The United Methodist Church will be holding an Ash Wednesday Service on Wednesday, February 10 at 6:00 p.m. The public is warmly invited to share in this service where we recognize our mortality, repent of our sins before our loving God. We recognize life as a precious gift from God and re-turn our lives towards Jesus Christ. We may make resolutions and commit to change our lives over the next forty days so that we might be more like Christ. In an Ash Wednesday service, usually the minister will make the sign of the cross on a person's forehead with ashes. The sign of the cross reminds us of the resurrection of Christ.

In Western Christianity, Ash Wednesday marks the first day, or the start of the season of Lent. Lent is a season of forty days, not counting Sundays, which begins on

Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday. Lent excludes Sundays because every Sunday is like a little Easter. The season is a preparation for celebrating Easter. Historically, Lent began as a period of fasting and preparation for baptism by converts and then became a time for penance by all Christians.

Also, at 12:00 on Ash Wednesday, the church will be having a short service of the Burning of the Palms in the prayer garden, if weather permits. Otherwise the service will be held in the Sanctuary. The dried palms to be burned were used on Palm Sunday last year to mark the glorious entry of Jesus into Jerusalem prior to his crucifixion. The ashes from this meaningful service will be used for making the cross on the foreheads during the evening service.

Deadline Approaching Raise the Roof, One Brick at a Time

The Cross Plains Economic Development Corporation and the City of Cross Plains need the help of it's community members. The city has laid the foundation for a new pavilion for community use in Treadway Park located on the west side of Cross Plains on Highway 36.

Funds are needed to erect the actual pavilion over the concrete slab. This pavilion will be in addition to the small covered stage and open area with surrounding benches already in place. The new structure will be 2600 square feet (60'x40') and will have electric lighting available.

With its majestic trees and scenic surroundings, Treadway Park has been the home of Homecoming dances, Fourth of July Celebrations, Barbarian Festivals, rodeos, weddings, reunions, and many other events. The new structure will be an asset to the community and will be available for recreational/personal use for low to no cost. The space will be available for reservations for private events, as well as general open use throughout March 1, 2016. the community.

To help raise the funds for the pavilion, the City and the EDC are offering engraved bricks for the low donation cost of \$50. Deadline to place your order for a commemorative brick is March, 1st. Each of these bricks will be displayed on-site, and be used to finish out the walkway that will run from the Turkey Creek bridge within Treadway to the new slab and future structure. Each brick may have up to 4 lines engraved with your choice of wording, with everything from honoring a loved one, to a class year, business name, or birth announcement. What a unique and lasting memorial for future generations. The donations are tax deductible as well so with the end of the fiscal year approaching this provides

Texas Antelope Squirrel

The Texas Antelope Squirrel (Ammospermophilus interpres) has been verifiably observed in 14 counties in the Trans-Pecos and Edwards Plateau eco-regions of Texas, although it almost assuredly occurs throughout the Trans-Pecos in the appropriate habitat. It is the only member of its genus that calls Texas home, but it is closely related to the much more familiar ground squirrels that can be spotted in this distinguished state. Adults of this relatively small species rarely attain 9 inches in total length, of which a mere 3 inches is the moderately bushy tail. Adult males. the larger of the sexes, typically weigh less than a ¼ pound. The body is colored a buffy-gray on the back, sides, and top of tail, while the underneath portions of the body are white. There are 2 narrow white lines, one on either side of the body, that run longitudinally from the shoulder to the rump area. The front legs are occasionally painted with a rusty-red color, particularly during the summer months. The head is colored above and below like the body. The large dark eyes are outlined with white, and the ears are comparatively small and round.

Being a denizen of the Chihuahuan Desert, this jumpy little rodent prefers areas with sufficient ground cover along dry creekbeds and arroyos, as well as along the edges of limestone mesas and igneous mountainsides. Very few specimens have been found far from such habitats, therefore it tends to occur in pockets than being widely distributed.

Antelope Squirrels are diurnal (day active), with the majority of their activity limited by temperature. They avoid midday activity during the summer months, being active in the mornings and evenings, while during the spring and fall seasons they can be observed readily throughout the day. Unlike their closely related cousins the ground squirrels, this species does not go through a hibernation period during the winter, although its level of activity is dependent upon the harshness of the weather conditions.

It is an extremely wary creature, rarely sitting in one place for more than a few seconds at a time. At the slightest hint of



Michael Wallace pleads guilty. Callahan County Jail passes inspection. William Cedergren indicted by Grand Jury and arraignment set for Thursday, 2/11/2016.

Does everyone remember the name "Michael Wallace"? He has been in the Taylor County Jail since February 5th, 2015. He is one of the four arrested and charged with the murder of Misty Mashburn which occurred on Gas House Road and I20 Access Road, between Clyde and Baird, in January, 2015. He pled guilty Friday, February 5, 2016, and received a sentence of 45 years in the Texas Department of Corrections. About 6 weeks ago Shaliko Mcgee pled guilty to the same charge and also received a sentence of 45 years in the Texas Department of Corrections. This leaves Xavier Sneed, who is still in Taylor County Jail and Briana Payne who is out on bond. They will have the opportunity to make their plea sometime in March.

their plea sometime in March. Friday, February 5, 2015 the Callahan County Jail had a surprise visit by Shane Sowell

from the Texas Jail Commission in Austin, Texas. The 119 year old jail, which in my opinion is a County Historical Treasure, passed inspection again with the stipulation that the metal safety doors be installed within 90 days. Doors have been ordered and should be arriving soon. As of 2/8/2016 there is a total of 23 inmates in our jail population which includes the jails in Taylor County, Shackelford County, Comanche County and Jones County. Taylor County has gone from \$38.50 to \$48.00 per day per inmate.

Wednesday afternoon, December 30th at 2:30 pm a 47 year old Clyde Boy Scout Leader was arrested outside the Clyde Boy Scout Hut and charged with a first degree felony of possession of a controlled substance (methamphetamine) with intent to deliver. This was within 1,000 feet of the Clyde Elementary School Which is a drug free zone which carries enhanced penalties. He was indicted by the Grand Jury on January 27th, 2016.



Reeves moves to top of steer wrestling standings at Fort Worth Rodeo

FORT WORTH, Texas (February 3, 2016) - Matt Reeves grew up coming to the Fort Worth Stock Show & Rodeo and in fact, even showed pigs here as a youngster.

Now, he is strictly a rodeo competitor and is in position to win a steer wrestling championship at this year's rodeo. Reeves tied for second place in the first round with a 4.2-second run earning \$4,730. He ran his second steer on Wednesday afternoon and stopped the clock in 4.7 seconds. While this won't get him a check in the round, it put him in command of the overall leaderboard with a total time of 8.9 seconds. He is over a halfsecond ahead of Brother Loud from Kaufman, Texas, who was 9.6 on two runs.

Reeves is a native Texan. He now lives in Cross Plains and grew up in Pampa. Stock shows were a big part of his world before he started competing in rodeos. Money from raising and showing animals helped him earn his animal science degree from Texas A & M University. Now he is an accomplished steer wrestler with five Wrangler National Finals Rodeo qualifications to

2013 when he left as the reserve champion. That was also the year he won the title at another legendary rodeo, Wyoming's

Chevenne Frontier Days. He's had success in the Will Rogers Coliseum before, finishing in second place in 2008. And, he's hungry for the championship.

"I don't think there is anyone that has grown up in Texas that doesn't want to win this rodeo," he said. "I need a big win and this one would really mean a lot to me."

Reeves spent much of last year on the injured-reserve list. In October of 2014, he made a trip to Philadelphia for surgery to repair a sports hernia, reattach a torn hip labrum and fix other damage done from a cracked pelvis.

He had been playing with pain and when Dr. Tandy Freeman, director of the Justin Sportsmedicine Team advised him to have surgery. Reeves did just that. Dr. William Myers is a specialist that has helped many rodeo athletes. That also helped Reeves make the decision.

They had considered two surgeries, but Reeves is diabetic and uses an insulin pump, so they didn't want to take any chances with anesthesia, and did it all at once. He went through weeks of rehabilitation and was soon back riding a horse and started running steers the end of February.

Reeves admits that he might have come back too soon and it wasn't until June that he started

rodeo's championships was in that steer wrestling did more than help him, it was good for a young horse that he had been riding named Nacho. Nacho worked flawlessly at Fort Worth as did Reeves' hazing horse

Beamer. "That horse has come a long way and it's been a process getting him there," he added. "I think a good steer wrestling horse has to be really gritty they have to run as hard as they can and not stop even when you get off. He's pretty gritty.'

A life-changing event for Reeves happened just last November when his wife Savanah gave birth to their son Carson Jace. They were all part of the Matt Reeves fan club here on Wednesday.

"People tell you how having a child changes everything, he said. "Well, it does. It's everything they tried to tell me and then some.

TxDOT reminds Citizens, Candidates not to

Campaign season spurs reminder on state laws, regulations for political signs

post signs in Highway right of way

Political elections are usually on the right of way. The penalty accompanied by an increase in the number of campaign signs placed along roadways this time of year. State transportation officials want to make sure citizens and candidates are aware of the laws regulating sign placement on state highway right of way. Under Texas law, it is a class C misdemeanor to place any kind

of sign on state highway right of way. This includes posting signs on trees, utility poles, traffic signs and other objects

for violating this law is a fine of up to \$500 per sign.

It is legal to place a campaign sign on private property adjacent to state highways with landowners' permission. Restrictions require that signs be constructed of lightweight material and limited to 50 square feet in size. Signs may be placed as early as 90 days prior to an election and must be removed within 10 days after

are intended to reduce clutter along highways so that official traffic control signs and vehicles approaching intersections are clearly visible for the safety of all the traveling public.

TxDOT's regulatory authority allows the immediate removal of a sign placed on state highway right of way without prior notice if the sign is not authorized by state law or approved by the department. Signs posing potential safety hazards will be removed as soon



Slow Cooker Tropical Pork Chops

Prep Time: 15 Minutes Cook Time: 3 Hours

Ingredients:

- * 2 jars (23 1/2 ounces each) mixed tropical fruit, drained and chopped
- * 3/4 cup thawed limeade concentrate
- * 1/4 cup sweet chili sauce
- * 1 garlic clove, minced
- * 1 teaspoon minced fresh gingerroot * 4 bone-in pork loin chops (3/4 inch
- thick and 5 ounces each) * 1 green onion, finely chopped
- * 2 tablespoons minced fresh cilantro * 2 tablespoons minced fresh mint
- * 2 tablespoons slivered almonds, toasted
- * 2 tablespoons finely chopped crystallized ginger, optional

* 1/2 teaspoon grated lime peel

Directions

* In a 3-quart slow cooker, combine the first five ingredients. Add pork, arranging chops to sit snugly in fruit mixture. Cook, covered, on low 3-4 hours or until meat is tender (a thermometer inserted in pork should read at least 145 degrees).

* In a small bowl, mix remaining ingredients. To serve, remove pork chops from slow cooker. Using a slotted spoon, serve fruit over pork. Sprinkle with herb mixture.

* Note: To toast nuts, place in a dry nonstick skillet and heat over low hear until lightly browned, stirring occasionally. Yield: 4 servings.

Land Stewardship - Providing **Water for Texans**

"Saving the water and the soil must start where the first raindrop falls." Lyndon B. Johnson, 1947

Texas farmers, ranchers, and forest landowners have a long history of voluntarily conserving the natural resources entrusted to them. Living off the land provides a great incentive to conserve and make the most of available resources. Today, Texas farmers, ranchers, and foresters produce more food, fuel, and fiber than ever on a greatly reduced number of acres using no more water than was used in the 1950s. In addition, wildlife management on working ranches has resulted in the conservation and recovery of a number of wildlife species.

Due to the prolonged drought in Texas, many of the state's agricultural producers have sought to aggressively adopt innovative technologies and onfarm conservation practices to combat the impacts of drought and improve profitability. Some of these conservation practices, such as grazing management, cover crops, and wildlife habitat enhancement, are lower-cost management practices that can have subtle impacts when implemented on thousands of acres. Other practices, like irrigation efficiency improvements and targeted brush removal and management, provide a greater benefit to Texas' water

costly to farmers and ranchers. Understanding the Benefits of Land Stewardship:

Unfortunately, as more Texans move from rural to urban areas they generally become less mindful of their reliance on the land and its natural cycles as well as the variety of benefits they derive from the voluntary stewardship provided by private landowners throughout the state. As a result, many today do not recognize that land stewardship, which provides water for Texas, is a responsibility that should be shared by all Texans. Key concepts to understanding this important link include:

· Ground and surface water supplies originate with the rain that falls on the land and is captured by complex, largescale ecological processes involving many variables including plants, animals, soils, and geology. When these processes function optimally, floods are reduced, aquifers are replenished, and water is released more slowly and steadily into springs, streams. rivers, lakes and eventually our bays and estuaries.

 When the natural processes are working well across millions of acres of productive agricultural, forest, wildlife and recreational lands the contribution to the state's water supply can be tremendous, "creating" more water for all

· The rainfall soaks into the ground as opposed to running off and carrying soil and sediment. The absorbed groundwater reappears as springs which drain into creeks. streams and rivers, which eventually feed the bays and estuaries, thus providing a base flow of waterfor all Texans. Land stewardship on millions of acres, combined with community conservation efforts, translates into what may be the most significant contribution to water conservation today.

· Finally, and perhaps most importantly, voluntary land stewardship allows Texans to consider water at its origins, not just at its destination.

We should encourage voluntary land stewardship on a grand scale - as one of the cornerstone solutions for water issues in Texas because it is complementary, costeffective, sustainable, efficient, environmentally sensitive, multi-faceted and manageable. The efforts of private landowners are vitally important because the presence of voluntary land stewardship helps maximize the effectiveness of all other water management strategies.

Look and see what you can do to make a difference on your lands and through your everyday activities to help provide more water for Texans.

Wild Rice Soup

Prep Time: 30 minutes Cook time: 1 Hour

Ingredients:

- * 1/3 cup uncooked wild rice
- * 1 tablespoon canola oil * 1 quart water
- * 1 medium onion, chopped
- * 1 celery rib, finely chopped
- * 1 medium carrot, finely chopped * 1/2 cup butter
- * 1/2 cup all-purpose flour * 3 cups chicken broth
- * 2 cups half-and-half cream
- 1/2 teaspoon dried rosemary, crushed
- * 1 teaspoon salt



Directions

* In a medium saucepan, combine the rice, oil and water, bring to a boil. Reduce heat; cover and simmer for 30 minutes.

Meanwhile, in a Dutch oven, cook the onion, celery and carrot in butter until vegetables are almost tender. Stir in flour until blended; cook and stir for 2 minutes. Slowly stir in broth and undrained rice. Bring to a boil; cook and stir for 2 minutes or until slightly thickened. Reduce heat; stir in cream, rosemary and salt. Simmer, uncovered, for about 20 minutes or until rice is tender.

Yield: 8 Servings

Classic Cabbage Rolls Prep Time: 30 Minutes Cook Time: 1 Hour, 30 Minutes

Ingredients:

- 1 medium head cabbage
- 1-1/2 cups chopped onion, divided
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 2 cans (14-1/2 ounces each) Italian stewed tomatoes
- 4 garlic cloves, minced
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- 1-1/2 teaspoons salt, divided
- 1 cup cooked rice
- 1/4 cup ketchup
- 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- pound lean ground beef (90% lean) 1/4 pound bulk Italian sausage
- 1/2 cup V8 juice, optional



Directions

1.In a Dutch oven, cook cabbage in boiling water for 10 minutes or until outer leaves are tender; drain. Rinse in cold water; drain. Remove eight large outer leaves (refrigerate remaining cabbage for another use); set aside.

2. In a large saucepan, saute 1 cup onion in butter until tender. Add the tomatoes, garlic, brown sugar and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Simmer for 15 minutes, stirring occasionally.

3. Meanwhile, in a large bowl, combine the rice, ketchup, Worcestershire sauce, pepper and remaining onion and salt. Crumble beef and sausage over mixture, and mix well.

4. Remove thick vein from cabbage leaves for easier rolling. Place about 1/2 cup meat mixture on each leaf; fold in sides. Starting at an unfolded edge, roll up leaf to completely enclose filling. Place seam side down in a skillet. Top with the sauce.

5. Cover and cook over medium-low heat for 1 hour. Add V8 juice if desired. Reduce heat to low; cook 20 minutes longer or until rolls are heated through and a thermometer inserted in the filling reads 160°. Yield: 4 servings.
