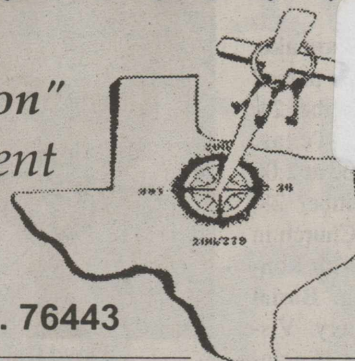

Help the Callahan County Historical Commission (CCHC) celebrate the history of the jail which is the second oldest continually operating jail in Texas. We will honor the Sheriff's department both past and present. This will be the third Callahan County Historical Marker erected by the CCHC. These markers are in addition to the county's many Texas Historical Markers.

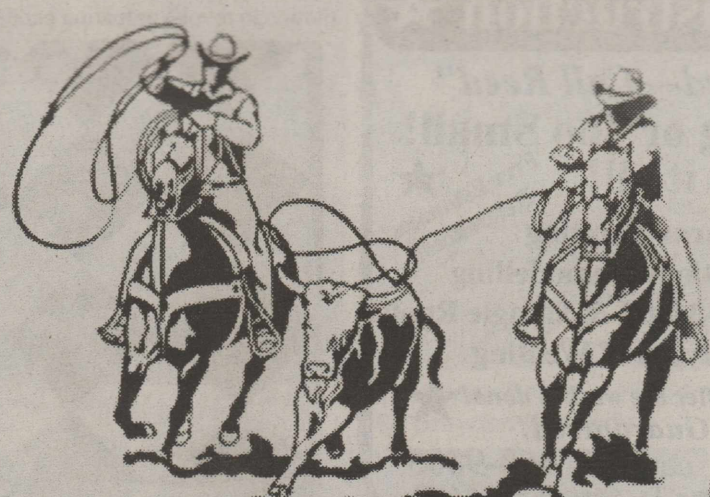

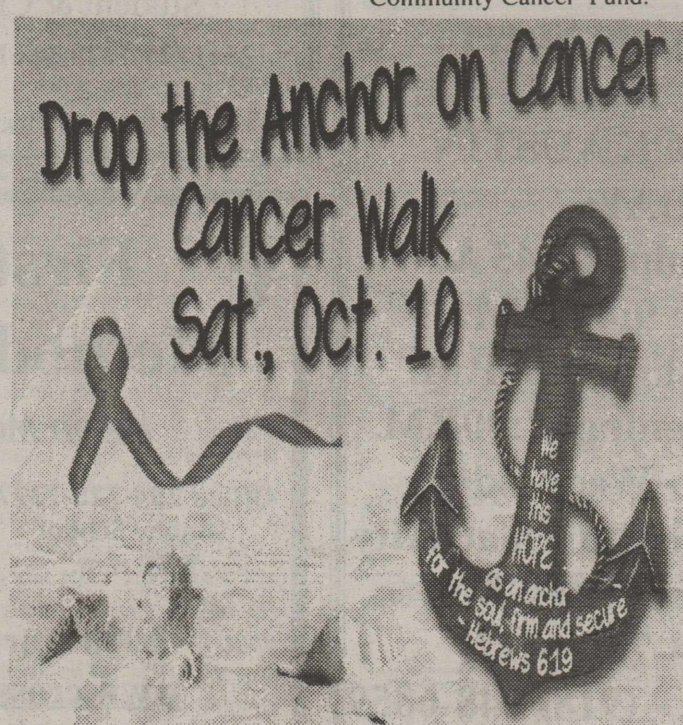

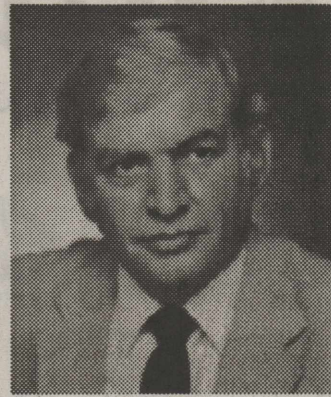

Floyd Dale McGough, 73, of Cross Plains, passed away on October 1, 2015 after a courageous battle with cancer. S

held Monday, October 5th, at 1:00 p.m. at Kimbrough Funeral Home in Cisco, Texas. Interment with military honors will be at Oakwood Cemetery following the service. A visitation for family and friends will be Sunday, October 4th at 5:00 p.m.

Floyd was born on March 26, 1942 at Fort Sam Houston in San Antonio, Texas. After graduation from Abilene High School, he enlisted in the U.S. Air Force where he served one tour of duty. He continued to honorably serve his country as a Captain in the U.S. Army. During his years as a helicopter pilot, he completed two tours of duty in Vietnam. He earned several service and honor medals during his military career, including the Bronze Star, Presidential Air Medal, and the Award of Distinguished Flying Cross which noted he was a distinguished soldier and hero. Upon his return from the service, Floyd attended Mary Hardin Baylor where he graduated Cum Laude. He completed his law degree at Baylor University and served as a defense attorney in the Belton and Temple area for many years. After closing his law practice, he moved to Cross Plains where he spent many

years writing novels. In 2013, he became a published author, penning the book, "Where Robins Die". His family will forever remember his quick wit and talented storytelling that never failed to cause laughter.

Floyd was preceded in death by his wife Nancy, daughter Becky, father D.J. McGough, second wife Waurine, former wife Jenny, and 2 sisters, Beth and Sandra.

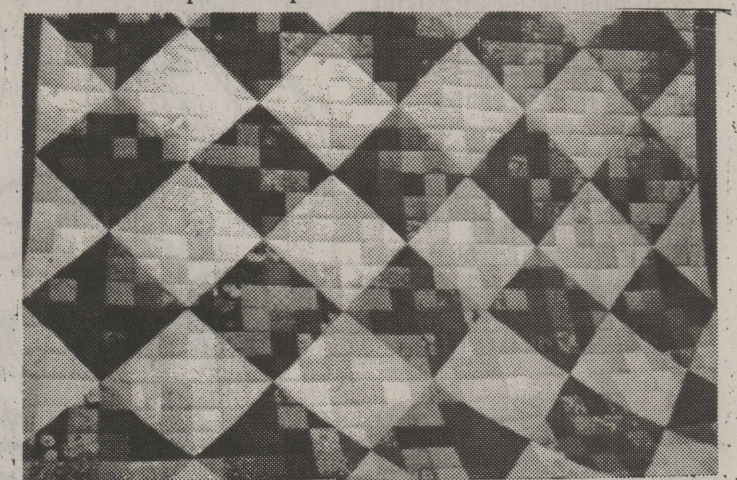

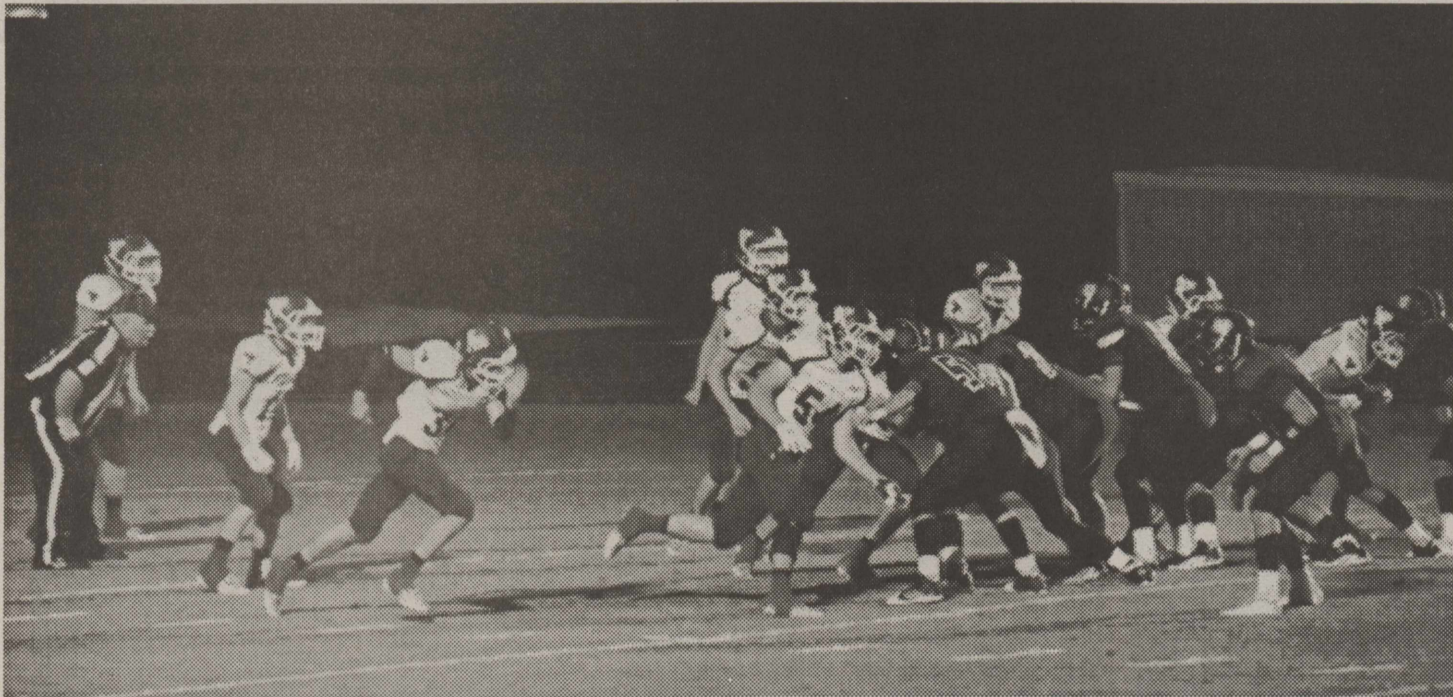

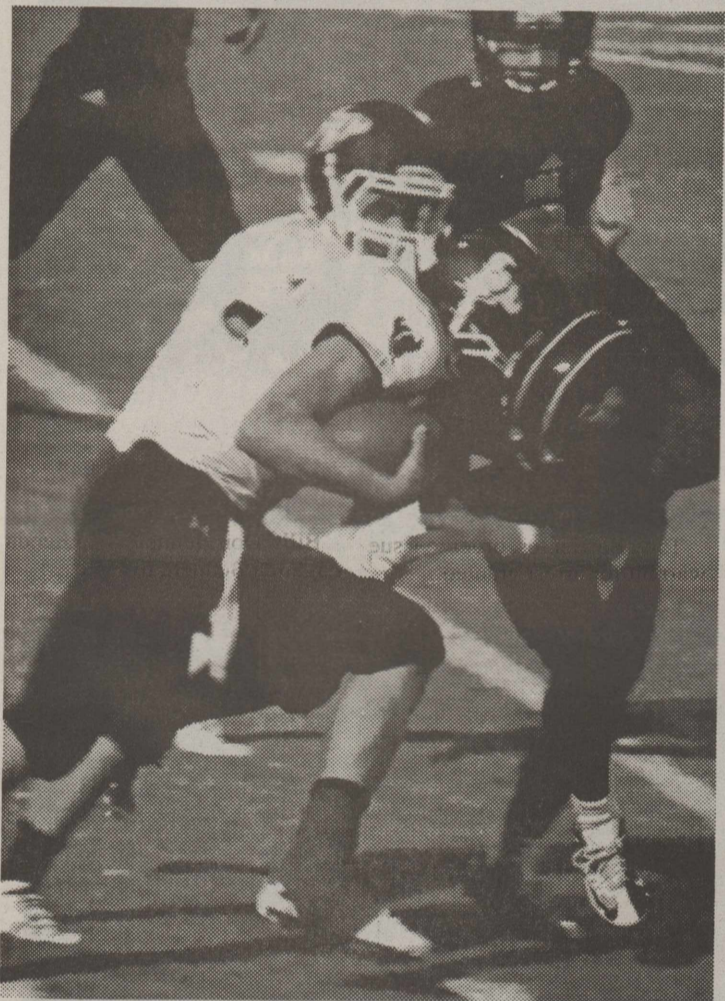

Buffs Fight Hard in Loss to lola

The Cross Plains Buffaloes dominated the statistics, but fell short on the score board in the 29-19 loss to lola last Friday night. The Buffs had 272 rushing yards and 115 passing for a total of 387 yards in total offense. The Buffaloes made 12 first downs. Buffalo quarterback Holden Senclair rushed for 116 yards and one touchdown and passed for 116 yards and two scores. Rylan Laminack ran for 103 yards. In first quarter scoring, Creed Goode scored on a 25 yard pass from Senclair; the kick was good. In second quarter action Laminack scored on a 64 yard pass from Senclair; the point after failed. Lola held the Buffaloes scoreless in the third quarter. The final touchdown for the Buffs came in the fourth quarter when Senclair took the ball in for touchdown from the 3 yard line; the two point conversion failed. The Buffaloes are on the road again this Friday night as they take on the Ranger Bulldogs. Kickoff time is scheduled for 7:30 P.M. in Ranger. Come out and support the Buffs!

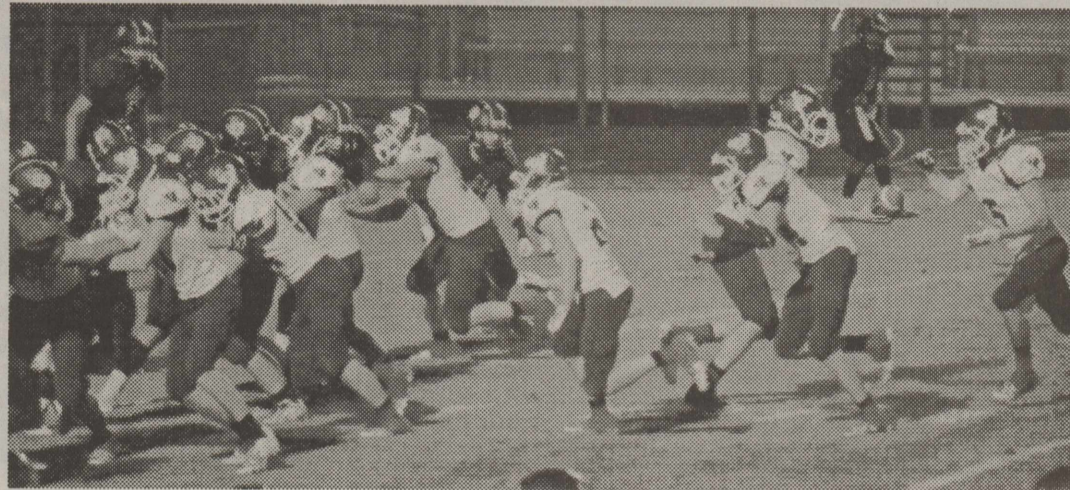

Blue Jay

While some birds are subtly colored and many others are very plain, one species that resides in this great state of ours definitely does not fall into either of those categories, and that species is the commonly observed Blue Jay.

The Blue Jay (*Cyanocitta cristata*) is one of six species of jays that call Texas home, and it is one of only two species in its genus. It ranges from the eastern slopes of the Rocky Mountains eastward throughout the Atlantic Seaboard. In the state of Texas, it is a permanent fixture that resides primarily in the eastern and Panhandle portions; it is usually absent from the far west and deep south regions.

Blue Jays are medium to large sized birds, with adults attaining a body length of just less than twelve inches. The wingspan is just a little larger, reaching nearly sixteen inches. While not entirely blue as the common name would imply, this bird is colored various hues of gray, white, purple and blue. The head is colored with a gray face and chin area, as well as a light purple crest. There is a black collar of varying thickness that separates the head from the body. This collar is thickest along the back angle of the head. The back is colored similarly to the crest, while the wings and tail are colored bright blue and are strikingly adorned with white spots and black bars. The skinny legs are long and are colored mostly black, as is the thick bill.

Blue Jays can be observed on the ground almost as frequently as they can be seen in short trees and bushes. The time spent on the ground is primarily a foraging activity for this omnivorous species. Studies have shown that nearly seventy percent of this species' diet is comprised of plant matter such as acorns, seeds, and berries. Specimens will occasionally feast upon small invertebrates, as well as other back-boned animals such as fish, amphibians, reptiles, and even small mammals.

As with all other species of Jays that occur in Texas, this variety is monogamous and breeding occurs once or twice annually. They are solitary nesters, and the nests are constructed with leaves, twigs, and paper litter and are constructed by both sexes. The height of the nest varies; some "couples" will be build their nest up to five stories above the ground, although most prefer much shorter areas. While both sexes incubate the eggs, the female usu-

ally dominates this role. The greenish-blue eggs number between three and seven and are nearly as wide as they are long. The helpless young are brooded by the female and fed by the male for approximately three weeks. Typically by that time, the young have obtained their ability to fly and developed their ability to gather food on their own.

Blue Jays, once restricted to heavily forested habitats, now are common residents around

residential areas, gardens, and recreational parks. They have been known to store acorns and other seeds in the ground for feeding during the winter months, and many forgotten seeds then in turn germinate. Use peanuts, sunflower seeds, and various other seeds to attract this brilliantly colored bird to your backyard bird feeders.

by the Bookworms



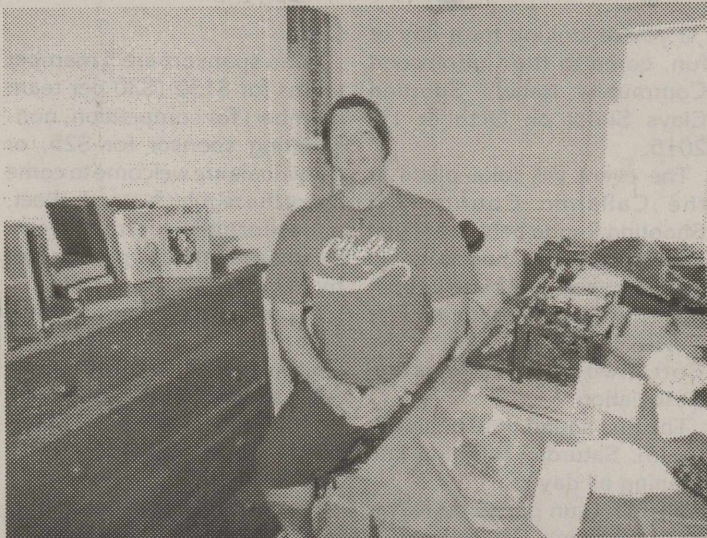
Do you ever decide to read a book or see a movie that you know might challenge your beliefs? I have always enjoyed a book or movie that tested my faith - how else can you grow stronger? Such is the case of "The Ark" by Boyd Morrison. This is a well-written thriller that will have you wondering whether the characters are looking for the real Noah's ark - or just a metaphor. It is fast-paced and chock full of action - one of those books you don't want to put down! But then, I didn't read the book - I listened to the audiobook in unabridged form. It made a very long drive quite enjoyable and I liked that there weren't a lot of subplots and characters to keep track of.

Everything centers on archaeologist Dilara Kenner and engineer Tyler Locke. A cryptic message throws the two strangers together and sends them on the run from madman Sebastian Ulrich, who is intent on murdering them before they can foil his plan to wipeout mankind - barring the few hundred in his cult which he has hand-picked to start a new and better civilization. Although

a work of fiction, this book was well-researched and explores some fascinating premises of the how, what, where, and why regarding the story of Noah and the Flood. After reading this, I was excited to find that it was actually the first book in a series, so I will definitely be checking out the next book!

Author Morrison started his career working for NASA, and after earning a PhD in engineering, he developed patents at Thomson/RCA, then managed a video game testing group in Microsoft's Xbox division before becoming a full-time writer. He is also a professional actor, appearing in films, commercials, and stage plays. In 2003 he fulfilled a lifelong dream and became a Jeopardy! champion. He currently lives in Seattle with his wife. Morrison brings his expertise in engineering and technology to his writing - creating a credible tale that will leave you wondering if it really could have happened that way.
