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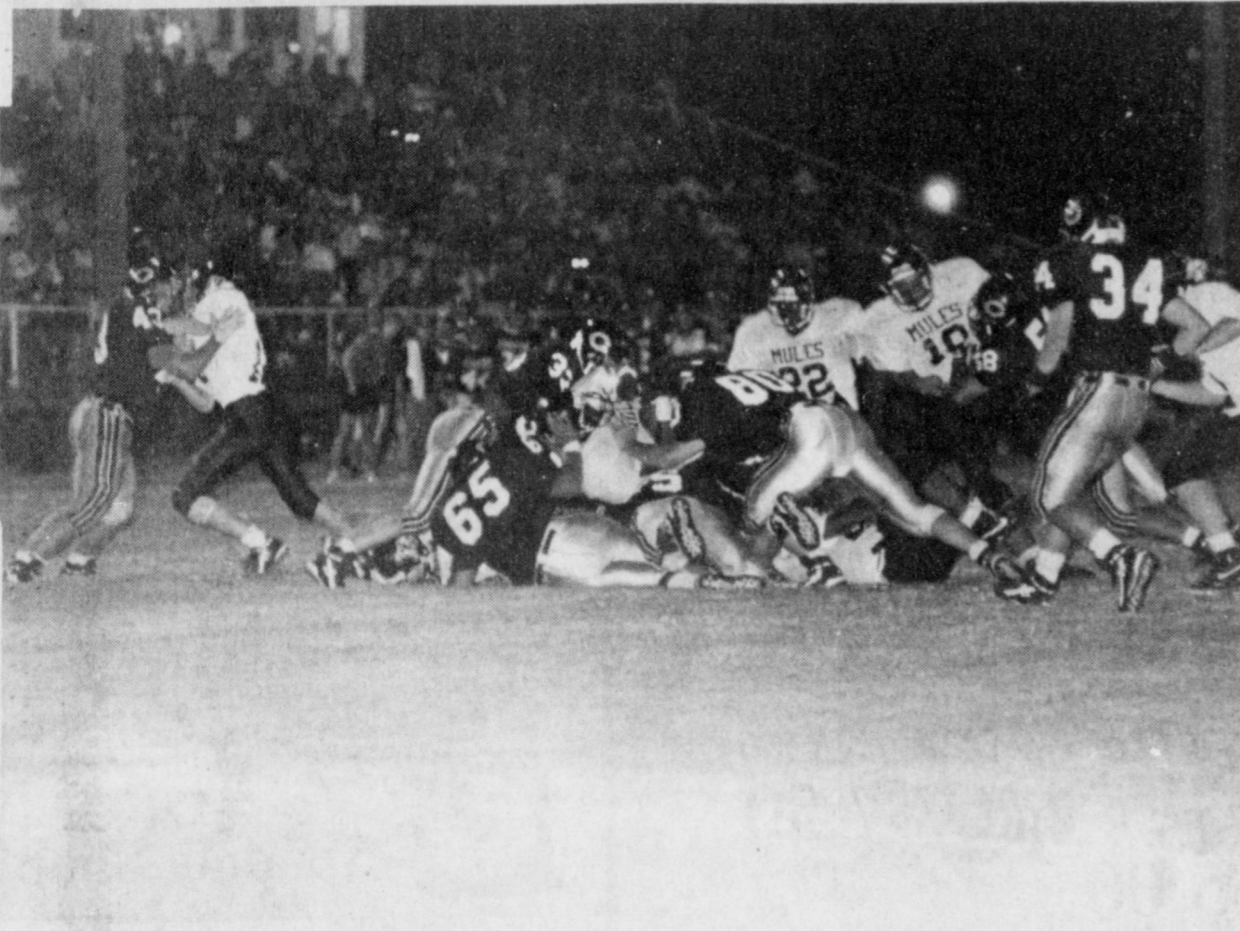

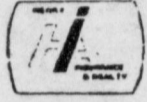

## Nebraska Favored Over Arizona State

It's going to be one of the very few college football weekends when there won't be that many attention-getting confrontations, at least in Division I-A. However, this is the type of Saturday where upsets are just lurking around the corner.

Atlantic Coast Conference fans can look forward to the Clemson-Georgia scramble. Champion and co-runner-up in the league last season, this will go a long way toward determining the 1992 title. The Tigers were undefeated in the conference last fall, but their closest call - other than the 20-20 tie with Virginia - was a slim 9-7 win over the Yellow Jackets. Guess the result can't get much closer. We're picking Clemson.

And while we're in the ACC, one can't ignore the annual bitter battle between intra-state rivals North Carolina and North Carolina State. The Wolfpack has really scrapped the Tar Heels the past four years, running up a total of 124 points while holding North Carolina to just 25. The four-year domination might continue even through the Tar Heels are the home team. However, we like North Carolina.

Georgia hosts Mississippi in the southeast Conference match-up. The Bulldogs fell to Tennessee two weeks ago 34-31 while Mississippi rolled over Auburn on opening day 45-21. Last year, Georgia tamed the Rebels 37-17, so .. Georgia in a squeaker.

Looking quickly at the forecasting statix through games of Saturday, September 12, we've picked 279 right and missed on 95 for a .746 average.

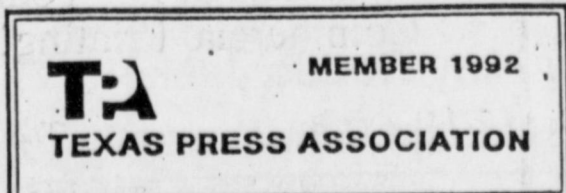

Sowder, Program Chairman of the AHA's Bailey County Division. "By reading labels and making proper food selections, you can keep your risk of cardiovascular disease low."

"When choosing food products, choose those which contain polyunsaturated or monounsaturated fats, and avoid products containing saturated fats and cholesterol," Sowder said.

Cholesterol is a soft, fat-like substance found in animal products (meat, fish, poultry) and is especially high in egg yolks and

organ meats.

Saturated fats are fats that usually harden at room temperature and are found in animal products and in some vegetable products. Coconut oil, cocoa butter, palm oil, and palm kernel oil are also sources of saturated fat.

Polyunsaturated fats are oils from vegetable products such as safflower and sunflower seeds, corn, and soybeans. They help lower blood cholesterol.

Monounsaturated fats are liquid

vegetable oils such as Canola and olive oils. New research indicates they may also help reduce blood cholesterol.

Sodium is another food ingredient to monitor closely. Excessive intake of table salt and other products high in sodium content can lead to high blood pressure, which is a risk factor for a heart attack or stroke.

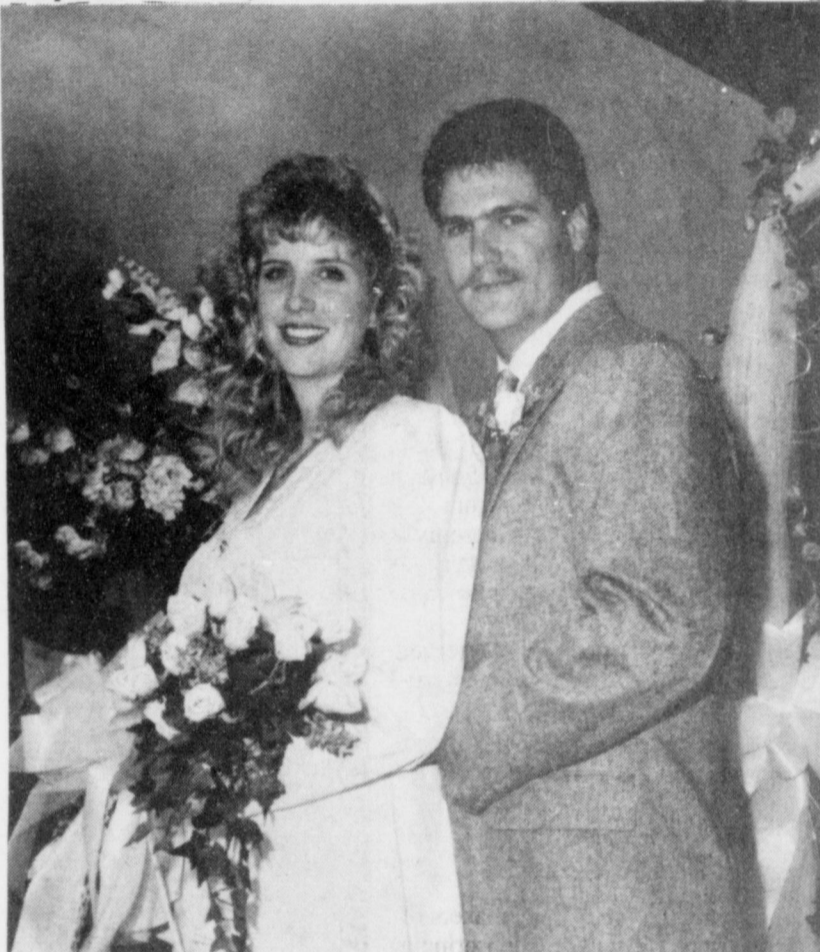

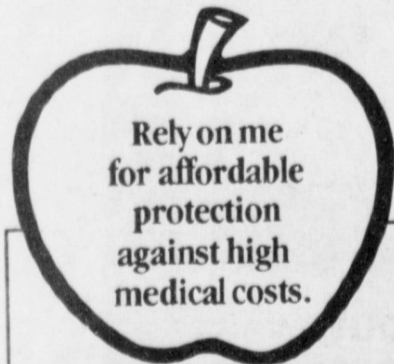

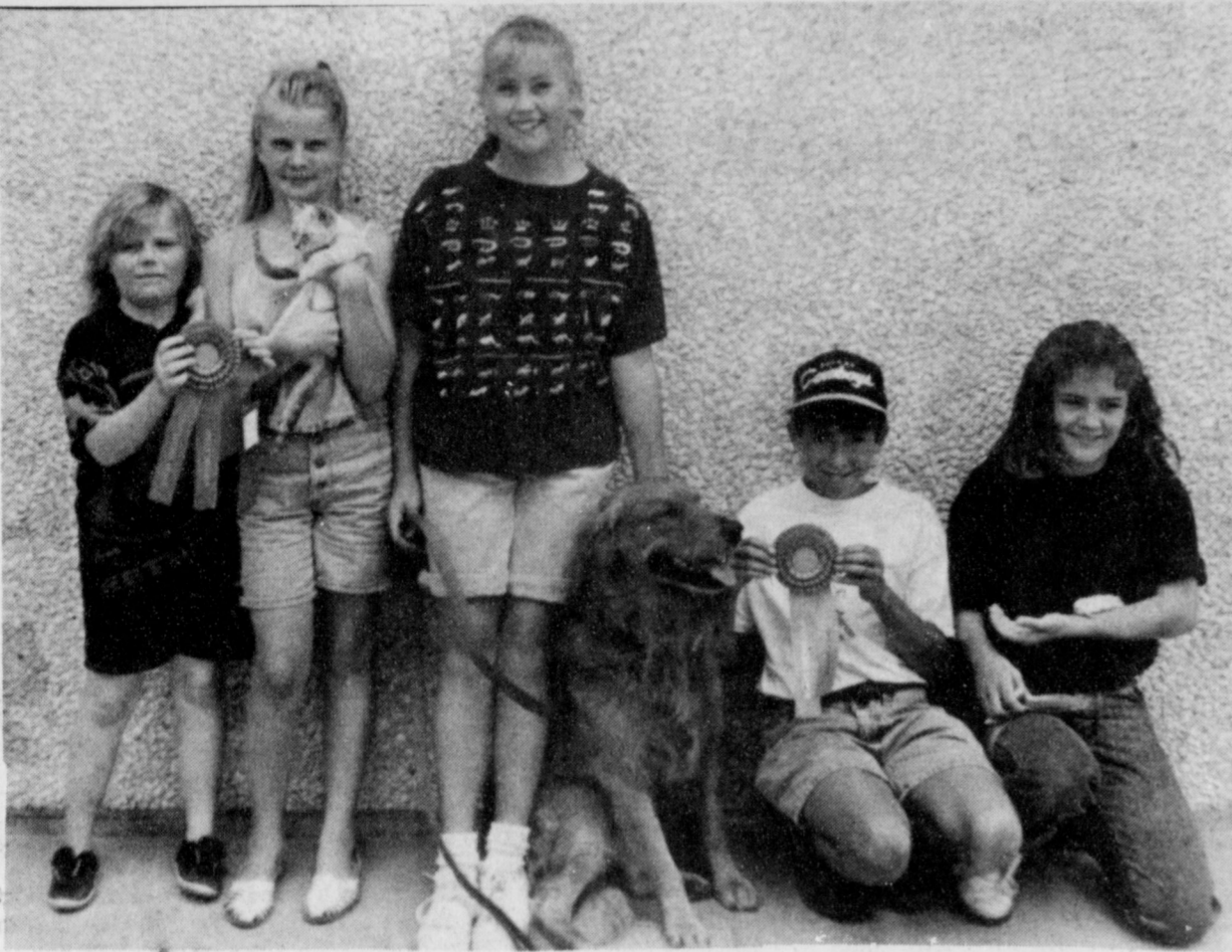

The cream brick building, providing more than double the program's present space, was made possible by a campaign chaired by Winthrop P. Rockefeller of Little Rock, a 1974 TCU Ranch Management graduate and a TCU Ranch trustee.

Templar is the son of Jack Templar of Muleshoe.

The 36-year-old TCU Ranch Management program, set up to educate men and women to operate a ranch profitably, includes intensive classroom instruction in the basic management principles of land, grass, livestock, records, marketing and personnel that are applicable anywhere. Current class members come throughout Texas as well as Oklahoma, Kansas, Florida and Brazil.

In addition, more than 120 cooperating ranchers and other professionals in Texas, Oklahoma, and Kansas will share their experience and insight as the class travels extensively. Their

University-owned vehicles are equipped with two-way radios in order that information may be

shared by Ranch Management Director John Merrill and three other teachers throughout the trips.

### Cotton And Grain Sorghum Contest Featured

The 1992 South Plains Farm & Home Show at Levelland will feature a contest to select the best cotton stalk and grain sorghum head entries submitted by area farmers. The show will be held on Friday, September 25 from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m. at the Hockley County Fairgrounds in Levelland.

There is no cost to submit cotton stalk or grain sorghum head entries, but each contest category can only be entered once by a producer. All entries will be judged together in each category--there will be no dryland, irrigated, skip-row or solid row division. Cash and product awards will be provided by the

Farm & Home Show Committee and sponsoring agribusinesses.

Contest categories include (1) TALLEST COTTON STALK, (2) MOST BOLLS ON A COTTON STALK--bolls must be one inch in diameter or larger (3) BEST COMMERCIALY ADAPTED COTTON STALK, (4) GRAIN SORGHUM--white seed coat, and (5) GRAIN SORGHUM--red or yellow seed coat. A producer can submit one entry in each of the five categories, but no more than one entry per category may be submitted.

All cotton entries must be of the type grown in the South Plains area and the variety must be indicated on the entry card. Leaves must be stripped from all stalks. Grain Sorghum entries must

consist of ten mature and dry heads cut away from the rest of the plant about two inches below the head. The variety or hybrid must be identified on the entry card. Entry cards will be available at the registration table and all entries must be made before 11 a.m. the day of the show. Entries will be put on display and results announced at 2 p.m. on September 25.

"Farm Family Preservation" will be the theme for the 3rd annual Farm & Home Show. Farm and ranch machinery and equipment will be on display and several pieces of equipment will be demonstrated in a field adjacent to the fairgrounds. Agribusiness booths, arts and crafts exhibits, western heritage displays, new car and pickup model displays, new tractor and machinery previews and lots of door prizes will provide attractions of interest to the entire farm and ranch family.

The Hockley County Young Farmers will be serving the noon meal again this year. Proceeds from the fish fry will go toward the association's scholarship fund set up for college students majoring in agriculture. The Hockley County Extension Ag Industries Committee encourages all interested South Plains residents to attend the show on September 25. Admission is free and the Farm & Home Show will be open from 10 a.m. until 4 pm that Friday.

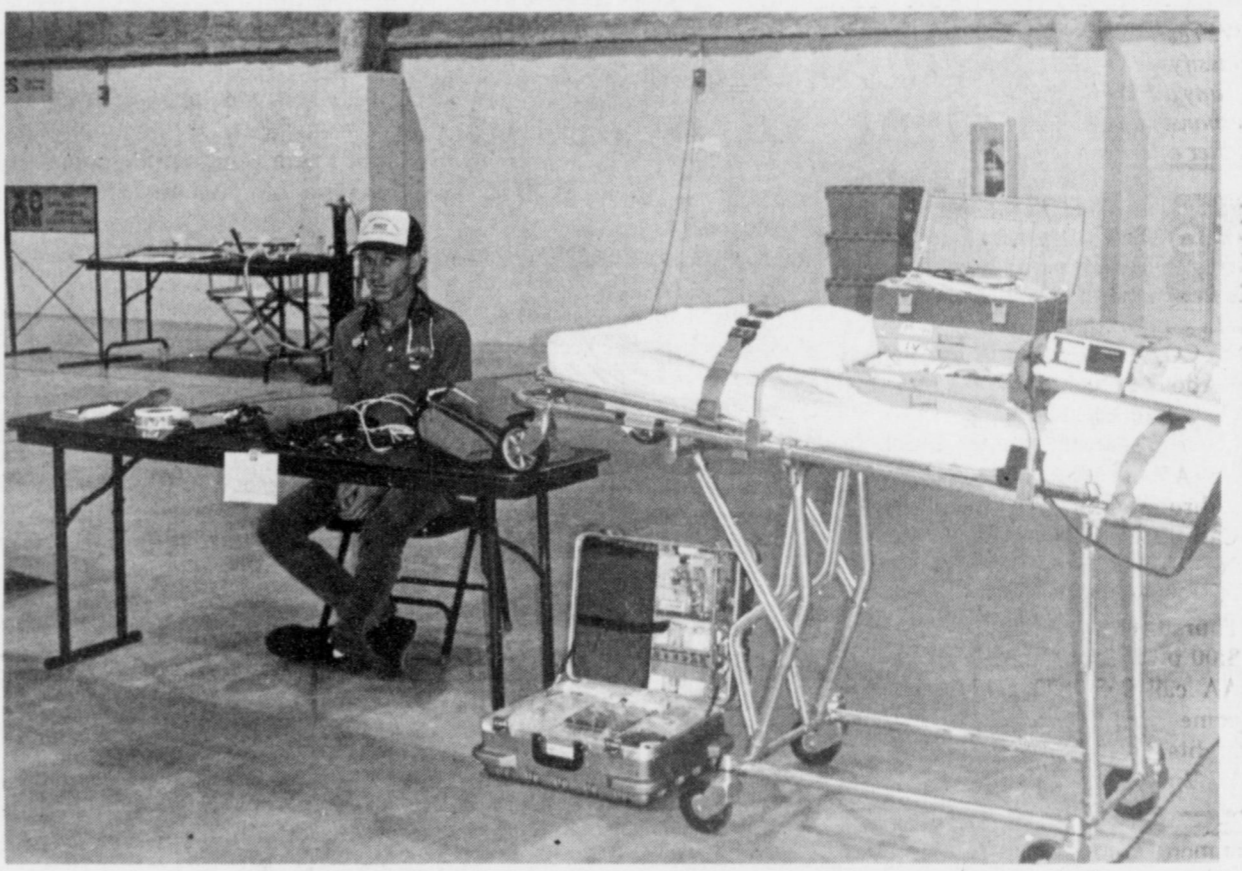
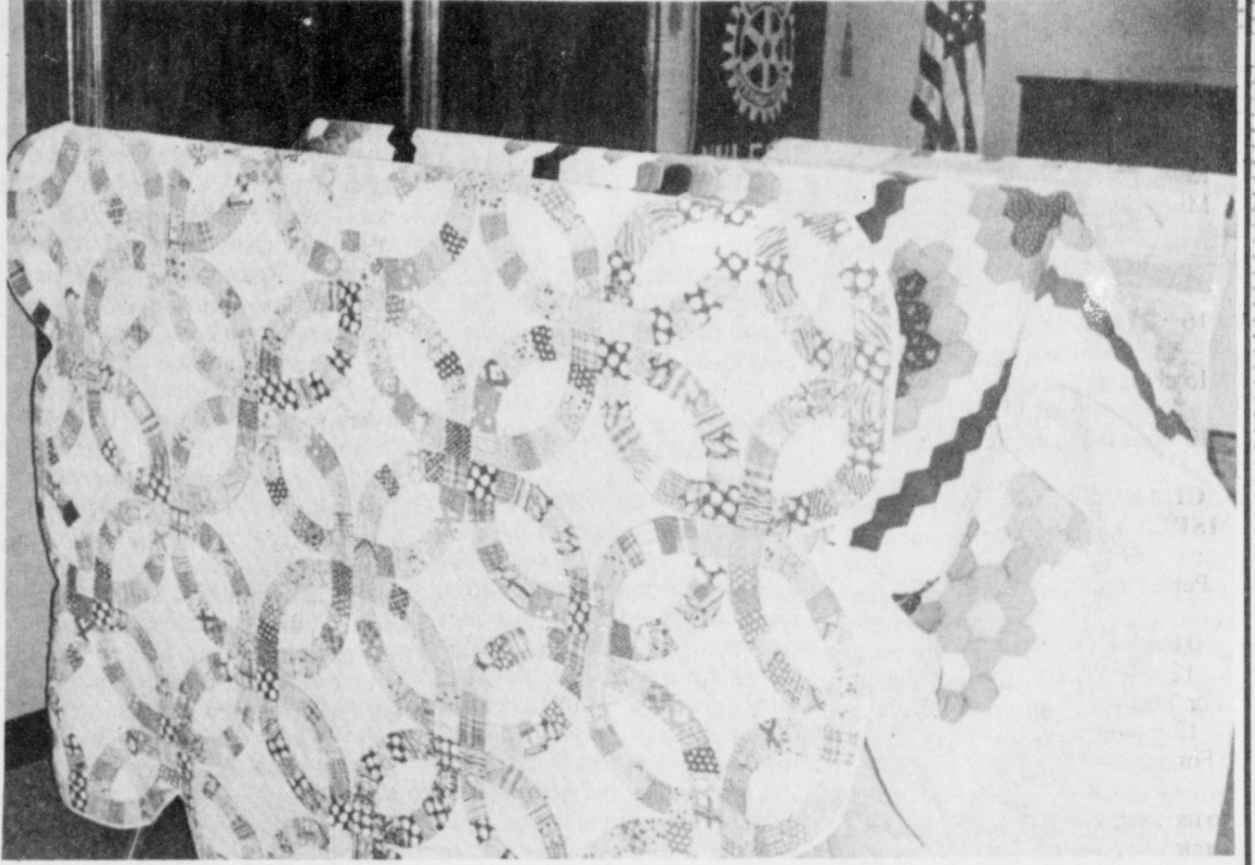
