary depending on the geographic terrain and vegetation. TDA believes landowners and local constituents know the surrounding land and waterways, as well as the potential challenges to combating feral

Through this program, the highest ranking counties will receive assistance to continue local activities which may range from educating the landowners on abatement methods, coordinating trapping and hunting programs, to conducting areal gunning and addressing public safety hazards related to feral

Participating counties were required to document the follow-

Number of feral hogs taken in 5835. the county, as certified by the county. A feral hog is taken if it

September 1 through Novem ber 30, 2014, or if it is trapped, snared, or captured during this period for purposes of immediate slaughter. Hogs that are trapped, snared, or captured for any other purpose are not considered to have been taken.

Number of individuals participating in-county-approved educational courses addressing feral hog abatement technologies.

The Callahan County Predator Association needs your continued help by reporting numbers to the Callahan County Extension Office throughout the year. Numbers can be reported by signing a certification form indicating date, location, etc. and returning it to the Extension office located in room 201 at Callahan County Courthouse.

Callahan County has participated in the "County Hog Out Program" four of last five years (no program in 2013) receiving \$37,500 grant funds used to take 3890 feral hogs and 1024

Ranchers may join this effort by becoming a member of the Callahan County Predator Association. One hundred percent of funds received from membership and/or participating grants will be used to control feral hogs in Callahan County. For more information please call 325-854-





## **REH Days to launch new game**

Once again, local residents along with all the visitors coming for the Robert E. Howard Days, will get a sneak preview of a Howard related product. In 2011, participants got an advance preview of the Conan movie that premiered a couple of months after Howard Days. This year two fantasy games are being introduced at the event.

June 12 & 13 will find dozens of visitors from around the world taking dead aim on Cross Plains as they come to take part in the annual two day celebration of Howard's legacy and extensive body of work. This year will make the 29th year that the Howard scholars have been coming for a variety of celebrations centered on the most well known resident of Cross Plains. After graduating from our local high school, Howard attended Brownwood High to get an additional year of credits before enrolling in **Howard Payne** 

By age 19, Howard was being published somewhat locally before he hit it big with his first story in the popular Weird Tales pulp magazine in 1925. From that point on, until his death in 1936, he cranked out hundreds

of short stories and poems from the small white house on the west side of town that has become the Robert E. Howard Museum.

Jeff Shanks of FL is one of the newer scholars in Howard studies and has shed some light on Howard's most famous creation, Conan the Cimmerian, who is taking the gaming world by storm! Shanks, who has attended the Howard Days for the past several years explained the phenomenon as "two new games featuring this character that will debut later this year and Cross Plains will get a sneak peak at both of them this June at Howard Days"

He went on to say that the first is a Conan strategy board game developed by a French company and utilizes miniature figures on a game map to simulate combat in the Hyboria Age. Howard had created this entire world as the backdrop of his fantasy stories. Patrice Louinet, 2014 Howard Days Guest of Honor from France, is serving as advisor and Howard expert in order to keep the game true to Howard's stories.

The second game is a traditional role-playing game,

along the lines of the popular Dungeons and Dragons, in which players take on the part of adventurers in the Hyborian Age of Conan. Along with Shanks, several other Howard Days regulars are contributing their expertise to the production. Mark Finn and Tim Truman as previously featured guests at Howard Days, along with the 2015 Guest of Honor, Mark Schultz, have critical roles in writing the adventures and background materials.

At the Howard Days in June, Shanks explained that Tim Brown (designer of the French game) will be joining Louinet, Shanks, Finn and Schultz for a huge panel on REH and gaming. They'll discuss how these projects came about, why these companies felt it was important to remain faithful to Howard's stories, and give us all a first look at these exciting new games before the rest of the world!"

Project Pride members encourage folks who are into the gaming world to check out this particular panel discussion to be held at the Cross Plains Public Library at 1:30 on Saturday, June 13. Other panels will be shared in later news releases.



## **Texas Game Wardens** Commission 10 new K-9s

AUSTIN - Ten canines are now official state K-9s after receiving their badges and commissions as Texas game wardens.

The K-9s were accompanied by their game warden partners during a graduation ceremony at the Texas Parks and Wildlife Austin Department's headquarters this morning.

"In a very short period of time, the K-9 program has become a great asset to Texas game wardens, state and local law enforcement agencies, and the citizens we serve throughout Texas," says Colonel Craig Hunter, Director of TPWD's Law Enforcement Division.

The dogs underwent an extensive eight-week training led by Sgt. Wendell Nope of the Utah Department of Public Safety's Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) program. The new K-9s received training in search and rescue, narcotics detection, and a few are also trained in resource recognition, which includes recovery of wildlife and gunpowder residue detection.

"The K-9 program, which began two years ago, has progressed attributes of our job- especially our search and rescue operations," says game warden Captain Jason Davis, who oversees the K-9 team as part of the Law Enforcement Division's Tactical Operations. "Now, we can go to the last place a person was and find them faster than we would during a full-area search."

Davis says the dogs and their partners have become an asset to not only TPWD, but to other agencies as well.

"The K-9 program has evolved into a stand-alone unit due to the large amount of

requests they receive," says Davis. "Handlers and their dogs are dedicated to serving all of Texas, not just specific areas. They are often called to assist other state and local agencies with narcotics searches and search and rescue efforts."

Sheep Raising in Callahan

No county, in Texas is better suited for sheep raising than Callahan. It is diversified with hills, valleys, and plains, thus affording variety in its grasses and vegetation—a matter that conduces in not small degree to the health of sheep. It is well watered for stock purposes and, where tracts have no water in creeks on, or convenient to them, the surface and soil is well adapted to the ready and cheep construction of good tanks. The county is comparatively free from the thick growth of rough, thorny bushes that often entails a heavy loss of wool in other locations. The soil, though not stiff, is of a firm texture and is not so loose and porous that the native growth of mesquite stands in danger of being tramped out and destroyed in a few years, where stocked with sheep. Callahan has railroads within an easy half day's ride of every part of it, except the extreme southwestern part, and the Gulf, Colorado & Santa Fe will soon be extended across or near this portion. No one locating in Callahan and bringing his family with him, there be necessarily deprives them of the advantages of society and schools. That

these advantages are beginning to be appreciated, is shown by the very rapid growth of our sheep and wool interests within the past year. One firm at Baird, Messrs. Wright & Seay, have already, up to May 25th, shipped this season about 100,000 pounds of wool, there are now about 75,000 head of sheep in the county, in flocks of 500 to 5,000 each. Mr. John Day has the largest flock, numbering something over 5,000. Several car-loads of bucks have been sold here within the past year, while many of the flocks are already pretty well graded. Callahan County can easily support a quarter of a million head of sheep, and now, while lands are cheap and the range not crowded, is a golden time for investment in the business.

## Wolf Spider

Think that you have a large extended family? Well, you have nothing on a group of creepycrawlies known as Wolf Spiders.


Wolf Spiders are a diverse group of spiders that can be found worldwide, save for the coldest of the Arctic and Antarctic regions. Taxonomically speaking, this family has more than one hundred genera and nearly two thousand three hundred species. In Texas, this family is represented by fifteen genera and sixty-four species, while the specimens that are the best known in this area are the nine species that belong to the genus Hogna.

Wolf Spiders, like other species of arachnids, have a body that consists of two parts (the cephalothorax and the abdomen) as well as the customary eight legs. The dorsal coloration varies from light to dark, but generally is a tan to light brown coloration. Along the cephalothorax are two darker brown lines that run lengthwise to the abdomen, which can be unpatterned or adorned with two light lines. Females are slightly larger in size than males, reaching a total body length of about one and one-half inch and a legspan of almost three inches.

There are two characteristics that make these spiders distinguishable from other native species. The first characteristic is the coloration of the underside. Wolf Spiders have a solid black underside that is set apart from the tan to brownish upper-side.

The other characteristic is the arrangement of the eight eyes. These eight eyes are arranged in three rows - four small eyes on the bottom, two large eyes on the middle row, and two medium sized eyes on the top. It is with these eight eyes that they rely on excellent eyesight to hunt for food as well as for scanning their surroundings for predators. These eight eyes also reflect light at night, and many specimens are seen on roadways during the summer months. They appear as little green flashes on the road as their eyes reflect the automobile head-

Wolf Spiders are also unique in the way that they care for their young. Unlike most other spiders, which will lay their egg sacs in their intricate web, this group of spiders will carry their egg sac with them on the underside of their abdomen. This egg

Two Safety Rules that Could Save Your Life:

• Safety rule number 1 - Be damaging thunderstorm wind sure you can receive warnings reports and tornadoes occurs from the National Weather

> Don't depend on sirens. Have smart phone or weather radio.

Sirens are used to warn those who are outdoors, and may not be loud enough to awaken you in the middle of the night. NOAA Weather Radio is like a smoke detector that can warn you anytime, both indoors and outdoors. This radio will produce a loud sound when a tornado warning is issued.

• Safety rule number 2 -Know what to do

The safest place to survive violent, killer tornadoes is in an approved underground storm shelter or in an above ground storm shelter.

The next safest place is on the lowest floor of your home, school or business in an interior room like a closet, hallway, or bathroom. Stay low to the ground and cover yourself with blankets, pillows, and/or mattresses.

If a tornado approaches and shelter. If nothing is available,

produce flash flooding. Watch out when you come to a flooded low water crossing. Always Turn Around, Don't Drown!

When severe weather threatens West Central Texas. your National Weather Service closely coordinates with local emergency managers, volunteer fire fighters, law enforcement officials, SKYWARN storm spotters, storm chasers, and the media to help keep you safe. But you can be your best source for protection when you get a warning from the National Weather Service if you are "weather ready."
