
Work will also be done on the watering system that will be connected to the well behind the parsonage.


Reggie Palmer Pillans



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

Health Tidbits—Listeriosis

Every Texan is aware of the Blue Bell ice cream recall, what recall: Listeria.

Listeriosis is an infection caused by the bacteria Listeria. Listeriosis causes meningoencephalitis and/or septicemia in adults and countertops, and cutting boards newborn infants. It is spread after handling and preparing through a variety of uncooked foods. contaminated food: uncooked meats and vegetables, refrigerator right away, unpasteurized dairy products, especially juices from hot dog and cooked or processed foods. Listeria is killed by cooking or meat, and raw poultry. pasteurization, but it can survive the cold.

Symptoms of Listeriosis:

Fever, muscle aches, diarrhea, rinse. headache, stiff neck, confusion, loss of balance, and from animal sources; such as convulsions. Pregnant women beef, pork, or poultry.







As we predicted in January, state revenues have grown at a site moderate pace. April is the second consecutive month of relatively slow growth in sales tax revenue, and I remain cautiously optimistic about our economic progress," Hegar said. "Growth in total sales tax revenues collected this month was muted by the significant slowdown in the oil and gas mining sectors, however, collections from other major economic sectors-including retail and wholesale trade, restaurants, construction, and manufacturing—continued consecutive month of growth in sales tax collections."

Hegar will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts their May local sales tax allocations totaling \$759.8 million, up 6.1 percent compared to May 2014.

Hegar sent Texas cities \$498.1 million in May 2015, which is to May 2014 and higher by 6.2 percent year-to-date.

He reported \$46.2 million in May 2015 allocations to Texas counties, which is higher by 3.0 percent compared to May 2014 and higher by 7.0 percent yearto-date.

The Texas transit systems received \$171.4 million in May 2015 sales tax allocations, which is 7.5 percent higher than May 2014 and up 7.1 percent yearto-date.

Special Purpose Taxing Districts received \$44.1 million in May 2015 allocations, which is 10.0 percent higher than May 2014 and higher by 12.5 percent year-to-date.





They will stay with the mother for an additional five months until they are ready to venture out on their own.

Do not underestimate a Badger's fighting skills just because they are comical in appearance. They have few natural enemies, and many domesticated dogs have succumbed to the fiery personality, teeth and claws of a healthy adult Badger. There is even a record of a Badger that successfully fought off two coyotes, so this animal is not one to be confronted. If you are lucky enough to observe this skilled digger and fighter in the wild, take a few quick photos, but be wise enough to know to leave well enough alone





Pharmacy Groups Asks Texas Senate To Act Now To Protect Children

AUSTIN, TX — A coalition of in committee." consumers, local businesses and pharmacy groups across Texas and the nation implored Texas Senate leaders today to act on legislation to expand vaccine access for Texas children. "Senate Bill 480, introduced by state Sen. Charles Perry (R-District 28), would permit pharmacists to administer CDC- recommended vaccines to children age 7 and up if their parent reported an increase in chooses to do so." The legislation was referred to the Texas Senate Health and Human Services Committee in February but has seen no adolescent vaccination rates in action since.



We have seen through our experience with flu shots that allowing pharmacists to administer vaccines helps drive up immunization rates," said Chadwick. Chadwick noted states that have expanded immunization authority to pharmacists have realized a 5 percent increase in vaccination rates for individuals under age 65 and a 10 percent increase for seniors. There are many reasons parents may want to visit a local pharmacist for vaccines for their children. Pharmacists are highly trained and rank among the most trusted health professionals. Texas' nearly 3,000 community pharmacies are conveniently located throughout the state, including rural and underserved communities. "We implore legislators to act quickly on Senate Bill 480, before the session ends, to protect children and the larger community from serious diseases," said Chadwick. Campaign Aims to Stem Spread of Invasive Zebra Mussels

AUSTIN-A major public board when traveling on a public awareness campaign is calling on boaters to "Clean, Drain, and Dry" their boats, trailers, and gear before traveling to and from Texas waterways to stem the spread of zebra mussels.

A coalition of river authorities, water districts and municipalities across the state, led by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, is investing more than \$400,000 in this year's advertising campaign; the largest investment in public awareness since zebra mussels were discovered in Texas in 2009.

Zebra mussels have been found in seven lakes in Texas since they were established in Lake Texoma in 2009. Other infested lakes include Lake Ray Roberts, Lakes Bridgeport, Lavon, Lewisville, Belton, and most recently in Lake Waco. Economically, zebra mussels have the potential to cause damage to drinking water facilities and electric power plants, with losses estimated to being in the millions of dollars annually.

From an environmental perspective, zebra mussels are filter feeders, which directly
