Barbarian Festival A Few Weeks Away - Thanks to the Sponsors



Wind Scorpion

With the advent of the Internet, the amount of informational resources has increased exponentially from what was available just a few years ago. However, just as the wealth of accurate information that is more accessible, the amount of misinformation is also staggering. This misinformation is more often than not the source of many urban legends, particularly when it comes to creatures that are associated with fearful reactions. Such is typically the case with an order of scorpions that contains over a 1,000 described species worldwide, including here in west Texas.

The Wind Scorpion (order Sulifugae) is a huge order of arachnids that can be encountered almost worldwide, with the region and curiously, Australia. In Texas, these fearsome looking scorpions are found throughout the arid areas of western and southern portions of the state. They can be quite abundant in the Trans-Pecos region, while less frequently seen in the other areas that they inhabit.

Just as with other arachnids such as spiders, Wind Scorpions have eight legs, although the first pair of legs is smaller and are actually not utilized in movement as much as they are for feeling the surroundings. Like other scorpions, they have a large set of pedipalps that are used primarily in the same way that insects use their antennae. Unlike other scorpions, however, these pedipalps do not have pinchers. It has two body parts, with the cephalathorax being the body part where the legs are attached to, and the abdomen which is often covered with prickly hairs and set off by anywhere from eight to ten segments. Both body parts are dark brown, while the legs are a light to medium yellowish coloration. Full length is achieved by adults at about two inches. There is a large set of eyes set on the front half of the cephalathorax.

The most distinctive, as well as the most fearsome, characteristic of this order is the four large, vertically curved jaws (known as the chelicerae) that project forward from the mouth area. These jaws are used to dissect its prey, liquefying the victim to be ingested through the mouth. Fortunately, it feeds only on small arthropods such as beetles and other insects, although small lizards, snakes, and even young rodents have been documented as food items. They search for

Days in Cross Plains

Co-sponsored by the Project Pride organization in Cross Plains, the international group known as the Robert E. Howard United Press Association, and the Robert E. Howard Foundation, the annual Robert E. Howard Days will be held on Friday, June 12 and Saturday June 13. Headquartered at the REH Museum at 625 West Highway 36, the two day conference will include panel discussions, special tours of the Museum and the surrounding areas, a special postal cancellation, an award ceremony, celebration dinner and silent auction.

Howard was an extremely prolific writer who lived in Cross Plains during his entire writing career. Although he is probably best known for his Conan the Cimmerian stories, Howard also wrote western, detective and boxing stories, poetry, as well as creating numerous other characters: Solomon Kane, El Borak, King Kull, Bran Mak Morn, and his somewhat bumbling mountain man, Breckenridge Elkins.

Mark Schultz, well known illustrator of Howard stories, has been named Guest of Honor and will share 'A History of Illustrating Robert E. Howard' at the celebration dinner on Friday. He will also lead a couple of the panel discussions on both Friday and Saturday at the Cross Plains Public Library. In addition to his work with the Howard stories, he has either scripted or drawn many popular fiction icons, including Flash Gordon, The Spirit, Tarzan and Superman. He has also scripted the Prince Valiant Sunday comic strip for the past 10 years.

He has promised to bring a variety of his work with him and some lucky bidder in the Silent Auction will be going home with some original, autographed Mark Schultz art!

Attendees at this year's REH Days will get a sneak preview of two games featuring Conan the Cimmerian. To be released later this year is a game developed by the French company, Monolith, LLC.
