





Saving Animals One at a Time

Just down the road from Cross Plains in Coleman they are saving animals one at a time, one day at a time. And all of it is done by the citizens of Coleman County.

In 2003, Coleman resident, JoAnn Eddleman, saw a deep need in her community for all the abandoned and abused animals that were being dumped in neighborhoods and on local ranches where they multiplied quickly. Within a few short months, Ms. Eddleman had the support of a handfull of other residents and with that the Humane Society of Coleman County was born. Through JoAnn's dedication and with the help of her team they received their 501(c)(3) status.

They began with one rescued dog and a standard building on HWY 153 across from Holiday Hill, and have since grown and expanded their operation. They have a new kennel addition on the rear of their building that will double the amount of animals they can shelter. All Humane Society Shelters are no kill spaces that will care for each animal until it is adopted, regardless of time.

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Ladder-backed Woodpecker

Living in the harsh arid lands of western Texas can be quite challenging. All sorts of creatures depend on and compete for the minuscule amounts of shade and water that exist here. But regardless how uninhabitable an area appears, there is always animals that have adapted to such harsh environments, and one such avian species is the Ladder-backed Woodpecker.

Woodpeckers of various species are familiar to most people, even those who do not spend much time outdoors. Perhaps this knowledge is due to the famous cartoon character Woody Woodpecker, who incidentally still annoys me with his laugh as much now as he did when I was a kid.

The Ladder-backed Woodpecker (Picoides scalaris) is a common bird throughout much of the lower western half of United States. It can be observed almost throughout the entire state of Texas, with the exception being the densely forested far eastern portions of the state. It is not a migratory species, meaning that it occurs in its Texas range year-round.

This attractive and somewhat colorful species of bird is small, with a body length approximately seven and one-quarter inches while the wingspan can approach twelve inches. The back, shoulders and wings are black, and are adorned with white horizontal bars, creating the appearance of a ladder, hence the common name. The legs and feet are also black, as is the straight, but sturdy bill. The belly and other underparts are tan-gray, and are typically mottled with small black spots. Like most avian species, the male is the most colorful of the two sexes. Male Ladder-backed Woodpeckers have red crown on top of their head, as well as a black line that extends from the eye to the neck that is quite noticeable on the white face. Females, although looking very similar, lack

the red crown on the head. Many times this species of woodpecker is heard before it is actually seen, either by its clear, high pitched, one syllable call or the tap-tap-tap sound of its hunting propensities. These hunting propensities include the animal clinging to a tree vertically with its specially adapted feet while banging its head into the trunk of the tree repeatedly as it attempts to stir up the insects living inside of the bark. Once the bark has been penetrated, these insects are carefully re-

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
Sheriff's Corner By Callahan County Sheriff Terry Joy

Sheriff's Deputies confiscate Drugs and Drug Paraphernalia in Callahan County

In the accompanying picture is of Chief Deputy Rick Jowers and Deputy Leroy Foley. On the desk in front of them are two small packages of meth, pipes for smoking the meth, one needle for shooting the meth into the blood stream and several snorting straws. The subject who was in possession of the meth and paraphernalia was added to the Callahan County Jail population.

The total number of inmates in the Callahan County Jail and the four other jails that Callahan County contracts with reached a total of 44 by noon Monday, October 19, 2015.

That same afternoon Chief Deputy Rick Jowers and Deputy Leroy Foley left for Abilene with 3 arrest warrants for three suspects in a home invasion that occured over the weekend. The warrants were for 2 burglaries of a habitation and 1 evading arrest and 1 criminal conspiracy. These charges may be upgraded pending further investigation. The two Deputies were unable to locate the suspects but though their investigation another suspect will be added to make a total of four involved in this home invasion. 



Mr. Oliver is an old hand at the business, and his worthy assistant has also had considerable experience in teaching. We congratulate our trustees in securing so good a corps of teachers and management.

machinery. Postmaster Ph. Schwartz has been on a trip east this week. He returned again this morning and went straight way to opening goods, of which they have received about a ship load.

We noticed a fine load of sweet potatoes on the street this morning; they were brought in by Asa Miller, of Hubbard Timbers. We are informed that the crop this year is a large one.

Hogs as well as other stock are in ready demand here at good prices and a number of transactions are being made in them. They bring from four to five and a half cents per pound. J. D. Merchant shipped 400 head, two cars, east yesterday.

Baird is making good headway in depositing the money to defray the expenses of moving the county jail to this place should she be chosen as the county seat. From all parts of the county we hear reports to the effect that if Baird raises this fund that she will be successful. The fund will be raised; nearly \$2,000 are now on deposit, and the money is fast coming in. The citizens mean business and will do all they promise.

7 Constitutional Amendments will appear on Tuesday, November 3rd Election Ballot

the new Callahan County Republican Party Chairwoman provided the following information about the seven Constitutional Amendments that will appear on the November 3rd ballot.

The November general election is just around the corner! Are you aware of just what it is that we will be voting on? As it turns out, this election seems to be attracting very little attention because there just won't be much on it aside from some local elections, but there will be seven proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution or propositions as they are called that we will be voting on. Since we are about to possibly amend our constitution with seven new additions, it's important that we educate ourselves on just what these propositions are and then we need to make sure that we show up to vote because amending the state constitution is a pretty big deal.

I'm sure that when most of us hear the word propositions, our eyes glaze over (I know mine do) and we just really do not want to read through all of the legal language that these things are usually written in order to make sense of them, so I've tried to make understanding the proposed amendments easy to understand and to give some thoughts from those for and against them. Hope this helps.

Remember, early voting begins October 19th and November 3rd is election day!!

PROPOSITION 1 - Changes the homestead exemption amount for school district property taxes from \$15,000 to \$25,000

BALLOT LANGUAGE - "The constitutional amendment increasing the amount of the residence homestead exemption from ad valorem taxation for public school purposes from \$15,000 to \$25,000, providing for a reduction of the limitation on the total amount of ad valorem taxes that may be imposed for those purposes on the homestead of an elderly or disabled

Editor's Note: Jane Holmes, person to reflect the increased exemption amount, authorizing the legislature to prohibit a political subdivision that has adopted an optional residence homestead exemption from ad valorem taxation from reducing the amount of or repealing the exemption, and prohibiting the enactment of a law that imposes a transfer tax on a transaction that conveys fee simple title to real property."

> **Self-explanatory. This is will give you a \$10,000 increase in the amount that you can deduct from your homestead exemption therefore reducing the amount of taxes you will pay in regards to school district property taxes.

PROPOSITION 2 -Exempts property from taxation for surviving spouses of totally disabled veterans.

BALLOT LANGUAGE - "The constitutional amendment authorizing the

legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a 100 percent or totally disabled veteran who died before the law authorizing a residence homestead exemption for such a veteran took effect."

**In 2009 an amendment passed that gave 100% or totally disabled American veterans an exemption to property tax on their homestead and then when that veteran passed away, their spouses also qualified for the tax exemption. This amendment will enable spouses of totally disabled vets, who were already deceased in 2009, to qualify for the same exemption.

PROPOSITION 3 -Repeals the requirement that certain executive officials reside in the state capital, Austin, while in office

BALLOT LANGUAGE - "The constitutional amendment repealing the requirement that state officers elected by voters statewide reside in the state capi-

It is also said that by them to arrive. Today's transportation alleviates this problem the economic benefit that comes therefore making this requirement obsolete. Because these officials will be held accountable for the job that they do through elections, neglecting their duties by not spending enough time in Austin due to the fact that their residency is not there should not be a problem. Being required to live in Austin creates an elite class of candidates who live in and can afford to move to Austin so by removing this requirement, they have to live in their own communities. Finally, most other states in the United States do not require this of their statewide elected officials.

Opponents say that allowing statewide office holders who are being paid full-time to live in other areas could cause them to be infrequently present and to possibly neglect their duties. State wide travel reimbursements could increase because of removing this requirement due to the fact that state business is often required to take place at the seat of government. It could lead to a state officer choosing a residence in an area that would provide a favorable venue for that officer other than Travis County if any legal action was brought against them.

PROPOSITION 4 - Allows professional sports team charitable foundations to conduct charitable raffles

BALLOT LANGUAGE - "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit professional sports team charitable foundations to conduct charitable raffles."

**As it currently stands, these entities are not allowed to conduct charitable raffles. PROPOSITION 5 - Authorizes counties with 7,500 people or less to perform private road construction and maintenance

BALLOT LANGUAGE - "The constitutional amendment to authorize counties with a population of 7,500 or less to perform private road construction and maintenance.

**This increases the population of the counties that are allowed this provision from 5,000 to 7,500.

Proponents of this amendment say that this amendment would give more flexibility to rural counties and private landowners in those counties to update private roads that are poorly maintained. The private landowners would pay the county for any work performed. Many rural counties rarely have private contractors available to do the work and poorly maintained roads create public safety hazards for citizens and emergency services. Private landowners would still be able to hire private contractors. For those in rural counties, this would provide much needed relief when it is sometimes impossible to get a private company to come and do the work

Opponents want all of the population threshold removed so that all counties in the state would have the option to construct and maintain private roads as long as the private landowners agree and pay the county for the cost of the work.

PROPOSITION 6 - Provides for a right to hunt, fish and harvest wildlife

Opponents do not feel this amendment is needed because no threat to hunting and fishing exists in this state. A constitutional amendment could force to do the same through changes regulations in regards to conservation that could be harmful. The amendment causes confusion between a person's protected right to hunt and fish and the role of the state and federal government in enacting laws that regulate those activities. The line between regulation and right is

> PROPOSITION 7- Allocates a portion of sales and use tax revenue to the state highway fund through 2032

BALLOT LANGUAGE - "The constitutional amendment dedicating certain sales and use tax revenue and motor vehicle sales, use, and rental tax revenue to the state highway fund to provide funding for nontolled roads and the reduction of certain transportation-related debt."

**Proponents say this amendment would provide a much needed stable mechanism for transportation funding in our state. The current mechanism for funding is partially to blame for the condition of the state's transportation system. This proposed funding mechanism would enable projects to be planned up to 10 years in advance due to the fact that funding would be available. The amendment provides base amounts of funding and dedicates only certain money in excess of those base amounts. This amendment provides a mechanism that the legislature may use to reduce the amount of money transferred to the state's highway fund if necessary. It will cause the legislature to review this method periodically to see if it is working as intended and then can be extended as the amendment re-

Opponents think that this method is not the best way to address transportation funding. The large amounts of money that this will dedicate to transportation related projects would tie the hands of future legislatures when the legislature currently has control of over less than 20 percent of the state's budget. They feel there are better ways to provide for transportation funding and that since there is currently a budget surplus, this could be used. Also the rates of other taxes that are already dedicated to transportation could be increased to provide additional funding.




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
