Robert E．Howard Days－ 29 years and still going strong

Back in 1986，when Project
Pride was still in the infant stages of organization，several things fell into place rather simultaneously that changed Howard Museum forever．Joan McCowen just happened to be in the library on a Saturday when a very surprised Rusty Burke wandered in．Taking a break from his work at the Johnson O＇Conner Research Foundation， Houston more or less on a whim to search for anything related to Robert E．Howard．

## Wind Scorpion

 sources has increased exponen-tially from what was available just a few years ago. However, just as the wealth of accurate information that is more acces-
sible, the amount of misinformation is also staggering. This
misinformation is more often han not the source of many rban legends, particularly when
comes to creatures that are associated with fearful reactions. Such is typically the case with order of scorpions that conains over a 1,000 described
species worldwide, including here in west Texas.
The Wind Scorpion (order Sulifugae) is a huge order of tered almost worldwide, with the exception being the Antarctic egion and curiously, Australia. n Texas, these fearsome looking scorpions are found throug and southern portions of the state. They can be quite abundant in the Trans-Pecos region, while areas that they inhabit.
Just as with other arachnids such as spiders, Wind Scorpi-
ons have eight legs, although ons have eight legs, although and are actually not utilized in movement as much as they are orfeeling the surroundings.
