





Friday, October 23 is the Annual Turkey Supper Night at the Cottonwood Country Musical.



What is the value of the Cross Plains Public Library to the community? We think our library's value is priceless, but let's check it out! Each year, the state releases a Library Use Calculator and these are the figures for our library from 1-5-15 to 9-15-15 that add up to a whopping \$70,446.65: the average cost of a book on Amazon.com is \$17 - we have had 2,432 books borrowed = \$41, 344; audiobooks cost \$9.95 - we have had 107 borrowed = \$1,064.65; we have had 43 interlibrary loans - based on a \$25 average price on Amazon with shipping = \$1,075; subscriptions to magazines and newspapers - we have 18 magazines @\$20 annually and the Cross Plains Review @ \$29 = \$389; there have been 48 movies checked out - based on Netflix average of \$4/movies = \$192; 922 hours of computer and internet use - based on FedEx/ Kinkos price of \$12/hour = \$11,064; 580 children attended

programs - based on average entertainment admission cost of \$7/child = \$4,060; 397 adults attended programs - based onaverage entertainment admission cost of \$15/adult = \$5,955. Add to that the 197 hours that our multi-purpose room is used based on the average of \$25/ hour for electric, water and janitorial = \$4,925, and the average cost of reference assistance - 54 @ \$7/each =

That's how we arrive at the figure of \$70,446.65 as the value of the services we have provided so far in 2015 - and we still have 3 Ω months of data to record! Our annual budget for this year is only \$34,000 - that means we are able to provide our patrons with more than \$2 of services for every \$1 that we spend - where else can you get such a value? Thanks to our volunteers and the support of the community, we are proud to be able to give you excellent service and a wide variety of programs at such a good value!

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Barn Swallow

The Barn Swallow (Hirundo rustica) is one of eight species of the swallow family that inhabits the state of Texas, and is the only one of its genus. This particular species is an extremely common bird that resides throughout every state in continental United States, save for the state of Arizona. It also occurs during the summer months northward to southern Alaska. and is a winter resident in central Mexico. It can be seen throughout the entire state of Texas, and is quite common in the Trans-Pecos and Panhandle re-

This variety of swallow is the largest of the family, save the Purple Martin. Barn Swallows have a body length between six and seven inches while the wingspan can be just more than thirteen inches. While these measurements make it the second largest of the family, it is quite a bit more slender than its closely related cousins.

Like many other species of the swallow family, the Barn Swallow has a coloration of indigo on the back and wing tops. This indigo color tends to iridize when seen in bright sunlight. The top of the head is also blue-black in coloration and is adorned with a rusty colored forehead. The chin is also a rusty color, while the under parts of the body are a combination of white and cinnamon. The tail is colored like the body and is long and deeply forked. This tail structure is one distinguishing characteristic that can be utilized to identify this species from other similar looking swallows.

Barn Swallows are commonly seen while foraging for food or when swooping down to get a drink wile in mid-flight. It has a flight pattern that has been described as graceful, with deep, but quick wing beats followed by inconsistent times of gliding. Occasionally it can be seen perched on telephone or electric lines, although the most frequent area that it can be seen is the areas where it nests.

This species is gregarious as well as primarily communal, particularly when nesting. The males and females are monogamous, and the female plays a game of "hard-to-get/catch-meif-you-can" game that the interested male participates in. After mating, both sexes assist one another in building the nest out





normal time for visitors at the REH Museum, but last Thursday found Nate Butler walking over from the motel for an 8:30 a.m. tour. Butler was on his way from Spring TX to Albuquerque NM for a board meeting of his COMIX35 company where he is President and CEO.

His former company, The Nate Butler Studio, Inc. produced artwork for clients such as Jim Henson Productions, Weekly Reader, Children's Television Workshop, DC Comics, and King Features Syndicate, as well as script writing for Modern Publishing, Archie Comics, and Marvel Comics.

In 1999 he was called into a ministry that would lead him around the world utilizing his artistic skills. His new company was named for Exodus 35:30-35, where the Israelites were called to use all of their artistic talents to build the Tabernacle and Sanctuary; thus the unusual name of COMIX35. Butler and his company have tapped into the comics as a way to teach people about The Word. He offers international consultations, coaching and classes on production and effective use of

comic style of literature. is a non-COMICX35 denominational ministry that brings artists from a given country together to learn how to use the comic characters of their country to reach the people of their country. Comics have been used for years and years to teach

> To add to his story, Butler shared that he had also been the editor/co-publisher/packager of Christian Comics & Games Magazine, editor/publisher of Christian Comics Catalog, and he co-wrote and packaged Aida-Zee, Paro-Dee, Behold 3-D, The Truth For Youth Bible comics, and the Yun: The Illustrated Story of the Heavenly Man graphic novel. Nate created and launched the Christian Comics International web site in 1996 (the first and most complete site of its kind on the Internet) which is now maintained as an additional ministry service of COMIX35.
