# **Incumbent Sheriff, Baird Commissioner win re-election**

Callahan County voters went to the polls Tuesday, March 1st in the 2016 Republican Primary Election and overwhelmingly re-elected its County Sheriff and the incumbent Baird Commissioner, while a runoff between the incumbent Clyde Commissioner Harold Hicks and the former County Sheriff John Windham will be needed to determine the Clyde Commissioner seat.

Incumbent County Sheriff Terry Joy won the Republican Primary Election Tuesday with 70 percent of the votes cast, while challenger Franklin P. "Bucky" Shackelford garnered 29 percent of the vote for Sheriff. Joy took every County Precinct, including the Clyde Precinct with 2,367 total votes, while Shackelford tallied 996 total votes for Sheriff.

In the contested race for Commissioner Precinct #3, incumbent Tom F. Windham easily won with 71 percent of the votes, while challenger Kevin Curtis took 28 percent of the total votes. Windham received 630 votes for Commissioner Precinct #3, while Curtis received 257 total votes for Commissioner.

In the contested race for Commissioner Precinct #1, incumbent Harold Hicks will be in run-off election against challenger John Windham, former Callahan County Sheriff. Hicks received the most votes among the three candidates for Commissioner, but did not receive 50 percent of the total votes cast, which is the number needed to win by majority. Hicks received 361 votes (44.02%), while Windham




Mr. D. A. Olds has been called down from Big Spring, where he has been at work for some time, to see his wife who has been prostrated by an attack of erysipelas. We are glad to say she is better now.

Whitley was up on two charges one for displaying a pistol and the other for swearing and using loud and vociferous language on Saturday night. Mr. Dido was arrested for disturbing the peace. It seems that W. G. Ruete was owing Whitley a board bill, amounting to \$35. Ruete had drawn his check from the pay car, but had turned it over to Dr. West. Whitley, thinking that Ruete was going to skip out "went for him" with considerable earnestness, and demanded his money. West paid him \$17.50 and balance was paid by George Dido on condition that West would pay it to Dido in the morning out of Ruete's check; but the next day West swore out a warrant against the parties as above stated. The pistol case was tried by a jury and a verdict of not guilty found, after which the other case against Whitley and the one against Dido were dismissed for want of sufficient evidence to convict. Mr. Dido informed us that he had no connection whatever with the affair, only that he had previously loaned Ruete a small sum of money and not having the change gave him a \$5 bill and told him to get the change and bring him back the balance, and that Ruete spent the whole, consequently he had also interviewed Ruete but had gotten his money when he was invited by Ruete and Whitley to go to Dr. West's house where the transaction above mentioned transpired.







# **Fellowship of Christian Athletes All-Star Classic**



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all the taxable property a person owned or controlled on Jan. 1st of this year. Tax laws require all businesses to pay property tax based on the value of the assets used in the business to generate income. These assets include inventory, furniture, fixtures, machinery, equipment and vehicles. Owners do not have to render exempt property, such as church property or agriculture producer's equipment used for farming, unless specifically requested from the Chief Appraiser. By April 15th of each year, business owners must provide the appraisal district with a listing of those assets. Your business should have received a Confidential Business Personal Property Rendition from the appraisal district. If you have not received this form please call us at 325/854-5865. If you own multiple business locations, you will need to complete the rendition form for

each location

The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 2016.

The last day to file a rendition or report of decreased value is April 15, 2016. If a rendition is filed late or incomplete or not at all a 10 percent penalty will be imposed, if a fraudulent rendition is filed, a 50 percent penalty is mandated. Property owners who need more time to file their renditions may file a written request for an extension with the chief appraiser on or before April 15, 2016 to receive an automatic extension to May 15 or the next business day if it falls on a holiday or weekend. 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his life on the frontier and his death, he has been a hero to millions of Americans for generations

David Crockett was born in the mountains of eastern Tennessee in 1786. He was the fifth of nine children in a farming family. By the age of twelve, he was part of cattle drives from Tennessee into Virginia. He had little formal education and taught himself to read, write, and add. He became known for his quick wit and storytelling.

By 1816, Crockett and his new family settled in Lawrence County, Tennessee, where Crockett farmed, hunted, and ran two mills and a distillery. He was soon elected as county commissioner and became a lieutenant colonel in the local militia unit. He was elected to the state legislature by 1821 and to Congress by 1827.

He had a bitter falling out with President Andrew Jackson over federal land sales and treatment of Native American tribes. As a result. Jackson used all of his political will to destroy Crockett's political career.

He lost the 1834 election to Adam Huntsman, a Jackson ally. After the bitter defeat, Crockett left for Texas in 1835, seeking the promise of new lands and a fresh start.

As for Huntsman, Crockett's eldest son, John Wesley Crockett, defeated him for re-election in 1836, avenging his father's name once and for all.

Crockett's time in Texas was short. Almost immediately upon his arrival, he was swept up in the excitement of the Texas Revolution as Mexico was pulled apart. He joined a volunteer unit heading to San Antonio to meet the approaching forces under Gen. Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna.

Crockett reached the Alamo on February 8, 1836, and began shoring up the old mission's defenses. By February 23, the Mexican army arrived and the siege began. The defenders held out for two weeks against a heavily armed force ten times

the fall of the Alamo has been including in Austin, Dallas, and a source of intense debate for many years. Some studies contended for years that he fought to the bitter end, never surrendering. Reports from Mexican troops contended that he was captured, and while Santa Anna's troops, impressed with his bravery, pled for Crockett's life, the bitter and vainglorious general ordered his execution anyway. Regardless, when Texas troops made their stand in that desperate siege, Crockett stood with them.

In the years after his death. Crockett became a larger-thanlife legend, adored by countless Americans. Numerous landmarks were named in his honor. The town of Crockett was founded near Houston in 1837. Crockett County in western Tennessee, not far from Memphis, native, writer, and history pro-

Grand Prairie. This is in addition to the Crockett National Forest and Lake Davy Crockett, both in East Texas.

Many films, books, and television shows have told and re-told his tale often. Perhaps the most famous was the Walt Disney depiction on television that originally appeared in 1954 and 1955, starring Fess Parker as Crockett in a coonskin cap. American children were captivated by the wild frontiersman image of Crockett, reportedly buying millions of coonskin caps to imitate Parker's portrayal of the "King of the Wild Frontier." In modern America, the legend has become almost inseparable from the man.




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# **Barred Tiger Salamander**

Most folks are very familiar with the 2 most common types of amphibians that reside in this state. Nearly everyone has heard a frog calling, or seen a toad in their own backyard. Yet most people are not aware of a foot-long, 4-legged and tailed amphibian that dwells here as well, and that is the Barred Tiger Salamander.

The Barred Tiger Salamander (Ambystoma tigrinum mavortium) belongs to a genus of

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salamanders that are categorized as Mole Salamanders. This genus has 5 representatives in Texas, and this particular species has the most extensive range of the faction. This distinctive species occurs in the northern extensions of the Edwards Plateau northward throughout the entire Texas Panhandle and westward throughout the entire Trans-Pecos region. It is in these eco-regions that it resides almost exclusively near semi-permanent bodies of water, primarily in areas of rocky or sandy grasslands. Moderately or heavily vegetated cattle watering tanks and stock ponds (ones that are not stocked with carnivorous fish) are often utilized as breeding areas. In the Texas Panhandle, ephemeral playa lakes are heavily exploited as breeding sites, especially playas that have been unaltered by farmland or industry.

As the family name implies, this group of salamanders is well suited to living life underground, much akin to moles. It rarely makes an appearance above ground, typically after heavy deluges of spring and summer rains, although occasional specimens may be surface active after sufficient winter rainfall. Its propensity to remain underground makes this creature a common, but rarely observed treasure, even by those who are looking for it.

The old adage "everything is bigger in Texas" holds true with this species. Whereas other members of this clan are undersized, this type is the largest terrestrial salamander species in the eastern United States. Adults can range in size from 7 to 9 inches, although foot-long individuals are not uncommon. The water-dwelling larvae often achieve a total length of 6 inches or so.

This impressive salamander variety is usually, but not always, stunningly colored. The dorsal coloration is typically black, and most individuals have a series of bright yellow bars and dots that are painted along the backside, the reason that it bears the com-

# **AARP** says sale of Oncor is a bad bet for Texans

AUSTIN, Texas - AARP Texas Director Bob Jackson is urging the Public Utility Commission of Texas to reject a proposed sale of Oncor, the largest power utility in the state. The PUC is scheduled to discuss the matter on Thursday, March 4. Since Friday, more than 1,000 AARP members in Texas have contacted the PUC expressing their concern about the deal.

A commentary by Jackson appeared in today's TribTak, a publication of The Texas Tribune. The article can be viewed here: http:// tribtalk.org/2016/02/26/ sale-of-oncor-is-a-bad-bet-fortexans/, and the text follows:

Something is surely wrong when Wall Street speculators swoop in to take over the state's largest power utility and present last-minute sweeteners to make it look like a good deal for consumers.

Let me be clear: Nothing has changed. The proposed sale of Oncor is a bad bet for Texans, and the Public Utility Commission should reject it.

The sale is merely a transfer of wealth from millions of Texas ratepayers to the suit pockets of hedge fund managers and bankers. It relies on a clever financing scheme, what lawyers call a real estate investment trust, to buy Oncor. And for the wealthy financiers, the REIT is as attractive of an arrangement as anything Wall Street could ever concoct.

Hidden inside the purchasing scheme is a

roughly \$250 million a year tax windfall, but not for ratepayers or Texas taxpayers. It's a windfall solely for the investors. Add to it that the general manner in which this deal is put together could easily leave Oncor severely financially unstable and at risk of imposing rate hikes on captive consumers.

So, while the long-term status of Oncor may not worry out-of-state investors, it's certainly a concern for millions of people throughout North and West Texas. Residential and business customers alke deserve assurances that the utility won't suddenly have a hard time staying in business. It's important that the company is stable when it comes time to restore power after a storm, and that it won't suddenly be in such trouble that it needs to jack up utility bills. Older folks especially count on the availability of reliable and affordable power for their homes

Under the proposed sale of Oncor, power outages, rate hikes and service interruptions which can be a matter of life and death for some people seem more likely. It's for these reasons and more why AARP, as an advocate for ratepayers, has been shining a light on this suspicious deal for months. Having closely examined the proposed sale of Oncor, and after issuing a 16-page report on the plan in early January, AARP, with nearly 2.3 million members in Texas, is urging the PUC to reject the sale.

The decision rests solely with three PUC commissioners who were installed in their jobs by former Gov. Rick Perry to protect the public interest. To get their approval, the investors must prove that the plan is in the public interest. But clearly, there's absolutely nothing about this sale that's in the public interest. The tax windfall, the unorthodox REIT structure, the potential for rate hikes and other troubles, they all are indicative of a deal that may look great to Wall Street speculators but isn't in the best interest of Texans.

Had the speculators not framed this deal as a bid from the Hunt Family of Dallas, I doubt anybody in Texas would have even given much of a nod. As it is, besides AARP, Gov. Perry is on record in opposition to the deal. So, too, are Oncor officials, leaders of a number of large Texas utility customers, as well as many utility authorities, including the PUC's own expert on rate regulation.

Failure of the PUC to stand strong for consumers on this decision could cause utility restructurings across the state. The REIT structure is such a lucrative arrangement for investors that other utilities have already hinted that, should the Oncor sale go through, they will reorganize in just the same manner. The ripple effect, from the consumers' perspective, would have cataclysmic impacts on the cost and reliability of electric service for decades to come.

PUC commissioners Donna Nelson, Kenneth W. Anderson, Jr. and Brandy Marty Marquez should promptly reject the sale of Oncor.

# **Commissioners keep Burn Ban, but** allow agricultural & prescribed burns

Callahan County Commissioners, during the regular meeting held Monday, February 29th, voted to keep the Countywide Burn Ban in effect, but to allow agricultural and prescribed burns.

On a motion by Commissioner Tom Windham and a second from Commissioner Harold Hicks, the county commissioners voted 5-0 to keep the Countywide Burn Ban in effect, but to allow agricultural and prescribed burns.

The order prohibiting outdoor burning follows:

#### CALLAHAN COUNTY, TEX-AS ORDER PROHIBITING OUTDOOR BURNING

WHEREAS, in accordance with Section 240.906 of the Local Government Code, the Callahan County Commissioners Court had found that dry conditions in the unincorporated areas of Callahan County create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning; and, whereas, such a finding authorizes the issuance of an order which prohibits or restricts outdoor burning.

NOW THEREFORE BEIT OR-DERED that the following regulations are hereby established for all unincorporated areas of Callahan County, Texas. (1) Action prohibited:

A. A person violates this order if he or she knowingly, intentionally or recklessly burns any combustible material outside of an enclosure which serves to contain all flames and/or sparks, or orders such burning

by others.

B. A person violates this order if he or she knowingly, intentionally or recklessly engages in any activity outdoors which could allow flames or sparks that could result in a fire, or orders such activities by others. (2) Enforcement:

A. A violation of this order is a Class C Misdemeanor. B. This order may be enforced by any duly commissioned peace officer in Callahan County. (3) This order is effective and

enforceable for 90 days after the date of adoption which is indicated below.

(4) This order does not apply to outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission for firefighter training; public utility, natural gas pipeline, or mining operations, or, harvesting of agriculture crops.

(5) Further, a person is not in violation if prior to the setting of any outdoor fire, he or she first obtains the permission of the appropriate volunteer Fire Chief. In this instance the Fire Chief will have the authority to set the conditions, restrictions, and/or precautions which must be observed.

(6) See Attachment A for welding precautions and Attachment B for grilling precautions.

#### ATTACHMENT A

Due to high fire danger and dry foliage these restrictions were put in place for the protection of the Citizens and their property in Callahan County. It was not intended to take away a person's livelihood.

WELDING WILL BE PER-MITTED IF THE PROPER PRECAUTIONS ARE BEING TAKEN.

1. The individual welding must have a spotter.

2. Two wet fire extinguishers must be available.

3. Must have sufficient supply of water on hand at all times. 4. Must have water sprayer

available for use. 5. Must wet down sufficient area (and re-wet as often as necessary).

These safety precautions must be taken and also, please use common sense and good judgment if the conditions are windy. If the job is not an emergency put it off until another date.

Violations will be punishable by a penalty of a fine of up to \$1,000.00 or confinement in jail for a term not exceeding 180 days. An individual, or individuals, could be liable for damages,



There have been no serious problems with the vaccine, though the CDC cautions that anyone with a weakened immune system should not be inoculated.

The most common side effects have been redness, soreness, swelling or itching at the shot site. If you have any questions, visit with your doctor.

Medicare covers the shingles vaccine as one of its preventive benefits. But, unlike some other vaccines that are paid through Part B, the shingles vaccine is covered by Part D. That's the part of Medicare you use when you buy prescription drugs at your pharmacy. People get Part D through a private stand-along drug plan, if they have traditional Medicare, or through a Medicare Advantage plan that includes drug coverage.

Your Part D plan will pay for the vaccine itself and for your doctor or other health care provider to give you the shot. But you need to make sure you follow your particular plan's rules in order to keep your out-of-pocket cost as low as

The average copayment for Medicare beneficiaries who get inoculated for shingles is \$60 to \$80, though that will vary by plan.


If you're vaccinated at a drugstore, check to make certain it's in your Part D plan's pharmacy network. Otherwise, the shot will cost you more than your usual copay

If you're inoculated in a doctor's office, check to make sure the office can bill your plan or at least can work through a drugstore in your plan's network. Otherwise, you'll have to pay the entire bill upfront and then claim reimbursement from your plan.

Just to be safe, call your Part D drug plan ahead of time and ask which pharmacies and doctors in your area you can use to receive the shingles vaccine at the plan's regular copay







Based on its solid performance and capital position, the bank's board of directors approved the return of \$137.4 million in patronage and other dividends, or 71 percent of its \$192.2 million net income, to the bank's affiliated lending cooperatives and other stockholders.

This benefit of Farm Credit's cooperative structure effectively lowers the cost of funds for the bank's affiliated lenders, enabling them to pass the value along to farmers, ranchers, agribusinesses and other borrower-owners.

The bank's double-digit asset growth in 2015 resulted in record total assets of \$20.0 billion at Dec. 31, 2015, compared with \$18.0 billion in 2014. Total loan volume increased \$1.5 billion to a record \$14.8 billion. 
