vegetable products such as safflower and sunflower seeds, corn, and soybeans. They help lower blood cholesterol.

Monounsaturated fats are liquid

vegetable oils such as Canola and olive oils. New research indicates they may also help reduce blood cholesterol.

Sodium is another food ingredient to monitor closely. Excessive intake of table salt and other products high in sodium content can lead to high blood pressure,

which is a risk factor for a heart attack or stroke.





### Cotton And Grain Sorghum Contest Featured

The 1992 South Plains Farm & Home Show at Levelland will feature a contest to select the best cotton stalk and grain sorghum head entries submitted by area farmers. The show will be held on Friday, September 25 from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m. at the Hockley County Fairgrounds in Levelland.

There is no cost to submit cotton stalk or grain sorghum head entries, but each contest category can only be entered once by a producer. All entries will be judged together in each category--there will be no dryland, irrigated, skip-row or solid row division. Cash and product awards will be provided by the

Farm & Home Show Committee and sponsoring agribusinesses.

Contest categories include (1) TALLEST COTTON STALK, (2) MOST BOLLS ON A COTTON STALK--bolls must be one inch in diameter or larger (3) BEST COMMERCIALLY ADAPTED COTTON STALK, (4) GRAIN SORGHUM --white seed coat, and (5) GRAIN SORGHUM--red or yellow seed coat. A producer can submit one entry in each of the five categories, but no more than one entry per category may be submitted.

All cotton entries must be of the type grown in the South Plains area and the variety must be indicated on the entry card. Leaves must be stripped from all stalks. Grain Sorghum entries must consist of ten mature and dry heads cut away from the rest of the plant about two inches below the head. The variety or hybrid must be identified on the entry card. Entry cards will be available at the registration table and all entries must be made before 11 a.m. the day of the show. Entries will be put on display and results announced at 2 p.m. on September 25

"Farm Family Preservation" will be the theme for the 3rd annual Farm & Home Show. Farm and ranch machinery and equipment will be on display and several pieces of equipment will be demonstrated in a field adjacent to the fairgrounds. Agribusiness booths, arts and crafts exhibits, western heritage displays, new car and pickup model displays, new tractor and machinery previews and lots of door prizes will provide attractions of interest to the entire farm and ranch family.



#### Pesticide Container **Collections In** Panhandle

Well-rinsed plastic and metal esticide containers will be collected from Panhandle farmers, ranchers and pesticide applicators at six temporary collection centers from Sept. 23 to Sept. 30.

"These voluntary collections are an excellent example of farmers taking care of a potential environmental problem without being legislated and ordered to do so," Perry said of the empty pesticide container program.

Since the program was launched last November, more than 37,600 pounds of plastic and almost 60,000 pounds of metal containers have been collected.

The collections are conducted by the Texas Department of Agriculture in cooperation with the Texas Water Commission, Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the National Agricultural Chemical Association.

The collected plastic containers will be granulated and made into new pesticide containers. Metal containers are also crushed and recycled.

Containers will be accepted from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. on these dates and at the following locations:




