On Monday evening, May 25, 2015, I was in my office in the jail writing a theft report when a by Taylor County Jail stating they had Xavier Sneed in custody. Taylor County told Callahan County dispatch that Sneed's mother had brought him vated robbery and murder of bery; they are Shaliko Mcgee, Michael Wallace, Xavier Sneed and Brianna Payne. The young lady, Brianna Payne, who is pregnant, had her bond reduced; and she is out of jail on bond.

Shaliko Mcgee has been in Taylor County Jail from January 27, 2015 until now, Thursday, June 4th. This calculates to 129 days and will continue at a cost of \$38.50 per day. Total cost of housing for this person to this date is \$4,966.50. Michael Wallace has been in Taylor County Jail from February 2, 2015 until now, which totals 120 days. At \$38.50 per day the Wallace. Xavier Sneed has only 11 days at a cost of \$423.50. These suspects have cost the county \$10,010.00 to date.

# **International Rocketry Competition** back for their 5th year

On June 11, 2011, over 120 college engineering students from institutions as far away as England and Istanbul, Turkey, Canada, and throughout the United States, gathered on a ranch owned by Pat and Lauretta Gordzelik south of Cross Plains to launch their team projects in high powered rockets. The event, known as the CANSAT Competition, because the projects cannot exceed the size of a coke can, and like real satellites, are lunched skyward via rockets, was created to provide hands on experience for budding aerospace engineers. The American Astronautical Society (AAS) and American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics (AIAA) have organized an annual student design-build-launch competition for space-related topics. Although similar competitions exist for other fields of engineering (robots, radio-control airplanes, racing cars, etc.), most space-related competitions are paper design competitions. While these are worthwhile, they do not give students the satisfaction of being involved with the end-to-end life cycle of a complex engineering project, from conceptual design, through integration and test, actual operation of the system, and concluding with a post-



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

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

**Tortellini & Chicken Caesar Salad** 

Prep/Total Time: 25 Minutes

## Ingredients:

- \* 1 package (20 ounces) refrigerated cheese tortellini
- \* 1 pound chicken breasts, cut into 1 1/2 inch pieces
- \* 1/3 cup finely chopped onion
- \* 1 tablespoon olive oil
- \* 2 garlic cloves, minced
- \* 3/4 teaspoon salt
- \* 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 package (10 ounces) hearts of romaine salad mix
- \* 1 1/2 cups grape tomatoes
- \* 1 can (6 1/2 ounces) sliced ripe olives, drained
- \* 3/4 cup creamy Caesar salad dressing
- 3/4 cup shredded Parmesan cheese





## Directions

- \* Cook tortellini according to package directions. Drain; rinse with cold water
- \* Meanwhile, in a small bowl, combine chicken, onion, oil, garlic, salt and pepper; toss to coat. Heat a large skillet over medium-high heat. Add chicken mixture; cook and stir 4-6 minutes or until chicken is no longer pink. Remove from heat.
- \* In a large bowl, combine salad mix, tomatoes, olives, tortellini and chicken mixture. Drizzle with dressing; toss to coat. Sprinkle with cheese and bacon. Serve immediately.

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

# Robert E. Howard **Days in Cross Plains**

Co-sponsored by the Project Pride organization in Cross Plains, the international group known as the Robert E. Howard United Press Association, and the Robert E. Howard Foundation, the annual Robert E. Howard Days will be held on Friday, June 12 and Saturday June 13. Headquartered at the REH Museum at 625 West Highway 36, the two day conference will include panel discussions, special tours of the Museum and the surrounding areas, a special postal cancellation, an award ceremony, celebration dinner and silent auction.

Howard was an extremely prolific writer who lived in Cross Plains during his entire writing career. Although he is probably best known for his Conan the Cimmerian stories, Howard also wrote western, detective and boxing stories, poetry, as well as creating numerous other characters: Solomon Kane, El Borak, King Kull, Bran Mak Morn, and his somewhat bumbling mountain man, Breckenridge Elkins.

Mark Schultz, well known illustrator of Howard stories, has been named Guest of Honor and will share 'A History of Illustrating Robert E. Howard' at the celebration dinner on Friday. He will also lead a couple of the panel discussions on both Friday and Saturday at the Cross Plains Public Library. In addition to his work with the Howard stories, he has either scripted or drawn many popular fiction icons, including Flash Gordon, The Spirit, Tarzan and Superman. He has also scripted the Prince Valiant Sunday comic strip for the past 10 years.

He has promised to bring a variety of his work with him and some lucky bidder in the Silent Auction will be going home with some original, autographed Mark Schultz art!

Attendees at this year's REH Days will get a sneak preview of two games featuring Conan the Cimmerian. To be released later this year is a game developed by. the French company, Monolith, LLC. This one is a strategy board game that uses miniature figurines on a game map to simulate combat in the Hyborian Age. The second game is a traditional role-playing game along the lines of the popular Dungeons and Dragons, in which players take on the part of adventurers in the Hyborian Age of Conan. Spring may have spring and summer is heading toward us at a rapid pace, but several local businesses here in Cross Plains are pleased to have finally completed their "Spring Cleaning"

Bubba's Smokehouse, on Hwy 36E and Avenue A, has completed their dining room remodel. Owner's Eva and Sam Fleming, are pleased to have a 30' x 34' space for dining that will seat 60 guests. They have installed their large walk in coolers and are continuing to make progress on a smoker room for Sam's meat artistry. Our local grocer has jumped on the remodel wagon as well with several new departments in the store. The Cross Plains Senior Center was blessed recently as well with a fresh new look. The Resource Care staff in Cross Plains gave their time to add some fresh paint to the front of the center. It has two well appointed dental bay's with mobile NO2 (nitrous oxide) for patient comfort. They are able to perform all aspects of general dentistry such as x-rays, cleanings, fillings and dental whitening.

There have been some lovely updates in our community and






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

# Callahan County's jobless rate

lahan County dropped fourtenths of one percent to 3.7% in April 2014, according to jobless figures released Friday, May 29th by the Texas Workforce Commission. The unemployment rate in Callahan County one year ago in April 2014 was

3.4 percent. Callahan County's unemployment rate was 4.1% in March,

Previous monthly jobless rates in Callahan County included: 4.0% in February 2015, 4.1% in January 2015, 3.1% in December 2014, 3.4% in November 2014, 3.6% in October 2014, 3.9% in September, 4.1% in August, 4.1% in July, 4.1% in June, 3.6% in May, and 3.4% in April, according to the unemployment

Big Country area counties, bordering Callahan County, and the counties' unemployment rates for April 2015 include: Brown, 4.0%; Coleman, 5.1%; Eastland, 4.2%; Jones, 5.0%; Runnels, 3.2%; Shackelford, 2.1%; Stephens,

3.6%; and Taylor County, 3.3%. The Abilene MSA (Metropolitan Statistical Area) unemployment rate, which includes Taylor, Callahan and Jones Counties, stood at 3.5% in April, 2015, according to the Texas Workforce Commission. The Abilene MSA Combined Labor Force is 76,600. There were 73,900 employed during April 2015, while 2,700 were unemployed, giving the Abilene MSA an unemployment rate of 3.5%.

The Abilene MSA reported the workforce was 76,900 in March, 2015. Total employment of 74,100 was reported in March 2015, while 2,800, or 3.7% were unemployed in March 2015.

The Abilene MSA unemployment rate for April, 2014 was 4.0%. The total workforce was reported at 77,300, with 74,200 employed and 3,100 or 4.0% unemployed in April, 2014.

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# Antlion

We as Americans have a tendency to overlook the smallest of things due to the busyness of our schedules. One small predatory insect that can be found in our own backyards is one such example of how amazing the natural world can be.

Antlions (Scotoleon sp.) are an abundant insect throughout most of the deserts of the southwestern United States, including right here in west Texas. It requires sandy soils, and it prefers shaded areas provided by brush, grasses, and commonly, carports and farm stables. Their presence can be detected by the conical pits resembling funnels in the soil. It is in these pits that the larvae stage of this insect resides.

The larvae stage of the antlion is rather small, only achieving a length of approximately 1/4 of an inch. The minuscule size is not the story on this tiny insect however, as it looks like a character straight out of the Star Wars saga. As with other insects, it has three pairs of legs, as well as three body parts (head, thorax and abdomen). Each one of the legs ends in a sharp spike, and the hairy abdomen actually encroaches onto and even over the thorax. Attached to the front of the head is two large, sickleshaped mandibles that have several jagged edges that aid it in holding onto its prey. It is these mandibles that give this animal a truly terrifying appearance.

The adult phase of this insect so much so that they are seen by many but recognized by very few. The overall body coloration is typically a dull gray, and the wings are delicately clear. The abdomen is elongated and thin. They have large bulbous eyes and stubby antennae. In short, they look like dull colored drag-

After hatching, the larvae will dig its first aforementioned pit into the loose soil. It is in this funnelized pit that the antlion receives it food like manna from heaven. As unsuspecting ants (its favorite dietary item) fall into the funnel, the antlion snaps its massive jaws shut on its prey. If this predatory response some how miscues, then a truly ferocious attack will ensue. As the ant attempts to climb out of the pit, the antlion will use its spiked legs to flick loose soil upward, causing the prey item to come tumbling towards its massive

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


# Callahan County 4-H Shotgun Team members compete at Johnson County 4-H Fandango


